The group has a monthly newsletter that they send to bereaved parents. The newsletter is filled with stories about the loss of a child, articles on ways to work through grief and personal accounts by parents telling of how they managed to cope. They have an annual picnic in which the whole group gets together with the families of the members and at Christmas they decorate a memorial tree in Bywaters Park which people can bring ornaments in memory of a loved one. The group is funded by donations that mainly go towards publishing

It is always possible that there may be a disease contributing to the problem; however, we have not been able to diagnose one. If someone can shed some light on the problem, I would be most appreciative. A good deep watering would probably help some of the trees. If you want to water a tree, see that the water reaches the feeder roots. You might want to think about placing the hose in the area at the ends of the limbs, turning on the faucet slightly, and letting it run for several hours. The length of time will depen d on the soil compaction and etc. Whatever you do, do not lightly sprinkle the soil under the tree every day, as this will encourage the roots to come to the top of the soil.
