Fire Protection School Open To Area Firefighters

There will be a Lamar County Fire Protection School on September 17-18, 1993 with registration from 5 to 6 p.m. on Friday and 7 to 8 a.m. Saturday. Classes will be held from 6 to 10 p.m. on Friday and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday.

Fee will be \$10 (includes lunch Saturday) Pre-registration is required. The school will be limited to the first 100 students.

It will be held on Friday at Paris Junior College at the Alford Center in Paris and at the Paris Fire Department Training Field Saturday.

All members of volunteer, paid or part-paid departments of cities and industries who want the latest training in firefighting and related skills are encouraged to attend to keep abreast of new problems and developments in the fire service and to

learn the most current fire control and protection methods.

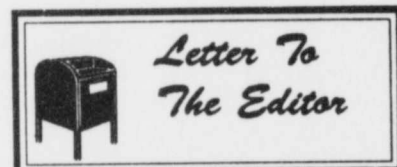
Courses will be: Friday (4 hours each) Basic Arson Detection; First Responder Hazardous Materials; Firefighter safety.

Saturday, (rotating, 2 hours each) Ladder Practices; Smoke House/SCBA; LP Gas Project and Housefires/Firefighting PPV.

It will be conducted by the Fire Protection Training Division of the Texas Engineering Extension Service and is sponsored by the Reno Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department and the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas.

Facilities are furnished by the Paris Fire Department and Paris Junior College.

A registration form should be available at area fire departments.



Letter To The Citizens Of Deport
Labor Day will soon be here and the **Deport Community Service Club** will be around to place the U.S. Flags in pre-installed holders for the holiday.

Our service club started this project on July 4th of this year and placed 68 flags around our proud city.

As Labor Day approaches the recent response has increased the number of flags until this holiday 110 red, white and blue flags will brighten the landscape.

I use approximate figures because people or businesses request the service from any member and not all requests may have been turned in right now.

As most residents of our city are aware this service only costs \$15 per year. During that year the club will place a 3 ft. x 5 ft. U.S. Flag in a pre-existing holder installed on a person's property or business five times. Those holidays are: Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, Labor Day and Veterans Day. The flags are furnished by the club and installed so that they fly from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

Club members will be installing flag holders this Saturday, August 28th in preparation for Labor Day.

I would like to encourage anyone or anyone with a business in Deport, Rugby, Milton or anyone who lives as close as three miles north or south of Deport to contact any Community Service Club members and request this service now so we can add you to our growing list.

This service enables everyone to be patriotic without the task of keeping up with a flag all year, installing and removing it and flying it during daylight hours.

All revenues from this service goes to fund local worthwhile projects and stays right here!

I would like to thank each and every one of you who have already subscribed to this service.

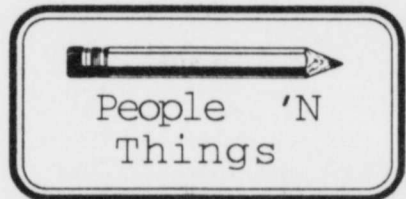

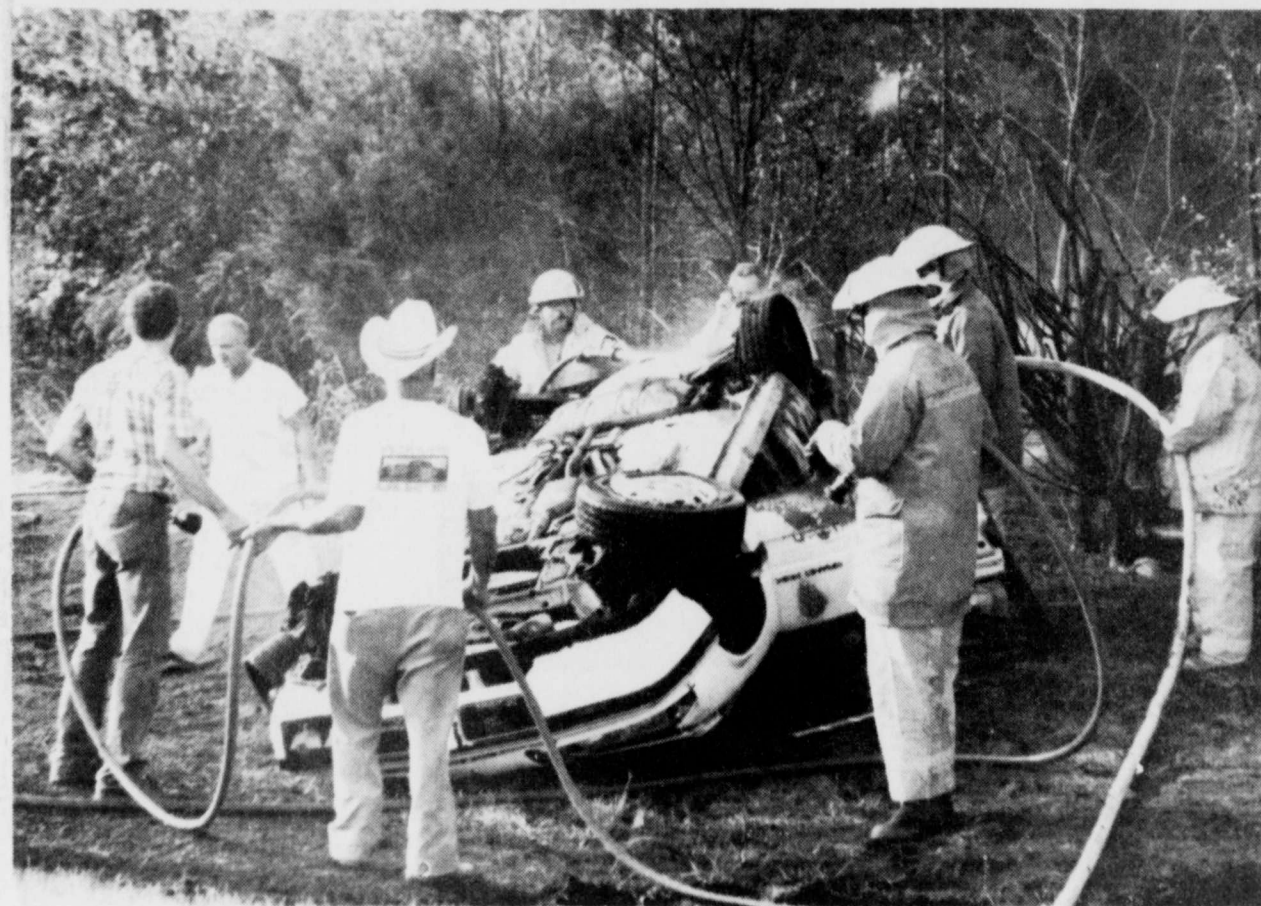

PECAN PIE

by Dixie Brown
3 eggs
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup white corn syrup
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. butter flavoring
1 heaping cup pecans
1/3 cup margarine, melted
Slightly beat eggs in medium size bowl. Blend in sugar and corn syrup and margarine, add vanilla and butter flavoring. Arrange pecan halves on bottom of crust. Pour filling over them. Bake for 50 to 60 minutes in 350 degree oven until center is almost set but still soft. Do not over bake for filling will set as it cools. Cool on wire rack 1 hour before cutting.

ONION MEAT LOAF

1 cup soft bread crumbs
1 egg, slightly beaten
3/4 cup minced onion
1 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. black pepper
1 Tbsp chopped parsley
1/2 cup grated carrots
1 1/2 lb. ground beef
2 (6 oz.) cans tomato juice

2 strips bacon

Combine bread crumbs, egg, onion, salt, pepper, parsley, and carrots. Add meat, mixing lightly. Gradually add about half of the tomato juice, using just enough to hold the mixture together. Mix together lightly, but well. Shape into a loaf, and put in a shallow baking dish. Pour remaining tomato juice over top. Lay bacon strips on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 50 minutes or until loaf is well browned and done in the middle.

SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE

3 cups sweet potatoes cooked and mashed
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup milk
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 stick oleo
Mix all ingredients well and pour into lightly greased casserole. Cover with the following topping: 1 cup brown sugar, 1/3 cup flour, 1 cup pecans, and 1/3 stick melted oleo. The topping ingredients should be mixed together and spread over the top of the potato mixture. Bake 35 minutes at 350 degrees.

Nicotine Is A Major Drug Of Abuse

Scientists in Texas are exploring new approaches to the study of drug abuse, focusing on how nicotine addiction develops in the brain.

"Nicotine is a major drug of abuse and a major killer," said Dr. James Patrick, a neuroscientist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "The evidence is in more than 440,000 tobacco-related deaths annually in the U.S. and Canada."

In hopes of developing ways to overcome nicotine addiction, Patrick, himself an ex-smoker, is studying the molecular aspects of nicotine action in the brain.

"People often seem to think drugs of abuse achieve their results through 'magic,'" he said, "but, in fact, they modify the body in some way that causes it to need that drug."

In the case of nicotine, one of the most addictive of drugs, Patrick thinks the modification is an increase in the number of some of the sites where nicotine chemically binds in the brain.

Research indicates the nicotine binding sites in the brain are about double the number in smokers as in non-smokers.

Studying how, where and why nicotine reacts with these sites has been the focal point of Patrick's scientific career for more than 20 years.

He is studying how nicotine changes the abundance of the sites in the brain and the possible tie to addiction.

"Telling people to 'just say no' after an addiction has developed is inappropriate and naive," Patrick said, "because at that point it's a medical problem rather than simply a matter of choice."

"The number of lives lost each year to nicotine addiction is about 10 times greater than the number of people who die as a direct consequence of all other kinds of drug abuse," Patrick said.

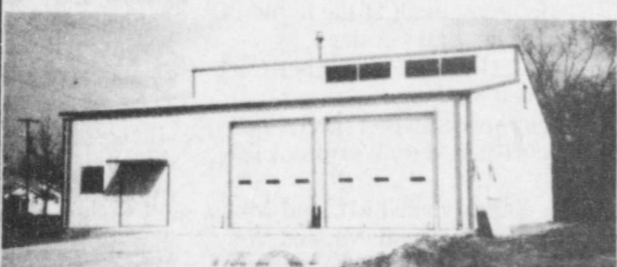
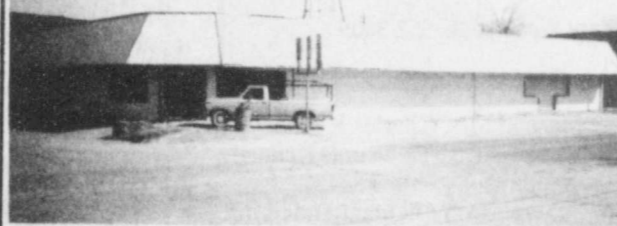

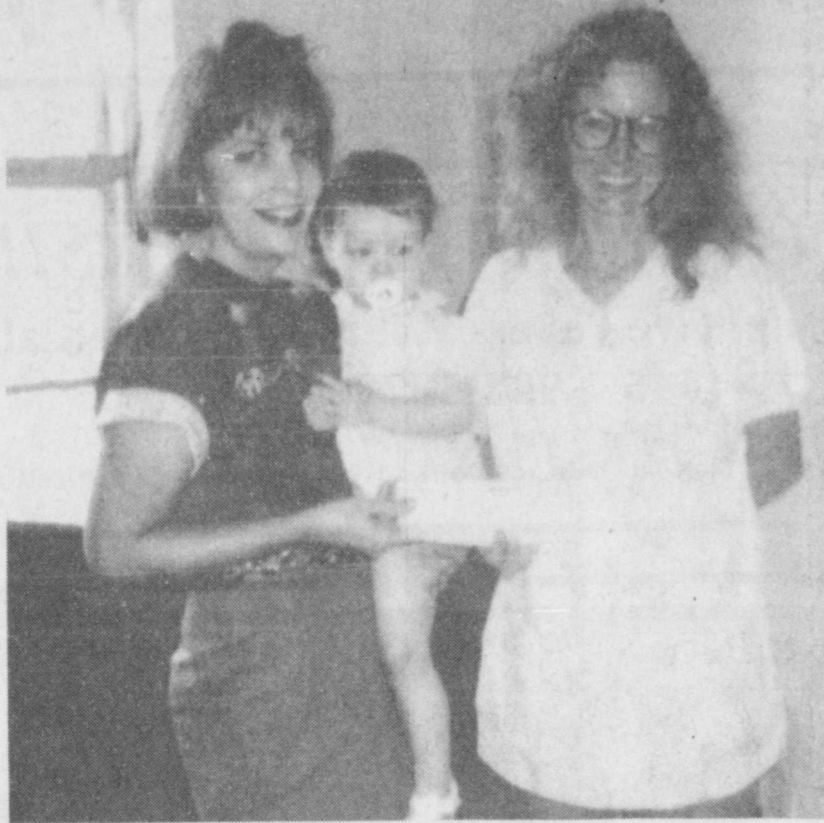
