Public Meeting Set By COG

The West Central Texas Council of Governments and the Brazos River Authority will sponsor a public meeting May 24 in Abilene to discuss development of a water quality management plan for the Brazos River Basin and adjacent Gulf Coast

The basin-wide planning will be discussed in general but the emphasis will be on those aspects relating to Brown, Callahan, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Nolan, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens Stonewall, Taylor, and Throckmorton counties. Meetings of this type have been scheduled in other sections of the Brazos watershed where specifics of plans affecting

those areas will be discussed. The meeting will be held at 2 p. m. in Room 207 of the Abilene Civic Center, 1100 N. 6th St., Abilene, Texas.

Col. Walter Wells, General Manager of the Authority, said purpose of the meeting is to describe the procedures to be used in developing the basin wide water quality management plan, present the stream standards and other factors on which the plan will be based, answer questions about the planning and offer opportunity for comment and suggestions from the pub-

The Authority was designated by the Governor's office more than two years ago as the State agency to develop a basin-with plan for improving and protecting the quality of surface water in the 45,000 square miles of the Brazos Basin and adjoining areas of the Gulf Coast. The basin-wide plan will provide the basis for actions in the above counties needed to meet the effluent limitations and stream standards established by the Texas Water Quality Board under the Federal Water Polution Control Act Amendments of 1972.

when available, it is almost a necessity for the farmer to consider farming operations this year that will reduce the number of trips over the field. At the cost of some \$15.00 to \$18.00 per hour to operate our large tractors, every trip across the field can save energy. And saved energy at this time is accomplishing two things-saving scarce fuel, and saving dollars out of your pocket.

What I prefer to see adopted in Haskell County might be termed "Optimum" tillage. In time to sit down and outline ing yields. your operation and see if any

Soil Conservation Service agronomists, and the US Dept. of Agriculture's research people say that the typical farmer will make one to 12 trips across each field every year. Some of these operations could be combined and cut down on the number of trips, thus saving fuel, time and reducing soil

compaction. Nearly every operation perormed mixes the soil and results in moisture loss. If some of these operations can be eliminated, precious moisture is conserved. So really, we are trying to save fuel and moisture, reduce compaction and at the same time maintain yields.

It isn't necessary to deepbreak the "hardpan". single biggest porblem a farmer has is his traffic pattern in the field, so the term traffic pan would be more appropriate. If the traffic pattern is changed, that is, not traveling the same rows every time, some of the traffic pan or hard pan situation can be eliminat-

If you reduce the number of trips across the field, there may not be a need to deep plow every year. Here again, do not rest on what you have been doing in the past. Take a shovel or posthole digger and actually determine if there is a hardpan. If there is not a zone of compaction, save the fuel and

Moisture conservation, especially right now, should be extremely important. Working your beds with either a knifing rig or a rotary hoe, after a rain or pre-irrigation causes moisture to escape. The land looks nice, but it is costly both in fuel and water. This has been necesary in the past for weed control.

However, with today's herbicides, and considering the dry winter, most fields are clean. Working the beds under these conditions is not optimum tilage. This same concept applies to cultivation or bed knifing after a summer rain. If the ground starts to blow or weeds become a problem, move in and initiate control measures.



Cherry Coffee Braid



Cherry Coffee Braid is the space-age woman's answer to coffee take extravaganza. It offers ultra-modern convenience with bakedrom-scratch flavor. Frozen bread dough and canned cherry pie illing are the secret.

Bread is the oldest recipe made by man or woman, yet it has not lost its importance in today's living. One of the basic four food groups, bread - either fresh or frozen - supplies a generous combination of the B-vitamins, thiamine, niacin and riboflavin; the minerals, iron and calcium; as well as protein.

> Cherry Coffee Braid 2 braids

1 package (2 lb.) frozen, enriched bread dough 1 can (21 oz.) cherry pie

1 package (21/2 oz.) slivered almonds, toasted (about 1/2 cup) Streusel Topping

Thaw bread dough according to package directions. Place in lightly greased bowl, turning to grease all sides. Cover and let rise in warm place (80 to 85°) until doubled, 2 to 3 hours. Punch down. Cover and let rest 10 minutes. Divide in half. Roll each half to a 15 x 13-inch rectangle. For each braid spread half of cherry pie filling in a 2-inch wide strip lengthwise down center of each rectangle. Sprinkle with almonds. Make cuts 2 inches apart on each side of dough just to edge of filling. Fold resulting strips of dough across filling, alternating from side to side and slanting strips downward to give braided appearance. Seal ends well. Brush with oil. Place on greased baking sheets. Sprinkle Streusel Topping over braids. Let rise in warm place until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake in preheated 350° oven 30 to 40 minutes, or until done. Streusel Topping:

2 tablespoons enriched flour 2 tablespoons sugar

1 tablespoon butter

Stir together flour and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News Of The Texas Department of Agriculture John C. White, Commissioner

It's anybody's guess what farming in Texas will be like by the year 2000. One thing that may be expected is that satellites may be helping, because they already are. Earth Resources Technology Satellite-1 (ERTS-1) circling the earth now, is sending back photo-like images that make it possible to identify different crops, acreage, and even crop growth. It is expected that satellites will help track down water supplies -a talent West Texans, especially, could use now-and will be able to give early warning on crop diseases. And United States satellites probably will be able to tell Americans what neighboring farmers are doing. Oldtimers use to say they 'planted by the moon.' The future farmer may be farming by sat-

The fuel situation may be easing for most farmers, but it is still tight for others. Very tight gasoline situations were reported in Hall, Foard, Hansford, Llano, Hemphill, Hartley, El Paso, Denton and Archer counties; and very tight diesel fuel situations were reported in El Paso and Hartley counties, according to the U.S. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reports that prices received by the State's farmers and ranchers declined six percent during the month ending April 15. Livestock and livestock products price index

was down four percent from the month earlier and 10 percent below a year ago. The allcrops price index fell nine percent below the previous month. Wheat went from \$4.76 to \$3.78 a bushel. Sorghum fell from \$4.56 to \$3.96 during the month ending April 15; upland cotton from 49 cents to 47, broilers from 22.5 cents a pound to 21; eggs from 56.3 cents a dozen to 51.2; and calves from \$47.80




