
We travelled up in the elevator, where there were signs prohibiting smoking. We entered our room, which smelled smoke-

#### Found Murdered In Florida An investigation has been launched at last report. Brooks reportedly worked for a into the death of Preston J. Brooks,

former Chairman of the Board at First National Bank of Deport.

According to reports from West Palm Beach, Florida, Brooks' body was found Tuesday, June 7th by a maid at the Knight's Inn Motel.

Brooks, West Palm Beach Police Lt. David Houser stated, was killed by a shot from a small caliber hand-

Apparently there were pesonal items missing from the room, and the investigation is expected to be lengthy. No gun had been recovered mortgage company in Jupiter, north of West Palm Beach, Houser said.

Brooks took over as chairman of the board of Deport First Naitonal Bank in 1983, and was dismissed by bank directors in November 1990 after they accused him of violating banking laws and regulations and of having engaged in unsafe and unsound baking practices. An administrative law judge fined him \$3,500 and ruled there were no grounds for prohibiting him from the banking profession.





# Social Security Has Message For Brides-To-Be

It's the time of year when many brides-to-be are busy with a list of "things to do" before the wedding. The Social Security Administration (SSA) would like them to add one important, but easily managed item,

If you're going to change your name when you marry, remember to tell Social Security.

For women who are working, reporting a name change assures that they will receive proper credit for their earnings and, one day, all the Social Security benefits they are due. For women who don't work outside the home, reporting the change will ensure that their Social Security record shows the correct name when the time comes to apply for benefits.

Another important reason to report your change of name is that Internal Revenue Service and SSA records should show the same name and Social Security number. If they don't, your tax refund could be post-

Of course, if a woman continues to use her maiden name after marriage,

as many women do today, they don't need to report the marriage. They just have to be sure to use their maiden name consistently thoughtout their working years. And if someone should change her mind later, let Social Security know at that time.

To report a name change, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., or call or visit your local Social Security office. You'll need to complete an Application For A Social Security Card and provide either your marriage certificate to verify your old




