another They can range from the absolutely fabulous to the oridinary. Over the centuries the Easter Egg has been as humble as a

plain brown hen's egg or as elaborate as a jeweled creation by Fabrege'.

These days the ritual of dying Easter Eggs has become simpler than it was. The messy dyes that children loved and adults dreaded can be replaced with stick ons, shrink- to- fit plastic wraps or dyes that are much improved . Special crayons can be used to color them, and the designs range from mutant turtles to the traditional bunnies, flowers and seasonal designs. There are "tattoos" that can be applied, and decals, cardboard cutouts to create easter bunnies and much more.

I can remember when Easter Egg time came when I was a child. My mother would protect things with a thick pad of newspapers, and the hard tablets of dye would be dissolved in vineger and boiling water.

After the colors were dry, mom went a step further. She would select a few of the prettiest colors and decorate them with bitsof rhinestone, ruffled lace or net or paint perfect little scenes on them. How proud I was when it came time to walk to the park and hunt those eggs. All thekids wanted to find one of mother's "special" decorated eggs!

As I grew older I began to help decorate these special eggs for my nieces. Then, even later. we bought brown eggs and painted bunny faces on them, and used white cardboard to make a "necktie" stand for them.

We sent them to cousins, nieces and nephews, decorated the house
