over the driving habits of Mexico. We took our vacation last week and flew down to the Yucatan penisula. There, amid palm trees, beautiful beachs and tropical breezes enjoyed we ourselves...and got acquainted with the Mexican attitude of driv-

Our first experience occurred when we decided to take the local bus around town. For about 60 cents you can ride all over. Our driver got a big tip...but not just because he put so much effort into getting us there on time.

You see, this man was not in the least concerned about hitting a bicyclist..running red lights, passing on the right hand side of the road or breaking the speed limit.

The only time he ever really hit e brakes and stopped was when poor mama dog wandered out into the road way. Then he honked...stopped and patiently made sure the dog was safely on the other side. A good man...without doubt! I confess that I like our driving habits around here much better...I just don't quite have the attitude necessary to survive down south of the border!





and ethnic foods, more casseroles than meat and potatoes. When fixing desserts, she searches for quick and easy recipes. She likes to make icebox pies.



1/2 C chopped pecans 1 1/2 C sugar(+1/4 tsp) tsp cinnamon

1/2 C cranberry juice tsp vanilla extract 4 Tbsp butter 1/4 tsp Allspice

Pre heat oven to 425 degrees. Line a9" piedish with pastry. Sprinkle lightly with 1/4 tsp sugar. Toss cranvberries, apples, raisins, and pecans with sugar, flour, cinnamon, allspice, cran-berry juice, and vanilla. Spoon into pie shell, dot with butter. Create a lattice over the top with remaining pie crust cut into 1" slices. Bake 40 minutes until fruits are tender and pastry is brown. Allow to stand before serving.

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
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
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To The Editor:

Mothers are the only people that have something in common with Christ. Christ says no one comes to the Father except by me. Now, think of this..no one comes in to this world except by their mother.


Some folks may have doubts about their father. but ther eis no way they can doubt their mother.

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

Scott Scudder Recuperating From Shoulder Injury

This has not been the spring that Scott Scudder anticipated as he worked had during the months of December and January to be in the best possible shape he could be for the upcoming season.

As he left for Winter Haven, Florida it was with high hopes and expectations of joining a team excited and eager to erase the stigma of a long history of losing seasons. Everything seemed to be in favor of this being at least a season where the Indians would begin to rise to the top. Then as Scott progressed from the early days of pitching to catchers on the side, to the more all-out, bearing-down business of actually pitching to batters, he experienced the tell-tale sign that his injury of last summer was not healed. Last summer during a game, he had felt a pain in his back in the shoulder area of his right side. Coaches and trainers assured him it was just a bout of tendinitis and a few days rest would set it right. Unfortunately, the true case was that a muscle had torn and because Scott was resting it for only a few days and then attempting to pitch again, the muscle was not healing properly.

During the off season, the muscle had healed back with scar tissue but still was not strong enough to withstand the pitching motion. Therefore, it was retorn and this time Scott was sent to a specialist in Birmingham, Alabama. Dr. Andrews put him on a program of exercises and therapy which would last six weeks. This program is a specialized routine of exercise and workouts gradually increasing the distance of his pitches. Scott has almost finished the required routine and is presently beginning his rehab time which will be a short version of spring training which he missed. He will probably pitch some games in the minor leagues of the Cleveland organization and then brought back to rejoin the team.

The tragedies that stunned the team have hit Scott and Tracy exceptionally hard. The Olins were good friends and Scott and Tracy often did babysitting for them since the birth of their twins. The Olins had eaten dinner with the Scudders on Sunday night before the accicent on Monday, March 22.

The team is slowly recovering from teh shock and although there is a constant knowledge that there are two missing team members, they will be a team that Cleveland will be proud of this year and Scott hopes that he will soon be back on the mound doing his part.







Social Security Notes

There are probably many people who were once turned down or thought themselves ineligible for SSI who have had a change in their circumstances that would make them

The following is a list of some of the most common changes that could affect someone's eligibility for SSI: a decrease in income or resources (resources are things you own or money you have in cash, savings, investments, etc.), the death of a spouse; a spouse enters a nursing home; a disabled child reaches age 18; a move to another State; the medical condition of someone who was previously denied disability

benefits worsens. Additionally, the SSI income and resources limits have increased over the years. This means people who

were ineligible in the past because they had too much income or resources may now be eligible.

Too often, people who have these types of changes fail to reapply for SSI. They are losing out on important benefits because being eligible for SSI means more than just getting monthly checks. In most States, they would also be eligible for Medicaid which helps pay health care expenses. SSI recipients often qualify for food stamps and other social services.

If you or someone you know was previously denied SSI benefits, look at the situation again. If there has been some kind of change, check with Social Security to see if the change means you now can get SSI. You could be doing yourself, or someone you know a big favor.
