

Hearing Will Deal With Deport's Trash Pickup

New rules from the Texas Water Commission and the EPA affecting landfills, and a Senate Bill aiming at a higher recycling rate will bring about higher trash pickup rates for Deport residents. Trash pickup rates have been costing the city of Deport \$175 per week, and due to the increase in landfill expenses the city will have to pay approximately \$285

per week starting October 1. A public hearing set for Monday, September 27 at 6:30 p.m. will also give residents a chance to hear about possible new trash collection methods. Stoney Armsby of Waste Man-

agement will explain the new laws

passed that are the reason for the pickup increases.

Waste Management, which currently has the large dumpsters in Deport, will have one of the wheeled individual dumpsters on hand to be looked over by citizens.

The household-size dumpsters would cost slightly more, but would eliminate the problem of animals tearing into garbage sacks. They would also be available to people living outside of the city limits for a fee.

City Secretary Sharon Francis says she would like to urge everyone to come to this hearing and voice their opinions and hear what is being



I had the nicest visit today with a very nice lady. Mrs. Leonna Wright lives in V. Thedford Homes, in Bogata. She lost her husband, Frank, in 1987 and her son, Truman Wright in 1981. Mrs. Wright was at one time the V. Thedford Homes Correspondent for The Bogata News. She says that she doesn't get around much anymore, but she is still a lot of fun.

Mrs. Wright had found an old cookbook that she hadn't used in a long time. It was titled "Recipes From The Blanton Reunion". From this book, she had recipes for Zesty Biscuit Bean Bake, Melt In Mouth Cookies, Cherry Salad, Just Like Wyatt's Egg Plant Casserole, Cabbage Rolls (the cabbage roll recipe


Tim was granted his licenses.
