## Industrial Foundation Is Seeking Additional Funds

Haskell Industrial Foundation fund drive chairman Abe Turner announced today an extended drive for additional funds. "We received a gratifying total of \$54,390.00 in the original drive to help finance the Herman-Marcus garment plant in Haskell," said Turner, "but even that figure was short of the goal we knew we would need. A portion of the money was allocated to the Industrial Foundation's share of financing the training school for employees. The rest was for the building, which is almost completed at this time."

Haskell and Big Country area businesses and businessmen responded wholeheartedly when they learned of the need to bring Haskell its first major industry. Since the drive ended last April, four more businesses have donated funds for the plant, including Party Port of Haskell, General Telephone Co., Stamford Federal Savings, and Olney Savings.

Delays in the beginning of construction of the building, on the Rule highway, are the major reasons for the need of additional funds. Spiraling costs of construction supplies have created a need for more funds on hand, even though the building is in the very last stages of completion. Everything is still on schedule, and Saturday is the day for its completion, with December 15 the date set for the opening of the plant.

One training school has al-

ready graduated 35 women, and another is in progress at this time, with 37 enrolled, that will end on December 14. Another school will begin in the plant —after the first of the year, in order to train enough people to keep the plant operating at full strength at all times.

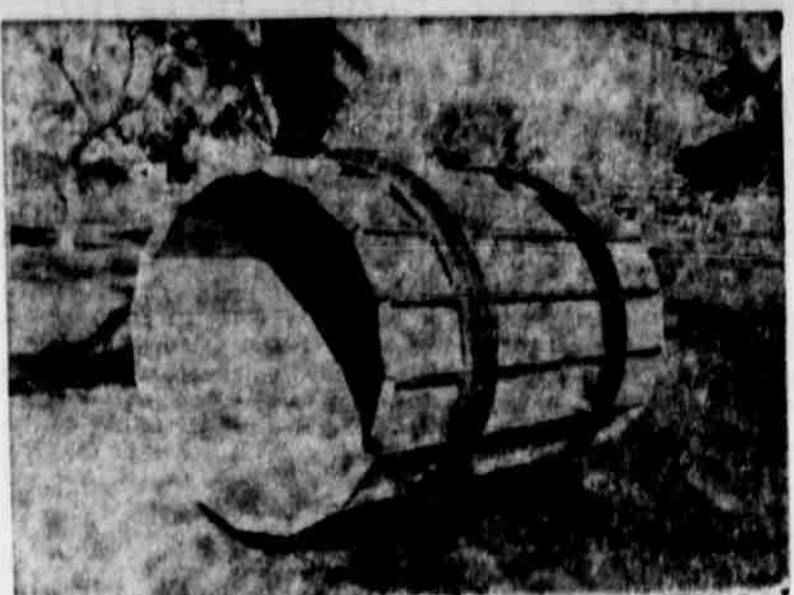

**Cotton Crop**  
The record 6,040,000 bales produced in 1949. Yield, based on Nov. 1 conditions, is expected to average a record 419 lbs. of lint per acre compared with 408 lbs. last year and the previous record yield of 410 lbs. per acre reached in 1958.

Acres for harvest are set at 5,500,000 compared with 5,000,000 in 1972.

As of Nov. 1, harvest statewide was estimated at 27 percent complete. This compares with 33 percent a year ago.

Production of American-Pima cotton in Texas for 1973 is estimated at 29,200 bales compared with 31,400 bales in 1972. Yield is expected to average 449 lbs. per acre compared with 437 lbs. last year.

Harvested acres are estimated at 31,200, down 3,300 from the 34,500 acre harvest in 1972.

Cotton producers throughout the state are urged to destroy cotton stalks as soon after harvest as possible. Cotton stalk destruction is perhaps the best method in controlling cotton insects for next year's crop.

**DRYLOT** sheep feeders in Texas with a lot capacity of 2,000 head or more had 93,000 sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter Nov. 1. This is 13 percent below the number on feed a month ago and 27 percent below the number on feed of last year.

Placements during October totaled 45,000 head. Intentions to market are: November 33,000; December, 28,000; January 32,000. These are incomplete at this time for December and January, however.

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## Carbon Monoxide Is Silent Killer; Take Special Care During Winter

COLLEGE STATION — "You can't see it, taste it or smell it, but it can kill you if it's present. It's the silent killer—carbon monoxide!"

"Carbon monoxide is an odorless, tasteless, colorless deadly gas produced when fuels such as wood, coal, oil and natural gas are incompletely burned," explains Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Properly working heating equipment in the home produces only a small amount of carbon monoxide, but when heating equipment is not functioning properly, dangerous amounts of carbon monoxide gas may be produced.

"So check your heating equipment now or have a reliable heating company serviceman check it for you, and avoid an encounter with the silent killer," advises the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are drowsiness, headaches, dizziness, confusion, nausea, muscular weakness and unconsciousness. If these symptoms are recurring, take action immediately. However, do not depend on these symptoms to warn you of possible danger. If the victim is overcome by carbon monoxide gas, get him to fresh air and immediately begin mouth-to-mouth rescue breathing.

Keese lists some safety precautions to help free your home of carbon monoxide poisoning during the coming season.

Assure that heating equipment is vented into a safe chimney. Keep the chimney clean: remove soot, broken bricks, bird nests and anything that might keep gas from escaping. Test the chimney to see if it draws well by placing a lighted match near the clean-out or other opening. If smoke is drawn up the chimney, it is drawing properly.

Check vent pipes to make sure there are no holes where gas fumes can escape back into the home. Allow fresh air into space where heating equipment is used, especially if unvented space heaters are used. Be sure the burner of an unvented heater is clean and adequate air is reaching the bur-

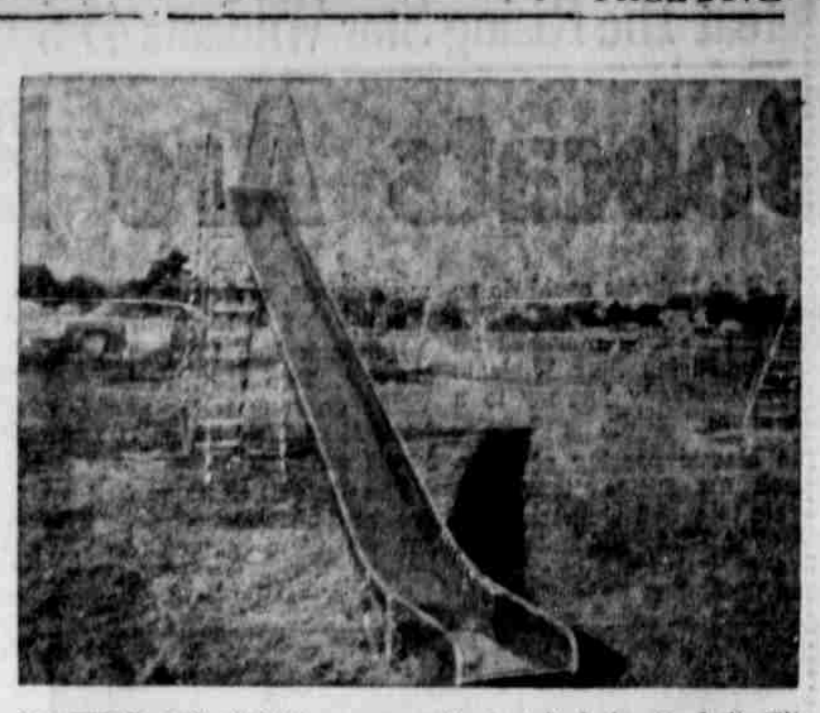
## Farmers Need Fuel; FB President Woodson Asks Immediate Action

## Fuel Allocation Protested

The president of the Haskell County Farm Bureau said this week that some farmers in the county are unable to buy diesel and other middle-distillate fuels because of red-tape in the mandatory allocation system.

President Marvin Phemister said the county Farm Bureau sent a telegram to Eli T. Reich, Administrator of Petroleum Allocation in Washington, D. C. asking for relief.

Text of the telegram follows: "Bureaucratic mishandling of fuel allocation is causing severe hardship to Texas farmers. Tractors and harvest machines are idle because farmers cannot obtain fuel. The government's program that allocates diesel, butane and propane fuels on the basis of purchases made 12 months ago is not working because it does not provide for common-sense flexibility. Last November was extremely wet in Texas and many farmers did not buy fuel then. Your so-called 'common-sense' directive issued recently to distributors is not working because no one has defined common sense. Distributors are afraid to make decisions that could cost them heavy fines. We urge that you immediately clear the air by assuring distributors they will not be punished for selling to hardship cases. These farmers urgently need fuel now to harvest this year's grain and cotton crops and to prepare land for next year. To delay any longer is to invite economic disaster, and we wish action as

## March of Dimes Poster Child Shares Family Fun and Chores

"Scotty was a month old when we brought him home from the hospital," Monta Hafen recalls, "and it was really hard not to overprotect him."  
 That was five years ago, and Scotty, who is Monta and Gary Hafen's fifth child, was just leaving to go down the block from their modest ranch house in North Las Vegas, Nev. That may not sound unusual, unless you are aware that Scotty was born with crippling birth defects, hydrocephalus (water on the brain), and spina bifida (open spine).  
 The first defect has been corrected by surgery. The second is painfully evident. Scotty is paralyzed from the waist down and has to use braces and crutches to get around.  
 "It was hard at first," his mother says, "but we finally got hold of ourselves. Life had to go on. We made ourselves be less protective."  
 "We don't treat him as an invalid in any way. We expect things from him, and he does them. If he makes a mess with his toys, he has to pick them up and put them away in his toy box."  
 "Of course, with four older brothers and sisters, he gets a bit spoiled, no matter what Gary and I do. But we figure that's not so bad. After all, they only do what they want to do. We don't expect them to take care of Scotty to any greater extent than they would naturally take care of the littlest one in the family."  
 Scotty's next older brother, Bret, has done a lot of that. He is only a year older than Scotty, but Mrs. Hafen has encouraged the brotherly relationship without interfering with it.  
 "Bret puts him in his wagon and hauls him all over the neighborhood," she says, laughing fondly. "With just a little bit of watching along the way, that's how things have gone along."

Bret won't be able to go along next month when, as 1974 National Poster Child for the March of Dimes, Scotty will tour the country. He will represent the 250,000 or so American children born every year with birth defects.

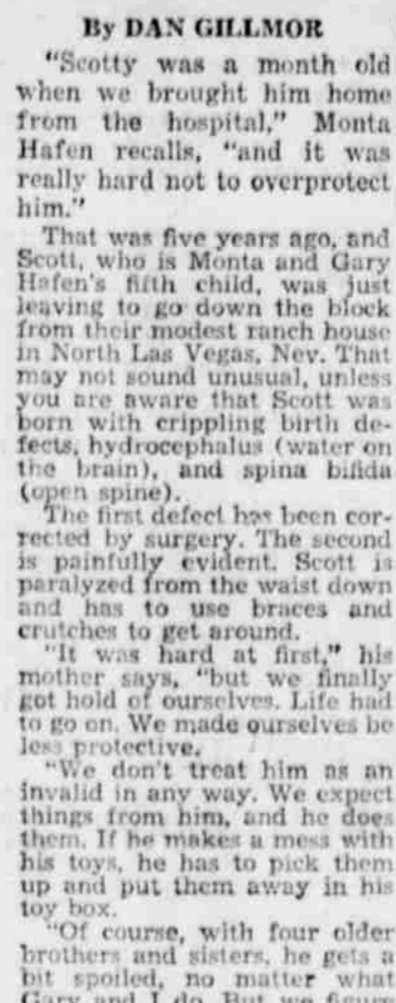

grams, and educational efforts in the fight to prevent birth defects and to improve the quality of life at birth.

I've already seen a change in him since he started going around the state as Nevada Poster Child. He just seems to be more on top of the situation. He feels more like an equal of other children."  
 "You know how it is; he has something to talk about now. Something that he did that they haven't done. His friends get to run and jump and play, and Scotty can't. But now he gets to fly all over and meet famous people."

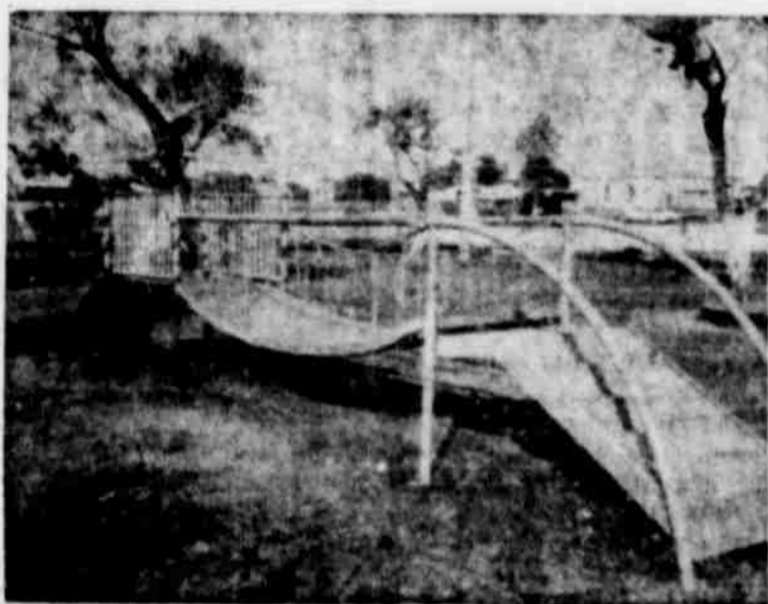

**Cotton Classing**

**MUNDAY**  
Cotton continues to be predominantly white with 67 percent in this category, according to Sidney Ferrell, in Charge, of the Munday Classing Office.  
The number of samples classed by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office during the week ending Friday, Nov. 23, 1973, amounted to 9,265. This brings the season's total to 29,660 samples.  
Mike reading results indicate very little change from last week. Range 3.5-4.9 accounted for 83 percent, while 5.0 and up accounted for 13 percent. Fiber strength results were

down slightly with 93 percent testing 80,000 lbs. per square inch or better.  
Grade and staple percentages follow: grade 31, 5%; grade 31, 51%; grade 31, 10%. Staple 29 was 2%; staple 30, 20%; staple 31, 48%; staple 32, 20%; and staple 33, 2%. Grades reduced because of bark or grass accounted for 12% of the cotton classed.  
Prices are still unstable and vary according to staple length

and grade in the lower qualities. Prices ranged from 2600 to 3600 points above CCC Loan with grade 4131 averaging 50.93 per pound and grade 4231, 49.77 cents.

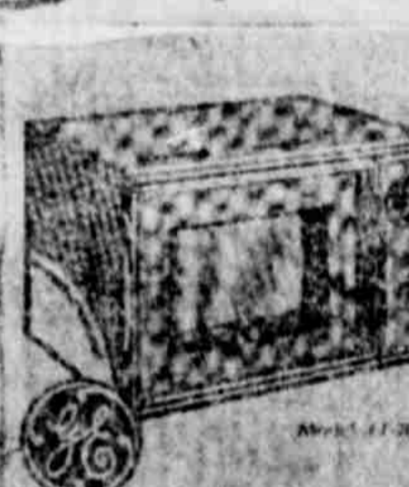

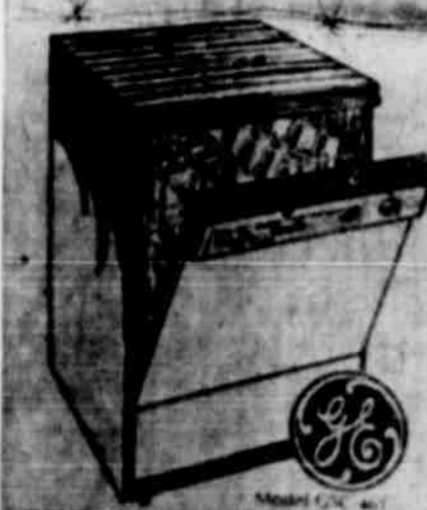

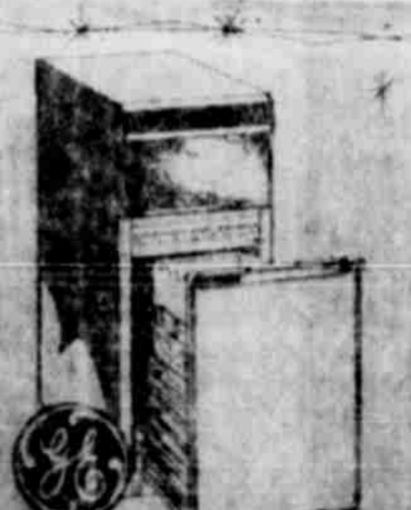

...awaits no day they get more requests. For your information, the following conservation contractors are now working in Haskell County, including both the California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts: Gene Grand, Brister & SoRelle, Blair Brothers, and Ralph Merchant of Haskell; H. T. (Cotton) Williams of Roch-

ester; Wesley Kirschner of Munday, and the Ellison Brothers from Aspermont.

The Soil Conservation Service personnel have been rather overwhelmed with requests for assistance. Our Field Office appears at times to be like a bee hive. During November we received 50 requests for new work. We rendered nearly 200 farmers and ranchers, 2 units of government, and one group technical assistance on conservation problems on their units of land. Much of the work consisted of lay out and checking for completion of conservation practices.

During November, the SCS staff assisted the following farmers in completion of these jobs:

**WASHINGTON**

**"As it looks from here"**

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A bill pending in the United States Senate calls for the establishment of a United States Fire Administration and a National Fire Academy. This proposal sponsored by 20 Senators would put the Federal Government into the fire fighting business for the initial bargain-basement rate of \$127.5 million over a 3-year period.

As many such ideas come about, the recommendation was made by a commission. A report by the commission recommends that it be the policy of the Federal Government to create a bureaucracy of fire prevention and control based on

90 items it found to be needed. It concluded that while fire prevention and control is and should remain a State and local responsibility, the Federal Government must help if any significant reduction in fire losses is to be achieved.

A nod is given to the Constitution by declaring that, "Fire constitutes a burden affecting interstate commerce." The key word here is "interstate commerce," which supposedly justifies the Federal Government getting into the business of local governments.

Federal programs of one sort or another are oftentimes found necessary because of "the indifference with which Americans confront the subject." This is a line in the commission's report. In other words, people governing themselves at the local level are found by Government bureaucracy to be unable to take care of themselves down to the proposition that they are indifferent to fire

hazards. One might think Americans would be allowed to be indifferent about something these days—even a "problem." The Senate bill, like so many other proposals, seems to suggest that it is made necessary because the American people are not interested in preventing fires or putting them out when one occurs.

So, in case of the "fire problem", break the glass and pour on a brand new Assistant Secretary of Commerce who, as the bill says, shall be known as the Assistant Secretary for Fire Prevention and Control. In the proposed measure the Secretary himself is directed to "establish a National Program for fire prevention and control and to create an academy to study the problem." Among the purposes of the academy will be to establish a National data center, hold annual conferences, create relevant studies, have "citizens" participation programs, and demonstration pro-

jects.

No inquiry has been made as to how this commission came into being but obviously someone came up with the idea that a study should be made on this subject. Once made and recommendations produced, sponsors for legislation can be found.

Just what may come out of this concoction is yet to be determined but, very likely, it will end up with something which may have the appearance of either being for or against fires. The only people who can be imagined as favoring fires are the arsonists who may set off a conflagration for profit or the pyromaniac whose twisted mind likes to see smoke and blazes.

A total of \$83 billion was paid out in 1972 to social security, railroad retirement, civil service, unemployment, workmen's compensation, and public assistance beneficiaries.

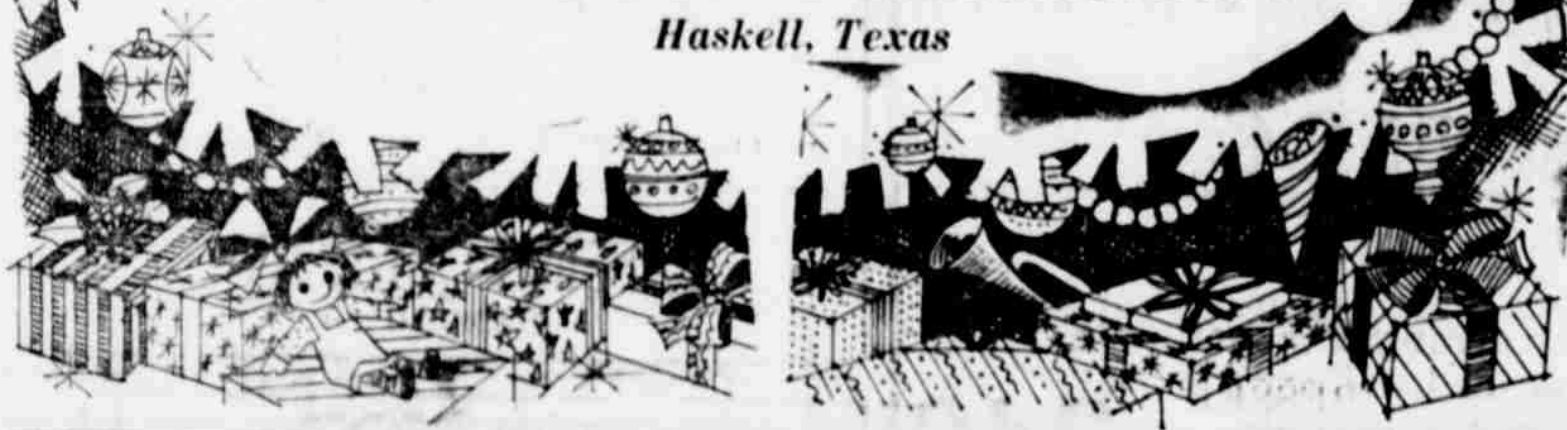
