
## City Of Deport Sets Election For May 1st

# Girl Scout Cookies Being Delivered!!



# Country Cooking By Judy Screws



Have you ever sold Girl Scout cookies? I have. I only did it once. It was back in "the olden days", my children's favorite way of referring to my childhood. I was a Girl Scout one year. Grace Branch was our leader. At that time you did not take orders for cookies and then deliver them at a later date. You took boxes of cookies from door to door and sold them. There was only one flavor, and I can't remember whether they were 25¢ or 50¢ a box. I do remember that the two girls (we went in pairs) who sold the most cookies were to receive a Girl Scout knife. That knife had a blade for everything. You could probably have survived in the woods forever with it.

My next encounter with Girl Scout cookies occurred when one of my daughters sold them. There were a few more flavors, and the price was a little higher. The girls took orders, and then delivered the cookies later. Then they took the money and the cookies that folks had decided not to buy back to their leader. My daughter had her money in a bank bag. It disappeared. We looked for that bag 'til the world looked level. By reenacting a few days of activities, we finally deduced that the money went out with the trash. For once in my life I got lucky. When I went out to dig in the garbage, I discovered that the trash man had not yet picked up the trash. The money was recovered. Our family rejoiced. If I remember cor-



# Single Family Housing Loans Available

Rural Housing Loans for very-low and low income applicants are available through County Offices of Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Robert Hendley, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, and repair rural homes and to provide dequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or in subdivisions.

Guarantees offer opportunities to families who are unable to afford a commercial loan with a guarantee. These loans may be made for up to 100% of the value of the property and are made for terms of 30 years. The interest rate is based on the Federal National Mortgage Association rate with a maximum loan amount in most counties of \$67,500.

The Farmers Home Administration assists rural America by guaranteeing private sector loans and by providing temporary, supervised direct loans to farm and housing borrowers who have a reasonable chance for success, and whose current needs cannot be met at reasonable rates and terms by commercial sources. 
