I think this is a requiem for a tree. I hope not, but it probably is.

Every community has one tree that is the largest in town. As a person who regards trees as one of the most magnificent of creations, I tend to take note of these giants, and in this part of the world they are usually oaks or pecans.

Unofficially, the pecan tree at the east end of my parents' lot is the tallest tree in Deport. From flying over Deport, I've pretty well confirmed that fact.

Monday afternoon, lightning struck this ancient pecan, setting it on fire and blasting limbs and huge chunks of bark loose from it. This native pecan has survived huge storms that ripped limbs as big as the trunks of lesser trees from it. It has survived the worst droughts Texas can offer, and the most rains and hail fickle weather can hurl at it.

My dad is 83, and he says that this tree is the one thing that remains as big as he remembered it as a child. As a boy he and his friends would try to climb it, but the lowest limbs were still too high to reach. To be that old when he was young means that it undoubtedly was on hand as pioneers moved into the area, during the Civil War, and all the succeeding years.

As a child I spent many hours playing under it with my friends, and, like him, there was no possibility of reaching those lower limbs.

A tire swing took me to far-away places, becoming my horse, or an airplane.

My older brothers worked on their cars under its shadows during the summer holidays.

Nieces and nephews dug in the sand box beneath its benevolent arms.

Picnics were cooled beneath its sheltering leaves, and in the fall a bountiful harvest of small but delicious pecans fed humans, squirrels and birds alike.

It is fitting that lightning should end its span with a fearful blast of power unequalled in nature.

It makes me very sad to know that it is gone...but, I've made my mind up to one thing...if it doesn't manage to survive, I shall see another one is planted. And that way, hopefully, in fifty years it will be a good sized tree...and in a hundred perhaps it can obtain the stature of its predecessor, and stand a sentinel and a beauty for all to see. My dad won't be there to see it, nor will I, nor will his grandchildren, but perhaps his great-grandchildren (or someone's) will be able to reap the benefits provided by a massive tree. And that is the correct and natural order of things.

Prairiland Board Of Trustees Holds Regular Session

The Prairiland Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday, April 11 at 8 p.m. in the administration building.

The first item of business was approving the March minutes, payment of March bills, and the monthly financial report.

The board then approved budget amendments to pay for the construction on the Deport campus. The board voted to join the Energy Management Coop with North Lamar I.S.D., Paris I.S.D. and other area schools. In that the duty requirements of the high school cheerleader sponsor will be increased during the coming year, the board voted to increase her salary supplement to \$2,000.00.

The board then went into Execu-

tive Session to discuss matters pertaining to personnel and property.

After the Executive Session, the board took the following action:

The board voted to appeal a T.E.A. ruling concerning the non-renewal of an employee's contract.

The board voted to expel two high school students for the current semester.

The resignation of Sue Malone, high school principal's secretary for 15 years, was accepted as she plans to retire.

Susan Roach was moved from an aide position to that of the high school principal's secretary.

Jennifer Nichols was hired as an educational aide for the Blossom campus.

The nursing home does not always know where a fire is (it depends on whether they take the call or not) and they certainly need their phone lines and personnel free to deal with other situations.

City Receives Grant For Some Sewer Lines

Mike Donnan of Hayter Engineering presented the council with a partial grant of \$132,251 for sewer lines to the sewer plant and across the creek to Depot St. John Roach made the motion and seconded by Floy Williams to accept the grant, it was carried 100%.

Motion was made and seconded to advertise for bids for the engineering and administration part of the grant, motion carried 100%. While this grant is not as large as was first expected, it will provide for replacement of sewer lines from the East End of Church St. down to the Master Lift Station, and S. Depot Street to the line going to the Master Lift Station. It will also include some work on the treatment plant and a bar screen.

Ken Hunt, representative from the Baseball Association met with the council for the purpose of a lease for a new baseball park located next to the Deport Lake north of town. Mayor Foster and Ken Hunt will go to City Attorney Don McLaughlin and work out the details of the lease it was decided.

The 1993 audit report from McClanahan and Holmes carried 100%.

Water rates were tabled until the May meeting so the council will have time to consider what the rate will be

with increase from Lamar County Water Supply District.

It was authorized to pay the amount of \$13,900 to Water Tank Maintenance, Inc., for the maintenance of the tower.

It was decided to authorize Mayor Charles Foster to work with the Highway Dept., Jordan Paving and City Attorney Don McLaughlin to make an appropriate settlement. This results from damages while Hwy. 271 was being worked on.

Texas-New Mexico Power Company's rate increase was tabled.

Drawing for placement in the upcoming city election ballots was: For Mayor, Charles Foster

- For two (2) year terms
- 1. Floy Williams
- 2. Duane Glover
- For one (1) year unexpired term
- 1. Chad Barnes

The council authorized Mayor Charles Foster to send letters to Jay Nelson, Highway Engineer, Senator Bill Ratliff and Representative Pete Patterson requesting that Highway 271 from Pattonville to Paris be completed within the year of 1994.

It was decided to help with expenses for Mayor Charles Foster's trip to Abilene with Resource and Conservation District and San Antonio with the Texas Assn. of Private Industrial Council with Ark-Tex Council of Governments.

On April 18 at 6:30 p.m., a Fire Science Class and Demonstration will be held at the Deport Fire Station.

The class will involve arson investigation dogs, and is being presented by the State Fire Marshall's Office. Instructor will be Charlye Killingsworth.

All members of the Deport volunteer Fire Department are urged to attend this important and interesting class.

That would stand to reason wouldn't it? If I know what is going to help me, why don't I do it? It is getting close to the time for me to go to the doctor and tell him what is wrong with me again, and I have this knot in my stomach, because I know he is going to look at me and then look at the scales and maybe or maybe not, just according to whether he takes pity on me or not, say "Let's see how much you weigh."

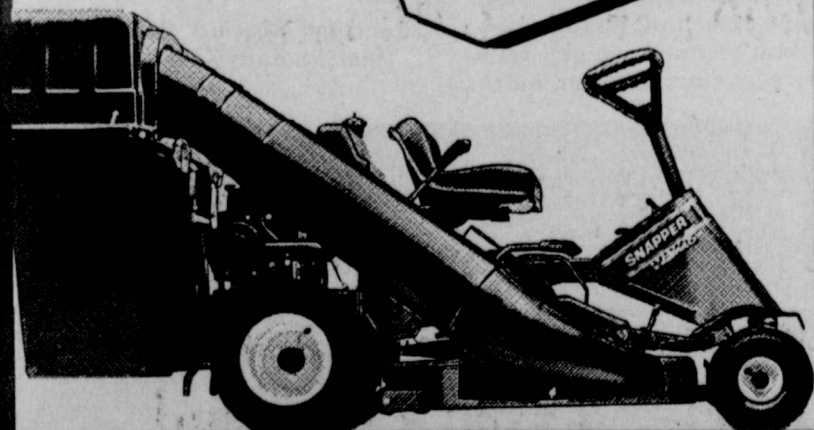

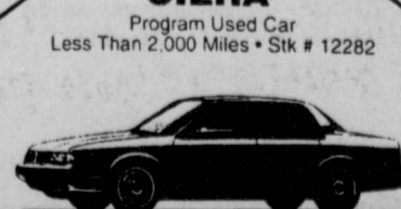

Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 5, 1994. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and weather and annualization of test year rate increases of \$34,802,920, or 8.92%. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 170,600 customers located within the state of Texas.

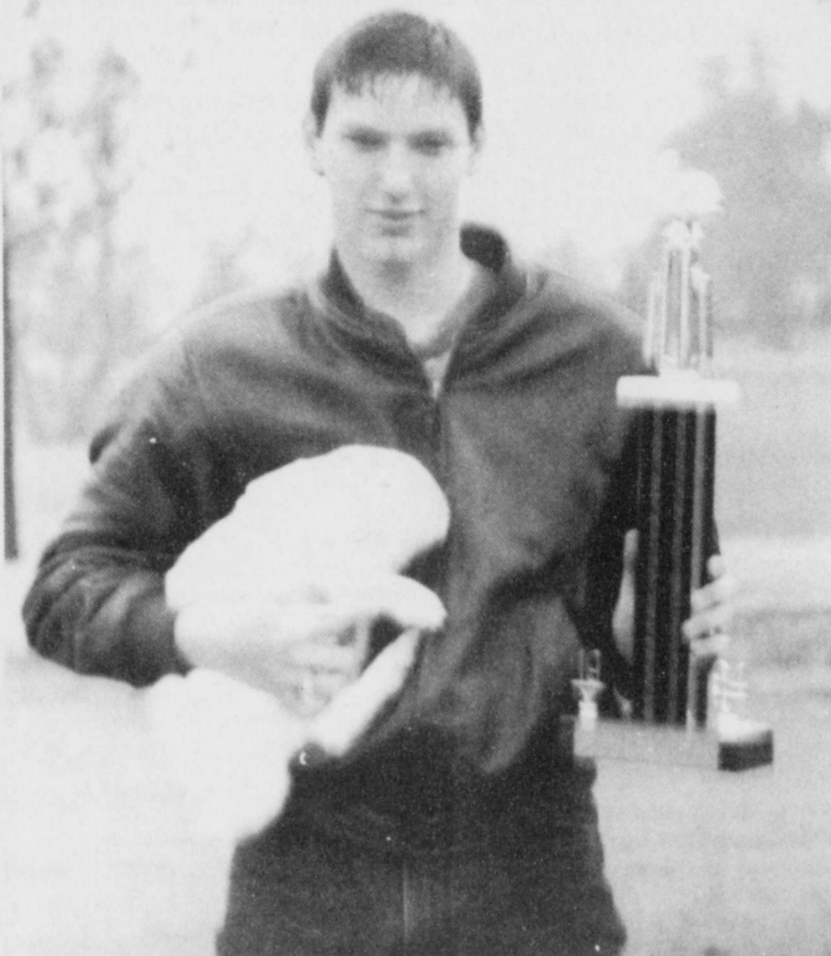

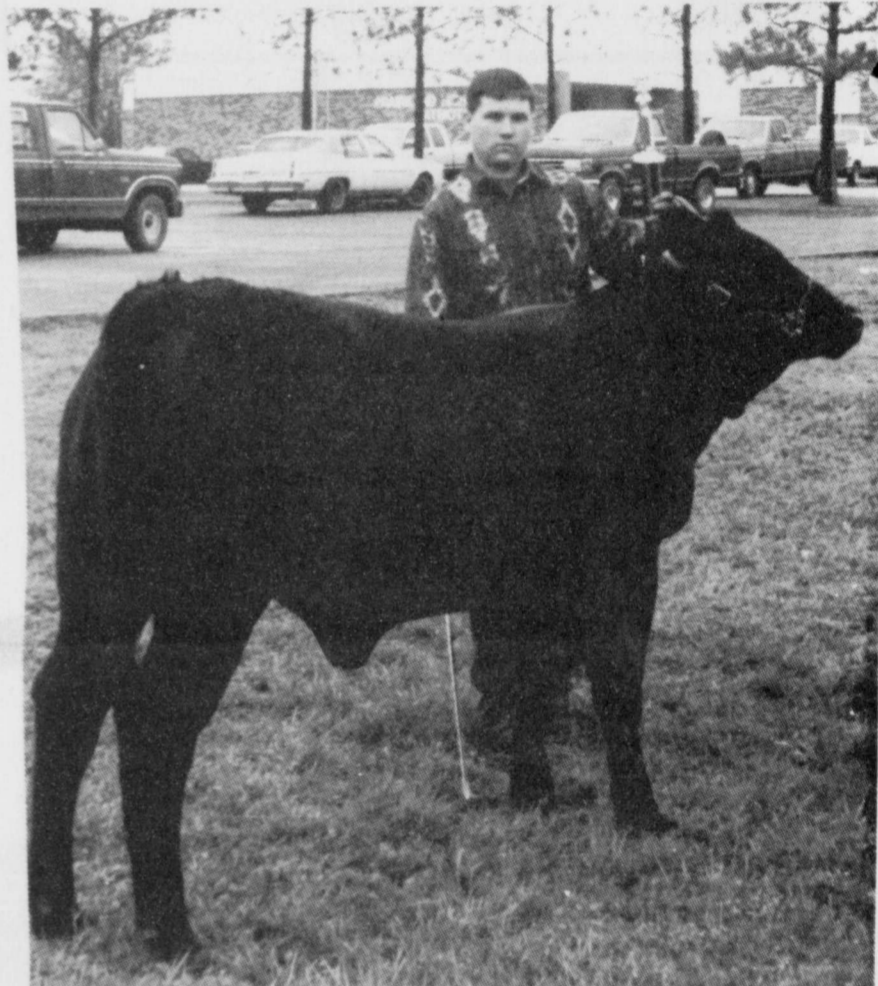

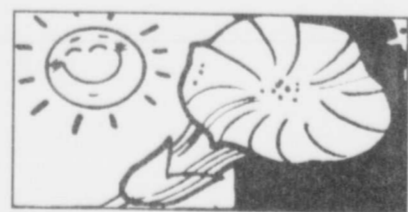

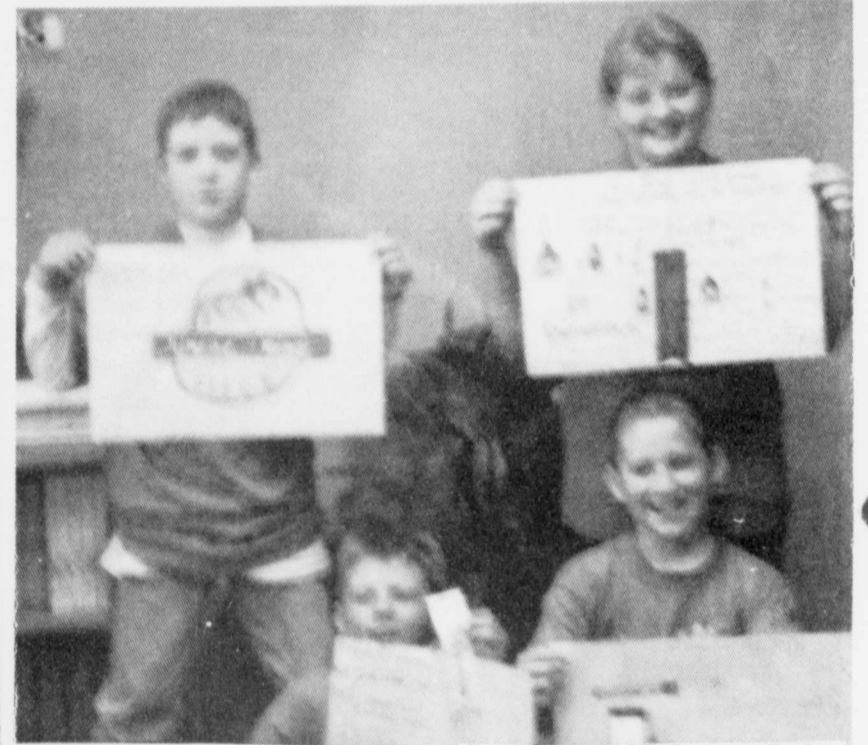
