Relieved of its burden of very aged cheese, the car is once more habitable.

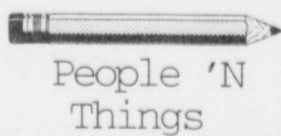
My only question is "What was my father intending to do with Limberg cheese to begin with!" Surely he didn't intend to fee US the stuff!

Fourth place in advertising was awarded with comments on how well done many of the ads were.

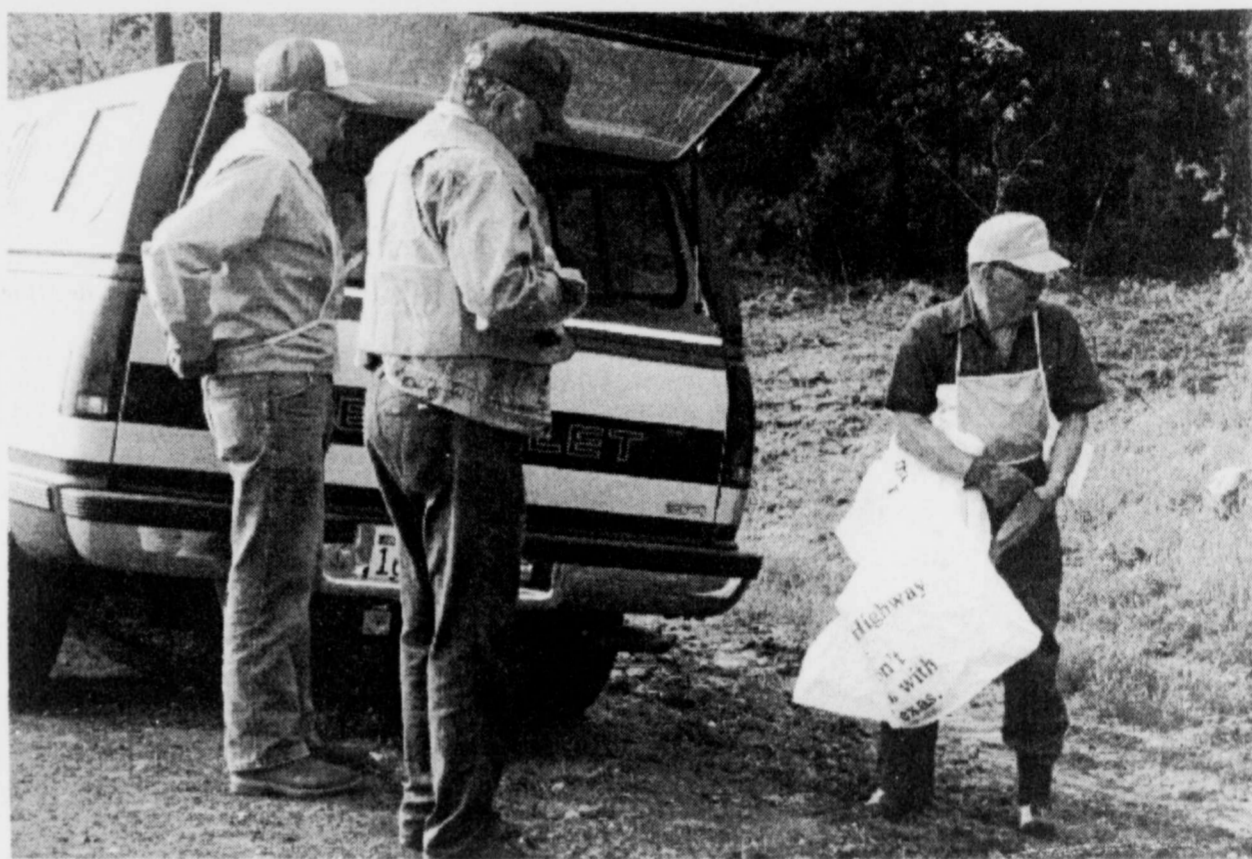
The Deport Times won third and Bogata News won fourth place in Sports coverage.

Third place in feature articles was commented on that they would have second or first if there had been more personal quotes.

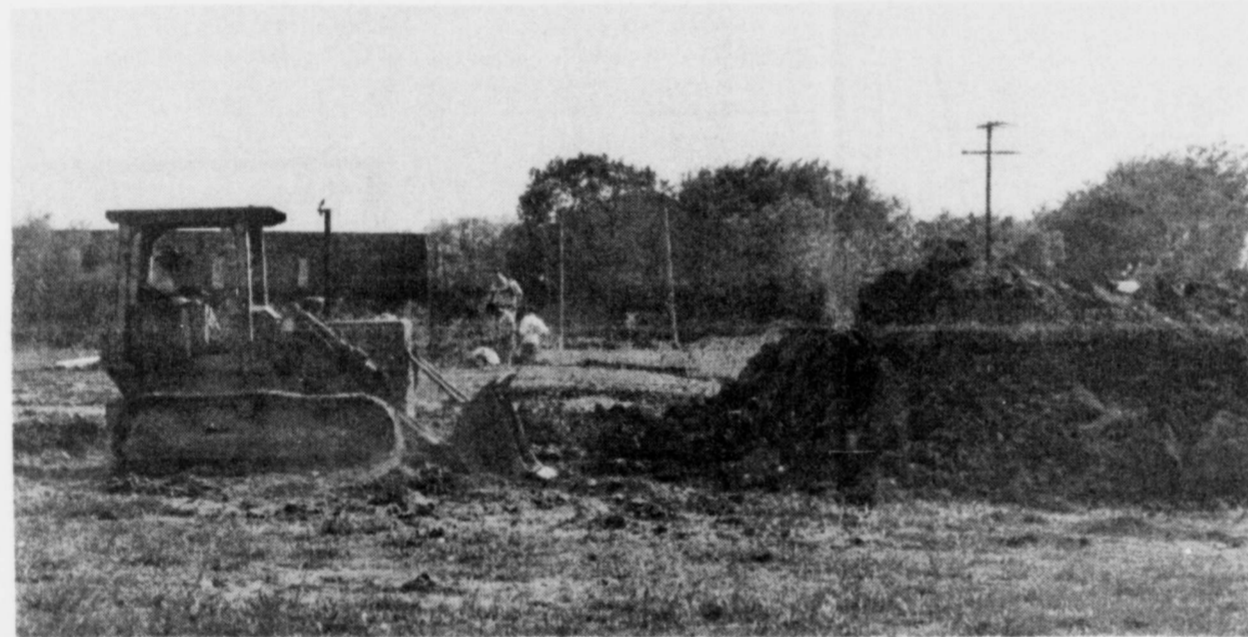

If you are not already a subscriber, call now and get the service started so that on May 30 you can join your neighbors and show your patriotic spirit and help the service club raise funds to help the community.

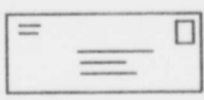
All funds raised go right back into this community, so its a good cause and a beautiful sight to see those flags waving in the breeze.

Letter To The Editor



Dear Mrs. Nichols,

My last visit to Deport was in September, 1993 as my wife and I passed through on the way from Longview to Paris and then back through on the way to Fulbright. This was a sorta "home again" visit for me. I was born and lived in Lamar County, on a farm west of Deport near the communities of Milton and Minter, spent first and second grades in Deport elementary school, but World War II came and my family became nomads, following the war construction from one site to another. My father and mother, Vernon Shuford and Bonnie (Jackson) were born and had lived in Lamar County all their lives, but we settled with other family members in Pt. Neches toward the end of the war. We left behind those things familiar and loved in the name of the war effort, never to return to Lamar County to live.

Our contacts through those years were through relatives in Lamar and Red River Counties and, of course, The Deport Times. The paper was eagerly awaited to bring news of home. Disgust was deep with the U.S. Postal Service if the paper was delivered later than the normal day. One thing that I did in September was to get a subscription for my Mother who now lives in Vancouver.

The Korean War and the activation of my Texas Air National Guard squadron took me to the Northwest, Spokane, WA and Portland, OR. I met, courted and married my wife, Jean, and settled here in Vancouver. We did live in Texas for two years while I finished school at East Texas Baptist Col-

lege. We are both retired from work in the public schools. She was a teachers' aide and secretary and I was a teacher, coach and principal. Through the years, we would return during the summer to Pt. Neches and then to NE Texas to visit relatives, but as the family members moved or passed on, there have been fewer and fewer visits to NE Texas.

One day I was visiting the journalism class in the junior high of which I was principal. The teacher was showing various examples of newspapers. He had The Oregonian, the Seattle Times, the New York Times and the local paper, the Columbian. After the class I asked him if he would like to have an example of a local, once-a-week paper. The next day I brought copies of The Deport Times to share with the class. I had to tell them of the needs of the small communities and rural areas to have this type of newspaper. They were intrigued with the concept of local community news columns, Milton, Minter, Fulbright, etc. I know of only one of my former students connected with newspapers. He is the editorial page editor of our paper, The Columbian.

Just a few rambling lines to tell you that The Deport Times still makes the news for a couple of people in Vancouver, Washington. Sometimes Mother and I have a hard time remembering the names, but we can remember the people and what they meant to us.

Lowfat Busy Day Cake
by Leah Carrell
1 pkg. white cake mix
1 1/4 cups pure apple juice
1/3 cup natural applesauce (No sugar added)
3 egg whites, beaten to blend
Mix all together. Bake at 350 degrees in 2 layers or oblong pan until done to the touch.
Top with choice of frosting - Powdered sugar or glaze.

Dinosaur Cookies
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup butter, softened
1/2 cup peanut butter
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg
1 cup all purpose flour
1/2 cup whole wheat flour
3/4 tsp baking powder
1/4 tsp salt
1/2 cup chocolate chips
In a large mixing bowl, beat sugars and butter until light and fluffy. Add peanut butter, vanilla and egg; mix until smooth. combine flours, baking powder and salt in small bowl. Gradually add flour mixture to sugar mixture until well blended.

Fresh Fruit Salad
4 cups fresh strawberries, halved
2 cups fresh blueberries
2 to 3 kiwifruit, peeled and sliced
2 bananas, sliced
2 cups seedless grapes, halved
1 carton (8 oz) plain or vanilla yogurt
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
In a large salad bowl, combine strawberries, blueberries, kiwi, bananas, and grapes. In a small bowl, combine yogurt, lemon juice, sugar and vanilla; mix well. Serve with fruit. Yield 8 - 10 servings.

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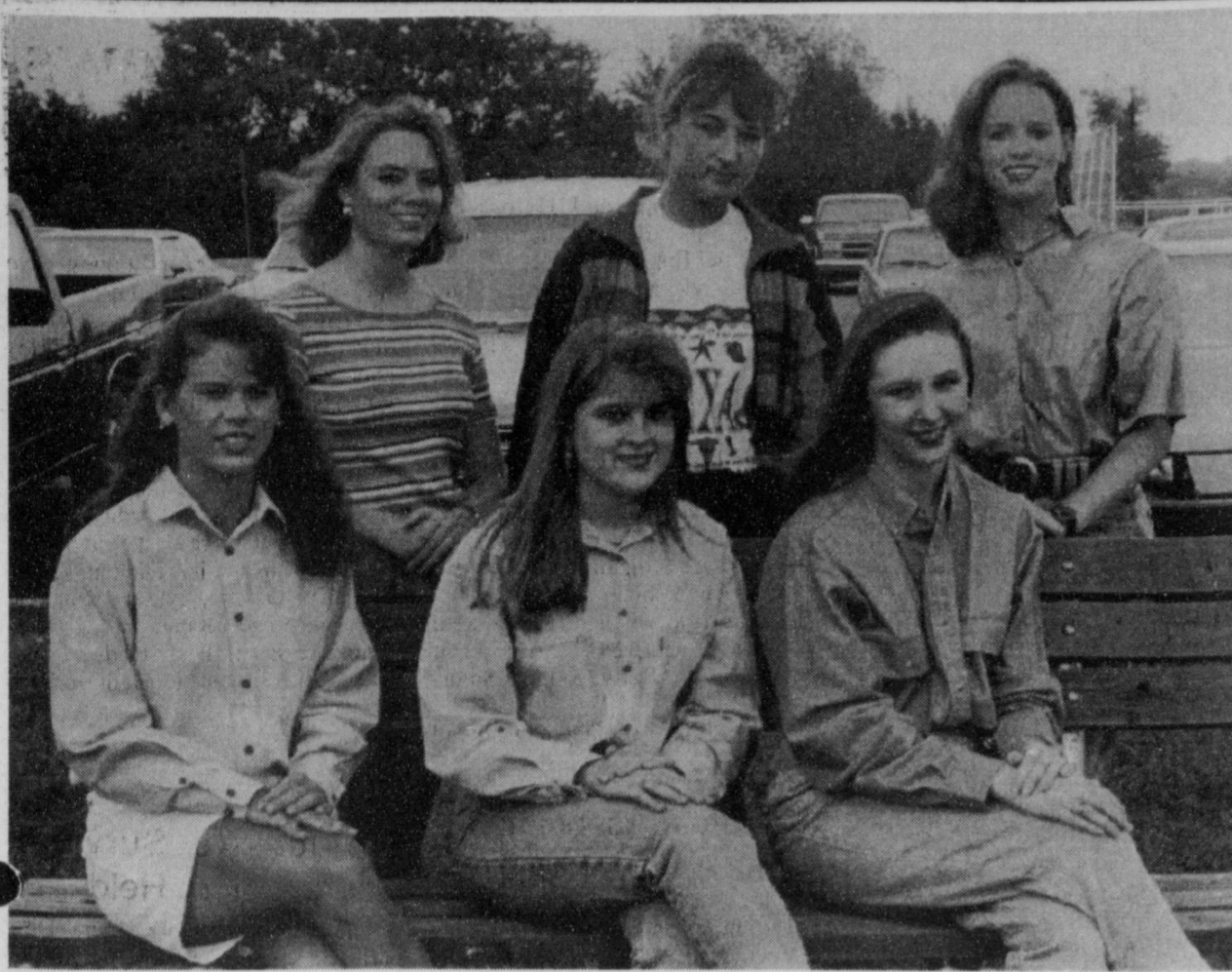

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From The Pastor's Heart



Welcome to a new column in your Deport Times. You will find us weekly under the title heading: "From the Pastor's Heart". Simply, it is an opportunity for the pastors of local churches in the area to share what is in their heart with the readers of this publication. I have been given the privilege of writing the first column, but let me extend an invitation to any pastors of local churches who might be interested in "Sharing Your Heart" to call the Deport Times for more information.

To briefly introduce myself, I am Tony Corso and I pastor the Abundant Life Church located in Minter. We are a non-denominational congregation that has been meeting for about 3 1/2 years. I live here in Deport with my wife, Kathy and 3 daughters, Lisa, Melinda and Caralyn.

A few months ago, several of us pastors in Deport felt a burden to come together with the men of our churches for a time of fellowship, prayer and sharing our concerns for the spiritual condition of our churches and community. One does not need to be a theological expert to notice that something is terribly wrong in our society today. And the scary thing is you don't notice the deterioration on a day to day basis. It is only over time, when looking back at how "Times Have Changed" do you see the tragic results of a culture that drifts away from God-given, time-proven and Bible-based values and principals. As pastors, we are deeply concerned.

Before a society can ever get its house in order, the communities must first do the same because a society is made up of many communities, large and small. Breaking it down even more, communities are made up of families and as the families go, so goes the community. And guess what: parents are responsible for their family in seeing them raised in a way that is healthy, constructive and productive for the community at large. When we fail as parents, it doesn't take long for a society to break down into chaos. But you know, it is hard for parent(s) of families to "do it on their own". And that is where God and his church comes in. We as "Christians" should be "salt and light" in a community-being an agent or vessel for God to work through to encourage, build up and to help those who are struggling. To ignore the problems only worsens the situation. 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Scams Can Be Avoided

One of the lowest things in the world is a scam that preys upon the elderly.

And, unfortunately, these scams abound. Statistics reveal that one of the main ways unscrupulous people take advantage of others is the Drive-way Swindle.

This one is common throughout the nation, and has happened numerous times right here in this area.

The scam goes something like this: a truck pulls up in a gravel driveway. The driver tells you that he and his helper have just finished a nearby job and have some asphalt left over. They offer to repave the gravel drive for a real "bargain". They have to hurry and do the job right now, of course. The job is done and paid for and it is only later that the owner of the driveway discovers that the price was no bargain, in fact was very much higher than a reputable contractor could do, and within a few weeks grass is growing through the surface.

The same routine is frequently used with painting roofs or barns.

The paint isn't the right kind and the first big rain is likely to wash most of it off.

The next scam is the "help us advertise" ad in a paper. The siding company wants ten houses to redo (or five or however many) and they would like to do yours as an example

of it's good work. In exchange the company will waive labor charges and you will only pay for the siding.

The cost of the siding, however, will be inflated so that there is no bargain to be found.

More direct is the problem of two or three people, often clean cut and nicely spoken who come into your house to talk to you about don't specific repairs. While one keeps the householder distract the others will steal.

"Almost Name Brands" are another problem Telephone sales, or door to door sales frequently offer special prices. The name of the product is spoken quickly and sounds like a well-known brand, but upon receiving it the product is not the well known brand, but an "off brand".

To avoid these scams get competitive bids, don't pay money out before things are checked out, ask for references, names, numbers of satisfied customers, and always use people that are known if at all possible. NEVER pay money before services are rendered!

Don't be rushed, don't fall for the "we have to hurry" routine.

If you are elderly, it never hurts to call family or friends, this will make unscrupulous people very nervous.

Be wary, be careful and avoid these problems.

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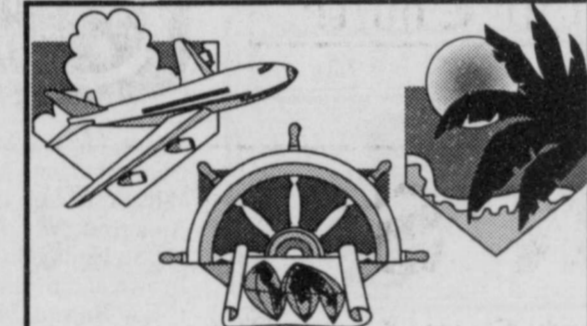

Joseph Filkins was honored on April 21 in Mrs. Freeman's kindergarten class at the Deport School for his sixth birthday.

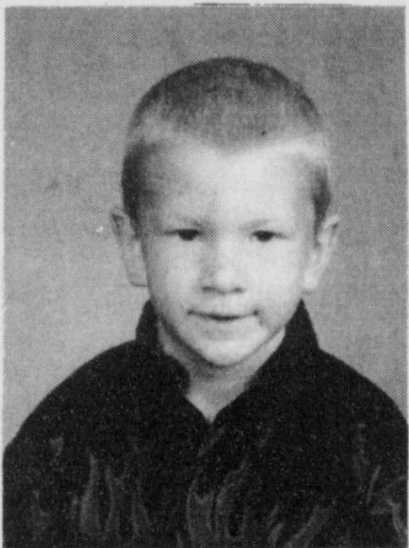

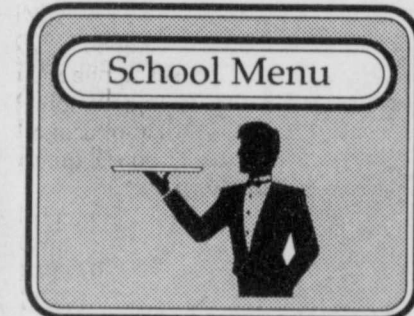
After interrupting Mrs. Drinnon's
