Vacation In Ireland, A Beautiful Experience, Once We Got There!

Here we go, again, with our vacation articles. I always feel rather strange since I know many people take longer and more "exotic" vacations. But, so many people keep asking when we're going to take a trip so that they can "go too" that I will give it a shot. If it isn't interesting, all you need to do is pass it over.

Well, after a short vacation last year, we decided to head for Ireland. As you may have read in my column last week, we wound up spending a whole day in New York City before we finally, once more, caught up with our tour.

If there is one word that describes New York City it is "alive" for it is a city full of masses of people from all races, all walks of life and all financial situations. We took a tour with a guide named Fran, and just the two of us, and it was an eyeopening experience. What impressed us the most? The Statue of Liberty, when approached by boat is a beautiful sight. Ellis Island, with its restored buildings, is now beautiful too, but it made us stop and think for a long, long time as to just how terrifying it must have been for the thousands who arrived from various places to be unloaded, tagged, sorted and processed through this immigration center.

Think about what it would have been like for most of them, after a horrendous sea voyage, to land with all their belongings in a single case or tied in a cloth, almost no money and not speaking a word of the language!

We saw Times Square, Central Park, Rockefeller Plaza, the Empire State Building, Chrysler building, the bridges such as the Brooklyn Bridge, Williamsburg Bridge and more. We went through Queens, Manhattan,

parts of Brooklyn and generally had a five hour tour of this huge city.

At the end of this tour, I confess we were happy to have seen so many things...and happy to be leaving. There is simply too much population to make me at ease there, and we just prefer smaller places.

At long last we were in Ireland, though, and so glad to be there.

What can one say about Ireland? I can wax lyrical at the beautiful countryside, the glorious mountains, the quaint cottages (and, indeed I shall do so in the course of these articles) but, first and foremost I will always remember the people of Ireland. We have, from Egypt to Canada, from the U.S. to Italy, come across many warm and wonderful people. But never have we been met with so many smiles, so many friendly, helpful gestures and so much interested attention.

Driving down country lanes we waved back as small children waved at us, as did their mothers who were hanging out clothes in the welcome sunshine or working in the bright flowers that grew beside their cottages.

In every village we were spoken to as we walked down the streets, welcomed into stores and questioned about how we liked their country. The Irish are so proud of their land, so happy to share it with anyone who comes to visit. They love their island passionately, and indeed, there is much to love in this beautiful land.

Our first glimpse of this country was from the taxi as we drove from the airport to Limerick. Limerick gave it's name to the "ditties" that we are all familiar with. We had a Limerick contest, and there is actually a proper form for a limerick. The first twolines rhyme, then the next two, and the fifth line rhymes with the first two. Our contribution?

"There once was a couple from Texas, When travelling seemed troubled with hexes, This made them quite tardy, In catching their party, They say it's just one of those hexes that vexes!"

The winning Limerick was clearly a great choice. Our tour driver was named Joe, and the limerick was dedicated to him. It read:

There once was a young man named Joe, Who thought "Where in my life should I go?"

I'll take people on tour, They'll feel really secure, And From Shannon to everywhere we'll go!"

Writing these little verses on the coach was a world of fun, broke the ice and generally made us all better friends. We travelled to Killarney from Limerick, along pleasant roads with May bushes or Hawthorne in full bloom.

That night we went to the Siamas Tire Theater. I won't attempt to explain the pronunciation of this, or any other Irish Gaelic words because there is no way I'd do it right!

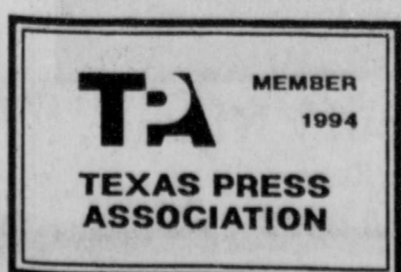
But, this is their national theater, and is filled with songs and dances from earlier times. Set dances, legends, May Day and routine daily life from the past is all portrayed. The players range from smaller children to older people, but they all have something in common, beautiful voices. We could not understand a word they sang, since it was all in Irish, but it was entrancing.

Finally, we returned to Killarney, exhausted from our two days in transit, curled up in our bed and fell asleep before our heads hit the pillow. The next day was our "ring of Kerry" tour, and it will be filled with some of the most beautiful scenery in the entire world!

Preston J. Brooks Found Murdered In Florida

An investigation has been launched into the death of Preston J. Brooks, former Chairman of the Board at First National Bank of Deport.

According to reports from West Palm Beach, Florida, Brooks' body was found Tuesday, June 7th by a maid at the Knight's Inn Motel.

Brooks, West Palm Beach Police Lt. David Houser stated, was killed by a shot from a small caliber handgun.

Apparently there were personal items missing from the room, and the investigation is expected to be lengthy. No gun had been recovered

at last report. Brooks reportedly worked for a mortgage company in Jupiter, north of West Palm Beach, Houser said.

Brooks took over as chairman of the board of Deport First National Bank in 1983, and was dismissed by bank directors in November 1990 after they accused him of violating banking laws and regulations and of having engaged in unsafe and unsound banking practices. An administrative law judge fined him \$3,500 and ruled there were no grounds for prohibiting him from the banking profession.

Country Cooking

Red Eye Gravy, a favorite with just about every one, is the first of her family's favorite dishes.

Thanks to Mrs. Gentry for sharing the recipes with us.

MamMa's Red Eye Gravy

Redeye Gravy is made from the drippings left in the skillet after a piece of ham has been fried. Use a spoon to loosen any meat bits that are stuck to the pan, add a fair amount of strong black coffee, at least a cup, depending of course on the quantity of drippings. Bring to a boil and simmer for a while, stirring occasionally. When gravy looks about right, pour it over the ham.

Squash Casserole

3-4 yellow squash
1 chopped onion
1 beaten egg
1 can Cream of Mushroom soup
1 1/2 cups cracker crumbs
salt and pepper to taste
1/2 stick margarine
cheese

Cook squash and onions until tender. Add egg, mushroom soup and margarine, salt and pepper, cook in oven in casserole dish for about 45 minutes at 325. Top with cheese when done. Put back into oven-melted cheese.

Zucchini Bread

3 cups flour
2 tsp. soda
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
3/4 cup chopped pecans
3 eggs
3 cups sugar
1 cup vegetable oil
2 tsp. vanilla
2 cups shredded zucchini
1 cup (8 oz.) crushed pineapple
Combine flour, soda, salt, baking

powder and cinnamon and nuts. Put aside. Beat eggs and sugar, oil and vanilla. Stir in zucchini squash and pineapple. Add dry ingredients. Bake in loaf pan (greased) at 350 for 1 hour.

Pineapple Cake

2 eggs
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 cup buttermilk
1 stick margarine
2 cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla

Pineapple Filling

2 cups sugar
3/4 cup milk
1 can of crushed pineapple
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 stick butter/margarine
2 tsp. cake batter

Lemon Chess Pie

2 cups sugar
1 tsp. flour
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. corn meal
1/4 cup butter/margarine
1/4 cup lemon juice
grated rind of 2 lemons
1/4 cup milk
4 eggs

Combine sugar, flour, salt and meal. Add butter, lemon juice, lemon rind and milk. Mix well. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 for 50 minutes.

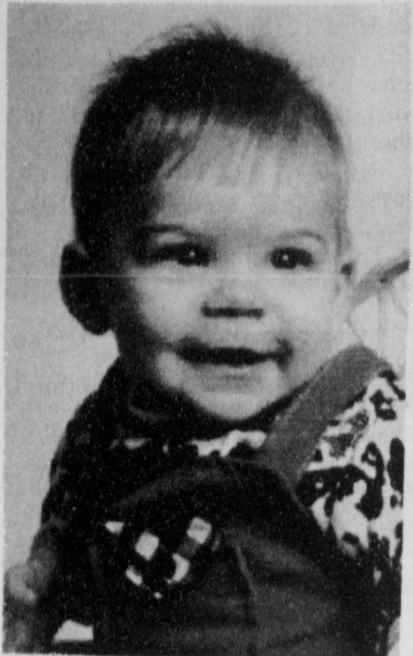

Social Security Has Message For Brides-To-Be

It's the time of year when many brides-to-be are busy with a list of "things to do" before the wedding. The Social Security Administration (SSA) would like them to add one important, but easily managed item, to that list.

If you're going to change your name when you marry, remember to tell Social Security.

For women who are working, reporting a name change assures that they will receive proper credit for their earnings and, one day, all the Social Security benefits they are due. For women who don't work outside the home, reporting the change will ensure that their Social Security record shows the correct name when the time comes to apply for benefits.

Another important reason to report your change of name is that Internal Revenue Service and SSA records should show the same name and Social Security number. If they don't, your tax refund could be postponed.

Of course, if a woman continues to use her maiden name after marriage, as many women do today, they don't need to report the marriage. They just have to be sure to use their maiden name consistently throughout their working years. And if someone should change her mind later, let Social Security know at that time.

To report a name change, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., or call or visit your local Social Security office. You'll need to complete an **Application For A Social Security Card** and provide either your marriage certificate to verify your old

and new names or two documents--one with your maiden name and one with your married name. All documents must be originals or certified copies. The application form lists acceptable documents.

The service is free. Don't be misled by any business that offers--for a fee--to complete the paperwork for you. The process is simple and you don't need to pay anyone for a revised Social Security card.
