Lamar County Sends Majority Of Incumbents Back To Office

There were few surprises in Lamar County after Tuesday's election results were in, with county officials being returned to office without fail except for Pct. 4 Commissioner Alan Weatherford, who will be in a runoff with contender Jackie Wheeler and the Pct. 4 JP incumbent Arvie Stevens, who fell to Ken Ruthart.

County Judge Dean Loughmiller received 53.3 percent of the vote, with 2,764 votes; Terry Hill had 33.8 percent with 1,756 votes; and Winford E. Russell with 12.8 percent or 664 votes.

Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace incumbent David Merritt avoided a runoff by getting 50.8 percent of the vote (278 votes) while Don Denison had 37.1 percent (203) and Lloyd Whelchel 12 percent (66).

County Clerk Kathy Poole was returned to office capturing 57.8 percent of the vote (2872 votes) with

challenger Missy Merritt pulling a 42.1 percentage (2166 votes).

County Treasurer Patricia Miller won with 54.3 percent (2755 votes) over Glenda Watson, who received 45.6 percent (2310 votes).

In the Pct. 4 Commissioners race Alan Weatherford received a 40.4 percent total with 879 votes; Jackie Wheeler 36.2%, 789 votes; and Bob Carico received 23.2 percent with 504 votes.

Justice of the Peace Pct. 4 is Ken Ruthart with 53.5% of the vote (462) against incumbent Arvie Steven's 46.6 percent.

State Representative L.P. (Pete) Patterson won the democratic nomination easily with 62.2 percent of the vote, receiving a vote total of 3,268. Challenger Lydia Bryant received 1,946 votes, or 37.3 percent.

Patterson, the incumbent, will face Republican challenger Ken McKim

in November.

District 1 State Senator's candidate Valinda Hathcox defeated challenger George Lavender by garnering 50.9 percent of the vote, receiving 2,101 votes to Lavender's 2025 (49.0%).

Hathcox will run against Republican Bill Ratliff in the fall.

In the Governor's race Governor Ann Richards received about 73% of the Lamar County vote, which matched up with voting trends statewide. She faces George W. Bush, who captured the Republican nomination by an overwhelming margin of over 90%.

Democratic candidate for United States Senator saw Jim Mattox and Richard Fisher in a runoff. Mattox received 40.1 percent of the votes and Fisher 44.3 percent. Michael A. Andrews took 9.1% and Evelyn K. Lantz 6.4 percent.

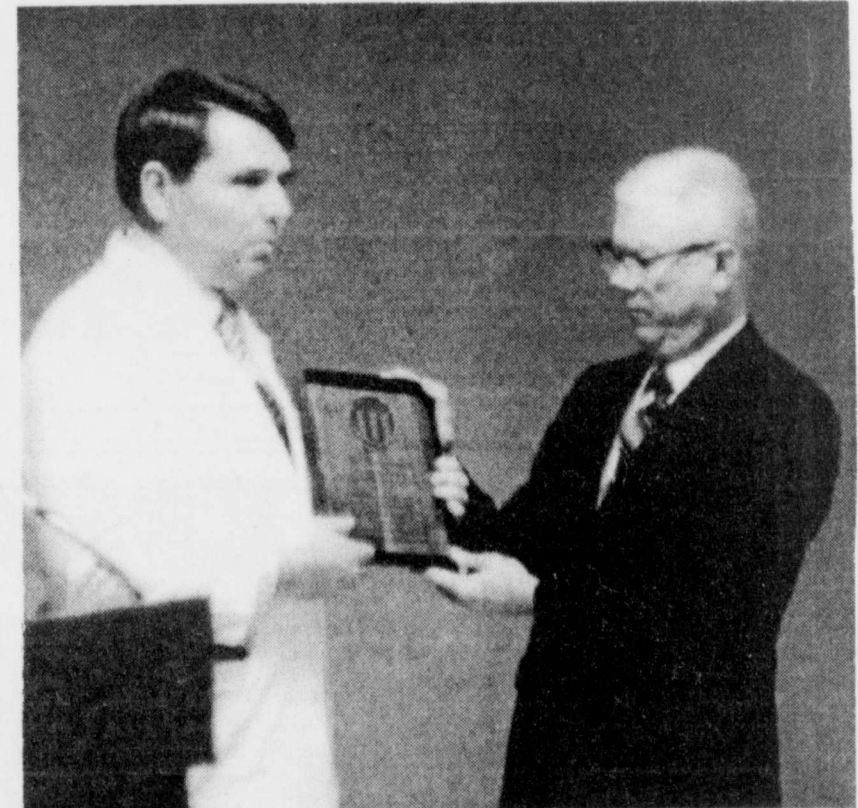

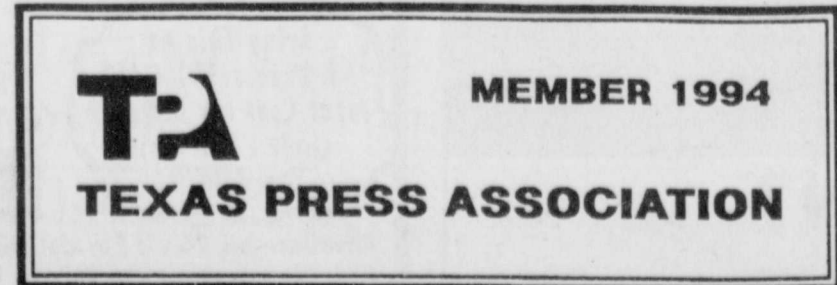

She has to protect the bird houses for the Martins. I guess if she let the wrong birds in them, she would have to rename the

The OsGood Pie Recipe was given to her by Camelia Stephenson. She is also sharing her Neiman Marcus Cake, which looks wonderful, and a Food Processor Pastry. Thank you, Jean Taylor, for letting us feature you this week. The recipes look great. Everyone have a good week!

March 10 1994

OsGood Pie by Jean Taylor

2 cups sugar
4 eggs
1 stick oleo
2 cups raisins cooked til tender and drained
2 cups chopped apples
1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans
1 Tbsp vinegar
1 tsp cinnamon
1 tsp nutmeg
Cream sugar and oleo, add beaten eggs. Add apples, raisins, nuts, vinegar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Pour into 2 unbaked pastry shell. Bake 45 minutes at 325 degrees. May be served with whipped cream.

Neiman-Marcus Cake

First Layer
1 Box Duncan Hines cake mix- yellow
1 stick oleo
2 eggs
1/2 cup chopped pecans
Second Layer
1 box powdered sugar (reserve 1/2 cup for later)
2 eggs
8 oz. cream cheese
1/2 tsp vanilla
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 13x9 in cake pan. Mix the cake mix, oleo and 2 eggs together; spread in bottom of pan. Batter will be thick. Sprinkle 1/2 cup chopped pecans over batter. Now mix powdered sugar, 2 eggs, cream cheese, and vanilla well; pour over mixture in pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. While cake is warm, sift 1/2 cup powdered sugar on top.

Food Processor Pastry

Yield: 1 nine inch crust
1 cup all purpose flour
1/4 tsp salt
1/4 cup shortening
1/4 cup cold water minus 1 Tbsp.
Position knife blade in food processor bowl; add flour and salt. Top with

cover and process pulsing 3 or 4 times or until combined. Add shortening to flour mixture until resembles coarse meal. With processor running, slowly add water (1 Tbsp at a time); then add 1 Tbsp vinegar. Process only until dough begins to form a ball and leaves sides of bowl. Cover and chill 30 minutes. Roll dough 1/8 inch thick on lightly floured surface. Place in a 9 in. pie plate, prick bottom and sides of pastry generously with fork. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown.

Hot Chili Stew

1- 3 pound can pinto beans
2 pounds ground chuck
1 large Spanish onion chopped
1 clove garlic, minced
1/4 cup chili powder
2 Tbsp cumin
2 Tbsp hot red pepper sauce
2 tsp salt
1-1 lb can red tomatoes drained
4 Tbsp tomato paste
5 to 6 cups water
1 large green pepper, chopped
3 canned green chiles minced
1/4 cup picante sauce
dash of cayenne pepper
dash of black pepper

Brown ground chuck over medium heat. Drain. Add onion, garlic, green pepper, green chiles. When onion becomes translucent, add can of tomatoes. Turn burner off. In a large pot put beans, chili powder, cumin, pepper sauce, salt, tomato Paste, water, picante sauce, cayenne and black pepper. Turn burner on. As beans begin to boil, add beef and tomato mixture. Turn heat down and let chili simmer with cover on 30 minutes. Remove cover and cook 30 minutes more. Serve in soup bowls with crackers. Remember- You may add more or less chili powder, chiles and hot pepper sauce to determine heat of final product.
