Ellen has worked at the Beall's store in Paris for almost 15 years. She is now an area manager. Buddy, who is retired from the Navy, is also an auctioneer.

The Stringfellows have four children. Mary Nell Hendricks and her husband, Randy, live in Bogata. Mary Nell works in the District Clerk's office. Randy is a mechanic. Twinkie Fruit Shortcake By Ellen Stringfellow

Twinkies (cut in half, longway) pkg. of Instant Vanilla Pudding can of prepared fruit pie filling container of Cool Whip

Cut twinkies in half in line the serving dish. Cover twinkies with vanilla pudding. Now a layer of prepared fruit pie filling. Top off with a layer of Cool Whip. Refrigerate for 30 minutes to one hour before serving. Very cool and delightful for summer-time.

Chicken Pot Roast

4 chicken breasts
4 medium size potatoes
4-6 medium size carrots
2 medium onions
parsley flakes
celery seed
black pepper
all season salt

Sear chicken breasts. Peel and wedge cut potatoes. Clean and chunk cut carrots. Wedge cut onions. Layer the vegetables on top of the chicken; liberally season with pepper, all season salt, parsley flakes and celery seed. Cover tightly and steam simmer until chicken and vegetables are done. Move chicken to top of vegetables after

cooking about 30 minutes. Approximate cooking time is 1 1/2 hours. Can be less depending on amount you are cooking.

Kraut Salad

This is so easy and keeps forever in the refrigerator.

1-15 oz. can of kraut
2 cups chopped celery
1 cup chopped onion
1 chopped green sweet pepper
1 small jar chopped pimientos
3/4 cup sugar

Mix the above ingredients and refrigerate for several hours before serving.

Shoo Fly Cake

4 cups flour
3/4 cup shortening
1 lb. box light brown sugar

Blend the above to crumbs.

Mix together:
1 cup Brer Rabbit molasses
2 1/4 cup boiling water
1 T. baking soda

Set aside 2 cups crumbs to top with. Mix rest with liquid mix. Pour in ungreased 9x13 pan and top with the set-aside crumbs. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes. This can also be baked in a crust as a breakfast pie.

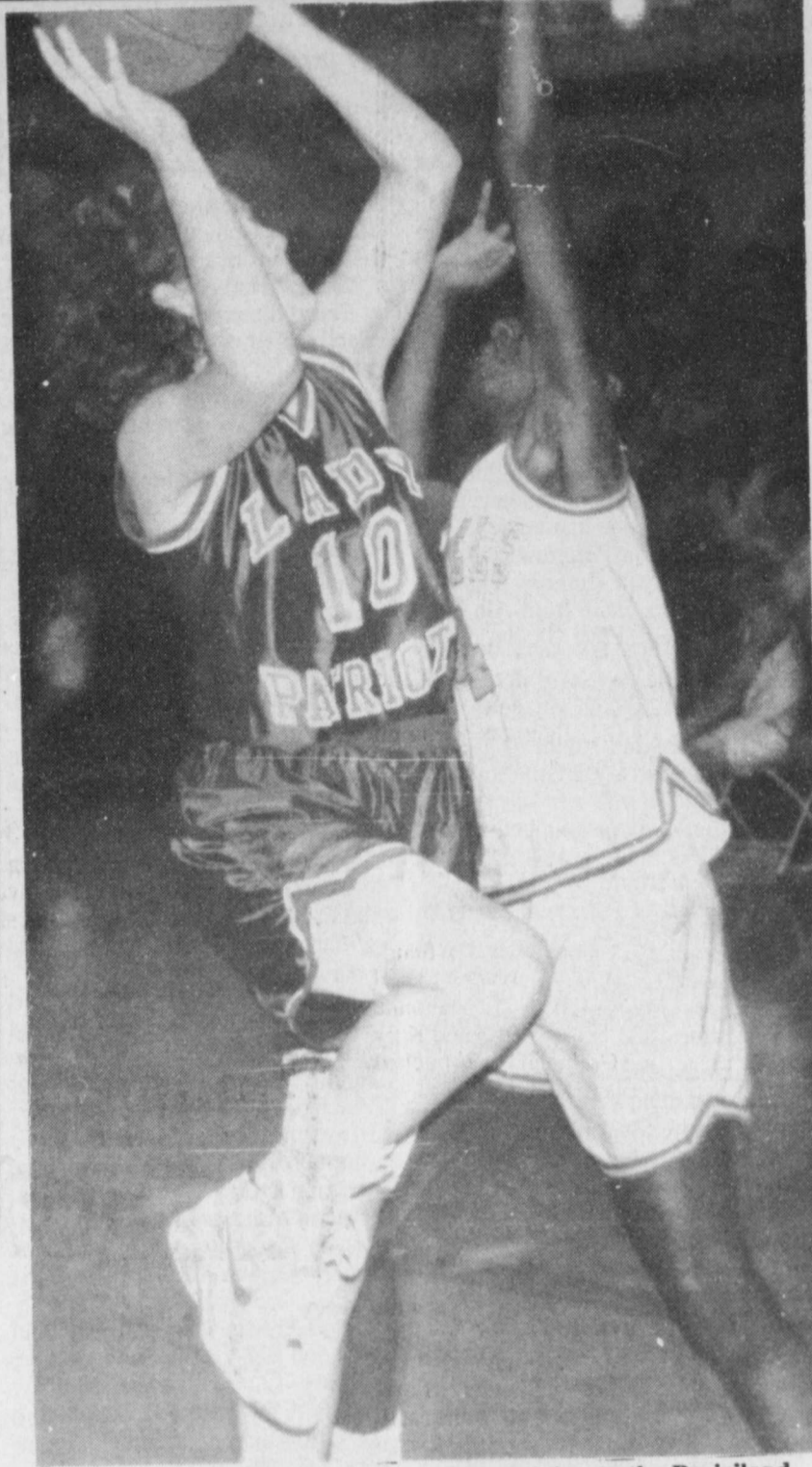

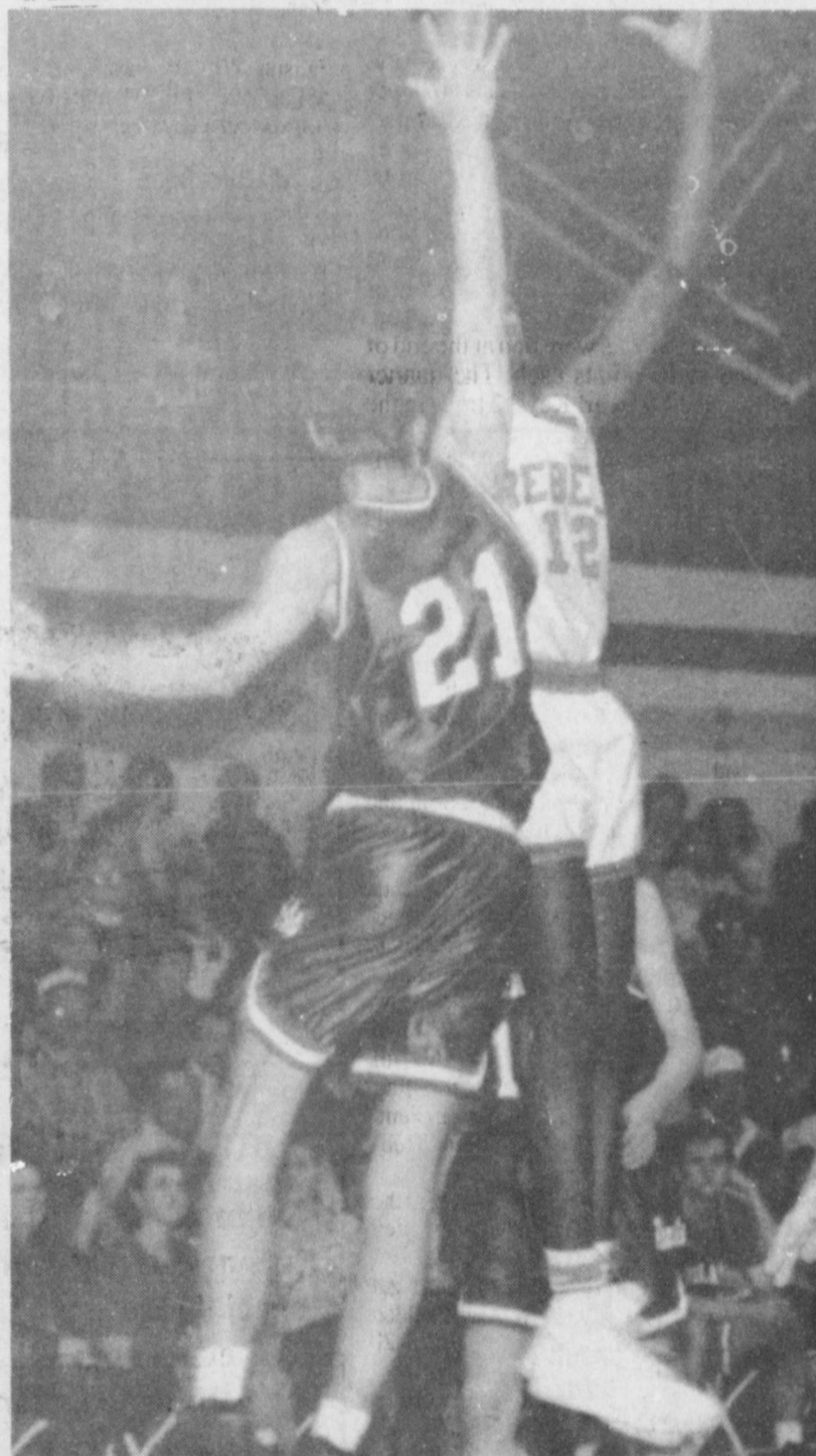

The third quarter saw the Patriots turn the ball over several times but still score 12 points with Whitley and Pasquill each scoring 4.

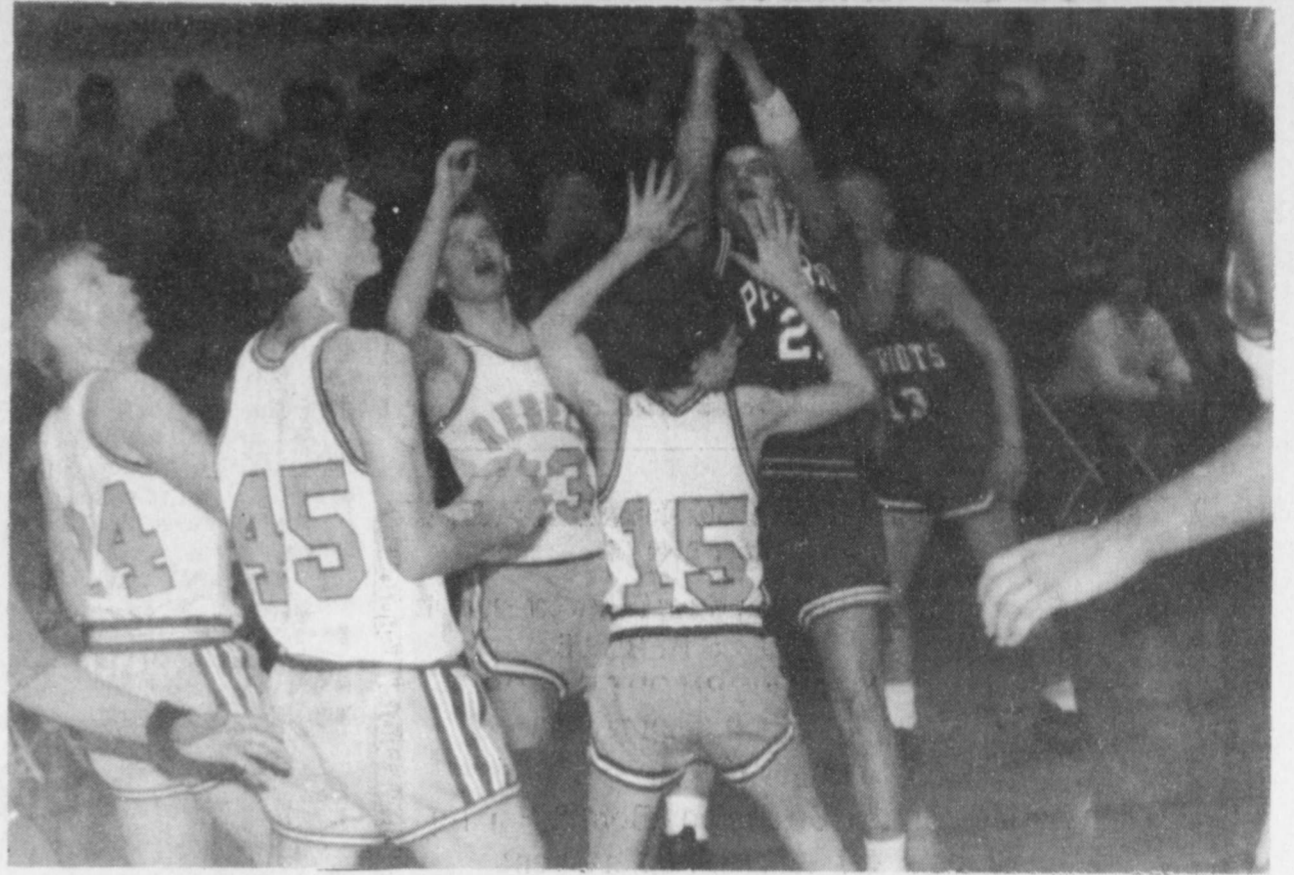
