The Veterans Edition was the main reason we earned the award. Apparently it really impressed the state judges.

In an acceptance speech at the presentation I pointed out that this particular edition was my husband's "brainstorm". He felt it was something that would provide veterans and their families with a keepsake to be proud of. So it has proven. We cannot express just how pleased we were that the American Legion felt our efforts were worth recognition. Not because it inflated our ego...but because it proves that our original intention was accomplished...the recognition of veterans.

When we began this edition we never envisioned just how big it would become. We certainly never thought it would gain state-wide recognition. The veterans and families can take pride in knowing that their pictures won this award.

As more and more veterans photos came in we were struck with just how many of them there are!

We had nearly another 100 photos again this year! What to do...we couldn't keep expanding forever! So, we took out artwork, quotes, and "squashed" things up. Still, we had too many without adding even more pages, and that is very expensive. Finally, sadly, we removed a handful of those veterans who were included in our very first edition...and have been included since. We hated to do it.

In fact, this is probably going to be the last year we put out a veterans edition. The expense of sizing, scanning, typesetting, printing and mailing an issue with so many photographs...even with sponsors...is overwhelming. It is the only issue we publish in which we don't strive for a profit margin, but it is becoming too big to handle.

Another disappointment is that I had saved a service man's letter from months ago to run in this year's edition. When my computer hard drive "crashed" the letter went with it. I don't remember who it belonged to, so I can't ask them to bring it back in!

But...we have done our very best. We have dedicated as much time and effort as possible into getting each photo right. I'm sure there are some mistakes...it would be virtually impossible not to have some when dealing with over 300 photos. But please...overlook them and take this very special issue as it's meant...a tribute to this nation's veterans who deserve so much recognition.

### Faces From The Past Deserve Recognition Now

Once more it is Veteran's Day. About fifty new faces have joined the long list of those whose pictures appear on these pages. One by one, as we scan the photos and place them in position on the page, these faces look back at us. Many of the faces we still see regularly...but they are older now, as time proceeds at its usual unstoppable pace. Fresh-faced young men from World War II, Youthful faces from Korea, even Viet Nam veterans are middle aged now. ## Deport City Council Meets To Handle Issues

Important issues were attended to at the Deport City Council's regular meeting Monday night, Nov. 8.

After the minutes were read and approved, bills paid and the financial report approved the council voted to support Leslie (Buddy) Taylor for appointment to the Lamar County Appraisal District Board of Directors.

Also approved was the billing for commercial customers serviced by Waste Management, inc. to be handled by the city.

Due to a new regulation the city of Deport will be required to take samples from twenty homes built after 1982

to check for lead/copper contents. This process will cost the city \$400. Building permits and sewer permit fees will be set at \$5 each.

The council agreed to help sponsor this year's Christmas Parade, which is set for December 13, at 1:00 p.m.

Dr. David Salas; Nurse Practitioner Carrie Thompson, Julie Maddox, Vice President of Patient Care, all from St. Joseph's Hospital discussed their possibility of opening a Rural Health Clinic in Deport before presenting the idea at a town meeting.

Responsibility for gravel on Milton-minter Road was discussed. The council agreed to share fifty of the cost.

## Prairiland School Board Meets Monday Night

The Prairiland CISD Board of Trustees met Monday, November 8.

The approved a resolution to support the Lamar County Coalitions of Education, Business and Industry and approved a waiver request for two more staff development days. These days will be January 17 and April 4th.

The board approved their votes for Leslie (Buddy) Taylor for the Board

of Directors of the Lamar County Appraisal District.

They approved a Town Bus Route in Blossom due to the road construction. This will keep the children from having to cross Hwy. 82 during heavy construction times. It will last until the construction is finished.

The board heard and approved the tax report, financial report and minutes.

## Positive Response Given To Rural Health Clinic In Deport

Deport area residents gave St. Joseph's Hospital officials a very favorable response to the idea of a Rural Health Clinic in Deport Monday night, as about 65 to 70 citizens turned out to hear the presentation.

Julie Maddox, Vice President of Patient Care, Betsy Chapman and Dr. David Salas spoke of the idea behind Nurse Practitioners.

Dr. Salas would continue to come to Deport on Tuesdays, and as long as Dr. Agnes Xavier wants to she would continue to come also. Dr. Xavier would be separate from the Rural Health Clinic area, and would provide her own nurse.

On Tuesday Dr. Salas would be reviewing at least ten percent of patient charts the Nurse Practitioner was seeing. The Nurse Practitioner would be using a set of protocols which are carefully established between nurse and doctor.

A Nurse Practitioner would be available Monday through Friday.

Nurse Practitioners have a Master's Degree and their advanced education is aimed at Minor Medical Management. This means that they can obtain medical histories and perform physical examinations; diagnose and treat common health problems such as infections and minor injuries; diagnose, treat and monitor chronic diseases such as diabetes and high blood pressure; order and interpret diagnostic studies such as lab work; prescribe or recommend prescriptions for medications and other treatments; provide prenatal care and family planning services; provide well-child care, including screening and immunizations; provide health maintenance care for adults, including annual physicals; promote positive health behaviors and self-care skills through education and counseling; collaborate with physicians and other health professionals as needed.

Medicare and Medicaid insurance will pay for Nurse Practitioner care.

The clinic would file on insurance for Medicare and Medicaid.

Many questions were asked by the people at the meeting. They were told, in response to some of these questions, that the price would be lower for a Nurse Practitioner visit than a visit to a Physician, that they know their limitations and if someone needed advanced care on hospitalization they would refer them to physicians, and that people would have a choice of doctors if their physicians was willing to work with them.

Julie Maddox said "We're not out to steal anyone's patients".

After such a positive response from people, it was said that the clinic might possibly go into effect as soon as January of 1994. It is a matter of interviewing Nurse Practitioners (who are much in demand right now), selecting one who can work well with people and the overseeing physician, and working out protocols between them.

**Mandarin Orange Cake by Ruby Horn**  
1 box yellow cake mix  
1 (11 oz.) can mandarin oranges with juice  
4 eggs  
1/2 cup vegetable oil  
Mix cake mix, oranges with juice, eggs, and oil with electric mixer until orange slices are broken up and batter is fluffy. (About 3 minutes) Divide among 3 greased and floured, 8 or 9 inch layer pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes, or until it tests done. Ice between layers and on top.

**Original Green Bean Casserole**  
1 can cut green beans drained  
3/4 cup milk  
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
1/8 tsp ground black pepper  
1 can French Fried Onions  
Combine all ingredients except 1/2 can onions; pour into a 1 1/2 quart casse; role, bake uncovered, at 350 degrees for 30 minutes, or until heated through. Top with remaining onions. Bake uncovered 5 minutes or until onions are golden. Makes 6 servings.

**Beef Roast**  
3 or 4 lb. beef roast  
sprinkle 1/2 pkg. Lipton Soup mix over meat and cover with 3 cans mushroom soup, undiluted. Stir soup so it will not be lumpy. Put in a pan or oven safe dish 13X9X2 inches, lined with heavy foil. Seal the foil tightly. Bake in 350 degree oven for 2 1/2 or 3 hours. Do not open foil until done.

**Tomato Stuffing**  
3 or 4 cups corn bread  
4 or 5 large tomatoes peeled and mashed, or a can of tomatoes  
1/2 tsp black pepper  
hot pepper to taste  
1 egg  
4 slices of light bread  
1 cup chopped colery  
1 medium onion  
1 Tbsp sage  
1/4 cup oil  
1/2 cup evaporated milk  
Cook onions and celery in 1 cup of water until tender. Mix all the other ingredients together and pour in dish or pan to bake. Put 2 slices of bacon on top. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes or 1 hour.

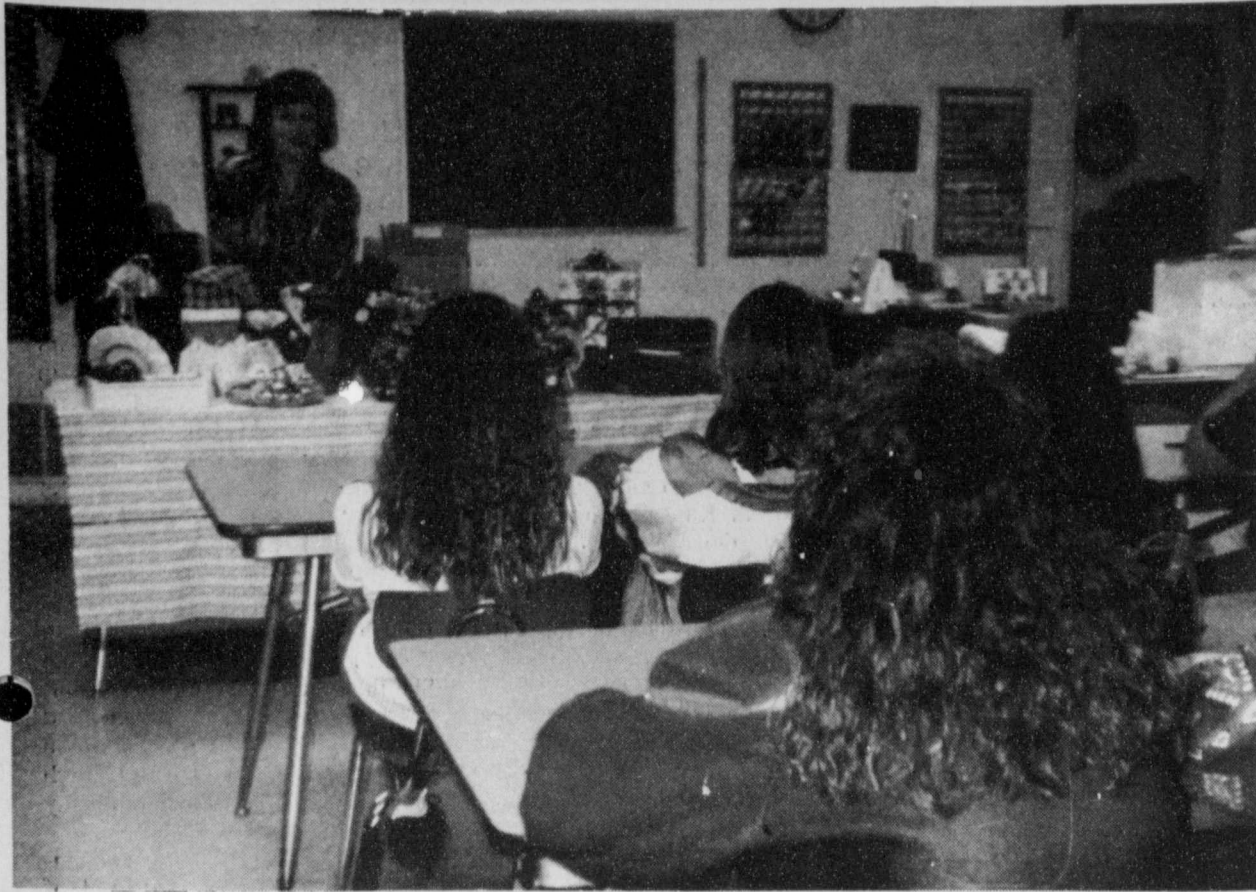

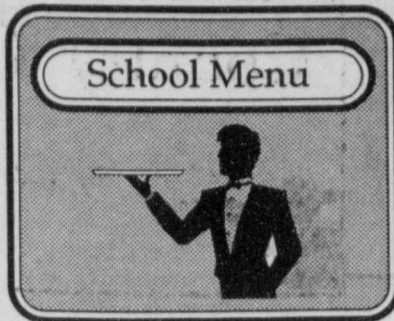

# Patriots Lose Finale 42-20

The Prairiland Patriots enjoyed a rarity of the 1993 season in their last game of the year, a two touchdown lead over the Cooper Bulldogs. But before the bone-chilled climax, the Red and Blue were enjoying it much less.

The Bulldogs had ridden a 330 yards+ rushing performance by junior running back Jacob Toon to a 42-20 win in the season finale for both teams.

At season's close, the Bulldogs finished in third position in district 17-2A, behind playoff representatives Honey Grove and Wolfe City. The Patriots, meanwhile, tied with Chisum and Rivercrest with one win apiece in conference play. The Prairiland mark for the year was 2-8.

The Patriots struck first following a routine exchange of punts on the two teams' first possessions.

Starting at midfield following a short Cooper kick, James Dudley punched for three yards before Zachary Allen crossed the home team up, rolling to the right and finding Ramiro Peralta roaming free at about the 20. Only good defensive recovery stopped Peralta at the Cooper 5.

But another Dudley trey, followed by one yard punches by Stephen Swaim got the score at 4:58 of the

first. Swaim then nailed the point.

Thirty-three seconds later, the Pats stunned the Bulldogs again when Paul Jackson jumped on a Blake Randle fumble at the Dog 34.

The Pats got another 14-yard Allen-Peralta connection, but a holding penalty put the ball back at the 32.

Not to worry. On the first play, Allen found Matt Dorries to the Cooper 4. Dudley took but one play to rip across tackle for the score, and Swaim's PAT netted 14-0.

But it was a wake-up call for the home team. Following a return to the 39, Toon got 12 off-tackle, followed by a pitch sweep outside for 49 yards. The drive had taken 35 seconds, and the first quarter score was 14-7, Prairiland.

It was 21-14, Cooper, at halftime, due to scores by Toon and Jaron Rainey, and it did not take long in the third period to get ugly.

Following the halftime kickoff, Toon ran for 16, 16, 10 and 21 to personally fuel the 65-yard drive which netted 28-14.

And in a lightning 68-yard strike which took less than a minute and a half, Toon got the first 50 on three strikes, and Chris King took the reverse the last 18 yards to 34-14.

Bruce Greene kicked a 42-yard

punt to the Pat 4 which nailed the game shut.

The Pats couldn't move, and when Peralta's punt only reached the 30 against the brisk north wind, it was Duck Soup for the Dogs.

Rainey got 11, a 10-yard holding penalty moved the ball to the 9. Toon got it to the lip of the goal, and King scored his second.

It appeared to be all over, but Swaim thought otherwise. Breaking two tackles, he broke free at the Pat 35, turning into a breakaway back with just enough speed to get the endzone for the final Pat touchdown of the year.

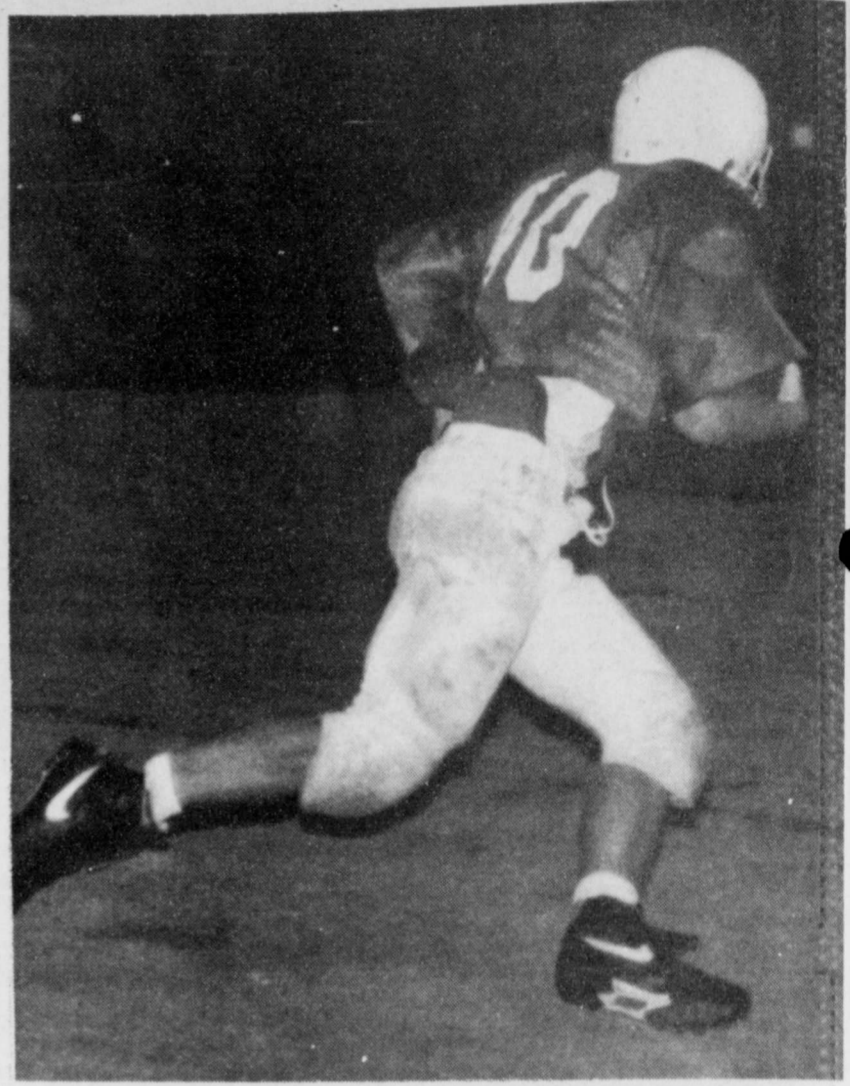

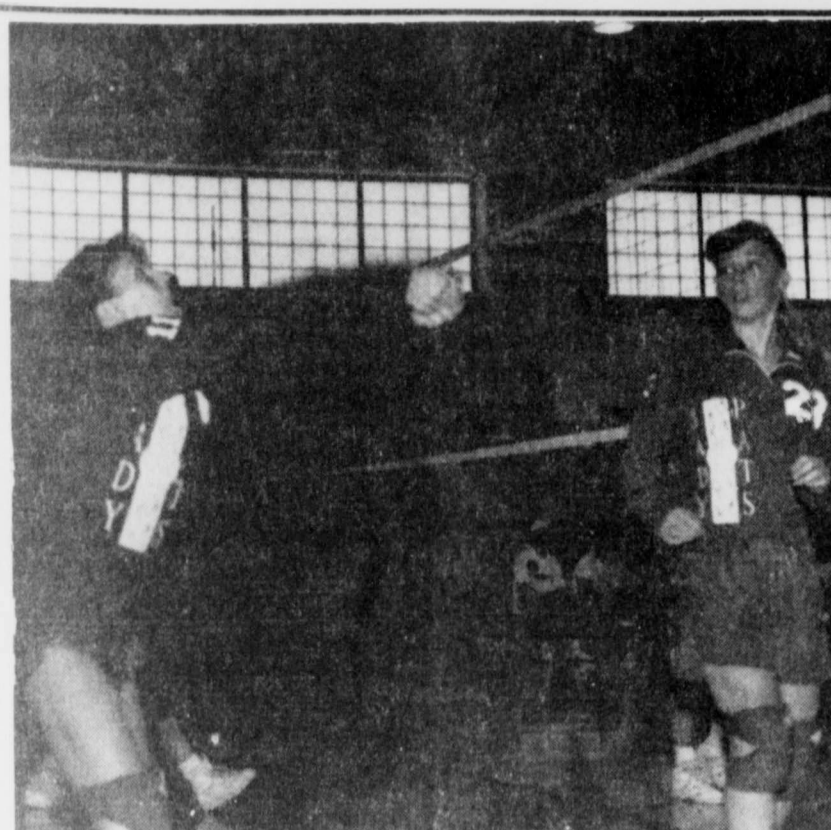
