There is never more than two or three dollars in this rack because we empty it constantly!

Finally, though, we decided to give it up.

Last week, when my husband came in he had a slightly awed look on his face.

"Look at this," he said. And he poured a whole handful of quarters out onto the counter.

It seems that virtually every single person who had taken a paper had made the effort to step inside the store and pay for it.

It opened our eyes. Instead of being frustrated and angry because of the coin tube theft, we found ourselves impressed that so many people were so honest!

Sure, it's aggravating that there is someone willing to go to all that trouble to steal a few dollars, or at least aggravate us.

But the assurance that there are SO many more people who are honest enough to pay for something when there isn't even a coin slot handy was heartening.

And it put things back into perspective.

In a world where every news media source is trumpeting violence, theft, dishonesty and ruin, it's nice to have a reassurance that people are still basically decent and honest...that it is only a very few who cause all of this problem.

The glass, which had been appearing half empty, suddenly looks half full again.

Last Days Of Halesboro School Remembered..

On a warm day in May, 1947, we turned out the light and closed the door for the last time at Halesboro School.....It was an occasion long overdue.

During the 1940's, World War II had started and had its impact on the nation. The population shifts from small communities to city-based aircraft industries, coastal shipyards, western copper mines and military bases had its impact. The nation had vigorously staggered back to its feet after a first round knockdown at Pearl Harbor. Men had gone off to war, families had moved to work in industries related to the war effort, and communities were changed forever.

The Halesboro community that once had its post office, stores, churches, school, telephone exchange, Masonic lodge and brewery was no exception. The Halesboro school that once offered an educational program from "primer" through the eleventh grade, was now down to 13 students in grades one through six. It seems that the once respected institution of learning at Halesboro was painfully reflecting the demise of a culture that was to be no more...another casualty of war.

In December, 1941, men went away to war with Pearl Harbor in their minds, and I officially started to Halesboro school. The school was in trouble from the first day I arrived to the very last day when we turned out the light.

Starting school in December was by design and not my idea. Leaders in the now diminishing community already feared losing the school because of rapid decline in student population. I was often allowed to visit school as a five-year old with my older sister. I was given a book so that if the school inspector came by, he would think I was a student. My parents and the teachers felt that I should start immediately after my sixth birthday in December, in order to help prop up the declining enrollment. Now, nobody asked me for my opinion at the time, but after a while, I was not too keen on the idea. My most noticeable reaction to school was that I cried for weeks. School wasn't much in my opinion and over the next few years, it turned out I was correct in my judgment.

For the first few years at Halesboro,

there were enough students for two teachers. Ms. Smith and Ms. Roberts were two kindly women, who were competent in their field and brave beyond belief. Their job was to educate students at about eight learning levels in two classrooms, build fires, sweep floors, supervise recess, counsel troubled, crying students and plead for materials and a signed voucher for their pay. They probably had their greatest lack of success in the latter, and soon moved on to greener pastures or, at least, to paved roads. Older students moved on to other schools in Deport or mostly Bogata. Most, however, just moved somewhere and, as we who were left would observe, must have taken the basketball, the softballs and the bats with them.

I was recognized as a student with a great deal of potential in about the fourth grade, since I could read on about the second grade level and do our column addition and subtraction. Our teacher at this time had actually been to college and knew about things like that, but by that time we were down to one teacher and she lived at our house. But, alas, she too tired of the endless duties, muddy roads and crying children and moved away. Things got sticky around Halesboro school about this time. My intellect told me that my dad was my best source of learning. We were down to a few ragged books, two broken seesaws, three swings with no seats swinging from bois'd arc posts, and the weeds on the school ground were growing about as fast as I was. There had not been a hot lunch served in Halesboro school since the 30's. Lunches were brought to school wrapped in "The Deport Times". If one wanted a drink of water and didn't care for the added enrichment of mosquito larva, then a mason jar of water was added to the old booksack. The REA had touched the school along with the rest of the community and a light bulb swung from the ceiling, and the school had a radio/phonograph that worked for perhaps a year. Nevertheless, the school was in trouble.

We got a new teacher in about 1946. She was another brave soul armed with determination, if not certification, and she was at least 18 years old. By this time, the number of

students was down to about 14 or 15, and we had learned about all there was to know. Onething we did notice during the last couple of years at Halesboro was that recess became longer and longer and the teacher stayed inside the building with her head on her desk. Someone even observed that she cried at times. I had finally stopped crying by about the fifth grade.

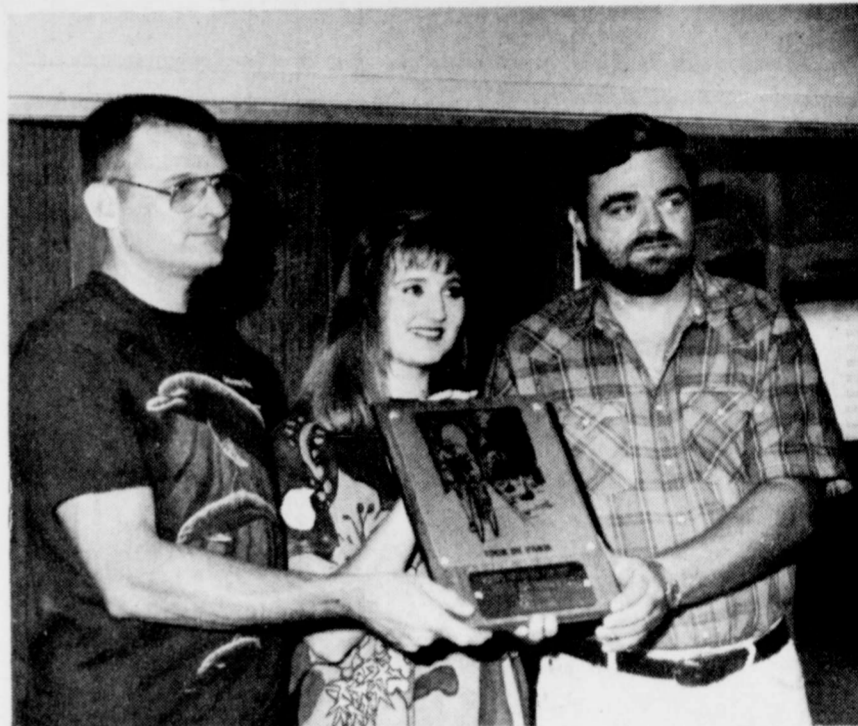
Playground equipment had gotten down to a very soft softball obtained by students' saving of Masterpiece seals from notebook paper and a 12 pound bat that my father carved from a hickory tree. The softball lasted about a month and I'm sure the bat continues to exist in someone's fence.

I'm also sure we still managed to have a few books and at times were actively in pursuit of learning, but rumors persisted about the imminence of consolidation with Deport and/or Bogata schools.

The new teacher married during the last few months of existence of the school, but she didn't move away. Instead she and her husband moved into an old house directly across from the school and set up housekeeping, and oftentimes on very cold days, her young husband would come over to the school and held classes. This was my first experience with a male "teacher". I remember that he would sit near the large stove in the corner so that his cigarette ash could be flipped into the ash dump. Little did I realize that the future for me held another male teacher, the late G.W. Seay, at Bogata Elementary School. Things were going to be quite different to say the least. It's hard to remember in much detail very much about schooling at Bogata. I noticed that Mr. Seay probably concurred with this statement, since he awarded me with two "D's" on my first six weeks report card at Bogata.

There was no celebration, no grand finale, no crying or cheering, we just turned out the light, locked the door and walked home in 1947.

Sales Taxes Show Healthy Increase, According to Comptroller Bullock

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that sales taxes collected in April, May and June of this year showed a healthy increase over last year's collections.

"This is further confirmation of a recovered Texas economy and of a state that's in economic expansion," Bullock said.

The Comptroller's office sent \$148 million in sales tax rebate checks to cities and counties throughout Texas.

Payments to cities totaled \$135 million, an 11% increase over last August's payments and an 8% increase over last year's total payments at this time.

In Lamar County, Blossom received \$3,016.65, marking a 6.46% decrease while Deport received \$2,383.35, marking a 3.23% decrease over last year's payments for the same period.

In Titus County, Mt. Pleasant received \$146,978.59 for a 6.40% increase and Talco received \$2,601.14, for a 14.83% decrease over the 1989 payments.

In Red River County, Bogata received \$4,049.96 for a 1.41% increase. Clarksville received \$26,398.61 for a 1.91% increase and Detroit received \$2,324.32.

Houston received \$23 million, the

state's largest payment, while Dallas received the state's second largest payment of \$14 million.

Rebates to counties totaled \$13 million this month for an increase of 18% over last August's payments. That sizeable jump is largely due to more counties collecting sales tax now than last year, Bullock said.

All local sales taxes must be approved by area voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General fund and use it for operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

Theresa Wyatt Dies August 6

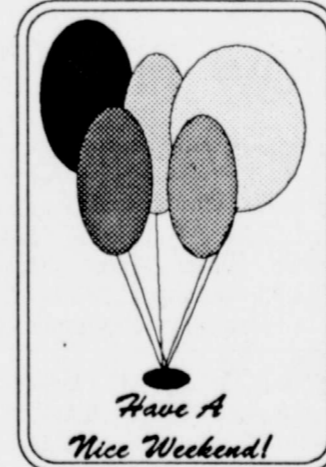
Theresa Augusta Wyatt, 69, of Montgomery, died August 6 in a Conroe hospital.

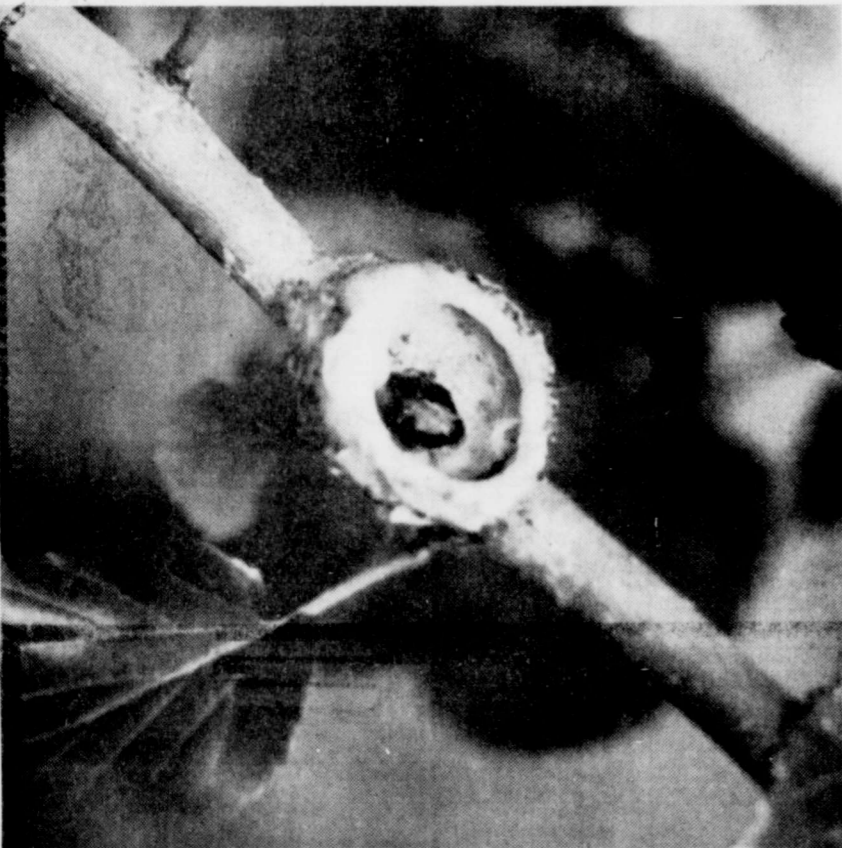

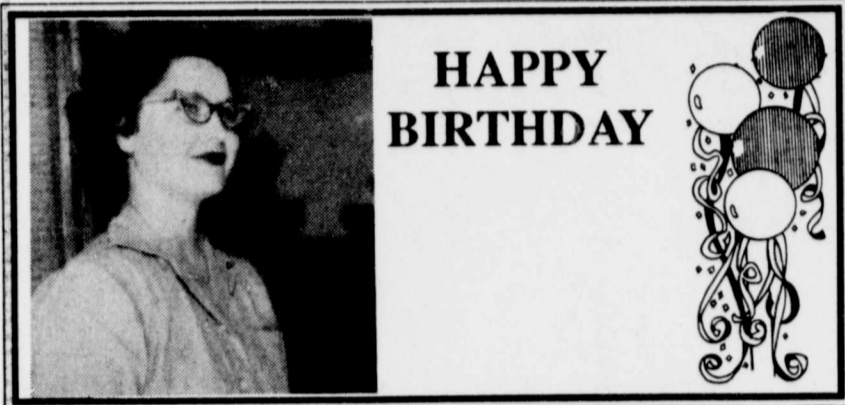

Cowboys And Athletes--- One In The Same

Rodeo is a unique sport, however, it holds many of the same traits as other sports. For example, each has the concept of "practice makes perfect". Like all sports, professional rodeo has language, customs, practices and rules of its own.

These practices will be in full effect during the PRCA rodeo in Paris, August 30-September 1.

Visitors and fans of the rodeo will experience the full force of American top spectator's sport, when cowboys from all parts of the United States and Canada compete for prize money in seven different events.

It is not uncommon for a contestant to have already competed in 500 or more rodeos before he ever enters his first PRCA contest as a permit holder, the PRCA's definition of an apprentice seeking professional ranking.

Today's rodeo is more than a rough native-born sport. It has become a living history that is vividly portrayed in professional rodeo. This heritage brings in a special breed of men that

drive for the best when in competition.

While professional rodeo has no quarters, halftimes or any other form of designated times of showing, it doesn't mean there's no "halftime" entertainment. Rodeo clowns can be very entertaining. They take time out to bring humor to the audience, sometimes taking his unpredictable behavior up to the bandstand, but his main purpose is to keep the bull off the cowboy in the bull riding. Still, a number of these men are skillful animal tamers and could probably make use of their talents with great success, at other types of spectator gatherings.

There are several stages in the rodeo industry, like Little Britches, Junior, High School, College and Amateur, all the way up to professional. But, no matter what stage, it takes consistent work, dedication and determination to become knowledgeable of the sport. Others make it on ambition alone.

"Tuff" To Be Tough

The first annual Paris PRCA rodeo is looking forward to presenting Richard Hedeman, better known as "Tuff" Hedeman, on August 30-31 and September 1.

Tuff is the World Champion Bull Rider for 1986 and 1989. With a bull riding earning of \$122,765 in 1989, he claimed his second world championship. He also received the Lane

Frost Memorial Award for the highest scored bull ride at the 1989 National Finals Rodeo. This was quite touching for Tuff, because Frost was his best friend.

The PRCA rodeo is part of the Red River Valley Fair and Rodeo which starts August 28 and runs through September 2 at the Fairgrounds Arena in Paris.

Instead of regular meal prices of \$1.00 for lunch and 50¢ for breakfast, students who qualify for reduced-price meals will pay 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

Children from households with incomes not exceeding the family size and income specified below are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

Once the applications are handed out, parents and guardians are urged by the school administration to return the forms within 10 days. However, applications will be received any time during the year, especially if a family's income changes significantly---someone in the household becomes unemployed---or if there is an increase in family size. Also, if there are foster children living in the home, they may be eligible for these benefits.

School officials say that information will be kept confidential and that all information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year to verify statements made. Anyone requiring assistance in filling out the application may contact the child's school.

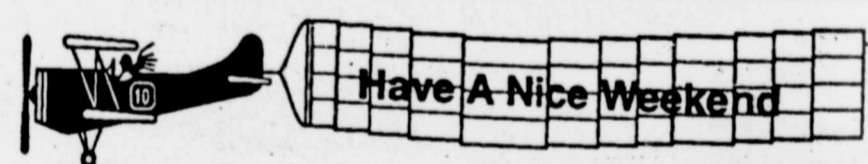

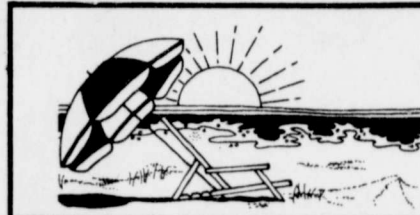

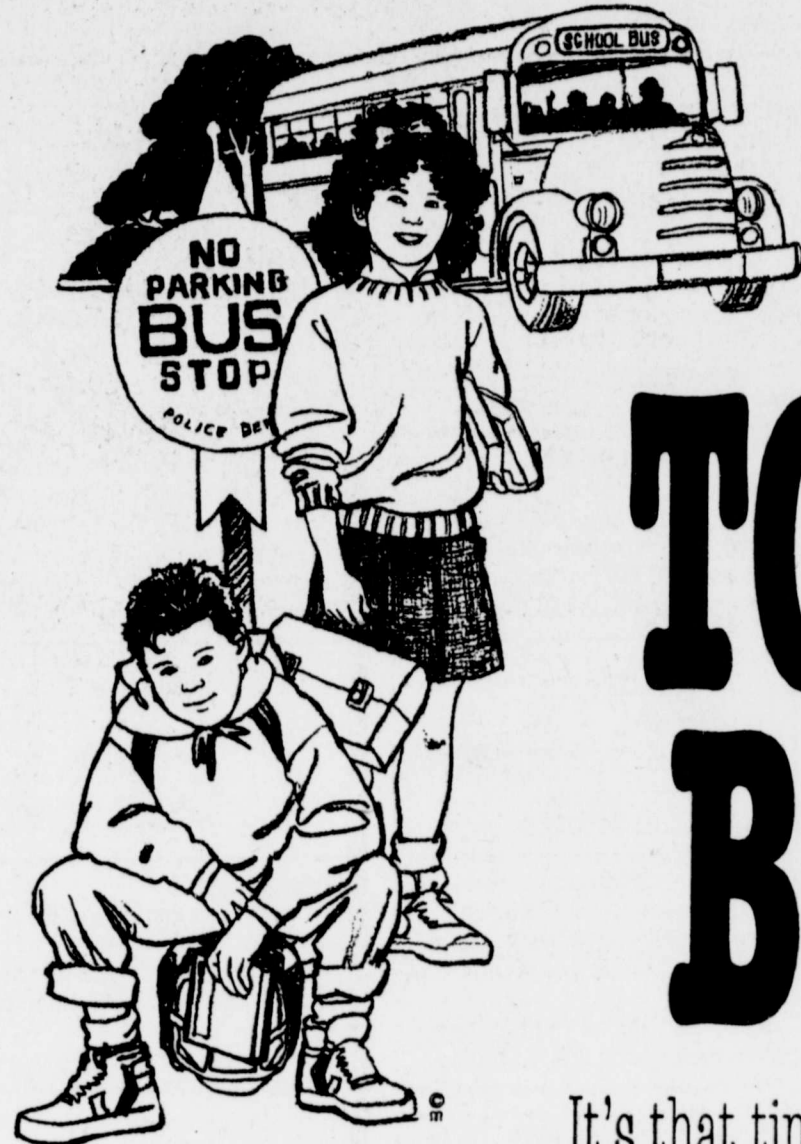
