Prairiland School Board Holds Budget Workshop

The Prairiland CISD held a called meeting on Monday, July 30 for the principal purpose of working on the 1990-91 school budget. They held a budget workshop and worked towards the completion of the budget.

The board viewed a video from Texas Education Agency concerning Senate Bill One, presenter was Tom Anderson, L.Finance Director of TEA. He discussed in depth the implementation of Senate Bill One and how it could affect the school district.

They gave Superintendent Max Ballard authority to review and award the Ag Supply bid.

The TASA/TASB Convention to be held in Houston September 21 through 24. Several administrators and board members are planning to attend this workshop.

In other action they accepted the resignation of Sharon Ramsey, first grade teacher at Deport and hired as her replacement Susan McDowda.

Also hired was Kathy Wilson to

teach English and Spanish at the high school.

The next regular scheduled meeting will be August 13.

The board held a lengthy discussion about the upcoming budget, and what was necessary to meet the state requirements for additional funding.

To meet the state's recommendation of a property tax rate of 91.08 cents per hundred dollars the board will have to raise the current rate from 76 cents per hundred dollars of valuation.

This would generate, Ballard said, about \$120,000 in additional revenue. At that point the state would then add \$280,000, and Prairiland could receive additional state funding of \$200,000 aside from any revenue generated from a tax hike, creating the potential for a \$600,000 additional funding.

The next meeting will be August 13, at 7:30 p.m. and at that time the board will hear the finalized budget proposed.

Contel Provides Free Emergency Calling

Beginning July 1, 1990, emergency calls placed to police, fire department and ambulance emergency services are now toll-free, Contel recently announced.

While this announcement may come as a surprise to many, to rural telephone customers it comes only as a relief. In Texas, as in most other states, many rural telephone customers receive their telephone service in areas where telephone calls to emergency services are long distance calls. The new 9-1-1 emergency communications system will correct this situation for most Texans, but the completion of the 9-1-1 system is still several years away for some areas.

In the meantime, Contel wants to assure that its customers are no longer faced with this issue. Contel customers can make emergency phone calls now without long distance charges. Jim Feaster, Contel customer services director, said, "Contel's customers will still dial the emergency number as it is listed in the telephone book. Even though the number will be dialed like a long distance number, no charges will be applied to the

customer's bill." Feaster also stated, "Contel customers should contact their Contel Service Office to have the charge adjusted from the bill should they ever receive a charge for calling one of the emergency numbers." The toll-free emergency calling will remain in effect until 9-1-1 emergency communications service is available.

Contel of Texas' President, Dennis Myers, explained how pleased he is to be able to provide this service to Contel's rural customers. He stated, "With 9-1-1 only a short time away, this may not have happened had it not been for the encouragement of Public Utility Commissioner Jo Campbell. It's a known fact that Commissioner Campbell is a strong supporter of advanced telecommunication services in rural Texas.

Paris Junior College is seeking to contact persons born prior to 1901. Registration will be held at 12:45 p.m. in the Student Center Ballroom.



Letter To The Editor:

A letter from Louise Watkins Osborne was received this week, which says "You can't go back, but you can remember good times and good friends".

She continues, that: When I look back over the years of 1930-40 in Deport I remember the good people and friends of the old First Baptist Church, the school and most of all the Deport High School and the Saturday Midnight show.

The show and the high school are gone now, but certainly not forgotten. Also, Grant Hospital and Dr. Grant.

Dr. Grant went day and night, 7 days a week, not much like a doctor's practice today.

He was a country doctor, who began practicing medicine in December of 1905. He was a farm boy, born on the Grant homeplace near Rugby in Red River County.

When I moved to Paris in 1948 we had a Paris Docotr, but when I was married and expecting my first baby I went to Dr. Grant. My mother and dad were Essie Watkins and Sam Watkins, and they used Dr. Grant when I was a baby.

I remember Dr. Grant and his nurse, Rhoda Oliver. (If you knew her you loved her) and Nurse Bocky Bell. They were like good friends or family.

On July 31, 1951 the hospital had to close. It had been operated at a loss for some time, and Dr. Grant was no longer physically able to keep up with the work load. Dr. Grant continued to practice medicine, making arrangements for hospitalization in Paris.

My daughter, Linda Kay Osborne was born on July 30, 1951, and I went home on the 31st. How I wished for Dr. Grant when my son, Malcom was born in the fall of 1952.

Linda teaches third grade at Thomas Justiss elementary, and il have two granddaughters, Amanda, age 16, and Emily age 10.

I went to Dr. Grant until he died in 1951. Deport lost not only a good doctor, but a good friend. I am glad Deport has two doctors now. I cannot think of a town without a doctor.

I know that a sum of \$1,025 was raised by local citizens for the purchase of the land at the intersection of Hwy. 271 and the loop at the west end of Deport for the construction of Grant Park. The Deport Lions Club supplied the remaining \$224 to pay Dean Oliver for the land, and the park, a fitting memorial, was created to remember him.


So for one more job well done you treat yourself to a coke, and what do you do when the can is empty? Throw it on the floor!!

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


