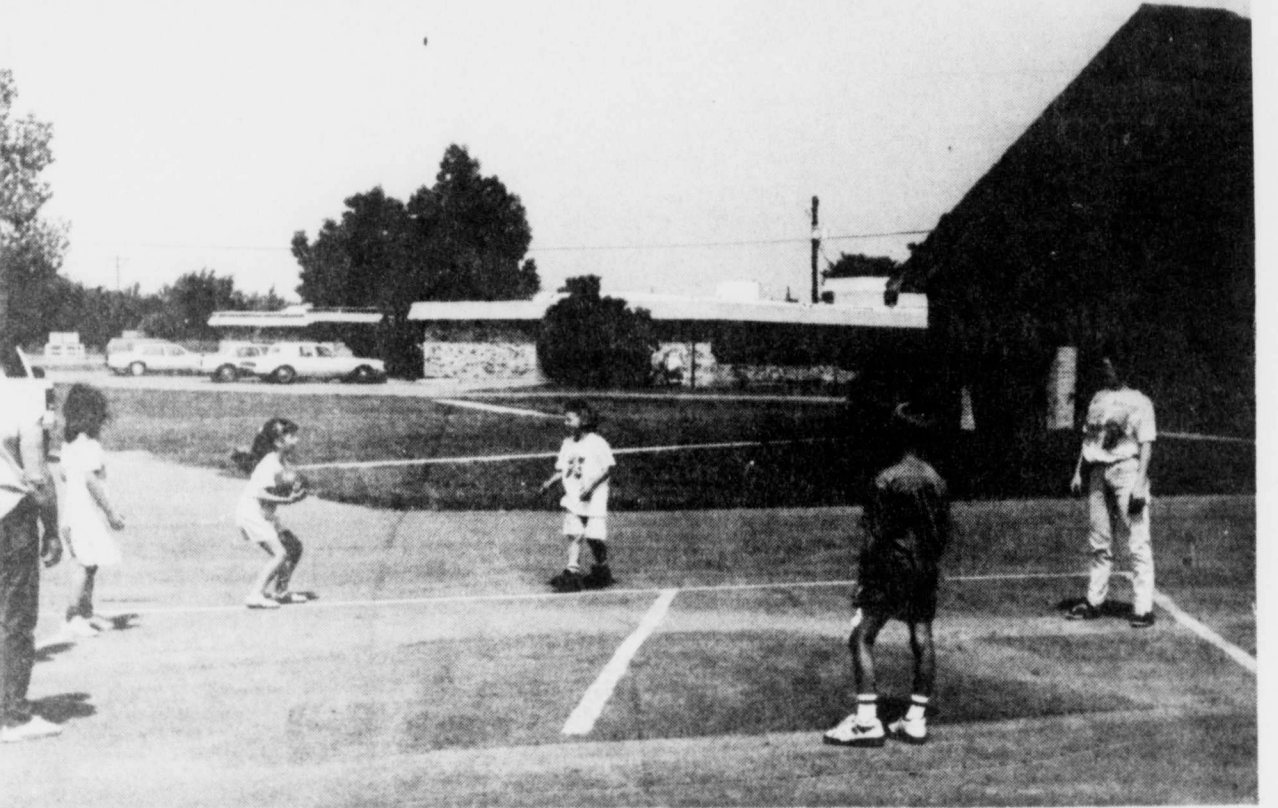

Guests were entertained with selections on the keyboard provided by Billy W. Flanagan.

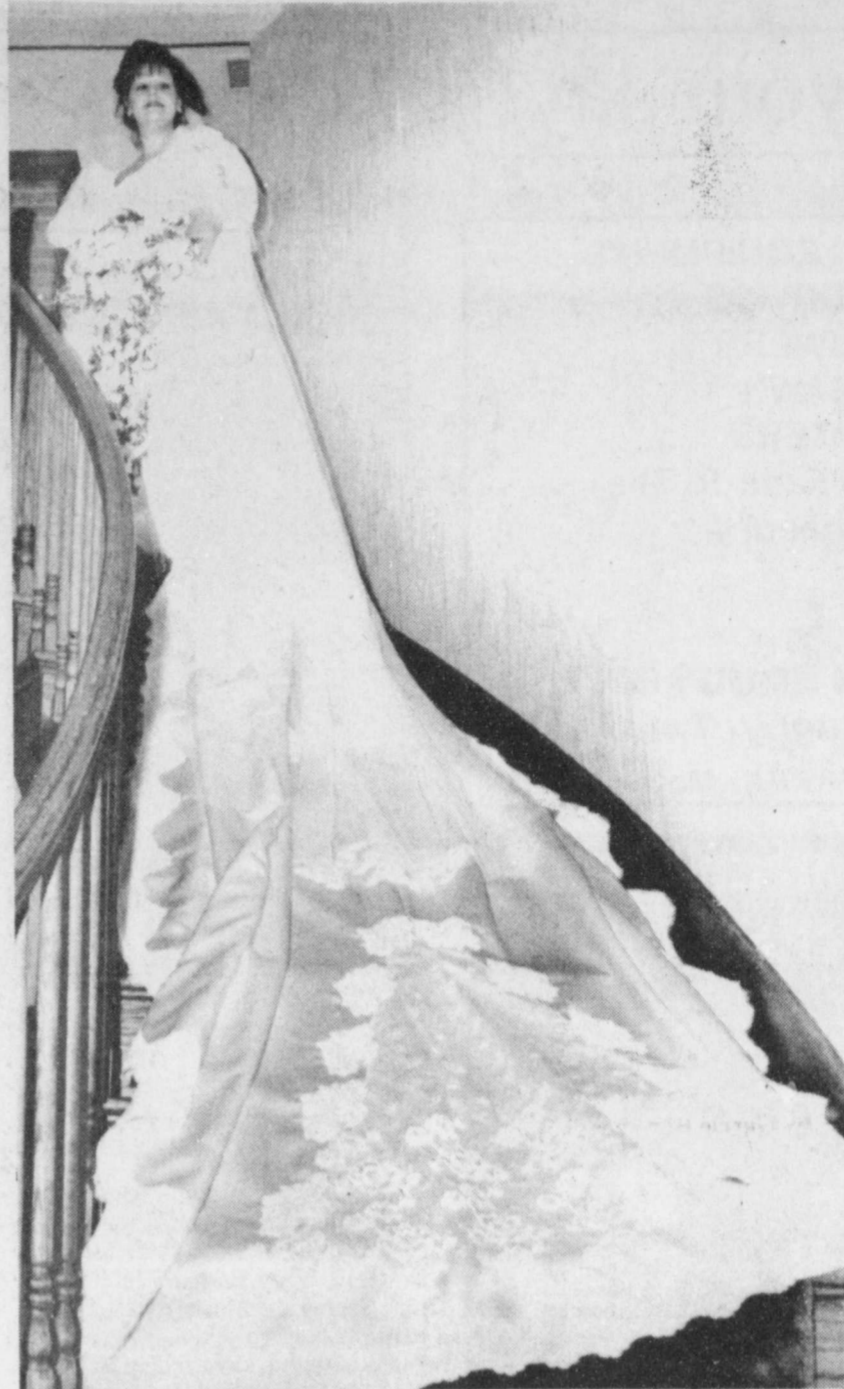

# Bogata Rodeo Begins Today!!

When the first chute gate swings open tonight (Thursday), the 1992 version of the Bogata Rodeo will be playing host to 289 champion cowboys and cowgirls from the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association. The contestants will be trying for an estimated purse of \$15,005.00 during the annual rodeo at Bogata.

The CRRA is a regional association that serves professional rodeos within the mid-section of the United States, based in Shawnee, OK.

Three big performances of action-packed rodeo thrills and chills will be coming to rodeo spectators at the Bogata Rodeo Arena at 8 p.m. nightly.

Seven championship events are being featured at the Bogata rodeo, with the Bogata Rodeo Association offering \$400.00 in added money to each event, for a total of \$2,800.00 in added money.

Many present CRRA champion cowboys and cowgirls have entered the competition at the Bogata rodeo, including David Worden of Cooper, TX, three-time Bareback Riding Champion (1986-88-90), has entered the bareback riding event, along with six-time Bareback Riding Champion, Jim Martin of Canadian, TX (1978-79-81-82-83-84). Worden is a two-

time average winner at the CRRA Finals Rodeo and holds the high marked ride record from the 1991 Finals. Martin is also a two-time average winner and holds the high marked ride record from the 1977, 1982 and 1983 Finals.

The 1991 Saddle Bronc Riding Champion, Jack Hooge of Blossom, TX has entered the competition as well. Hooge leads the bronc riders for his second championship title in 1992.

1991 Calf Roping Champion Wade Matheson of Gillham, AR is scheduled to compete. Matheson ended his 1991 rodeo season in the CRRA with \$6,338.25 to win his first championship.

In the steer wrestling, Kenneth Prater of Checotah, OK, six-time CRRA Steer Wrestling Champion (1985-86-87-88-89-90) will compete, along with 45 other steer wrestlers.

The bull riders are well represented by two Bogata residents, Damon Holmes and Jeff Bivins. Holmes has been runner-up to the CRRA championship two times and is the average winner from the 1988 CRRA Finals Rodeo. He holds the record for the high marked ride from that Finals, an

84. Bivins is a perennial qualifier for the CRRA Finals Rodeo and will be competing at the Bogata rodeo with a shoulder injury he suffered just weeks ago. Adding to the bull riding list is Dan Worden of Cooper, TX, the 1986 Rookie of the Year in the CRRA and the 1986 Bull Riding Rookie of the Year. Worden won more money than any rookie competitor that year to win the overall Rookie of the Year title.

The rodeo is produced by Bogata's own Wing Rodeo Company, the eight-time Stock Contractor of the Year (1982-83-84-87-88-89-90-91).

The Rodeo Princess contest is in full swing, with girls ages 7-12 and living in a 75-mile radius eligible to enter. The winner will be determined by overall ticket sales; horsemanship; personality and appearance.

The new Princess will receive a trophy buckle.

The Rodeo Queen contest is open to contestants ages 13-19 who live in a 75-mile radius of Bogata. The winner will be determined by: selling tickets; horsemanship; dress; and personality.

The new Queen will receive a trophy saddle donated by Peoples National Bank.

Here is a continuation of our vacation in Scotland. For all of you who have told me, or written me, telling me you are enjoying the trips...thanks so much.

Several times now I've been asked how we manage to make "personal" contact with people while taking an organized tour. The secret is to talk...to anyone and everyone you encounter. During free times, while on a break, anytime you make a stop while on tour - talk to people! We also try to leave our group on breaks and always on free afternoons, instead of clustering in groups. Try to wander just a short way away from the coach to talk. Don't be shy, don't worry about being a problem. Ninety-nine percent of the people you talk to will enjoy the little visit. The other minority will let you know pretty quick they don't have the time or inclination to speak with you. This doesn't hurt my feelings at all.

Dogs or cats make one of the best conversation openers. At St. Andrews I had a lovely chat with an elderly man about his half Lab half Bovier dog. At Stirling castle Thomas and I were down on our knees exclaiming over a Westie and a Cairn Terrier. As we petted the handsome little dogs their proud owner exclaimed "Aye...and they can do with a lot of that!"

At antique shops I've made friends with cats...and consequently their owners.

I guess what I'm trying to say is...be friendly, admire people, their pets and their country. Don't make fun of things and for heaven's sake don't be "patronizing"-if you genuinely like the country say so. If not, keep your mouth shut!

But, enough of this, onward to the city of Glasgow. I made the mistake of pronouncing the "gow" to rhyme with cow...a mistake that so greatly amused our tour director that I thought he was going to hurt himself giggling. Rest assured...I learned quickly that it is pronounced GlasGO not gow!

We traveled on a "B" road...what we would refer to as a Farm To Market

Road in Texas. Here was more highland scenery to lift the heart. Yellow blooming gorse, the famous blue bells of Scotland and a bewildering variety of wildflowers kept our attention.

At the top of a hill we pulled over onto the gravelled side of the road to get off the coach and simply admire the view. Once more those mountains swept the eye into infinity, fading to a paler and paler blue until one could no longer tell mountain from sky. Snow fences lined the road, and although it was warm and sunny, it was easy to imagine the mountains scoured by the harsher snows of winter.

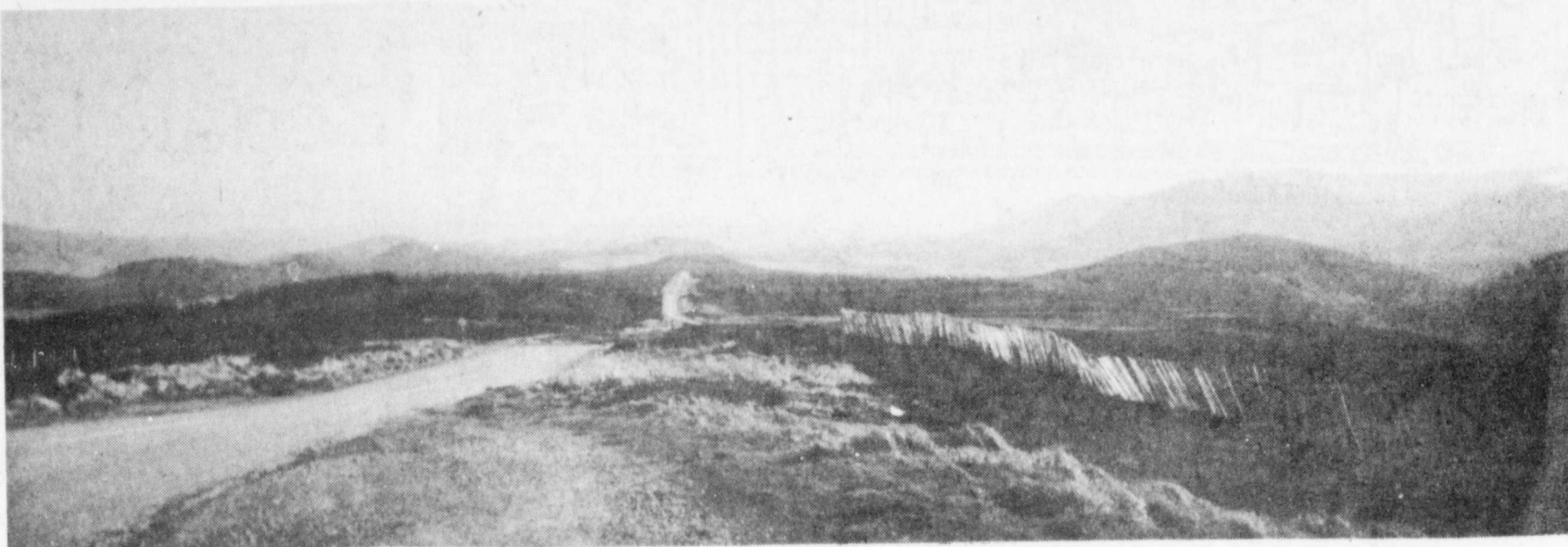
I walked away by myself, pondering whether anyone in the area needed someone to herd cows and had a "wee hoose" (small house) for rent! What a wonderful thing to live in such gorgeous surroundings.

At Glen Coe we stood once more on the side of a mountain, looking down into the glen (valley) where the MacDonalds were massacred years ago by the Campbells. One more tale of blood and betrayal to add to our collection...this one told of the English King sending the MacDonald's enemies, the Campbells to the MacDonald stronghold. There they were fed, sheltered from the storm and take care of for six days before arising and murdering the MacDonald Clan in their beds. It is now known as the Glen of Weeping, and is supposed to be "at it's best" on a rainy day. It was sunny the day we were there, but still a haunting spot.

doctors, the center of the church in Scotland and the government in Scotland.

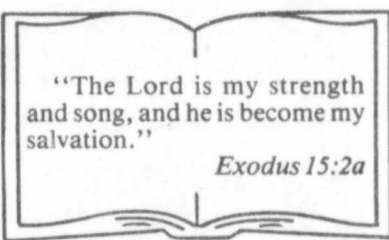
However, if we had thought the people in Edinburgh were friendly the people in Glasgow were positively wonderful!

George Square is crowded with statues of various heros and royalty.

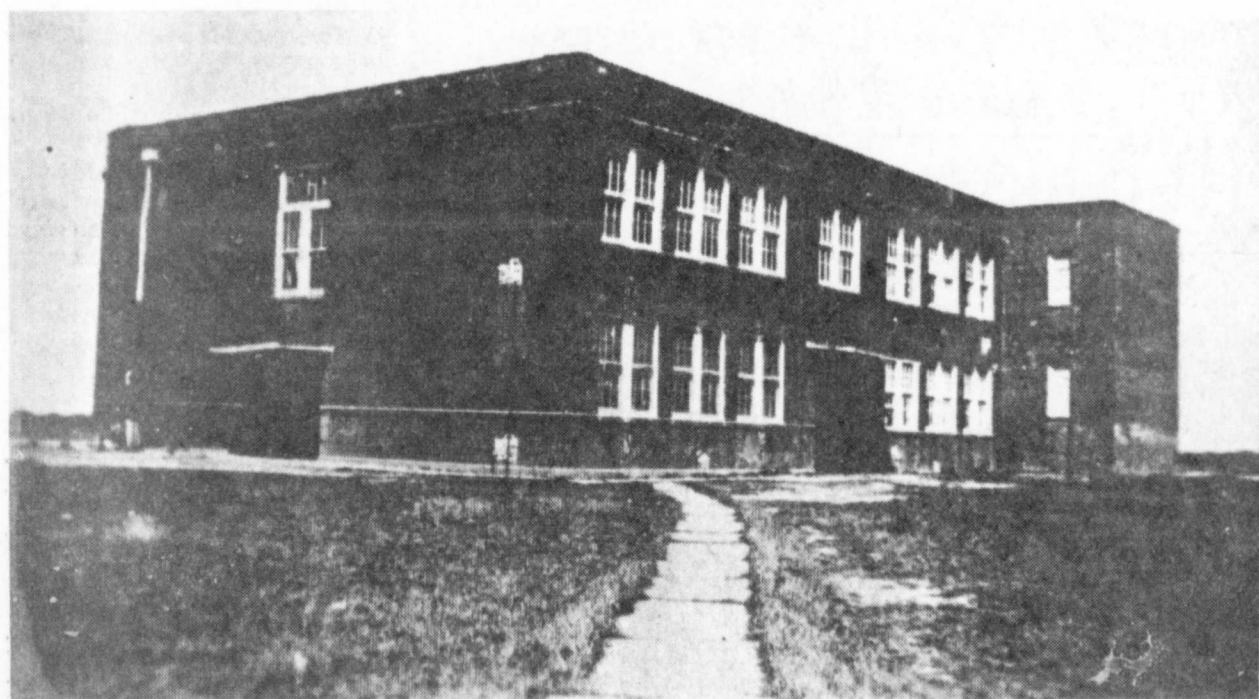
We went to our hotel out by Glasgow's airport and enjoyed a meal of lamb, vegetables and potatoes laet that evening.

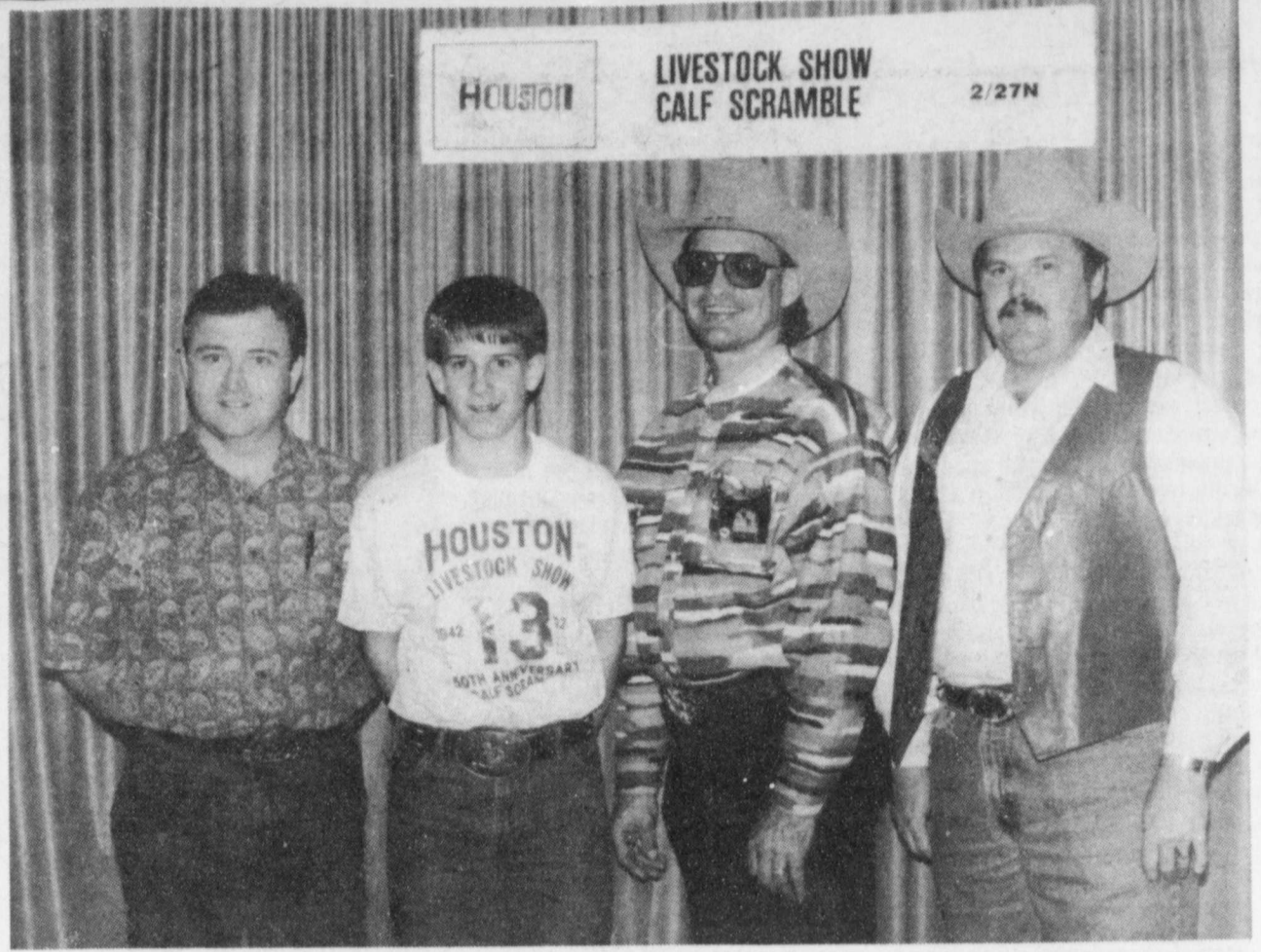

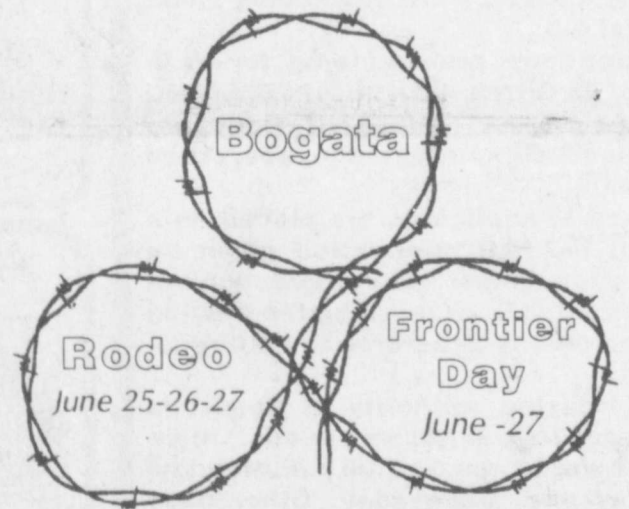


