## Prairiland I.S.D. Board Canvasses Election Votes, Elects Officers

# Oates, Downs Elected To School Board

The Prairiland Independent School District Board met Monday night, May 6 for their regular meeting.

The main purpose of the meeting was to elect new board officers for the coming year. Elected were: president, John Dunagan of Blossom; vice-president, Chet Downs of the Marvin community; and secretary, Dana Norman of Deport.

In the next order of business, the Board canvassed the voting from last Saturday's election.

Winning in Place 5, an uncontested race was Bily Ray Oates, who received 137 votes.

Winning in Place 7 was Chet Downs, who received 123 votes to his opponent, Herb Ferguson, who received 38 votes.

In other business, the financial and tax reports were presented by Superintendent Max Ballard, who also gave a report on the Senate financial Bill #351, recently passed by the Legislature.

The Board approved the adoption of Board Policies #7002, 7004, 7005, 7006, 7007, 7008, 7009 and 4433, dealing with campus and district

committee policies.

The Board then heard a report from Dr. Richard Nash concerning transportation.

The list of transfer students presented to the Board was approved for the 1991-92 school year.

Superintendent Ballard was given the authority to request bids on cafeteria equipment to update the Deport

and high school cafeterias.

Also approved was the purchase of cheerleader uniforms for the 1991-92 school year.

Supt. Ballard then gave a report on vocational funding for 1991-92.

In final business, the Board approved the expulsion of one student for the remainder of the school semester.

## Deport Fills Three Council Posts

The City of Deport went to the polls last Saturday, May 4 for the purpose of electing three councilpersons to the Deport City Council.

A total of 78 voters turned out to cast their ballots for the six nominees on the ballot.

Winning the places on the Council

were Nancy Gresham with 55 votes, Eric Pearson with 51 votes and John Lee Roach with 50 votes.

Receiving 27 votes was Rhonda Burns; Sherry Denison received 21 votes and Judy Whittle received nine votes.

One of the best attended and most anticipated events of the Prairiland High School year takes place Thursday, May 9 as the FFA Chapter of the school has its annual banquet.

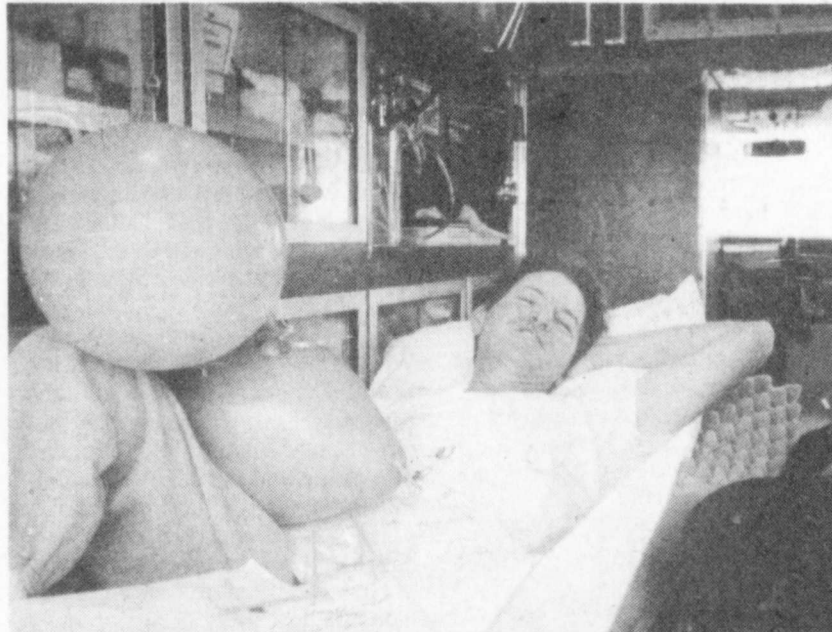
All current officers of the chapter will be recognized, as will those individuals who have won in competitions and in the department.

## Country Grocery Stores Are Going, Going, Almost Gone

Kisner's and Joe Ford's Grocery are gone from Bogata. Edgar Rodgers and Otis Westbrook's establishments have vanished from the streets of Deport.

The Taylortown Store is no more, and the stores at Milton and Minter don't exist except in the memories of older residents.

The one that sold so much sugar and corn at Sugar Hill, near Talco, is a thing of the past.

Rugby's store is now a lawn mower repair service. Fulbright was one of the last to go...but is now locked and vacant.

Blossom's old wooden structures have disappeared, and so have East Post Oak's. Halesboro Store's exact location isn't even a memory.

Carpenter's at Pattonville served for many years as a post office and store. It is being torn down even now, having been closed for years.

It seems that soon the old fashioned country grocery store will be as rare as a glass topped gas pump or two row tractor rig.

In many cases these homely little establishments have been replaced by more modern stores, often on the same location. Such is the case with Jim's Country Corner near Cuthand. It was destroyed by fire, and a clean, new building took its place.

At Pattonville a new building has replaced the wooden structure that was known as Jack Short's Grocery for so many years.

All too often, though, in an age of super markets and increased mobility, the country store has simply "bitten the dust" and belongs to a by gone era.

The country store was generally located at the crossroads of a town. It usually consisted of one long, narrow room, with a tacked-on feed room to the side, and often a set of gas pumps out front.

The porch would harbor a bench or two and the elderly men of the town could usually be found sitting there, telling tales, whittling and generally keeping an eye on the progress of their town.

When a customer entered the

double doors the screen door slammed an arrival announcement. Those screens frequently had an advertisement for bread or soda pop emblazoned on them.

The interior was dark, and felt cool in the summer. A pot bellied wood stove kept the front porch crowd happy in bitter weather.

Those stores cat to folks wanting basics like flour and sugar, salt and bacon, milk or butter.

There were few frills to be found. No fresh mushrooms or artichokes ever found their way to those emporiums!

But feeding a large family was easy as a farmer's charge account was totted up in a little book, to be paid off when the "crops come in".

Inside the proprietor or his wife would give hearty greeting to their customers.

Few strangers would appear in that dim chamber...and those didn't remain strangers for long.

The fixtures of a country grocery now can be found in antique stores fetching handsome sums of money.

Coke boxes that held their glass bottles suspended in a bath of icy water, tobacco plug cutters and signs advertising Ivory soap or Gladiola flour have all become collector's items now.

The floor was plain wood, and creaked mightily while shoppers wandered up and down the one or two aisles. Often a tin can lid would decorate the floor, nailed down to keep out rodents.

Shelves were of painted or plain wood, and prices were hand printed onto the can or package.

Overhead a ceiling fan might twirl in summer, setting the fly paper to jerking in rhythm to the fan's rotation.

At the back huge sacks of flour, sewn up in calico prints that were used to make uncountable dresses, quilts and shirts, gave the whole store a faintly dusty odor.

Eggs were frequently be purchased from a local grower, as was sorghum syrup, honey and fresh

produce. Slanted bins held fresh bundles of onions, greens or tomatoes, while underneath tilted bushel baskets held red and white potatoes, sweet potatoes and beans.

Human nutrition wasn't the only kind that could be obtained at a country store, either.

There would be scratchy burlap bags of horse and mule feed, hen scratch and hog mash. Those bags would bear portraits of truly amazing, prize-winning animals on the side.

Medicinal needs, too, were met with Lydia Pinkham's, Carter's Little Liver Pills and other patent remedies lining the shelves.

For children there was always a special section...the candy section.

In an era where candy was a real treat, those glass jars filled with everything from peppermint to chocolate possessed an irresistible appeal.

Often the store served as the post office too. The post master would be one or the other of the husband and wife team running the store.

The post office was a small room with a lockable door, and a request for mail pickup or stamps would result in the grocer removing their apron and stepping "next door" into the post office to fill their customer's needs.

That extra postal money came in handy to store proprietors who were all too often plagued with more credit business than cash.

After a bad crop year it was difficult to cut off credit to a family with several small children. So the understanding proprietor kept right on carrying the family until times "got better".

Country stores are few and far between now. Cunningham still has one that contains a post office.

So do a few other places. But, like full service gas stations and soda fountains in drug stores, there are only a few left.

And perhaps it is that scarcity that makes them worth noticing and remembering.

By their very rarity they have become something worth noting.

All students received peanut parties, balloons, coloring books, popcorn, cokes, safety brochures and bumper stickers.

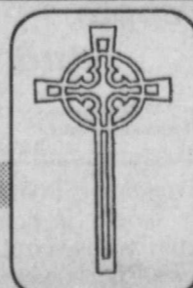

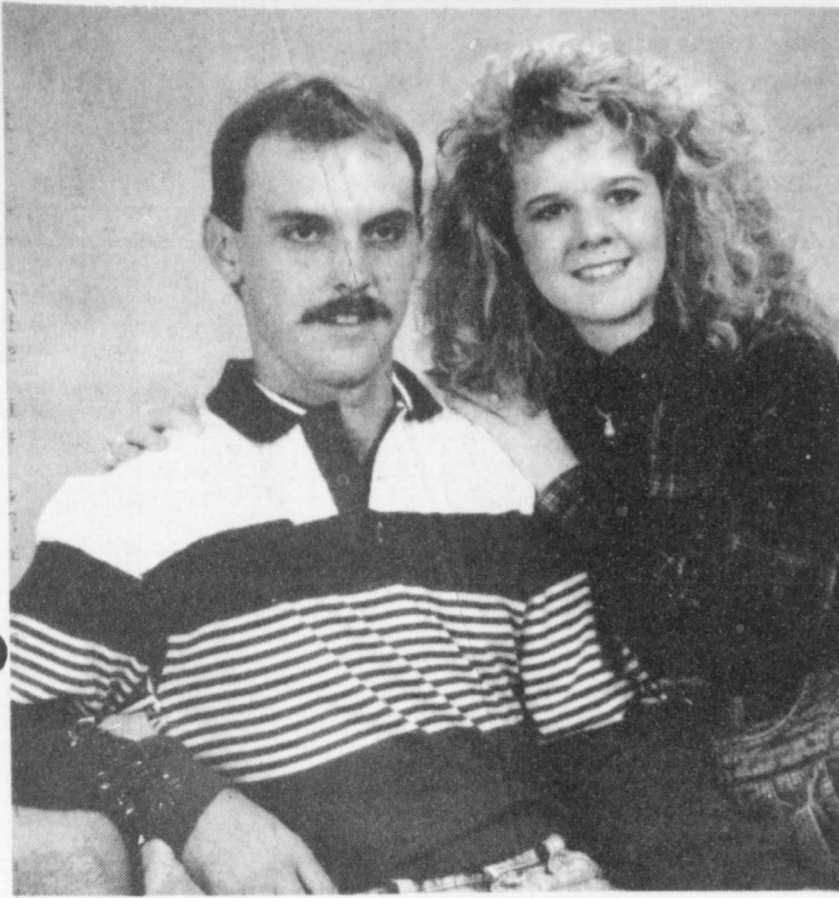

## Moore-Ingram Announce Engagement

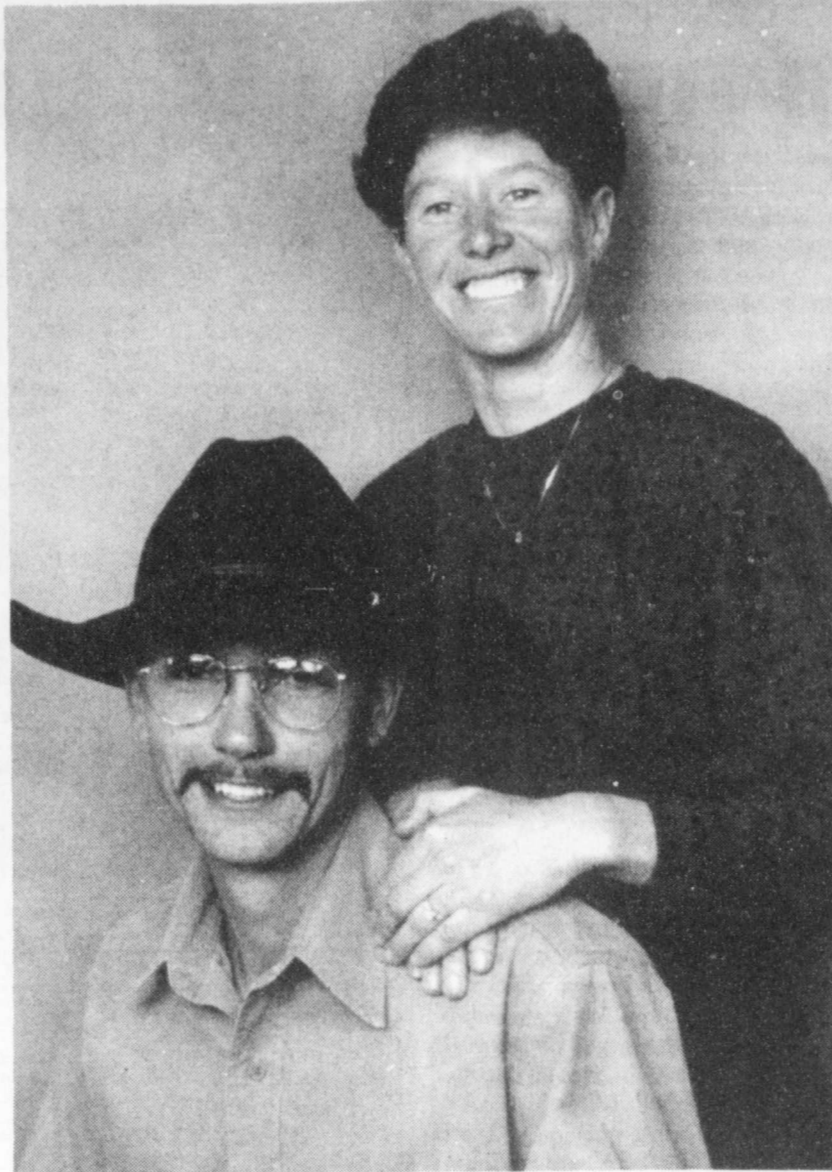

## Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 17, 1991. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and weather and annualization of test year rate increases of \$35,836,827, or 9.63%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 2 of TNP One, the second unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, sale-leaseback treatment will be given to Unit 2, thereby including a lease payment in the cost of service, as opposed to traditional rate base treatment. If adopted, the sale-leaseback plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$31,210,197, or an 8.38% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 165,011 customers located within the state of Texas.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, Texas, and with all cities served by Texas-New Mexico Power Company which have retained original jurisdiction. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at each business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

## Commercial Drivers Require CDL License

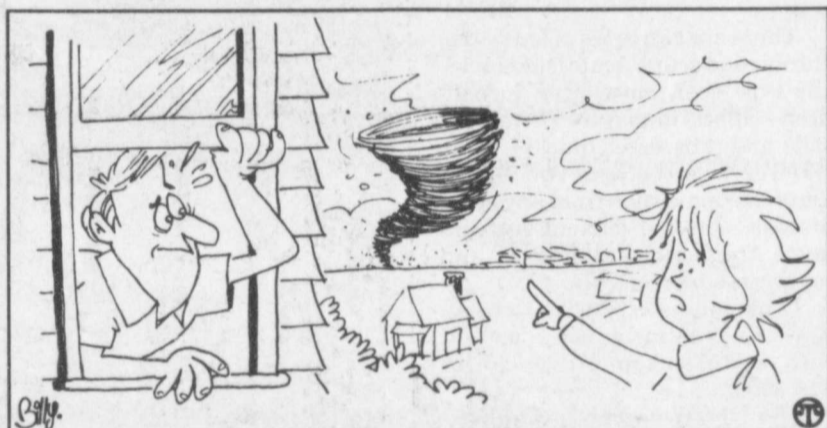

Tornadoes: What You Should Know



Myth: Windows should always be opened to equalize pressure. Fact: Opening windows to equalize pressure during a tornado is ineffective in reducing damage. Don't worry about windows, worry about protecting yourself.

If you're like many Americans, there are a number of things about tornadoes you might like to know. Separating myth from reality can mean the difference between injury and safety. Here, from the experts at State Farm Insurance, are helpful facts that may do just that.

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## Rep. Patterson Announces Eradication Bill

As chairman of the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee, Representative Pete Patterson, D-Brookston, is taking the lead in guiding House Bill 1979 through the House of Representatives. H.B. 1979, developed and supported by Texas cotton commodity groups, establishes methods and procedures for the development of a Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation and Board. Senator Bill Sims, D-San Angelo, is sponsoring the bill in the Senate.

The boll weevil causes annual losses to cotton production in excess of \$20 million a year in the United States. The boll weevil is an insect that damages a cotton crop by feeding on the cotton plant, blooms and boll and by laying its eggs there.

Virtual eradication has been proven possible by programs in some of the southeastern states, California and Arizona. The Texas eradication plan, that could be used if H.B. 1979 passes, is similar to the plans used in those states and has been revised by representatives of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Texas cotton producer organizations.

Cotton producers will pay for the majority of the cost of the program and in fact may pay the entire cost

unless the USDA and the state of Texas later decide to appropriate funds to the program. The USDA has provided up to 17% of the cost of similar programs in other states and it is anticipated that it will do the same in Texas. The Texas Department of Agriculture will not incur any costs until field operations begin, which will be no earlier than September 1993. The TDA will act only in an advisory and regulatory capacity.

It is estimated that an eradication program will take four years to complete. Eradication means that the boll weevil will be removed to the extent that it is no longer economically threatening. Although the program will be costly to producers in the short run, in the long run it is expected to reduce their production costs significantly due to lower chemical costs.

"This is the kind of legislation I'm proud to sponsor. It helps people help themselves," Rep. Patterson said. He further commented, "Cotton is the second most valuable agricultural product in Texas and if we don't put this legislation into place, our cotton farmers are going to be at the disadvantage to farmers in those states that have gotten rid of the boll weevil."

**Progress: The Search for a Leukemia Cure**

Leukemia strikes down tens of thousands of victims each year—many of them children. Through research, however, scientists are closer to finding the key to unlock the puzzle.



The United Food and Commercial Workers Union (UFCW) has adopted leukemia research as its official charity, raising more than \$3.5 million in the last eight years, and urges everyone to support such efforts.

Leukemia is a malignancy that arises in the blood-forming tissues—bone marrow, lymph nodes, and spleen. It prevents mature white blood cells in the bloodstream from effectively fighting infection in the body.

There are two types of leukemia: chronic and acute. Acute leukemia—the type seen most often in children—affects immature white blood cells and progresses quickly. More children between ages two and 15 die of leukemia than from any other disease. Chronic leukemia occurs more frequently in adults and progresses more slowly.

Leukemia is expensive to treat. A year's treatment for a patient with acute leukemia costs about \$40,000.

The UFCW encourages all concerned consumers to help support leukemia research by making a donation to your local chapter of the Leukemia Society of America.

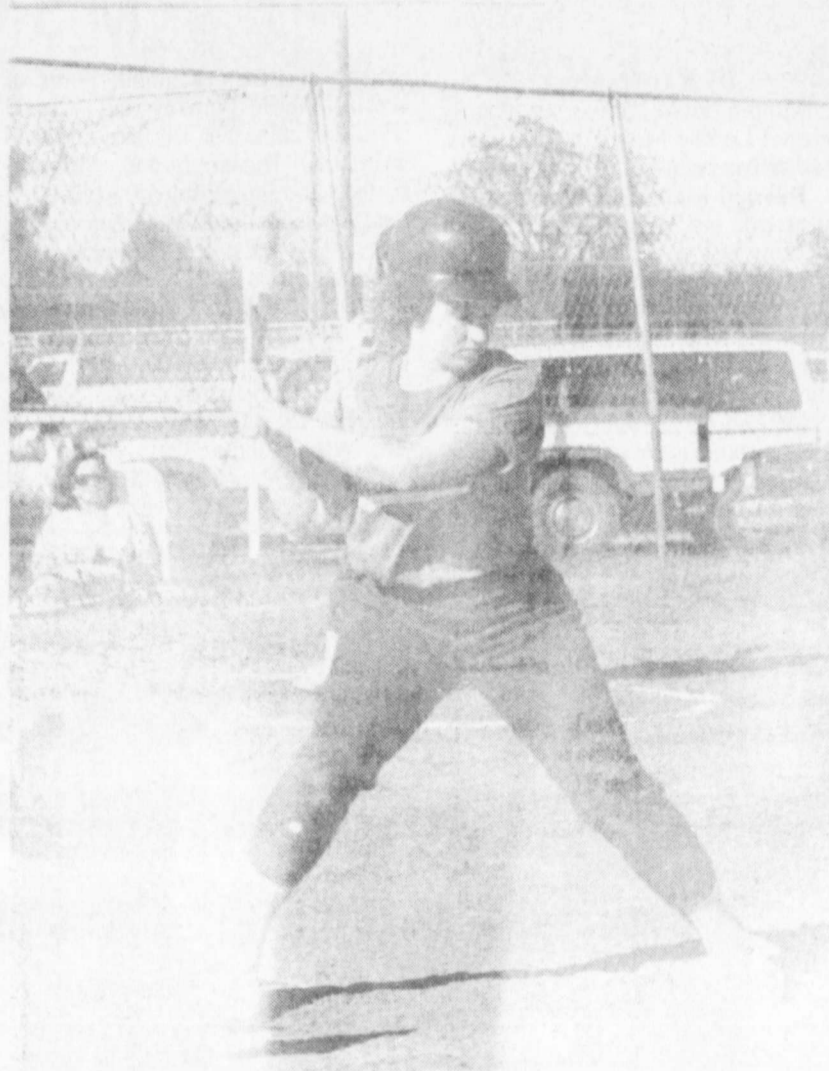
