## Groundbreaking For HM, Inc.

Members of the Haskell Industrial Foundation, along with Herman Rieherd of Rieherd & Huckaby Architects, Larry Camp of Camp Construction of Graham, Barry Henry of Hank Dickerson Industrial Foundation of Dallas, Richard Pietree of West Texas Utilities, and Herman and Richard Marcus of Dallas, all were on hand for the groundbreaking.

After a welcome by Chamber manager Rex Felker, HIF president Royce Adkins expressed the feelings of the entire town quite well by saying, "It's been a long road, but the road gets sweeter when you can see the end of it, and this groundbreaking is the end of it, and the beginning of Haskell's growth in industry."

He then introduced Judge B. O. Roberson who welcomed Herman Marcus to the City and County of Haskell and extended good wishes on their success here.

Mayor J. Belton Duncan also welcomed HM, as a sizeable part of our community, and Chamber president Royce Williams said, "This is certainly a proud step forward into the future of Haskell, and we pledge the support of our Chamber of Commerce to help in any way possible in the future."

Richard Pietree of West Texas Utilities, who made the initial contact between HIF and HM for Haskell, also said a few words at the groundbreaking, as did Barry Henry of Hank Dickerson of Dallas; Herman Rieherd of Rieherd & Huckaby; and Abe Turner, financial chairman of the Industrial Foundation.

Herman Marcus, chairman of the board of Herman Marcus, Inc., then thanked everyone for their gracious reception of the plant here and said, "I believe in the future of Haskell,

and I believe in the people of Haskell. We like to grow with a city like this, and we plan to have a labor force of 150 people as soon as possible with a possible 3/4 to one million dollar payroll. If things work out as we expect them to, we will be able to double the plant size as is originally planned here."

Richard Marcus, president of the board, asked the question, "Why did we come to Haskell?" then answered it with, "City leaders and their enthusiasm made us want to put a plant in this town. This is not the end of the road for Herman Marcus, but rather, the beginning of a love affair with Haskell. We believe we can grow with people like this, and how far we can go, nobody knows. We came to Haskell because of its people."

Camp Construction Company of Graham begins construction on the plant building this week, and plans will soon be announced for the beginning of the training school for its employees.

## Duane Gilly Gives Lions Program

Haskell Lions Club heard a very informative and interesting program given by HHS vocational agriculture teacher, Duane Gilly Tuesday at noon at Haskell Steak House.

Gilly explained that FFA and vocational ag students have much, much more than the nine-month school training, that goes into their year's work. An entire summer program keeps them busy, and a record book on their projects can be very detailed and take many work hours. He showed slides on some of the projects that boys have undertaken here and told of the training the students receive.

The song and pledge to the flag was led by John McDermitt, and invocation was given by Sam Sharp. Doyle High, vice president, presided over the meeting in the absence of the president, Ron Bingham, program chairman, introduced Gilly.

Special guests were Durwood Jacobs of the Weslaco Club, and his step-father, Raymond Brewer of Haskell.

## 1-3 to 1-2 Signup On Weevil Pgm.

About 20 interested farmers met with officers and members of Haskell Boll Weevil Assn., at Rule Thursday night, to finalize the signup on the Boll Weevil Diapause program, sponsored by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

A representative of the Texas Department of Agriculture met with the group to explain the cooperation on the diapause boll weevil control program.

Some 7,572 acres of cotton, for a total of \$20,075.00 already has been signed up and paid to the association for this three-time spraying in this area, and Cecil Lewis, secretary of the association, said possibly the drive is 1/3 to 1/2 complete.

The association is hoping to finish the sign-up by Friday (tomorrow) and urges all farmers who wish to cooperate on this program, to contact them as soon as possible.

## Hey Day Entries End This Week

## Haskell Water Analysis Received: Thank Goodness For Miller Creek

The City of Haskell received their yearly chemical analysis of Haskell water from the Texas State Department of Health Laboratories in Austin last week, and a very informative report it was.

The '73 report showed 165 milligrams of nitrate per liter, as compared to the 45 high recommended limit. Dissolved solids measured 2,000 per liter, and total recommended solids should not be over 500.

A comparison with last year's report showed an increase of 80 liters of nitrate, and even that was 105, as compared to the recommended 45.

A complete comparison of the water report of 1970, with that of 1973, shows:

The comparisons show a steady increase in every element in the past three years, and most are far above the recommended limits.

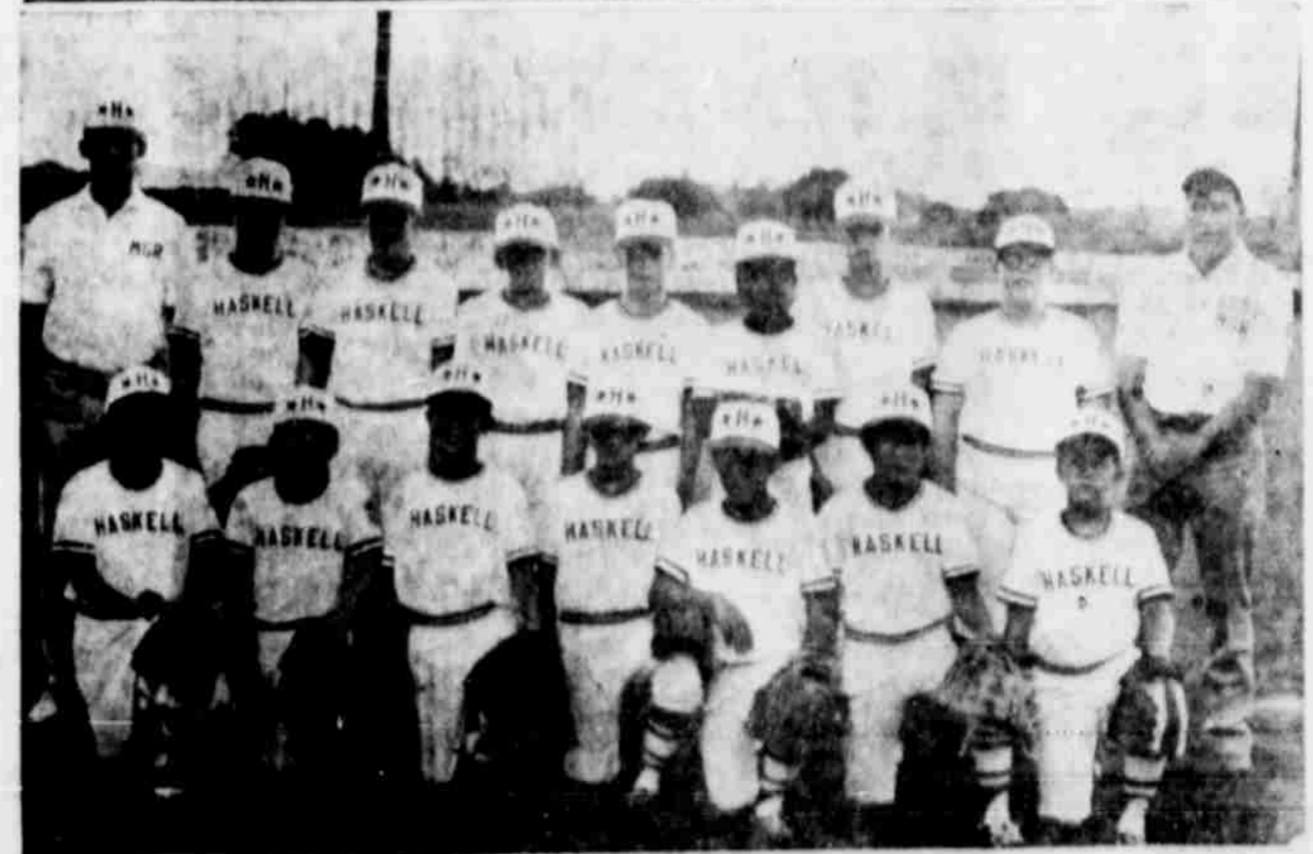
The Constitutional Revision Commission is meeting to review policy presentations of its seven standing committees on specific areas. Following the presentations, editors and publishers will hold informal talks with commission members. Deadline for the final document is Nov. 1, which the commission will follow by briefings of legislators in December. The legislature will meet as a constitutional convention from January to May, 1974.

of natural resources have been farsighted enough to see that conservation is not merely desirable but absolutely essential in this age of increasing populations and diminishing resources.

During the early history of this country, the government encouraged or permitted exploitation in order to get the land settled and the resources developed. We thought we could afford an economy of exploitation because we were so rich in resources. We know now that we cannot afford to waste our resources. Poor schools and churches, rundown government buildings, and decadent institutions of all types are the result of serious depletion of the natural resources.

A stated purpose of the conservation laws enacted by our Federal, State and local governments is "to provide for the public health, safety and welfare." Our State conservation laws permit the people of the various States to adopt such conservation measures as they deem necessary. Some countries have statutes that compel individuals to use and manage

their privately owned farm lands in specified ways. It is questionable whether such laws will ever be adopted by the people of the United States in view of the progress being made in this country toward conservation on a voluntary basis.

Many conservation problems cannot be solved by individuals, working alone. Wind and water, Flood, drought and fire, migrating birds, and invading insects do not recognize man-made boundaries. The damages caused by these events often extend across property lines and their prevention and remedy become the concern of government.

Our future generations are dependent upon how we face the many challenges of our ever-changing environment—today.

Administration in Abilene. However, persons unable to qualify for one of the above assistance programs by state standards, and who believe they might qualify for the new Federal system (Supplemental Security Income or SSI), should arrange to see a social security representative this late summer or fall. The new operation will be handled by social security offices, but the money they'll dispense will not be from their trust funds but from general revenues of the Federal government.

In general, an aged, blind, or disabled person who gets as much as \$150 per month from social security, railroad retirement, state or federal retirement, or company pension, will not get an SSI check. However, if no such income, and with earnings of less than \$345 per month, SSI eligibility might exist. Resources such as a home of reasonable value, personal belongings, one car, etc., usually will not bar entitlement; however, savings, cash on hand, insurance, 2nd cars, etc., may do so.

Since no such payments can be made until January 1974, Tuley suggests that insofar as possible and convenient, potential applicants see their social security representative along this sort of a schedule: if last name begins with A-G, check into it in August; if H-K, in September; if L-R, in October; if S-Z, in November. If everyone in an area tries to see the social security representative in August, the lines will be long, long, long.

The schedule for visits of social security representative(s) to Haskell is every Thursday during August and September. Time is 10 a. m. at the Annex, City Hall, 305 N. 1st.

## Farmers Fight Sorghum Midge

Sorghum midge populations are now present in many grain sorghum fields in the Rolling Plains. When sorghum is blooming and midge number more than two per head, reduced yields will result and heavier infestations can cause a complete crop failure. To prevent a reduction in yields producers should begin inspecting sorghum plants daily after the heads emerge from the boot. Sorghum must be blooming for midge to deposit eggs into the developing florets.

The orange-red midge is about 1/12 inch long and resembles a common gnat. The midge lay from 50 to 250 eggs in a 24 to 48 hour period. The eggs hatch into larvae which consume the developing seed, causing the head to appear blasted. It takes about 16 days for the midge to develop from an egg to adult. Once midge reach damaging population levels in an area, this pest continues to infest later blooming sorghum fields for the remainder of the season.

One method of checking adult midge populations is to quickly slip a plastic bag over the sorghum head and then watch closely for the midge. Heads may also be checked visually during the cooler part of the day, but this method is not as accurate as the plastic bag method. If daily field inspection indicates that an average of two or more adult midges can be found per head and if 25 to 30 percent of the sorghum heads are beginning to bloom at the tip, then insecticidal treatments should be applied. If adults are still active in similar numbers 3 to 5 days later, then another application may be needed. This procedure should be continued if multiple insecticide applications are warranted by crop production potential until the bloom period is completed.

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# Life On A Kidney Machine

By CLYDENE COMEDY

"We thank God for giving man the knowledge to build a machine to take care of this problem," Bill Marr summed up his attitude toward the Century artificial kidney machine sitting in one room of his home. The machine has been there since April 12, 1971 when it was shipped by van from the Denver, Colo., Veterans Hospital. And it almost didn't get here in time, then.

Bill and Marie, his wife, had been in Denver for months, while Bill was on the machine 3 days each week, 10 hours each day. When the decision was made to put a machine in his home, preparations were made both in Denver and in Haskell.

Bill was taken off the hospital machine one day after his machine was shipped to Haskell, and plans were that it would arrive and be set up for operation before he and Marie got home.

It wasn't.

They had—at a maximum—four days before he had to go back on the machine. It finally arrived, but they already had called Denver and were making preparations to go back up there for his treatment. In the nick of time, the machine was installed and set up for operation. Now, he is on it three days a week—six hours each day—and goes back to Denver about every three months for blood checks and examinations.

### WHY THE MACHINE?

Events prompting Bill's ultimate life on the kidney machine began as far back as 1945, while he was in the service. Kidney infections and lingering infection after he was released from the Army, prompted his retirement from his vocation of driving a gas truck for the Enco distributor on October 19, 1970. He had worked for J. E. Walling in Haskell since 1945. He married the former Marie Wingham on April 13, 1943. They have two children, Mrs. Sharon Murphy and Billy Ross Marr, both of Denton; and three grandchildren, Renee and Basil Murphy, 6 and 4 years old, respectively, and Sheree Marr, 1.

In 1951, his local doctor began treating him for the first signs of kidney deterioration. In 1953, he was referred to the Veterans Hospital in Big Spring. He was treated there as the need arose until 1957, when he was referred to the Wichita Falls Hospital. Ultimately, he was sent to Denver's kidney

treatment center. In 1970, Dr. Alfrey and Dr. Mischelle there tried both medication and a low protein, no-salt diet. Neither worked. In intensive care for weeks, Bill finally went into convulsions, and was immediately put on the kidney machine.

It worked.

They installed a 'shunt' in his arm, needed to connect the machine to his body, but it only lasted two months.

The kidney machine treatments were working so well, they changed to a 'fistula'—created by sewing an artery and a vein together at his left wrist, and another in the inside of his left elbow.

When he 'goes on' the ma-

chine, the blood is taken out of his body at the wrist; circulates through the artificial kidney and is completely purified of all body poisons and excess fluid; and returns to his body at the elbow.

### HOW IT WORKS

The artificial kidney is a clear plastic tube about 8 inches in diameter and about 10 inches long, filled with 10,000 porous filters. The blood enters the artificial kidney at one end and a chemical concentrate at the other. Calcium, potassium and other chemicals are used. As the two fluids by-pass each other in the machine (they will not mix, but merely react to each other) the poisons and fluid are drained from the blood and in turn, pass out the kidney at the same end as the blood enters; while the purified blood passes out at the same end as the chemicals enter.

Kidney research is constantly improving the machine. When Bill first was put on it, he had to stay a full ten hours a day; then with improvements, that time was cut to 7 hours. Just two months ago, more improvements on the artificial kidney made it possible for him to stay on it only 6 hours.

"We are constantly hopeful that even that time can be cut down, although we know that the slower the blood travels through, the purer it is," Bill explained, "and even that one extra hour off is wonderful—more time for fishing."

The entire principal is based on one thing—kidneys are the body's purifiers. When they cease functioning, the artificial kidney purifies the blood, and also takes out the excess fluid from the body.

### INSTALLATION - OPERATION

Bill and Marie have the operation of the machine down to a fine science, and rarely have any trouble with it. They went through a 5-week training on it in Denver. Operation problems almost all consisted of installation, in one form or another.

For obvious reasons, a power failure—either caused by weather, or improper wiring in the house—created a need for the machine to be wired directly, completely apart from the normal house wiring. West Texas

Utilities also put in a bigger transformer at their house, for further safety. Special plumbing had to be installed, along with a water purifier for the machine.

And, in case of power failure, there is a manual on the machine to operate for up to 24 hours. The power has been off 3 times in the machine has been the first instance of a power failure. Marie can

During the Christmas season it is lighted with a revolving, multi-colored light.

Now that the tree is filled with them, he has begun installing them in the garden pool and, connected to a water supply, they spray tiny arcs of water into the circulating pool. Fish can live in the pool, which is filled with white polished rock and gravel.

**VACATION TIME**

"What do they do for a vacation? They go to Denver, Colorado; one of the most beautiful spots in that state. Each year, he hospital in Denver gives Marie a week's vacation, by taking over her duties of putting Bill on the machine. 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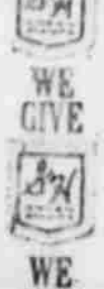
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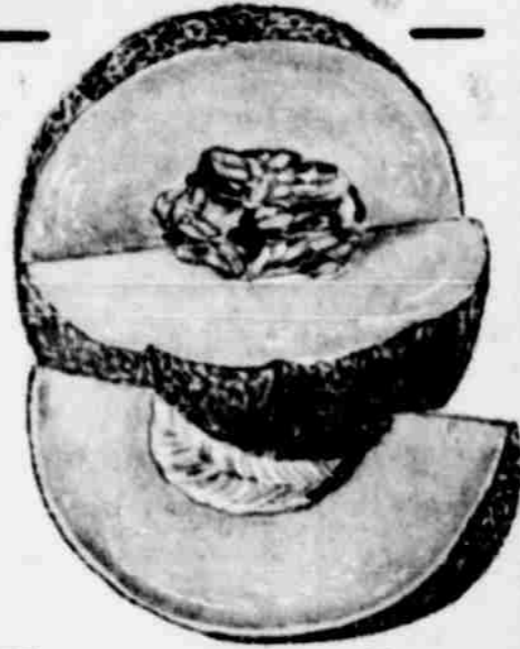

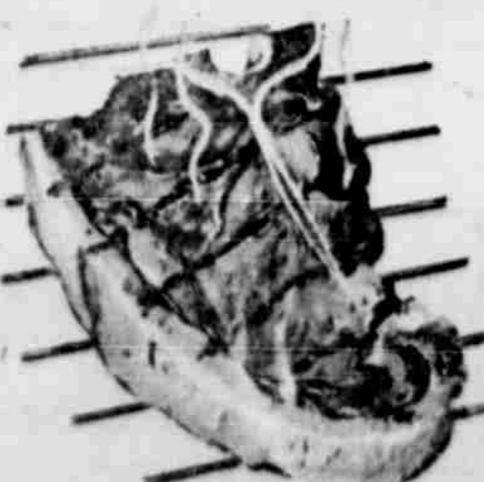
