Midnight Thoughts On Veterans Day

It's midnight, a Tuesday night. And we are putting the finishing touches on our first Veteran's Day page. Outside the office all is dark.

Last week we decided to solicit photos of veterans and people currently serving in the United States Armed Forces. We actually worried about getting enough in to do a full page.

The response, however, has gone far, far beyond a mere twenty or thirty pictures. Instead, we have over a hundred pictures, total between the four papers.

And, more than the photos, we have gone through an experience.

As the pictures have been brought in we have heard stories to move the heart, to warm the soul, and to bring a tear to the eye.

Unfortunately, we didn't have room to list all the medals and ribbons, places stationed and promotions for each service person, perhaps next year we can do a more complete job. We were simply unprepared for the enormous response to this.

But we have listened and read in fascination.

One family brought in pictures of a military tradition dating back to the Civil War.

Another told of how their husband nearly starved as a Prisoner of War in World War II.

Some sent maps and newspapers, like the one sent in by James E. Pratt's family. He had a copy of

"Blizzard" magazine, published by and for the men of the 10th Mountain Division in Europe.

The well-preserved publication has day by day accounts of the 10th part in a major push, and cutting a Nazi Escape. Moving letters from Italians, battlefield notebooks, even ads for "Keep the money but please return pictures and cards in leather wallet lost between Cassone and Riva" bring World War Two into perspective.

Purple hearts, victory ribbons, Distinguished Flying Crosses, Bronze and Silver Stars, the awards that chronicle valor through World Wars I and II, Korea, Vietnam and yes, even through the current Middle Eastern Crisis make a lengthy list.

Cherished Discharge papers or commendations were submitted.

Elderly men and widowed women smiled at the youthful faces that looked back at them from photos taken in a different era and sometimes those smiles came through tears.

Youngsters proudly brought Dad's photo in as Vietnam veterans try to explain a puzzling, frustrating period in this Nation's history.

Mothers sent us pictures of their children currently serving in the Middle East, their worries for the safety of these children apparent on their faces or in their letters to us.

World War I veterans still alive were few and far between, naturally.

One man, C.G. "Bud" Nobles served in WWII, Korea and Vietnam.

There were those who wouldn't

bring in their picture. They were too shy, or too afraid of "showing off" to do so.

Questions evoked a ducked head and a "oh, well, I don't remember, it was a long time ago". And then they would change the subject.

The pictures submitted were sometimes large and colored, sometimes small, cracked or faded. Each had to be "shot" (turned into a reproducible halftone) individually.

Each had to be trimmed and each name set and placed on a page.

And, slowly, the page took shape. A variety of faces looked back at us from the depths of history until the current time.

We're going to go home soon, hoping that we have everyone right, hoping that next year we can get more and more photos, because it's apparent that our gallery of local Armed Forces is far, far from complete.

And we're going home with a much deeper understanding of the sacrifices these people made, and are making, for this nation...and for all of us.

It gave us pause...it made us think. Now you look at the page and try and feel what Veteran's Day is truly all about. Then tell every Veteran you know "Thank You". Because they deserve it. And it can be too late to say those words...but it's never too soon.

Deport Heads List For Water Grant

With 24 cities vying for \$1,308,259 in Community Development Block Grants from the Texas Department of Commerce, the Northeast Texas Regional Review Committee ranked the City of Deport first with a water project in the amount of \$140,000. Second ranked was the City of Bogata for a sewer project (\$227,800); third was the City of Clarksville for a water project (\$172,000). The City of Detroit requested funding for a water project (\$143,500) while Red River County presented a street project for consideration (\$158,250), and the City of DeKalb requested monies for a sewer project (\$177,000).

All projects met the general requirement of benefiting at least 51% of low to moderate income persons/families with a priority of their impacting low income housing projects. However, this process was only the first step toward actual funding of proposed projects.

"The Regional Review Committee has the first responsibility of considering each project using a specific set of criteria adopted earlier this year," said James D. Goerke, Executive Director of the Ark-Tex Council of Governments. "These scores, though, make up only 50% of the total used to award actual funding. The Texas Department of Commerce, meeting later this year, will take each project and use an additional set of criteria developed by the

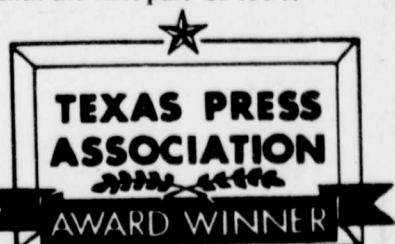
State to add to the scores of the RRC and determine the final outcome. "So," he added, "projects that rank at the top of the local level may not necessarily end up first following the state process."

On a statewide basis some \$32 million is available for Community Development Block Grants. For ATCOG's nine-county region, approximately \$4.03 million will be awarded.

Congressman Jim Chapman, Democrat was returned to his office, defeating Paris nati, Republican ve Hamp Hodges.

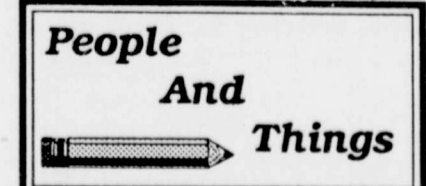
In an extremely close race Jim Hightower was defeated by oppo-

Mabel enjoys making Christmas crafts for her and her children's homes. Her specialties are Christmas tree shirts and stockings.

Banana Nut Cake With Caramel Icing

2/3 cup shortening
2 1/2 cup flour
1 2/3 cups sugar
1 1/4 teas baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
1 teasonn salt
1 1/4 bananas mashed
2/3 cup buttermilk
2 eggs
2;3 chopped nuts (optional)
Stir shortening just to soften. Sift in dry ingredients, add bananas and half milk. Mix til all flour is dampened. Beat vigorously add remaining milk and 2 eggs. Beat well, fold in nuts. Bake in Bundt pan.
Frosting: Melt 1/2 cup butter, add 1 cup brown sugar. Boil, stir 1 minute or until slightly thick. Cool slightly. Add 1/4 cup milk. Beat smooth. Beat in about 3 1/4 cup sifted powdered sugar til of spreading consistence. Frost cake.

Spaghetti Sauce

2 lbs. ground meat
1 onion, chopped
2 tbsp. Italian seasoning
2 tbsp. garlic powder
2 large cans tomato sauce
2 small cans tomato paste
2 large cans water
1 can sliced mushrooms
Brown meat and onion. Add other ingredients and simmer for 4 hrs at low heat. Serve over spaghetti. Sauce freezes well.

Pear Cake

3 eggs beaten
1 3/4 cups sugar
1 cup vegetable oil
1 tablespoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
1 cup whole wheat flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon ground all spice
3 cups chopped pears, about 4 medium
1 cup chopped pecans
Combine first three ingredients in a large bowl. Beat at medium speed. Add vanilla. Combine flour and next three ingredients. Add to sugar mixture alternating with pears. Stir in pecans. Spoon in a well-greased, floured bundt pan. Bake at 350 for 55 minutes. Cool completely.

Caramel Icing

1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons milk
1 cup powdered sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
pinch salt
Melt butter. Cook over medium heat until lite brown. Stir constantly. Add brown sugar til melted. Remove from heat, add milk. Stir slowly, add powdered sugar and salt. Spoon on cake.

Chili-Mac

1 lb. ground meat
1 onion chopped
Brown in large pan, add
1 can tomatoes
1 can chili,
1 can ranch style beans.
Simmer for short time. Add cooked shell macaroni.

Bro. and Mrs. Clark will leave after church Sunday for Houston to attend a convention for Baptist churches.

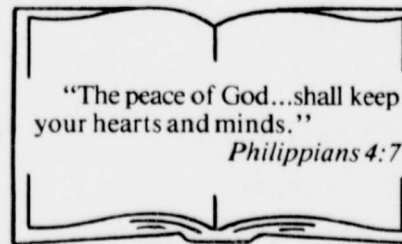

 To further this goal, the City has previously adopted a Fair Housing Ordinance, which makes it unlawful for any person, corporation, group or other organization to discriminate on the basis of race, color, sex, religion or national origin, in the sale, rental, financing, brokerage or other provision of housing; and which establish complaint procedures for persons claiming to have been injured by discriminatory practices, and further establishes procedures for investigation and prosecution of violations of this ordinance.
 The Fair Housing Ordinance was adopted in 1980, and is on file at the Blossom City Hall. 11-8

He mentions how much being a mayor has changed since he has been doing.

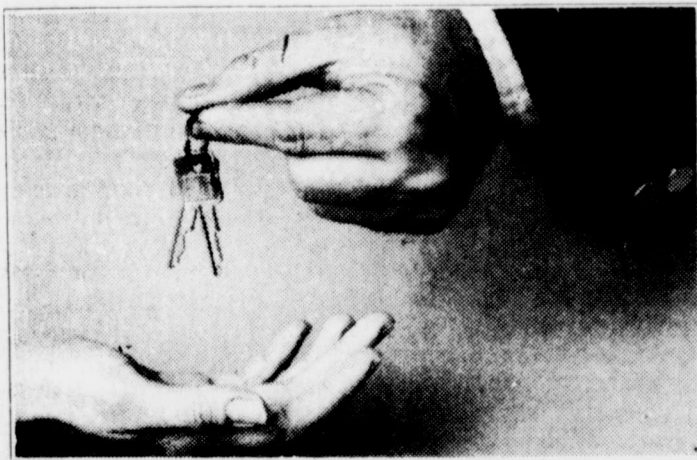
The story mentions the grants that have helped replace the old sewer system, that he was appointed to the
