New Deport Council Members Sworn In At Meeting

The Deport City Council sworn in three new members Monday night at their regular monthly meeting.

Incumbent Nancy Gresham and newcomers John Lee Roach and Eric Pearson were sworn to their duties by Mayor Charles Foster.

They were welcomed by the mayor and fellow council members.

Prior to the swearing in ceremony the votes were reviewed from the May 4th election.

On the agenda of business was Judy Whittle, with a proposal about a recycling program that could be established in Deport.

No action was taken on the idea until further information can be obtained.

The council voted to grant a price increase to B&B Equipment of \$2 per container per week effective July 1st.

River Cablevision Manager Jim Short was granted permission to have a Rivercablevision employee collect cable bills at the Deport City Office at a future date.

Short plans to use the city office to collect these cable bills as an experiment to see if the system can provide this service on a regular basis and better serve customers. He hopes that the employee could answer questions and put the business on a more personal level.

Permission was granted to Short to implement the program for a 90 day trial program.

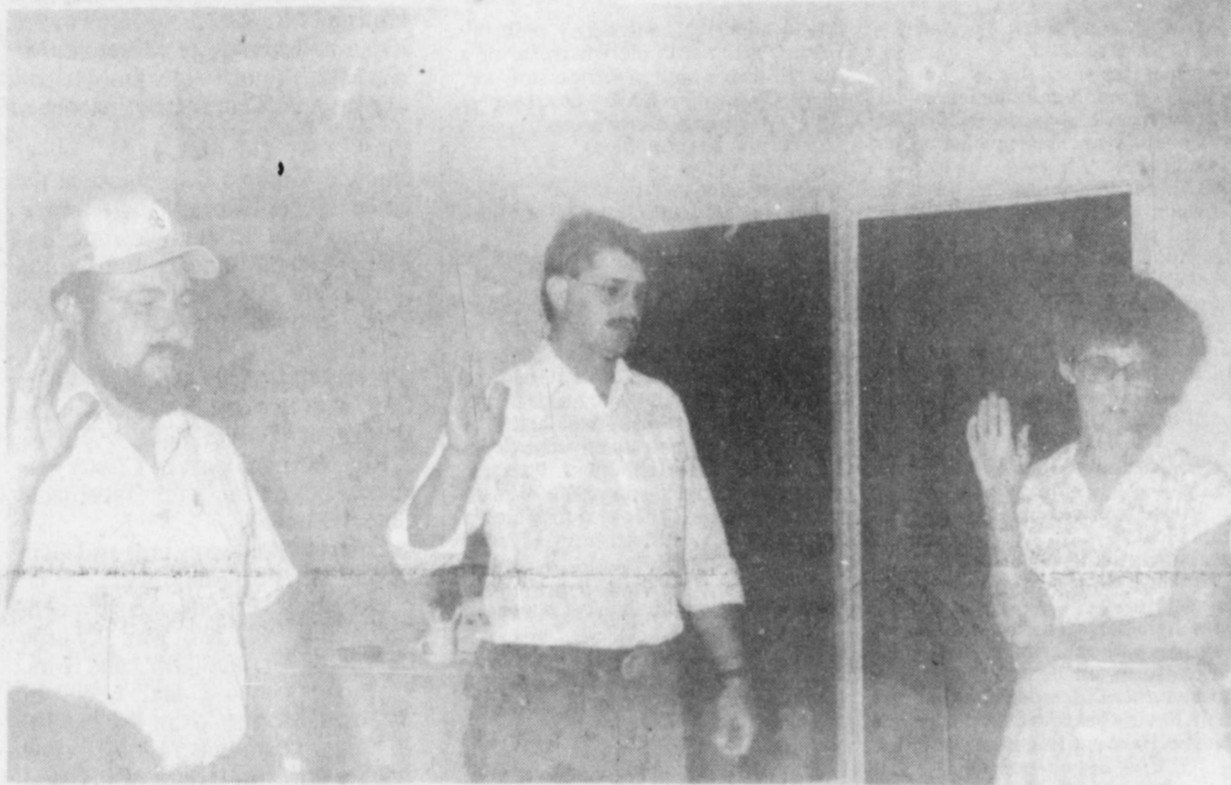
Joe Riley presented a bill in excess of \$900 to the city for property damaged due to a water leak inside his trailer house.

The council responded to Riley's demands as being a matter that would be referred to the city's attorney.

The council voted to purchase a maintainer from the Lamar County Water Corporation, and accepted a bid for a new city pickup from Kosterman Motor Co.

The Elrod trail date was announced, once more, with a pre-trial date set for Monday, June 10th.

Minutes were read and approved, financial report heard and payment of bills authorized.

Tax Rebates Running More Than 10% Ahead Of 1990

"The state's moderate but stable economic growth is one good reason there is more than a 10% increase in sales tax rebates for Texas cities and counties thus far in 1991, when compared with the first five months of last year," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

Sharp made the comments as he sent over 1,000 Texas cities, counties, city transit and hospital districts

checks totaling \$147.1 million in monthly sales tax rebates.

Through the first five months of 1991, the state has rebated a total of \$740.9 million to city and county governments, a 10.6% increase over the same period last year.

Locally, Blossom received \$2,080.71 for a 17.71% increase while Deport received \$1,707.44 for a 5.72% decrease over last year.

Paris received \$277,380.165 for a .89% increase.

Bogata received \$8,380.62 for a 44.09% increase. Clarksville received \$23,145.95 for a .29% decrease and Detroit received \$1,016.24 for a 4.05% decrease.

Talco received \$1,922.36 for a 3.53% decrease and Mt. Pleasant received \$127,316.645 for a 19.28% increase.

Beef Hash
Using leftover roast:
Cut beef into small pieces
Chop one onion in little pieces
Potato, if you had potatoes with roast, cut them up. If you use a raw potato, cut in small cubes.
Put all this in a skillet that has a lid. Add water to cover plus a little more. Salt and pepper to taste. Cook slowly until onion and potatoes are tender. Remove lid. To thicken, use one cup cold water and stir in a heaping tablespoon flour. Mix flour and water well and add to hash. Stir to mix and cook until it thickens a little. Set it off burner. Serve on a homemade biscuit or dry toast.

Amber Pie
4 eggs, separated (beat yolks) save whites
1 cup stewed apricots
1 stick oleo
1 cup buttermilk
2 cups sugar with 1/2 cup flour sifted together
Mix ingredients, stirring well. Put in heavy pan and cook until thick. Will stick easily so stir constantly. I use a pancake turner to scrape bottom of pan as I stir. Put in a baked pie crust, top with meringue. Bake until meringue is brown.

Cole Slaw Dressing
Equal parts vinegar and sugars, as 1 cup sugar, 1 cup vinegar.
Add any seasoning you like: celery seed and salt and pepper or Mrs. Dash (not both).
Bring to a boil to melt sugar. Cool and add enough Miracle Whip salad dress-

ing to make right consistency, probably 1 cup. Whip with electric mixer or a whisk. Keeps well in refrigerator.

Chicken or Turkey Dressing
Family Size Recipe
2/3 cornbread (crumbled)
1/3 white bread
2 eggs (beaten)
medium size onion, chopped or onion flakes
salt and pepper to taste
1 Tbsp. poultry seasoning
Broth from chicken or turkey to moisten
1 can Campbell Cream of Chicken soup
Mix ingredients, dissolving the chunks of bread. Use your hands to mix well. Let set a few minutes and then bake in a moderate oven until done. Dressing is best right out of the oven, topped with giblet gravy. Will furnish dressing recipe for cooking for a crowd on request, 25 to 100 servings. My own recipe.

Dirt Cake
2 pkgs (3 oz) vanilla instant pudding
3 cups milk
8 oz. cream cheese
8 oz. cool whip
1 cup powdered sugar
1-16 oz. oleo cookies
vanilla
Mix pudding mix and milk. Add sugar, cream cheese and cool whip (room temperature). Crush oreo cookies, sprinkle some on both of dish, 9x13. Mix other cookies with above mixture, leaving some to cover top. Chill before serving, then pig out!!!

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Switzerland Is A Vacation Paradise!

Editor's Note: For those interested in hearing about a trip to Switzerland, here's your chance. If you aren't, feel free to read something else....this article is definitely for those with travel in their hearts! Did you ever dream of having free airfare to Europe? Well, that's what we had back in February, through Paris Travel Consultants. I had earned exactly enough working there to have a choice of Munich or Frankfurt, Germany; Copenhagen, Sweden; Paris, France or Zurich, Switzerland.

After careful debate we decided on Switzerland. It has beautiful mountains, and there was a tour that was inexpensive enough so that a trip to Galveston would have cost more! All booked, there was nothing to do but wait until May when it was time to leave.

Our good friends and neighbors, Richard and Helen Nance, decided that they would go along, so last week we all set off to Switzerland! Of course, we had to make a little detour through Chicago first, where they managed to lose three out of four bags. When our one, small suitcase rolled off the baggage carousel in Zurich we all realized that we had no coats, and it was cold outside.

So, first thing, we went on a shopping expedition in downtown Zurich, at a place called Herren Globus. It was our first inkling of what things were going to cost in Switzerland. The country has an extremely high standard of living, and high wages. That makes goods high, too.

We kept shopping to a minimum, believe me. A sweatshirt or two kept us warm, and then we had time to wander around the old city center of Zurich.

The shops were amazing, and were so exclusive that few bothered posting prices in the windows. It was very much a case of "if you have to ask you can't afford it".

One of the most fascinating things we found was a clock, mounted above a jewelry store. Musical bells began playing tunes, and a parade of three foot high figures began a dance. Shepherds with lambs, brides and grooms, bakers and lumber jacks, children and adults all in traditional Swiss costumes turned and twirled above the crowds.

Zurich is the largest city in the country, and filled with banks and bankers from all over the world, all dealing with those numbered Swiss

bank accounts that are so famous. The only thing to mar the afternoon was a pair of teen aged boys who attempted to snatch Thomas' camera in the Zurich train station. They didn't succeed, however, and we put it down to the type of thing that can happen anywhere and went on.

The next day we set out on our Trafalgar tour, meeting our fellow tour members and getting acquainted with our guide, a young English woman named Lesley.

There would be little chance to become acquainted with our bus driver, because Renzo spoke only Italian.

Switzerland has four official languages, German, the most prevalent one, Romansche, an ancient language spoken in only a very small part of the country, Italian, and French.

Almost immediately after leaving the city we began climbing into the mountains.

They were so beautiful, and, due to a late spring, were covered with tons of snow. Huge slabs of greenish rock poked through on sunny slopes and red "pan tile" roofs and slate roofs gave color to quaint villages that dotted the mountainsides like jewels.

Every village seemed to have its own tall square church spires, or even the onion domes one normally associates with Russian churches.

The Swiss are very ecology minded. In every town there would be a recycling center where the local people put their papers, bottles and cans.

Many of the paper products we ran across were made from recycled paper. Of course, one doesn't find paper plates, cups or plastic forks except in the restaurants like McDonald's. (Yes, there was one in every city).

We noticed in several areas a set of poles outlining a plot of ground.

Lesley explained that whenever a house, barn or building is planned the builder must erect these poles in the exact size, height and shape of the proposed structure. Then, for sixty days, the poles stay up. At the end of that time if there are no objections that the building will spoil someone's view, or access, a permit to build will be granted.

Phosphate detergents are outlawed. No salt is used on the roads in winter because it flows into their rivers and streams and kills the grass on the "verge" or roadside. Their mountain

water is pure, readily drinkable. They have very strict labor importation rules, and very low immigration quotas.

We soon were in the tiny country of Lichenstien. High above it's capital (and virtually only) town of Vaduz was the royal palace. The houses were prettily painted with vines, flowers and bright colors.

In a cafe we discovered just how bad coffee can be. Espresso is bitter, strong and to most of us, awful. Thomas, however, didn't find it so bad, which was nice, as he managed to drink mine too!

After mailing some post cards and shopping through a stretch of stalls we proceeded to a little town called Leazerhauf. There our tour group scattered to make their own luncheon arrangements.

We tried the traditional dried meat called "Bunderfliesch" (not pronounced much like it is spelled).

This air dried beef, sliced paper thin, is served with cheese and brown bread and a pickle. We found it to be excellent.

All afternoon on the bus the scenery just got better. Soon it was snowing and we threw snowballs at one another!

At the top of Julier Pass we were knee deep in snow as we watched a small herd of deer flee down a gorgeous cliff into a deep crevasse.

There at the top is a square stone, put up by some of the area's first tourists...the ancient Romans.

Our night's stay was in St. Moritz, a favorite resort of the rich and famous. We walked around it's lovely lake, wandered streets past buildings carved into beautiful designs, and tried not to get too cold in our inadequate clothing. The promised lost luggage had failed to appear by that night, and we learned that the flight from Chicago that was supposed to have brought it had been cancelled.

Lugano, they promised! We could only hope.

A dinner of soup, salad, roast pork and potatoes warmed us up. We went window shopping. That was certainly all we could do, given the incredible prices on goods!

The next morning, as the cathedral bells rang out their morning welcome, we looked out our window to discover more snow, fresh and pristine, to make our trip onwards even more beautiful.

Next week to Italy, where the scenery really changes.



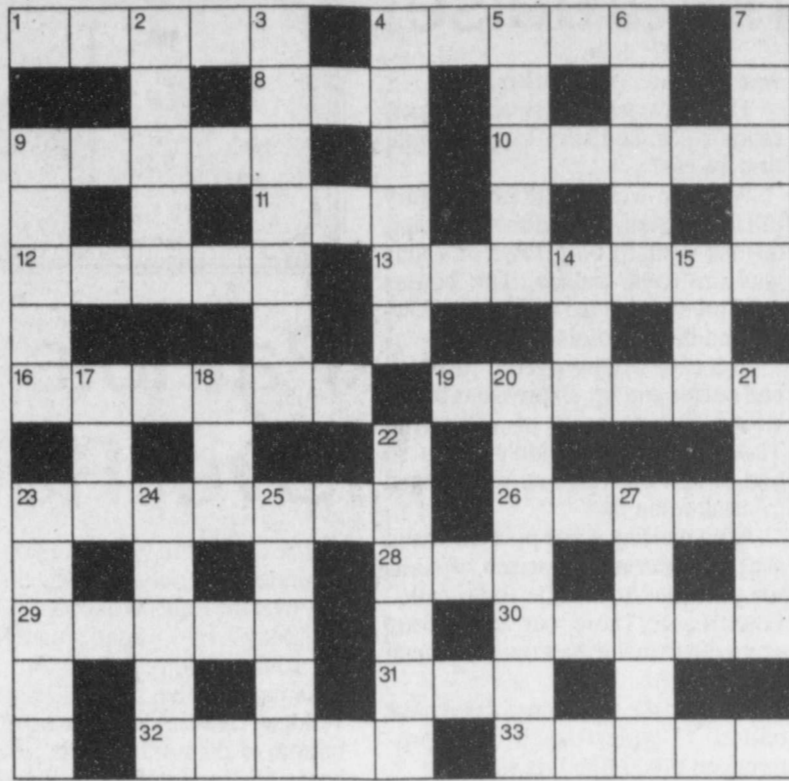

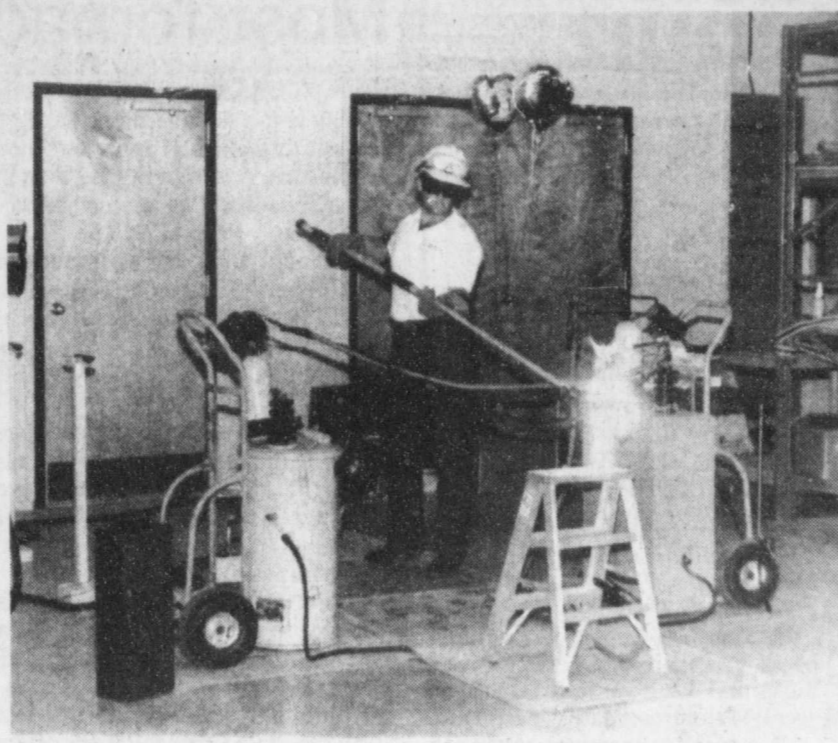

Most Tornadoes In Texas Occur In May

May is tornado month in Texas. More tornadoes and tornado-related deaths have occurred in May than in any other month, state weather records show.

The two worst killer tornadoes in state history tore through Texas in May: 114 people were killed in Goliad on May 18, 1902, and the same number died in Waco on May 11, 1953.

Since 1953, when the state began keeping more reliable tornado records, the number of tornadoes have occurred in May than in April or June, the other two months in the state's tornado season.

More than 37 tornadoes hit Texas per year in May, compared to 19 in April and 18 in June. All other months averaged less than 10 tornadoes annually through 1988, according to data from the State Climatologist's office at Texas A&M University.

Texas averaged 126 tornadoes in May because atmospheric conditions for them are most favorable that month, said Jon Zietler, an assistant in the State Climatologist's office. The state's location between the Rocky Mountains and the Gulf of Mexico also makes it prime tornado country.

In the spring, early summer and autumn, cold fronts from the north converge with warm, moist air from the Gulf near the earth's surface. At the same time, warm, dry air at higher altitudes flows from the southwest out of Mexico.

Scientists have identified several characteristic behaviors of the converging airstreams that can form tornadoes, but they don't know precisely what causes the storms—or how to predict them, Zietler said.

Meteorologists do know that when the airstreams converge, the forces can create large, spinning thunder-

storms, as well as violent updrafts and downdrafts, he said.

The dry air aloft can provide a "capping" effect that temporarily keeps rising, moist air from going higher. But sometimes the moist air can burst through the cap in a powerful updraft, creating thunderstorms that grow explosively upward and contribute to tornadoes.

May tornadoes have killed the most people in Texas, averaging just over 6 deaths per year while April averages just under 4. All others average less than 2.

Meteorologists point that such statistics may be somewhat misleading. The 1953 Waco disaster skews the May death total, Zietler said, but without question the heaviest tornado activity, both in number of storms and related deaths, has been recorded between April and June.

The deadliness of tornadoes has much to do with wind speeds. Those can only be estimated, because wind-measuring devices usually don't survive in winds of much more than 100 miles per hour.

But estimates based on Doppler radar and photogrammetry measurements, as well as special engineering studies of structures damaged by tornadoes, have helped scientists deduce that wind speeds can reach 300 mph or more.

Such information has been used to develop the Fujita scale of wind speeds, a 12-level scale for ranking tornadoes. None are expected to reach wind speeds of above 316 mph, or the F5 level, Zietler said. F12 on the scale puts wind velocities at the speed of sound, about 750 mph.

F54 tornadoes are powerful enough to lift well-built frame houses off their foundations and carry them great distances before disintegrating them.

Many of Texas' most infamous twisters were estimated to be F5 tornadoes. Among these those that hit Waco in 1952 and Lubbock in 1970, both by dark coincided on May 11.

The Waco twister hit in the heart of the downtown area just before 5 on a weekday afternoon, killing 114 people and injuring almost 1,100. Of the dead, 94 were found in a two-block area that included the square around City Hall.

Damage totaled more than \$51 million and included 196 buildings destroyed or damaged beyond repair, as well as 850 homes demolished in whole or part.

The Lubbock tornado plowed through some 15 square miles, nearly one-fourth of the city, from near the campus of Texas Tech to the Lubbock Municipal Airport.

Twenty-six died and at least 500 were injured. Eight percent of downtown's plate glass windows were shattered, and cars were smashed into 2 or 3 feet high pancakes.

The worst May tornado in recent years hit Saragosa, the tiny West Texas community that lost 30 citizens on May 22, 1987. All were the town's community center, celebrating the accomplishment of a preschool education program, when a tornado, rare in the area, struck the building.

Zietler said that tornado reporting and recording has improved dramatically since World War II, but many tornadoes go unnoticed because they occur in rural areas.

For all their ability to do major damage, tornadoes have relatively little impact on agriculture, said meteorologist Rusty Billingsley of the Southwestern Agricultural Weather Service, a division of the National Weather Service at Texas A&M.

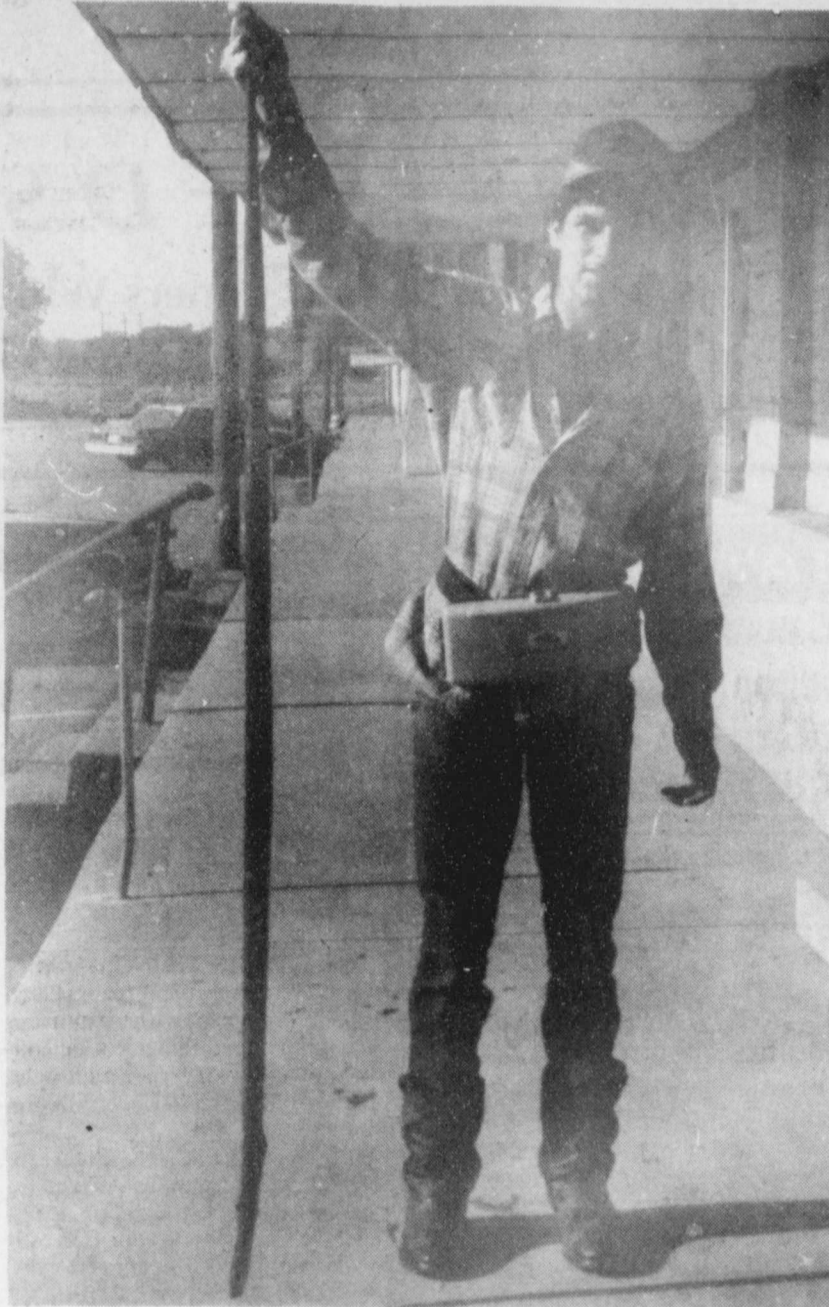

Apple Nut Muffins

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 egg whites
1/4 cup HOLLYWOOD Canola or Safflower Oil
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup skim milk
2 cups coarsely chopped unpeeled apples
1/4 cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350°F and grease muffin cups. In a small bowl, stir together flour, baking powder and salt. In a large bowl, beat egg; stir in oil, sugar and vanilla. Stir in 1/2 of the dry ingredients. Stir in milk and then remaining dry ingredients. Fold in apples and nuts. Fill muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake for 20 minutes. Allow to cool 5 minutes in muffin cups before removing to wire racks.

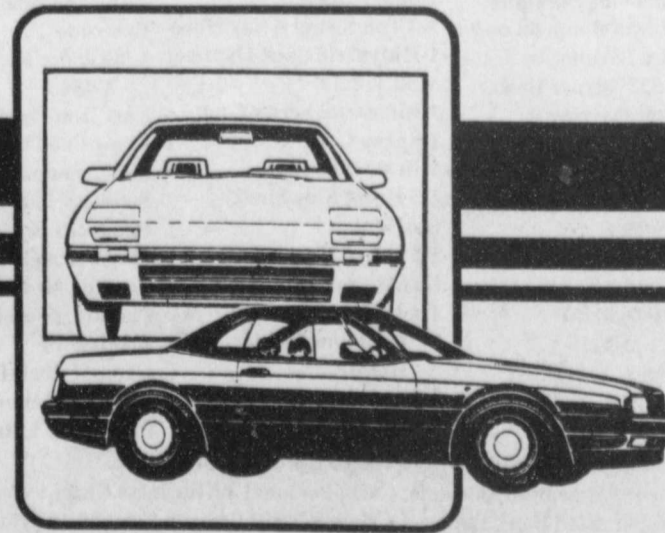
