The Haskell School Board of Trustees met in regular session Tuesday, August 6, at 7:30 p. m. in the board room of the Haskell Public Schools. Present were board members Abe Turner, President, Elbert Johnson, Secretary, Leonard Weise, Raymond Andrada and Kenneth Lane; also present were R. K. Sams, Superintendent, Darold Roberson, Haskell Housing Authority and Mrs. Gene Long, Haskell Housing Authority.

Darold Roberson and Mrs. Gene Long met with the board to ask that the Housing Authority be excused from their in lieu of taxes payment for 73-74 due to a lack of funds. No action was taken on their request. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as written.

Motion was made by Raymond Andrada, seconded by Leonard Weise to accept the following resignations: Bonnie D. Hohler, John McFadin, and Janice Alderman. It was also moved that the board accept with regrets the resignation of board member C. G. Burson, Jr. Carried.

The following bids were submitted for the purchase of a new pickup: Bailey Tolver Chev. Co. \$2,350.00; Richardson Truck & Tractor \$2,408.10. Leonard Weise made the motion, seconded by Raymond Andrada that the bid submitted by Bailey Tolver Chev. Co. be accepted. Carried.

A motion was made by Kenneth Johnson, seconded by Elbert Johnson, to employ the following for the 1974-75 school year: As teachers — Catherine Bartley, Pamela K. Burson, Coy Payne and Olson LeFevre; as teacher aides — Elaine Davis and Lee Barnett; as bus drivers — Edwin Jeter, Olson LeFevre, Marion Strickland and Elton Cuiherth. Carried.

A motion was made by Elbert Johnson, seconded by Kenneth Lane, that since we are employing one less coach for 1974-75, the \$1950 coaching increment be divided between the three principals. Carried.

Kenneth Lane made a motion seconded by Leonard Weise, to amend policy No. 3.02(9) Paragraph one to read as follows: For an employee to attend authorized professional conferences and workshops, the school district will pay actual expenses up to a maximum of \$25 per day for room and meals. In addition the district will pay enrollment costs such as registration, fees, etc. Also the district will furnish a vehicle if available, if not, then the district will pay the employee for the use of his or her personal vehicle. Carried.

Kenneth Lane made the motion, seconded by Elbert Johnson to amend policy No. 8.13 (1) First paragraph to read: Correspondence Courses: A maximum of two units of correspondence work will be accepted for graduation. Only seniors will be eligible for correspondence work. Correspondence work cannot be used to graduate a student earlier than his normal age-grade enrollment calls for. At no time can the total regular classroom courses and correspondence courses be more than six. Carried.

A motion was made by Elbert Johnson, seconded by Raymond Andrada, to accept the contract for appraisal services with Pritchard and Abbott. Carried.

A motion was made by Raymond Andrada, seconded by Kenneth Lane, to adopt the amended budget for 1973-74 as presented. Carried.

A motion was made by Leonard Weise, seconded by Kenneth Lane, to adopt the 1974-75 budget as presented. Carried.

Raymond Andrada made the motion, seconded by Elbert Johnson, to adopt Exhibit B for the free lunch eligibility income scale. Carried. (Included in this week's Free Press).

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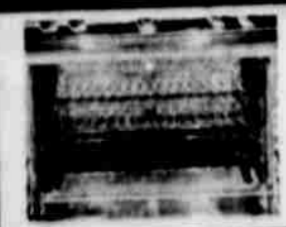

The report says "as the workload is constantly added to by new concerns, the steady reduction of staff of high skilled conservationists who work alongside local soil conservation district officials and others who share these concerns has put the SCS and conservation districts in a binding position.

Some of the highlights: The Secretary of Agriculture has been directed to provide SCS with high employment ceilings of full-time permanent employees and said it is imperative that the technical staff of the SCS be maintained at a competent level to enable SCS to maintain its network of field offices rendering service to local conservation districts. The Great Plains Conservation Program was given new life and was directed to be retained with the SCS, continuing to be operated as a separate program as in the past. Agricultural Conservation Program, known in 1973 as

REAP, and in 1974 and RECP, was re-vitalized for 1975. The Senate's decision is indeed heartening to the 17,000 district officials throughout the country who have been faced with growing demands for assistance and declining resources with which to meet the need.

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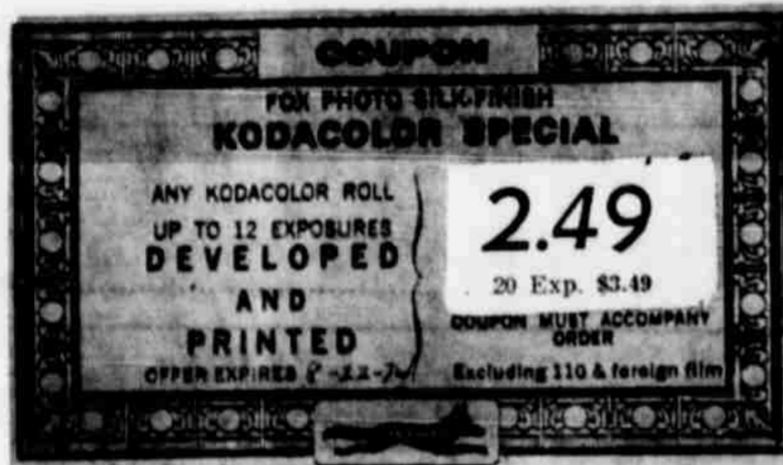

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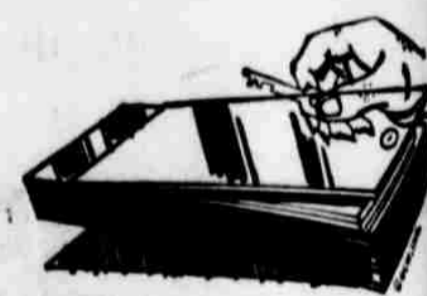

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Local Banks Play Role In Civic Projects

By ABE TURNER, President Haskell National Bank
Most people think of banks as

businesses which might be willing to lend you your own money if you can catch the boss in a good mood. However, we do a lot more than just take in deposits and make loans. A key function of banks that affects every citizen is investment in state and local government financing issues. Banks represent the single most important market for these bonds, and, in communities like Haskell the local bank often can be the difference between a key local project succeeding or being discarded. Communities raise money in two ways—taxes and borrowing.

Often borrowings for specific projects can avert tax increases by improving the overall capacity of the community to bring in revenues. But it can be difficult at times for a small town to raise money in debt markets. Large banking systems generally are interested more in acting as underwriters or agents for bond issues than they are in buying these securities. The underwriting function can produce quick profits while avoiding the necessity of tying up large amounts of funds in relatively low profit paper. Local independent community banks, on the other hand, generally invest a large proportion of their non-loan funds in the debt issues of the areas they serve.

In many small towns, where independent community banks are the prime source of financing, these problems were overcome. Often the bank agreed to purchase a full issue of local bonds at the rates acceptable to the community — no matter what the prevailing market conditions called for.

Thus, the paradox existed of the nation's largest cities paying unheard of interest rates or postponing needed programs while smaller towns were able to go ahead with financing plans. However, in states dominated by large banking systems — which must account to stockholders for every move — the problems of the money prevailed even in the smallest towns. There are many areas in which a bank with strong community identity can make a difference to the local economy. None is more significant, perhaps, than the role played by independent community banks in school and government financing programs. (Pd. Adv.)
