He served three years in the military.

He and his wife Debbie, who works as a clerk for Lamar County Special Education Co-Op have one child, Matthew, who is in the sixth grade at

Blossom.

They attend Bethel Baptist Church in Clardy and he serves as Sunday school teacher for Adult 2 class.

He has been on the school board for six years.

He says he is running for re-election because he wants to continue to be involved in the Prairiland District on an active level.

He says "I believe the district has made some great improvement in the last few years, our test scores have continuously improved and our taxes have remained the lowest in the county." He continues that he believes that Prairiland is one of the best small schools in the state that that with the dedicated staff of employees, administration and board members he hopes to see and be involved in continued improvements.

If you are not already a subscriber, call now and get the service started so that on May 30 you can join your neighbors and show your patriotic spirit and help the service club raise funds to help the community.


All funds raised go right back into this community, so its a good cause and a beautiful sight to see those flags waving in the breeze.

Mexican Chicken

- 1 large Pkg. tortilla chips
- 1 fryer
- 1 chopped onion
- 1 tsp garlic salt
- 1 tsp chillie powder
- 1/2 lb. cheddar cheese
- 1 can Rotel tomatoes and green chilies
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup

Boil chicken, bone and cut in pieces. Mix chicken, cheese, garlic salt, chile powder, and tomatoes with chicken. Stir all ingredients until mashed and stirred together. Soften tortilla chips by dipping in chicken stock. Line tortilla chips in baking dish. Add all the chicken mixture. Put over chips and pour 2 cans of soup over mixture and bake at 350 degrees, about 35 minutes or until bubbly and hot.

Buttermilk Pie

- 1 stick oleo
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 3 eggs
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 unbaked pie shell
- 1/4 tsp cinnamon

Melt oleo, add eggs and milk, vanilla, cinnamon. Mix sugar and flour together. Then add to the other mixture. Mix well and pour into unbaked pie crust. Bake at 350 degrees about 45 to 55 minutes, or until a knife comes out clean when you stick it in the center

of pie. Most of the time 45 minutes will be enough, just depends on the deepness of the pie shell.

No Bake Chocolate Oatmeal cookies

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 4 Tbsp cocoa
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 1/2 cup min oats
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 cup peanut butter

Blend sugar, butter, milk and cocoa, and stir over medium heat. Let come to a big boil, cook 1 1/2 minutes. Remove from heat. Add oats, peanut butter and vanilla. Spoon onto waxed paper. I use teaspoon measure makes 3 doz or more.

Coconut Chess Pie

- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup flour
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup sweet milk
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 unbaked pie crust
- 1 cup coconut
- 1 pinch salt

Cream sugar and butter. Add eggs and beat together. Add flour. Mix. Add vanilla and milk then coconut. Mix well pour in unbaked pie crust. bake about 45 minutes at 350 degrees or until a knife comes out clean. When you stick it into the pie.

The annual meeting of the Fulbright Turner Cemetery Association will be held Saturday, May 7 at 9 a.m. on the cemetery grounds.


After clean up of the cemetery, there will be a potluck dinner, bring food of your choice, and a business meeting at the Fulbright Community Center.

ORDINANCE NO. 1-SL-94
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS REGULATING THE SPEED OF MOTOR VEHICLES UPON A CERTAIN SECTION OF WEST WILSON STREET WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF TALCO TO ERECT SIGNS PRESCRIBING PENALTIES, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH AND PROVIDING A SAVING CLAUSE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Talco, Texas, Mayor & Councilmen, have determined the reasonable and safe prima facie maximum speeds for motor vehicles upon that section of West Wilson Street within the corporate limits of the City of Talco, Texas; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the reasonable and safe prima facie maximum speeds for motor vehicles traveling upon said sections of the hereinabove mentioned street in the City of Talco, Texas should be set out hereinafter; and

WHEREAS, said section with said reasonable and safe prima facie speed limits as hereinafter set forth has been approved by the Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Talco; and

WHEREAS, the City of Talco has indicated a willingness to erect signs indicating the reasonable and safe prima facie maximum speed limits along said portions of the above mentioned street within the City of Talco, Texas; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1.
That the following prescribed section of West Wilson Street is regulated as to the speed of motor vehicles traveling thereon in the direction indicated, and it shall be unlawful for the driver of any motor vehicle to drive said vehicles within said section in the direction stated in a speed in excess of the following:

A. TRAFFIC TRAVELING IN AN EASTERLY DIRECTION UPON WEST WILSON STREET.

1. Ten (10) miles per hour from Highway 271 on to West Wilson Street (200 blk. to 400 blk.) to North 4th Street, south of Community Park.

SECTION 2.
That the hereinabove speeds for vehicular traffic traveling upon the hereinabove designated portion of West Wilson Street in the direction herein specified be and they are hereby found to be reasonable and safe prima facie speed limits therefore. The fact that this regulation of the speed of motor vehicles is needed, created and emergency which is for the immediate preservation of public safety and general welfare, requires that this ordinance take effect immediately from and after its passage and it is accordingly so ordained.

SECTION 3.
The City of Talco is authorized to erect signs indicating the speed limits herein designated.

SECTION 4.
That any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

SECTION 5.
That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6.
If any portion of this ordinance shall be judicially determined to be invalid such invalidity shall affect only that portion thereof so found and it shall not be construed so as to affect or otherwise impair the validity of the remaining portions thereof.
