The Laverne Tripp Family will be singing at Life Tabernacle Church in Cunningham on Monday, November 22 at 7 p.m.

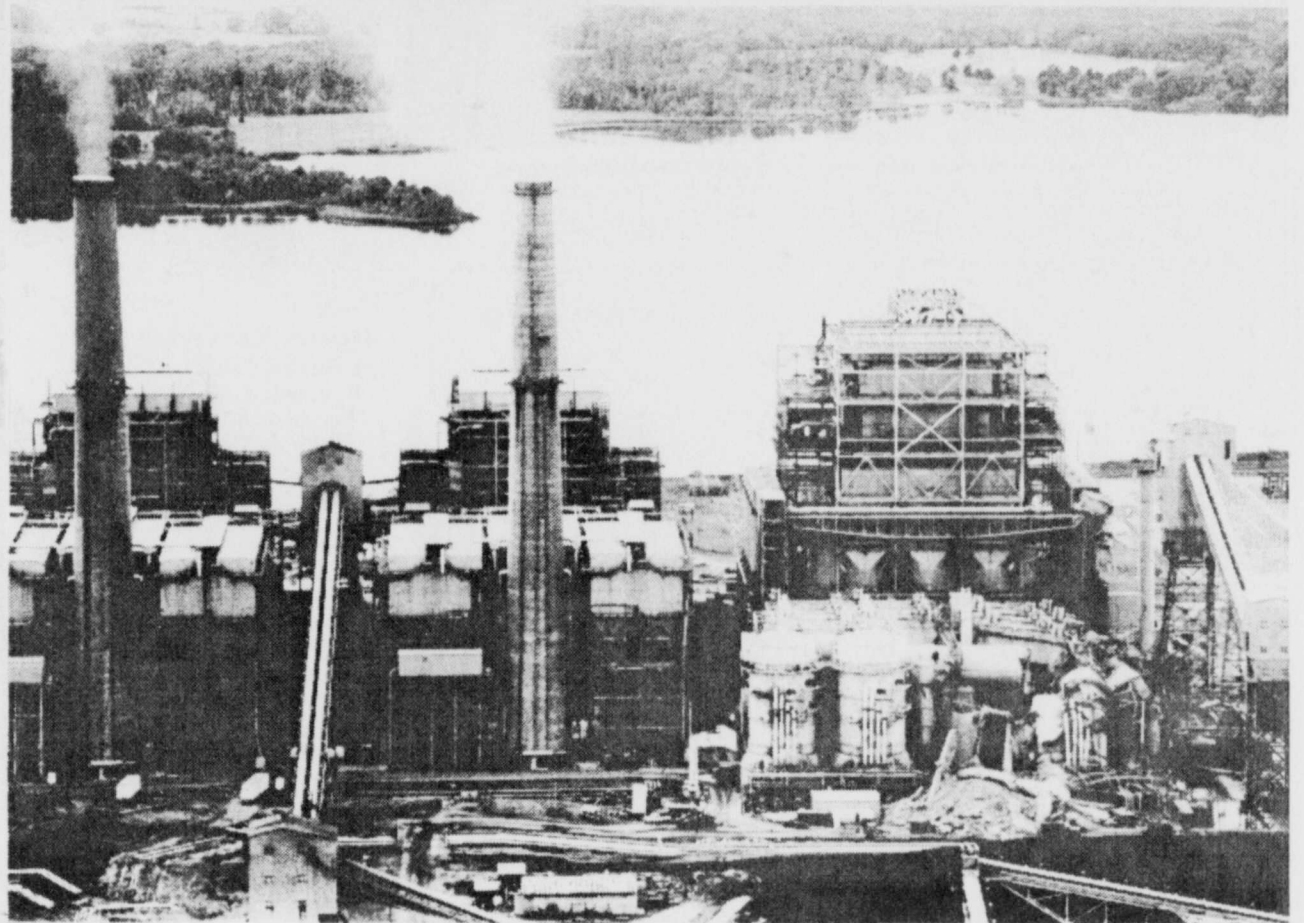
Capital Murder Indictments Handed Down In Lennox Case

Red River County Attorney Jack Herrington reported that on Tuesday, November 16, 1993 the Grand Jury returned four capital murder indictments and one criminal conspiracy to commit murder indictment in the death of Martha Lennox on October 29th.

Indicted for capital murder were Ricky Dean Bell, age 23 of Clarksville; Willie Earl Pondexter, Jr. age 19 of Idabel Oklahoma; James Lee Henderson, age 20 of Idabel Oklahoma and Deon Lashun Williams age 16, a juvenile certified as an adult.

Williams was certified as an adult in Red River County Juvenile Court on Wednesday, Nov. 10 at a hearing which issued a discretionary transfer.

Indicted for criminal conspiracy to commit murder by the Grand Jury was James Earl Bell, age 22. County Attorney Jack Herrington said "the laws have changed and there are only two penalties for capital murder now...life or death. A life sentence carries a minimum 40 calendar year sentence with no parole or time off for good behavior."

It Isn't Sport, Folks By Nanalee Nichols

Several hunters have called me to express their disgust over the illegal hunting going on. Spotting deer, killing them and leaving them lying, hunting does and fawns, trespassing on land seems to be at an all time high this hunting season. Responsible hunters, who pay for their license and obey the rules (because they know there is a reason for these rules) are outraged and sickened by this wanton killing. They know that hunting is a harvest, and done properly results in a careful balance between man and nature. They know it is not a slaughter simply for the "fun" of seeing something die.

Pct. 1 Constable Randy Boren reports that area constables are working closely with game wardens to track down those who are hunting illegally, and that the matter is being taken very seriously. "It won't be a fine in my precinct," he says, "it will be jail and a weapons confiscation".

The complete selfishness and lack of regard for nature...and other people, that these illegal hunters display is beyond my comprehension. Deer, like any other crop, must be harvested carefully, taking enough to fill needs, but leaving enough to insure the continuation of healthy populations. That way there will always be a deer season, and always plenty of deer.

But when a few individuals begin to flaunt the laws, everyone loses. Deer populations drop, hunting laws get stricter, seasons shorter, quotas lower. If enough of it happens, soon this area will no longer have deer in any significant number. This isn't an idea...it's a fact.

I know there is no use appealing to the poachers causing the problem...they aren't going to listen. They don't care that others are appalled by the waste of good meat or violation of laws. Apparently they think they stand outside the law.

Instead, I'm appealing to those who do care to help the game wardens, constables and deputies by reporting spotlighting, suspected hunting, suspicious vehicles, anything that might help law enforcement officials as they try to stop this sickening misuse of natural resources. Dare to get involved! Because we are all losing by this stupidity.

Mexican Casserole

Mix together:

1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can Rotel Tomatoes with green chilies
1 can Ranch Style Beans

Brown: 1 lb. Hamburger meat & 1 onion chopped fine
Grated cheese
Corn Tortillas quartered

In 11X13 pyrex container, layer meat, tortillas, onions, and cheese twice. Put soup mixture over meat and onions each time and top with cheese. Baked at 350 degrees until bubbly.

Divinity

1 1/2 cup sugar
1/3 cup water
1 pint marshmallow cream
1/2 cup chopped pecans
pinch of salt

Combine sugar water, and salt in saucepan. Boil until it forms a hard ball in cold water. Pour boiling mixture over marshmallow cream and stir by hand with large tablespoon until it forms peaks. Add pecans and drop on wax paper. Make about 1 1/2 lbs.

Macaroni and Cheese

1/2-1 cup macaroni dry
1 lb. velveeta cheese
1 small can pet milk
1-2 Tablespoons squeeze butter
salt and pepper to taste

Boil Macaroni until it is soft. Drain and pour into casserole dish. Stir in 1 small can Pet milk, 1 lb. velveeta cheese, cubed, and 1-2 Tablespoons squeeze butter.

Microwave until cheese melts. Cook 2 minutes at a time.

Broccoli Casserole

1/2 stick butter
1 box chopped broccoli
1 chopped onion
1 8 oz. jar hot jalapeno cheese whiz
Tobasco sauce to taste
1 1/2 cups rice
celery seed to taste or fresh celery 1/2 cup

Cook broccoli as directed on box and drain. Cook rice as directed. Mix all ingredients and bake in 9X13 pan (sprayed with Pam so it won't stick) at 350 degrees until bubbly.
