School Principals To Discuss Education Issues

The Texas Association of Secondary School Principals will hold its 70th Annual Conference from Sunday, October 31 through Tuesday, November 1 at the Stouffer Austin Hotel in the Arboretum Shopping Center.

The conference marks the beginning of "Secondary School Principals' Week in Texas" as proclaimed by Gov. Ann W. Richards, and helps to focus attention to the problems faced by principals in administering a contemporary secondary school. More than 700 principals, assistant principals and other school support staff are expected to attend the conference.

Conference attendees can participate in numerous discussion group sessions under the themes of "Instructional Initiatives," "Professional Development Strategies," "Special Programs for Special Needs" and "Update on State Initiatives."

The opening general session speaker on Sunday will be Paul Burka, Austin, executive editor of Texas Monthly magazine. Dr. Ben Bissell, Richmond, VA will address

the second general session on Monday. The third general session on Tuesday morning will feature Suzie Humphries, Dallas, whose message is "Life is What Happens to You While You're Making Other Plans."

Participants may also pack the Grand Ballroom for the hour long question and answer session with Texas Commissioner of Education, Lionel "Skip" Meno. This session begins Monday at 4:45 p.m.

The Texas Association of Secondary School Principals, established in 1922, is a private non-profit organization which represents over 70% of all Texas high school and junior high/middle level school principals and assistant principals as well as other school support staff.

Dr. Gary Ballard, principal of Prairiland High School, is the 1993-94 President of the 4,000 member association, which encourages research and discussion of issues in secondary education, promotes high standards for its members, and seeks the successful completion of secondary education for all Texas school children.

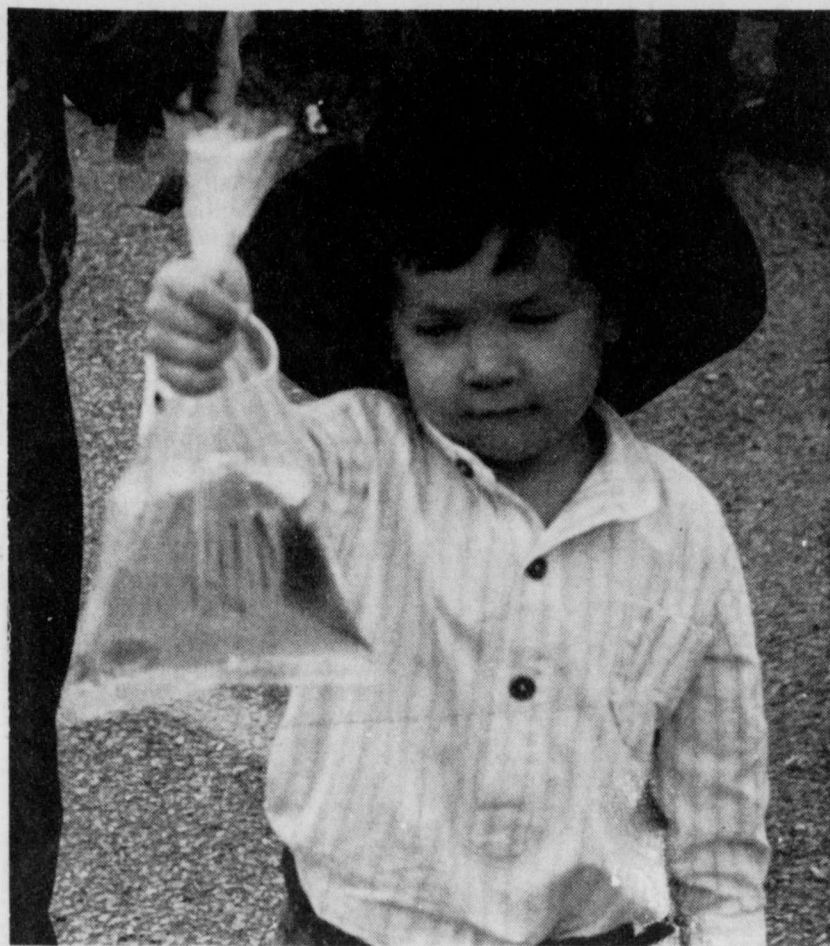

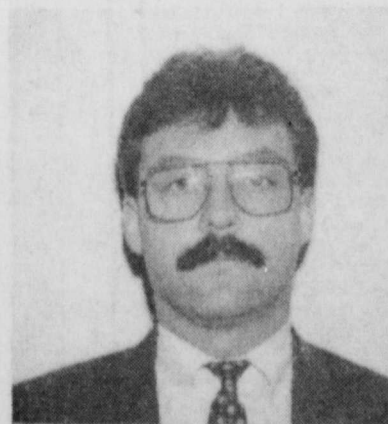

Chewy Peanut Brownie Bars

Crust:
1 (21.5 oz.) pkg. Pillsbury Fudge Brownie Mix
1/2 cup margarine
1 egg

Filling:
1 cup corn syrup
3/4 cup peanut butter
1 cup peanuts
1 tablespoon margarine
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Glaze:
1 Tablespoon Margarine
1 ounce unsweetened chocolate
7 1/2 teaspoons water
1 cup powdered sugar
1/2 teasp. vanilla

Heat oven to 350 degrees. In large bowl, combine all crust ingredients; mix well. Press evenly in bottom of ungreased 15X10X1 inch baking pan.

In a small bowl, beat corn syrup and peanut butter at low speed until well blended. Stir in remaining filling ingredients. Spread filling evenly over crust to within 1/2 inch of edges.

Bake at 350 for 18-20 minutes or until edges are firm and center is just firm to the touch. Cool completely.

In a small saucepan over low heat, heat 1 tablespoon margarine, chocolate and water, stirring constantly until mixture is smooth. Remove from heat. Stir in powdered sugar and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla; blend until smooth. Drizzle glaze over cooled brownies. Let stand until set. Cut into bars. Makes 50 bars.

Quick As An Elf Key Lime Pie

1 (6 oz) Keebler Graham Cracker Pie Crust
3 eggs separated

1 can (14 oz.) Eagle Brand Milk
1 tsp. grated lime peel
1/3 cup lime juice
whipped topping
A few drops of green food coloring (optional)

In a large bowl, beat egg whites until stiff peaks form; set aside. In a small bowl, beat egg yolks. Mix in sweetened condensed milk. Gradually add lime peel and juice. Stir to combine well. Fold mixture into egg whites; add food coloring. Pour into crust. Freeze 3 hours. Let stand 15 minutes at room temperature before serving. Serve with whipped topping.

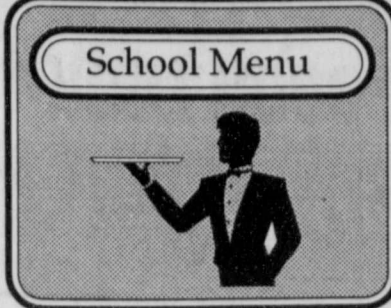

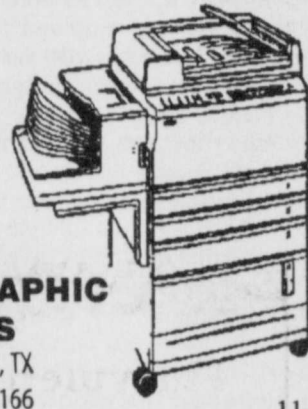

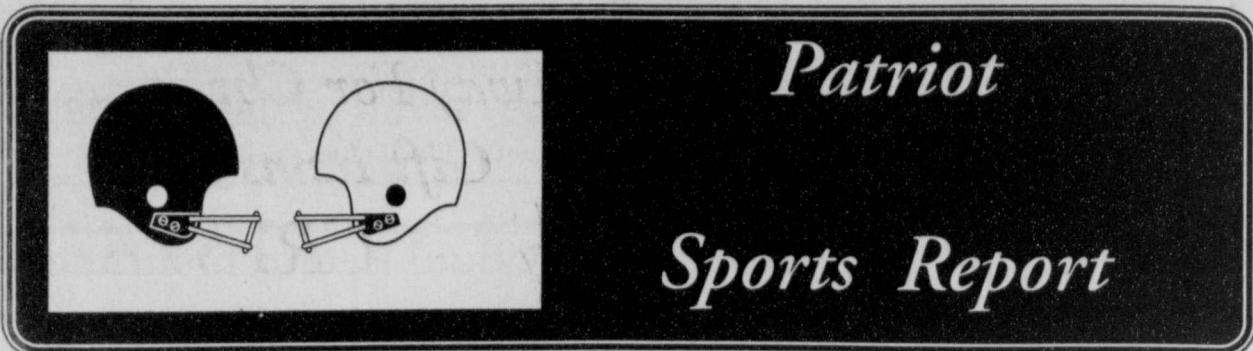

Prairiland Falls Hard To Honey Grove

When the Patriot faithful arrived at Warrior Stadium in Honey Grove last Friday night, they were greeted by a program which welcomed them to the "Year of the Angry Orange". And if the Warriors were not angry in their 56-6 win over Prairiland, it is probably best that no other 17-2A team test the Warriors.

It took the Orange just 1:07 to score their first seven points on an electric 68-yard pass and run play from Todd Morrison to Richard Bates, plus the first of eight straight PAT's by Nathan Ryser.

The Patriots still could not move to open the second quarter and Honey Grove moved 70 yards by mid-quarter to get 28-0 on a 13-yard pitch sweep by Bates.

When Peralta could not handle the snap on the punt following the next

Pat series, the Warriors had to move only 24 yards. Bates had a 20-yarder and Morrison got the score on a one-yard sneak to make the halftime count 35-0.

And it got no better quickly. Wayne Stevenson intercepted Michael Murphy at the Pat 30, and 13 by Bates and the 16-yard tally by Allen Stevenson culminated the 2-play drive which brought it to 42-0.

By this point, Coach Charlie Brown was substituting liberally, but still the offensive onslaught continued with reserve fullback Ben Crump popping for 39 yards and the score which made it 49-0.

But a fanned kickoff, plus a major penalty for spearing against the young Warriors set Prairiland up at the Warrior 40, their first such field position, and the Red and Blue was not about to waste such an opportunity.

Johnny White pounded for eight yards on two successive carries, and just when the Warriors began to look at White, James Dudley powered off tackle to a first down at the 27.

Stephen Swaim and Dudley had bookend 8-yarders to the 11 before Swaim was stopped for a yard gain. And on the last play of the third quarter, Zach Allen hit Matt Dorries for a first and goal inside the one.

Allen got the touchdown to open the last quarter. But Swaim had been injured, and Dudley's attempt at placement fell harmlessly away.

Still, there was finally Patriot excitement. For exactly 12 seconds.

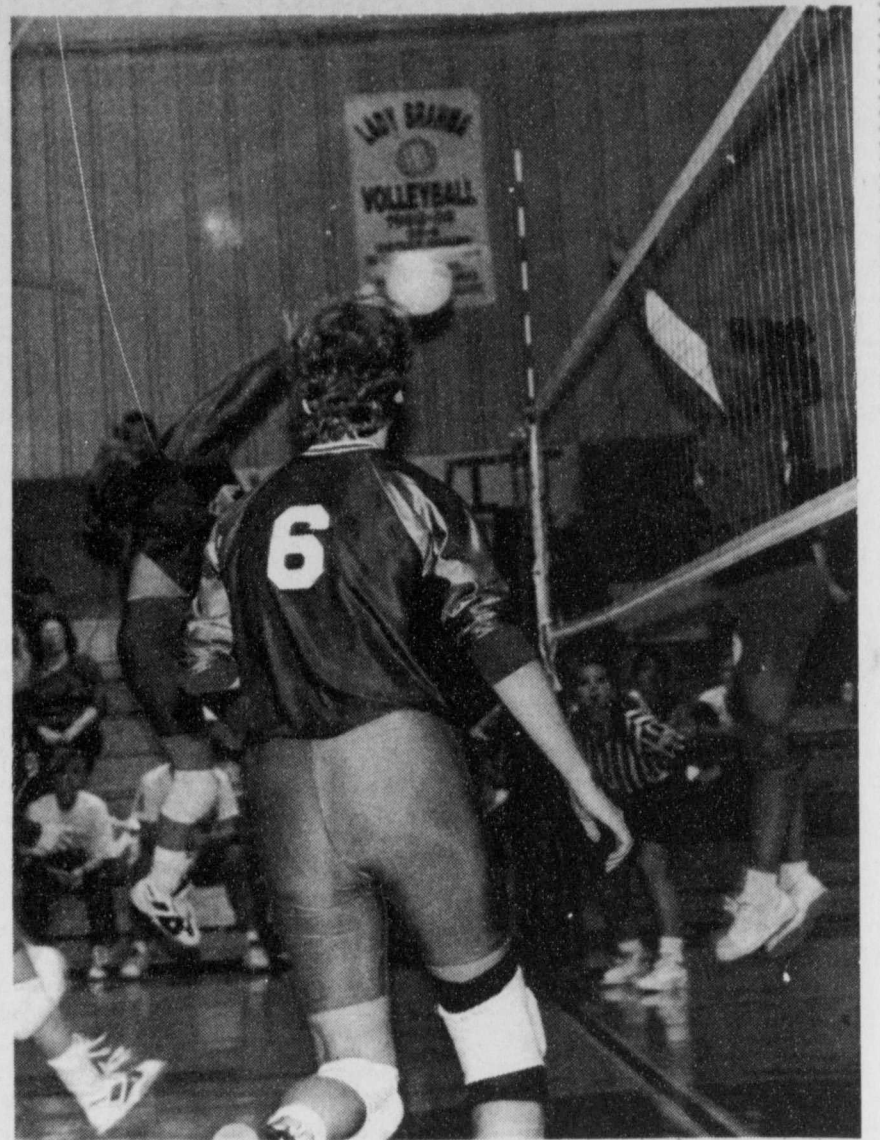
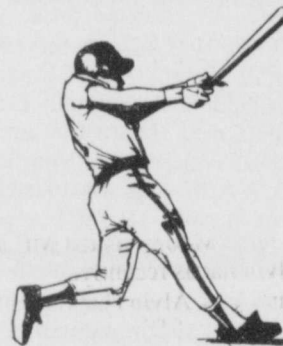
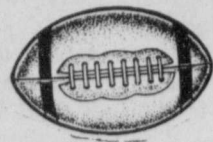
Quick junior Terry Jackson took the kickoff return back 80 yards, and the final indignity had been reached.

Keeping Healthy

Effects of Oat Products on Cholesterol

Coronary heart disease (CHD) is the most common cause of death in the United States, claiming approximately one-half million lives annually. Several risk factors for CHD have been identified including hypertension, cigarette smoking, and hypercholesterolemia. The findings of the Lipid Research Clinics Coronary Primary Prevention Trial indicate that lowering elevated plasma cholesterol will definitely lower risk for CHD.

While it has been demonstrated that reductions in total fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol intake will help reduce plasma cholesterol levels, recent studies indicate that alterations in soluble fiber intake can also reduce plasma cholesterol levels. Soluble fibers are found in certain foods, including fruits, dried beans and peas, and oats.
