Last Wednesday night, when the highways were a glaze of ice and more was falling, we crept around in four wheel drive, first to Paris to print, then back to Deport, then on to make deliveries at Pattonville, Blossom, Detroit, Bogata, and finally our stop at Talco. At a convenience store a young man with a beautiful chocolate Labrador Retriever on a leash walked up. He had tried to make a curve just outside of Talco, went into a skid and wound up on a driveway culvert. The car was only two weeks old, and was pretty badly damaged. He and his wife lived in Tyler, but she was working in Paris that week and he was on his way to Paris to see her when the trip came to an abrupt end. Both were originally from New York State and were quite unfamiliar with the area.

Thomas and I listened to him trying to give directions to his wife and make arrangements for her to get a vehicle so she could come and get him.

We discussed the options, and finally told him we would take him on to Deport, where he could meet his wife. This would cut down on her road time by half.

We were a little nervous about this move...after all, he was a stranger, and we knew nothing about him. Was he telling the truth? Was he what he seemed to be? Actually the dog was probably the deciding factor, she was due to have puppies in a week, and he was much more concerned for her than for himself or the car.

We loaded the pair up and took them back to his car to get his suitcase and briefcase, which he put in the back of our vehicle. The dog was in the back seat also and he said he needed to find his checkbook, since the door to the car was damaged enough that it wouldn't shut.

While he searched, Thomas decided to turn around. As Thomas drove down the shoulder of the road the young man leaped up and was running down the road, screaming "Stop, stop" at the top of his lungs. I barely heard him, and told Thomas to stop. He did, and the man collapsed into the back seat of the Jeep, panting and making all over.

The poor man thought we had loaded up his dog, his suitcase and briefcase and they were leaving him! The minute we stopped, he realized this wasn't the case. He and Thomas were apologizing to one another right, left and center, both of them feeling bad. Thomas said that he had frightened the young man, and the stranger because he knew he had misjudged us.

But, the episode made me think about the fact that while we were worried about him...while we were uncertain about his honesty HE must have had the same thoughts about us! He had to weigh the possibility that we could do him harm...just as we had weighed the possibility of him doing us harm.

All was well, his wife was waiting for him, we were safely home after a long, icy trip. But I think I'll always remember about the rope having two ends...and as we face each other across that rope, it helps to remember that the person on the other end doesn't know our mind and intentions any more than we know theirs!

Hill Files For Lamar County Judge

Terry Hill said his motivation to run for county judge is not personal.

Hill, owner of Terry's Cutlery, filed for the office, laying the groundwork for a run at the Democratic nomination.

Incumbent Deane Loughmiller has said he will seek re-election and there has been talk that another one or two will toss a hat in the ring.

Hill said he hears daily from a lot of people, and based on those dealings he has formulated a platform.

There are issues, Hill contends, that may appear minor, "but it's the small things, the detail things, that are important to me and make the workings of the office...go a lot smoother. The little things add up to be big things."

If elected, Hill said, he wants to keep regular office hours and maintain a dependable appointment sched-

ule, better communications among constituents and maintain a higher visibility.

Heading off one inevitable question, Hill discussed how a non-lawyer can handle county judge's duties, which include holding county court.

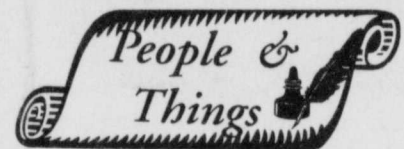
Hill said the county judge's office was initially set up to allow citizen input into local government. A law degree is not a requirement for the office.

With the judicial system's guidelines, Hill, said, meting justice is not difficult. The law states ranges for fines and incarceration times, Hill said, so "it's pretty well cut and dried."

There was a move about several months ago to divide the county judge's administrative and judicial duties by creating a county court-at-law. The matter was dropped after several weeks of discussion.

Deport City Council Discusses Rate Increase

The Deport City Council discussed the 5% rate increase to be placed in effect on all Douglas Cablevision customers.

David McDonald of Douglas Cablevision explained the reasons for the increase to the Council during Monday's regular meeting.

Mr. McDonald explained the 5% increase will cost the basic subscriber approximately \$.96 per month more.

The big question concerning the issue is when the rate increase will become effective.

According to McDonald, the increase was to become effective March 1, however, the FCC rate freeze in effect was to be lifted on February 15. However, the freeze has been extended to May 15. Douglas Cablevision has appealed the ruling and depending on the outcome of the appeal, the rate increase could still become effective March 1.

The Council approved the financial reports, paid the bills and approved the minutes from the last meeting.

Also, three separate contracts to repair the City's water tower were approved. The three contracts will be to clean and paint the outside of the tower, inside the tower and install a new flapper valve. The total cost of the three contracts will amount to \$13,900.00.

The Council agreed to have McClanahan & Holms conduct their audit.

The Council discussed a letter from Deport Housing Authority director, Melba Ladd, requesting a reduction in city taxes for the Housing Authority because of the unplanned added expense of the new trash pickup service.

Councilman Duane Glover made the motion to award the reduction, just this one time, but the motion died from lack of a second.

Mayor Foster called for an election to be held May 7, 1994, to elect two full-time aldermen (council members) and one to fill an unexpired term. The unexpired term was created by Dana Norman moving out of the City Limits.

The Council approved the Volunteer Fire Department's election of Duan Glover as Fire Chief and Don Denison as Fire Marshal for 1994.

The Council agreed to purchase rubber boots for City employees. Council reviewed and approved a work policy and safety policy book, composed by City Secretary, Sharon Francis.

Council approved the new City insurance policy, which will provide insurance on equipment, fire trucks, liability insurance coverage on elected City officials and workmen's compensation for employees and members of the Fire Department.

The Council discussed letters that will be mailed to property owners who have open sewer lines. The open lines allow rainwater to enter the City's sewer system, causing an overload in the system.

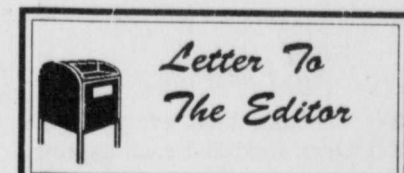
Property owners with this problem will receive a letter explaining where their open line is located. Each property owner will be required to make repairs at their own expense. If repairs are not made, the City will then have the right to discontinue water service to those property owners. The leaks were found through smoke test to the City's sewer system conducted in 1991.

Prairiland's Gifted/Talented Selection Committee met Friday, February 11th, and selected six kindergarten students for the Gifted/Talented Program.

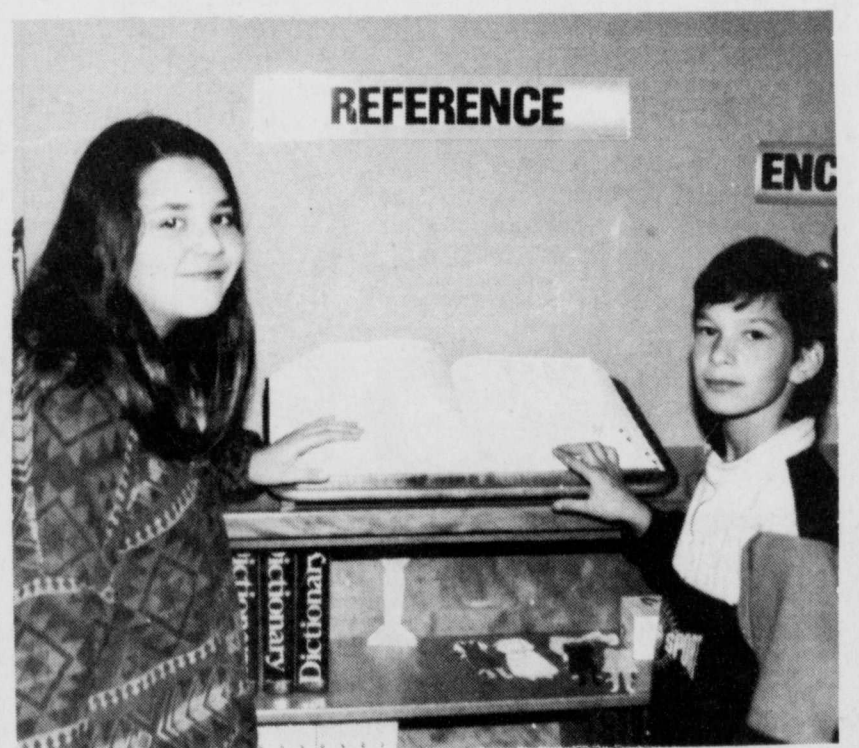



Emery Selected For "Who's Who"

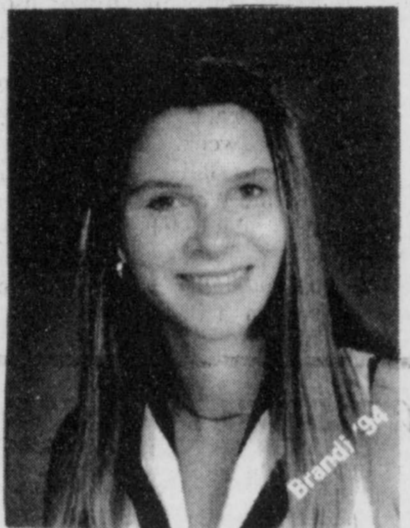

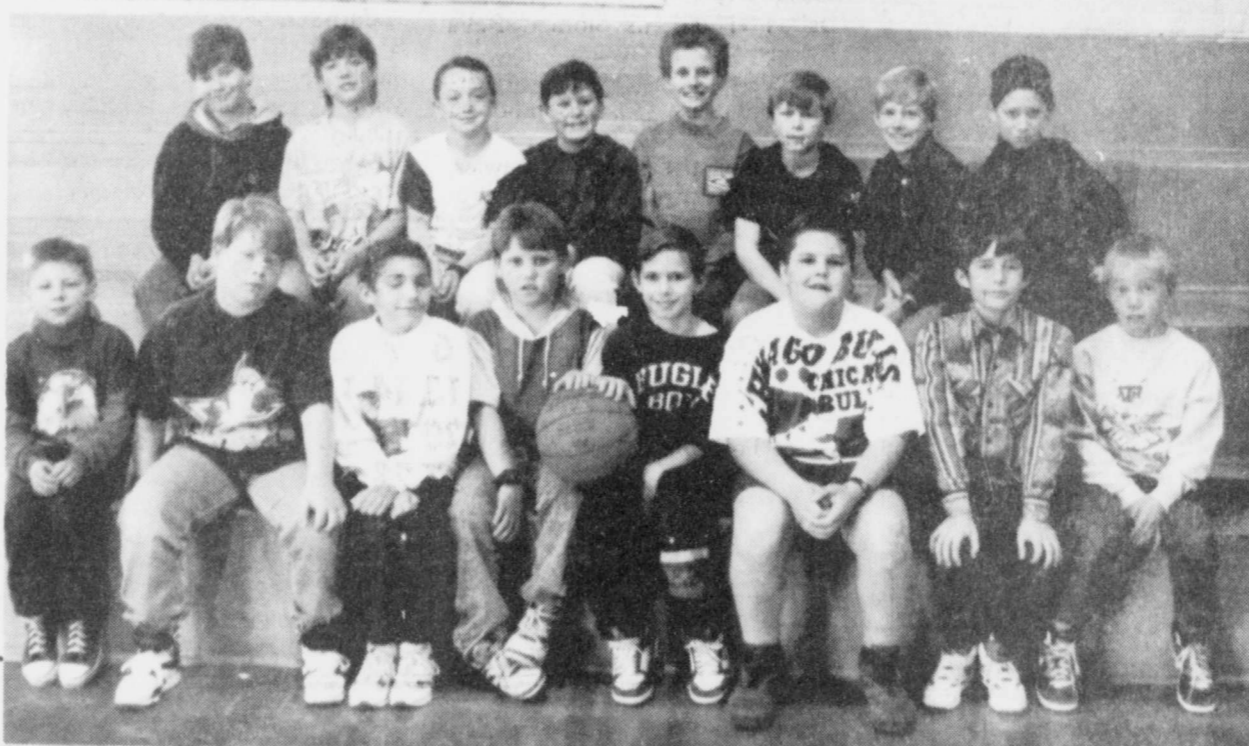

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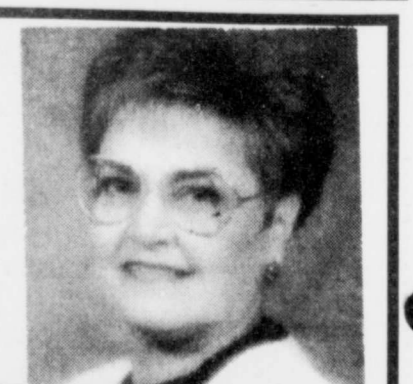

The boys played Blossom II on Feb. 12, winning 19-12. Jessie Crawford had 10, Kyle Malone 7 and Jesse Spears 2.

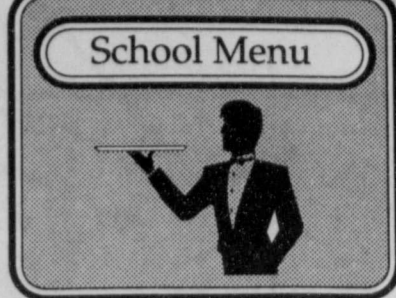
