Prairiland Board Transfers Funds, Accepts Resignations

The Prairiland Board Members met June 20 and attended to a number of items of business.

The board approved moving \$200,000 from Fund Balance to the General Fund.

Policy update 45 was adopted, and compact safes for the schools were approved.

McClanahan and Holmes Engagement Letter was accepted.

A certificate of authority/request for CNPIMS access was approved.

The release of a CD being held as collateral for an ag truck was approved, and teacher appraisal calendar for 1994-95 was okayed.

The district's portion of Lamar County Education/Business Coalition budget was approved.

A discussion of McIntosh Computers for Deport and Blossom campuses was held, and Superintendent Stout was asked to get bids for the computers.

Chapter 1 application was also approved.

The board went into executive session.

The board voted to suspend the students involved in a bus drinking incident at the end of the school year from bus riding privileges for the first six weeks of the coming school year.

They accepted the resignation of Mrs. Pieper as teacher at Blossom.

The resignation of Tony Corso as a bus driver was also accepted.

Junior high Coaching Supplement was raised to \$750 for football, volleyball and basketball \$500 for track.

Edna DePriest was hired as Junior high Counselor.

The custodial salary schedule was adopted.

Minutes were read and approved, financial statement, tax report and payment of bills approved.

Bogata Rodeo Starts Today!!

The traditional downtown Rodeo Parade on Thursday, June 23 (today) at 6:00 p.m. rodeo activities officially begin in Bogata, Texas.

Following the parade, the first of three action-packed rodeo performances will be held at the Bogata Rodeo Arena beginning at 8:30 p.m.

The rodeo is produced by Bogata's own Wing Rodeo Company, owned and operated by Jerald and Joan Smith. The Wing Rodeo Company assures rodeo-goers that top quality livestock will be on hand each performance to pit their ability against top rodeo competitors from a seven state area.

Added attractions at the rodeo on Thursday night will be a Scoop Race and the Wild Cow Milking Contest. The Wild Cow Milking pits six wild cows and 18 cowboys all in the arena together, at one time, trying to get enough milk to prove to the judge that they were successful. This event

does get western! The reigning 1993 champions in the Wild Cow Milking are the Donnie Smith team from Bogata.

The Scoop Race will find cowboys riding in a corn scoop on the end of a 45' lariat rope, being pulled at break-neck speed by their partner on the fastest horse they can find. This event is a crowd pleaser, for sure.

The championship rodeo, which is co-sanctioned by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, will feature the seven championship events, with \$400.00 per event, total \$2,800.00, being added into the prize money by the Bogata Rodeo Association, hosts of the annual rodeo.

Princess candidates, age 4 to 10 years old, will be vying for buckles, crowns and trophies. The Princess contest is being sponsored by the Bogata Rodeo Association and Guaranty Bank-Bogata. There are five

young ladies in competition for the Rodeo Princess title. They are: Jessica Fenner, Jordan Davenport, Casey Gibson, Sara Alsop and Wendy Stewart. One lucky lady will be crowned on Saturday night, the final performance of the rodeo.

On Saturday, June 25, the Frontier Day activities will be held in downtown Bogata all day long. The day's events will begin at 7:00 a.m. with a pancake breakfast at the Community Center.

Saturday evening will wind down the 1994 activities, with the Rodeo Parade at 6:00 p.m., followed by the final performance of the rodeo at 8:30 p.m.

Used Machine Sells For More Than New One

Precinct One Commissioner Troy Owens says "I've never seen this before", about the new road grader the county has purchased.

Owens says that two years ago Lamar County paid about \$102,600 for a new maintainer. Recently the commissioners court advertised bids to purchase a new maintainer and to sell the used one.

With the governmental discount Caterpillar offers, they were able to purchase a brand new, identical maintainer for \$115,707, while the used machine was sold for \$117,700, a profit of about \$2,000.

Irish Bannock

Mix 8 ounces of whole meal flour, 4 ounces of plain flour, 1 level tsp of Bicarbonate of soda and a level tsp of salt.

Make a well in the mixture and stir in buttermilk until the dough is firm. Put on a board. Spread with flour and turn again. Put into a greased tin and bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes.

Irish Stew

Take 1/1/2 lb. of mutton (or lamb in season) Cut into small pieces. Slice 3/4 lb of Potatoes 3/4 lb onions. Put in a saucepan. Cover with cold water. Season with salt and pepper. Bring to a boil. Slowly, skim off scum. Simmer gently over lowest heat for 1 1/2 to 2 hours.

Irish Coffee

Into a warm whiskey glass pour 1 jigger of Irish Whiskey Add some strong black coffee up to 3/4 full Add plenty of sugar and stir until completely dissolved Top up by adding pure or whipped cream. Pour gently over a teaspoon. Do not stir.

Poundies (or Champ)

Wash and peel 3 lbs of potatoes. Boil in saucpan until fully cooked THEN mash. Wash and clean about 1 dozen spring onions, chop small and add to mashed potatoes. Mix onions well into the mash adding a little milk as you go along. Season with salt and pepper. Add a knob of butter to centre. Soda Farls Sift 1/2 lb of plain flour add a level tsp of Bicarbonate of soda 1/4 tsp of salt Stir in a 1/4 pint of Buttermilk or sour milk and mix until the dough is soft and knead very lightly. Turn out onto a floured board and shape into a "Round" about 1/2" thick. Quarter and bake of griddle for 4 minutes.

Irish Potato Bread

Mix 8 ounces of mashed potatoes a tsp of salt 1 or 2 ounces of butter sufficient flour with a little milk to make a stiff dough. Roll out to 1/4" thick. Cut into eight pieces. Cook on griddle or hot plate, browning on both sides. Prick with a fork. Fry in Fat for an Irish breakfast.

To avoid a shortage, Campsey is

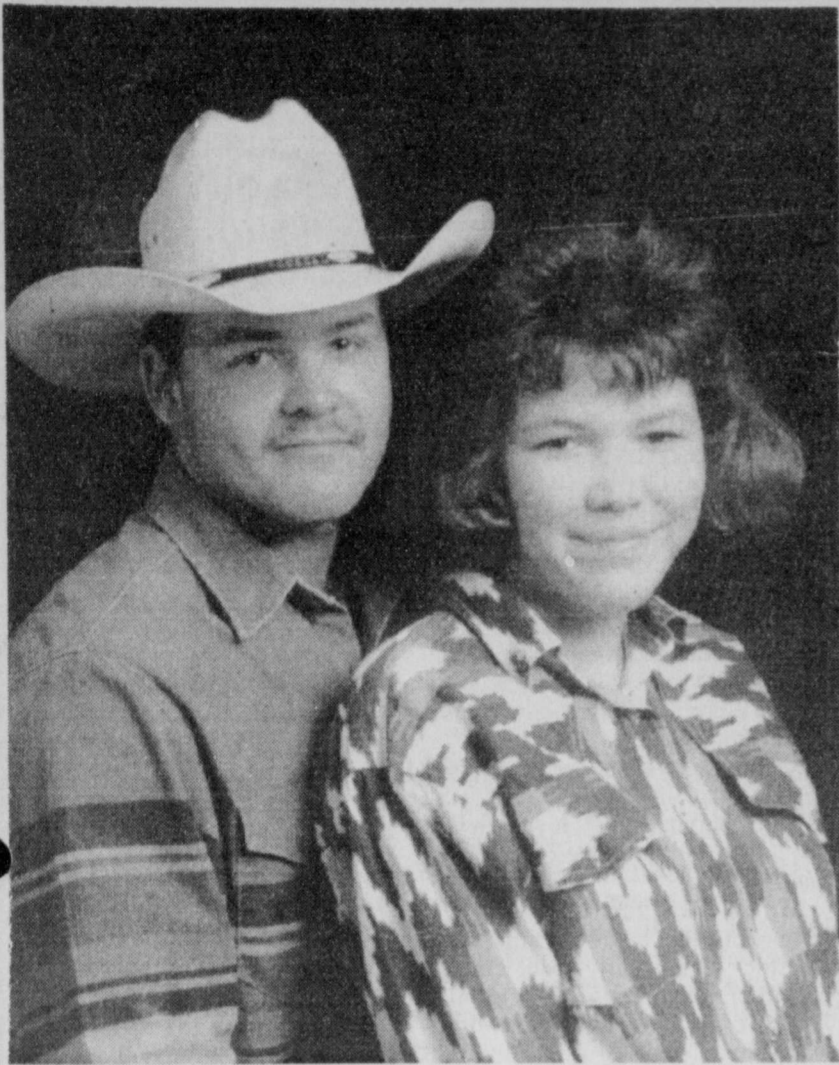

Vacation In Ireland,
A Beautiful Experience,
Once We Got There!

As we continue with our "Irish stories", I will assume that many of you have heard of the "Ring of Kerry". This is often touted as some of the most beautiful scenery in the world. And, the claim is true, true, true. Never have we seen anyplace prettier. Mountains climb from sea level up into the sky, while peaceful valleys, bearing farmsteads like jewels, sweep down the the Atlantic ocean. rivers tumble, singing (as all of Ireland seems to do) songs of joy, lakes are cuddled closely by the embrace of the hills. The thing that makes the drive known as the ring of Kerry so exceptional is that there isn't just a mile or two of this breathtaking scenery...but miles and miles and miles of it! The weather was sunny and perfect, and everyplace we stopped we once more encountered the friendliness that is the hallmark of a proud people.

While driving down narrow, twisting lanes, our guide told us of the legends and superstitions of the Irish. If you sweep your floors out the door you sweep your luck away...it should be swept to the hearth or picked up. A single May bush or Hawthorne in the middle of a field is left because it used to be believed that it was a tree special to the fairies. Farmers believed that they would have bad luck if they angered the "little people" by removing this tree.

Along the way we saw wild rhododendrons, foxglove, fuchsias and bog cotton. The white glow of hawthorn and golden coins of gorse brightened our way.

We stopped at a peat bog. Peat is a strange thing to an East Texan. Used to coal, natural gas and oil, peat appears to us to have been "almost coal" but wasn't compressed quite enough. It absorbs water like a sponge. It is trenched and drained, then dug and stacked to dry, then re-stacked to dry again. After it is completely dry it can be burned in cookstoves and fire places. Commerical peat-harvesting operations dig peat for power plants and for making a fire brick much like charcoal. There only remains about forty years of peat for these large commercial operations. Some Bogs

are being preserved since they are a unique portion of ecology.

Peat burns without sparks, and provides a pleasant smelling fire.

In the afternoon we went to see Muckross house, a beautiful stately home surrounded by gorgeous lawns and gardens.

The woodwork inside, which was done by local craftsmen, was absolutely stunning. Handcarved and hand inlaid furniture could only create a feeling of awe at those long-ago artists.

As usual in Europe, back when these homes and castles were built they were well provided with servants to keep the huge places clean and running smoothly. The amount of work it must have taken is amazing.

That night we had a party at "The Fisheries" at Killoclin, a small village near Killarney. Huge, fresh salmon steaks and other good food was set before us as we heard locals play, sing and dance.

A local school master was the master of ceremonies. Two young girls danced the traditional Irish jigs, and a child about ten played the accordion. While it was definitely not "polished" entertainment, it was absolutely delightful. On our trip back to Killarney, late that night, Ann sang various songs to us, and for the first time we became aware of what a lovely voice she has.

The next day we headed towards county Cork. As rural people, we enjoyed watching the beautifully kept farms with their lovely little gardens pass by.

The wide river Lee swept by as we came to Youhal (pronounced Yawl). During that time Ann spoke to us about the settlement, history and strife that has disturbed Ireland over the centuries.

We began to gain a better understanding of the cruel actions the English took against Irish Catholics. For a long time Irish Catholics could not own land, vote, educate their children or celebrate any part of their religion. Over 3,000 priests were hung, and it is no wonder that the Irish still hold a lot of bitterness against the English. The provisional

IRA, however, is not that well thought of, nor is it's equivalent group, the protestant terrorists. It is hoped that there will be peace soon, as the IRA and Britain are supposed to be negotiating a peace. After the hundreds of years of bitterness, however, it may well be an uneasy peace at best.

We saw a Penal Altar, a stone altar in the hills where mass was celebrated in the 1800's. There people gathered to worship in secret. A pure spring flows near the altar, and locals still come to pray and leave fresh flowers.

The spring is said to be good for the eyes and people bathe their eyes in the good water.

On the road again to Blarney we once more passed peaceful countryside. Little glimpses of children scattering corn for chickens, old men in rubber boots (wellies) striding out to check their cattle kept us interested.

Blarney castle has 120 steep stone steps up to where one kisses the Blarney stone. Lying down, grasping rails, one must bend back to kiss the stone that is said to bestow the gift of eloquence. I passed on that one, partly because of my arthritis and the steps and partly because people who know me insist I already have too much gift of gab!

Instead we did some shopping and roamed around the castle grounds.

At the town of Waterford we went through the crystal showrooms Waterford is the premier crystal worldwide, and the huge trophies, presentation bowls and incredible works of art, all hand blown, cut, polished and engraved, were truly incredible.

At the Bridge Hotel in Waterford we had time to walk the waterfront, which, unlike waterfronts in most of this country, was quite safe.

After supper, which we had with Susan and Ernesto, a couple from New York, also on our tour, we went out to Jack Leigh's pub. I must explain that pubs are family places, not the "dives" that drinking places tend to be here. Under beamed ceilings we listened once more while two local entertainers told jokes and sang. Then we went back to the hotel for a good night's sleep before heading for Dublin, the "big city" in Ireland, the next day.

Bill Buckman Is 1994 Texas "Top Gun"

Bill and Joyce Buckman participated over Memorial day week-end in the Texas 17th IHMSA State Bigbore Handgun championships in Abilene. International Handgun Metallic Silhouette Association has members internationally who compete with open sighted handguns shooting at steel targets in different shapes. A match usually consists of 40 targets-- 10 chickens at 50 meters (55 yards), 10 pigs at 100 meters, 10 turkeys at 150 meters and 10 rams at 200 meters (219 yards). Targets are fired on at banks of 5 in a time limit of 2 minutes. Target must be knocked off stand in order to score hit. (Ram weighs approximately 55 pounds). The exception to "animal" and distance is often in shoot-off (ties) when competitor may be called to shoot at 5 chickens at 200 meters. This 17th annual match was Bill's 17th and Joyce's 16th. Bill along with friend Mike Stinson of Midlothian has attended all 17 championships.

In this 17th at Abilene, Bill and close friend, Richard Porter, of Sweetwater set at least five Texas state championship match records. Before this state finals there had not been a standing score greater than 30 posted nor a 3 gun aggregate over 110 nor a 4-gun aggregate over 146. (Aggregate total score is based on 10 targets at each distance in categories of always standing then 2 or 3 of the freestyle positions in revolver, production and/or unlimited according to which aggregate--120 or 160) Bill on third relay of first day posted a record 32 standing international class then later a production international class score of 39 missing the first 150M turkey. (International class is the highest class of shooter and the class in which Richard and Bill both

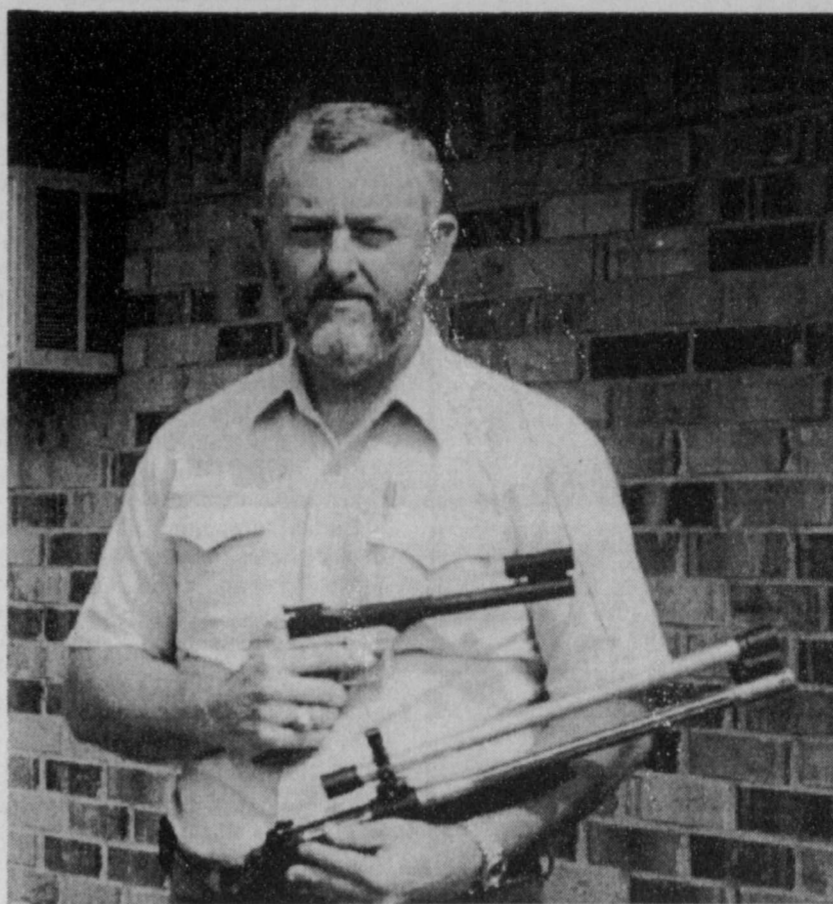
are classed with all four categories.) Richard Porter closed first day with a revolver international score of 38 and a perfect 40 in unlimited international class. Bill goes to line early second day posting a 36 in revolver Int. class. Richard then shot a super 31 standing Int. score to have Bill edged 109 to 107 of 120 possible. Bill came back to line in the afternoon to fire a perfect 40 in unlimited international class now having Richard 111 to 109 of 120 but also setting record 147 of 160 4-gun aggregate. Richard, an excellent production international class shooter falls short for a 38 but total ties Bill's 4-gun of 147. A couple of other competitors still had a chance at titles but all fell short of catching Bill or Richard.

The afternoon of the third and final day is th day that really brings on the spectators. It's the time for the shoot-offs for trophies where needed. And there was to be many. Richard and Bill were both in a shoot off or two but a committee added to the crowd enjoyment and decided on an aggregate shoot-off for the ties 4-gun aggregate although Bill had won by virtue of ram count (totalled more of farthest target, the rams). This was to be highest title, it needed a shoot off for sure and this was a new rule. Bill felt pretty good for he knew he had won standing state champion due to highest score of 32 and he also was aware that if loosing aggregate shoot off he would take consolation 3-gun champion. (A single competitor could not receive both) Bill also knew Richard Porter to be one of the finest IHMSA competitors in the nation for he had won or placed in many categories at International championships through the years. Bill's shooting abilities were really on the line

and there was an emotional side to it -- Richard had been one of Bill's dearest friends for 16 years. If it just wasn't for the highest honor of match....but it was!

Shoot off begins in revolver category with chickens placed at 200 meters. Bill gets one more than Richard. Bill, a little surprised, they both are called for production, again same-chickens at 200 meters. They both struggle but Bill remains one ahead as both add only target total. Unlimited, a real crowd pleaser, is next and at this point it will take 4 of 5 score to remain in contention for unlimited champion, a title Bill had taken in 1987 in Midland, but most of all each needed to add to their aggregate total. Bill beats Richard 4/5 to 3/5 which puts him up two in aggregate total and also in true pursuit of unlimited title. Bill is told to remain on line to go against the international classed Mondo Renteria of Sweetwater who was the only other 40 unlimited competitor (of 10) who had gotten 4 or 5 in "first go" F. With Joyce as spotter and timekeeper; Bill nails chicken #5 as Joyce counts down 5-4-3. Five of five 200 meter chickens versus Mondo's second only 4 of 5. Joyce and Bill were excited for second champion honor of match but the hard part was coming up--chickens at 150 meters shot at standing not freestyle (lying down). Richard charges hard for title getting one more than Bill but he had fallen short in total. As cease fire command is given Richard is handed consolation 3-gun champion cap and Bill is given the cap designation the top honor of year--Top Gun--4 gun champion.

Bill will compete in International Championship later this summer.

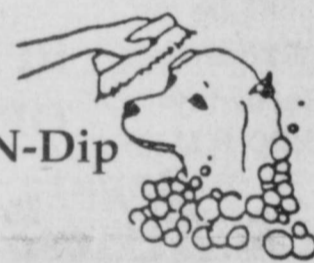

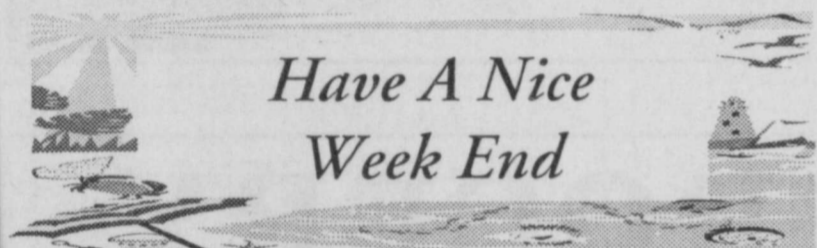

East Texas State Guard To Host Field Training Exercise

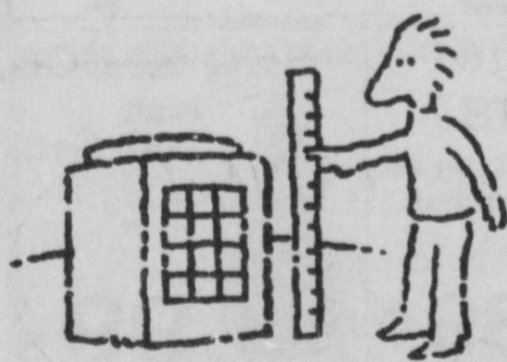

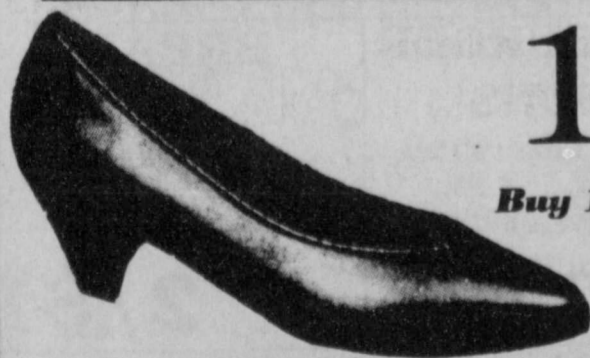

PUBLIC NOTICE
AN ORDINANCE REGULATING WATER RATES SETTING A MINIMUM MONTHLY WATER SERVICE; PROVIDING FOR AN EMERGENCY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.
WHEREAS, the rate at which the City of Deport purchases its water has increased; and
WHEREAS, the present minimum water service rate is insufficient to cover such an increase;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DEPORT

I. That ordinance shall hereafter read as follows:
"B" WATER RATE
That there shall be and is hereby adopted and fixed for the fiscal year of 1994 a minimum monthly water service rate of \$9.00 for the first 1500 gallons of water used and an additional rate of \$3.25 per 1,000 gallons of water used in excess of the first 1,500 gallons.
II. WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent requiring that all laws requiring more than one reading of pro-

hibiting the passage of an Ordinance introduced and the taking effect on the day of introduction and passage, shall be suspended; such Ordinance shall be passed and effective as an emergency measure and be in full force and effect from and after the first day of July, 1994.
III. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be and remain in full force and effect from and after July 1, 1994.
IT IS SO ORDAINED, READ, APPROVED AND PASSED THIS 16TH DAY OF JUNE, 1994.

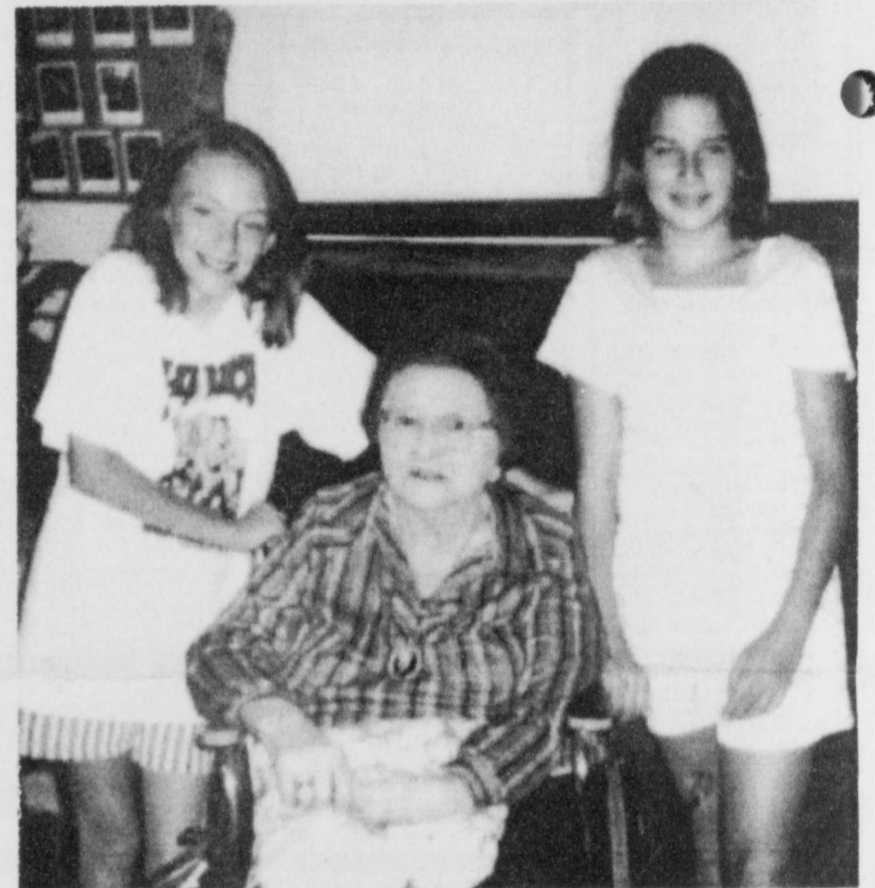

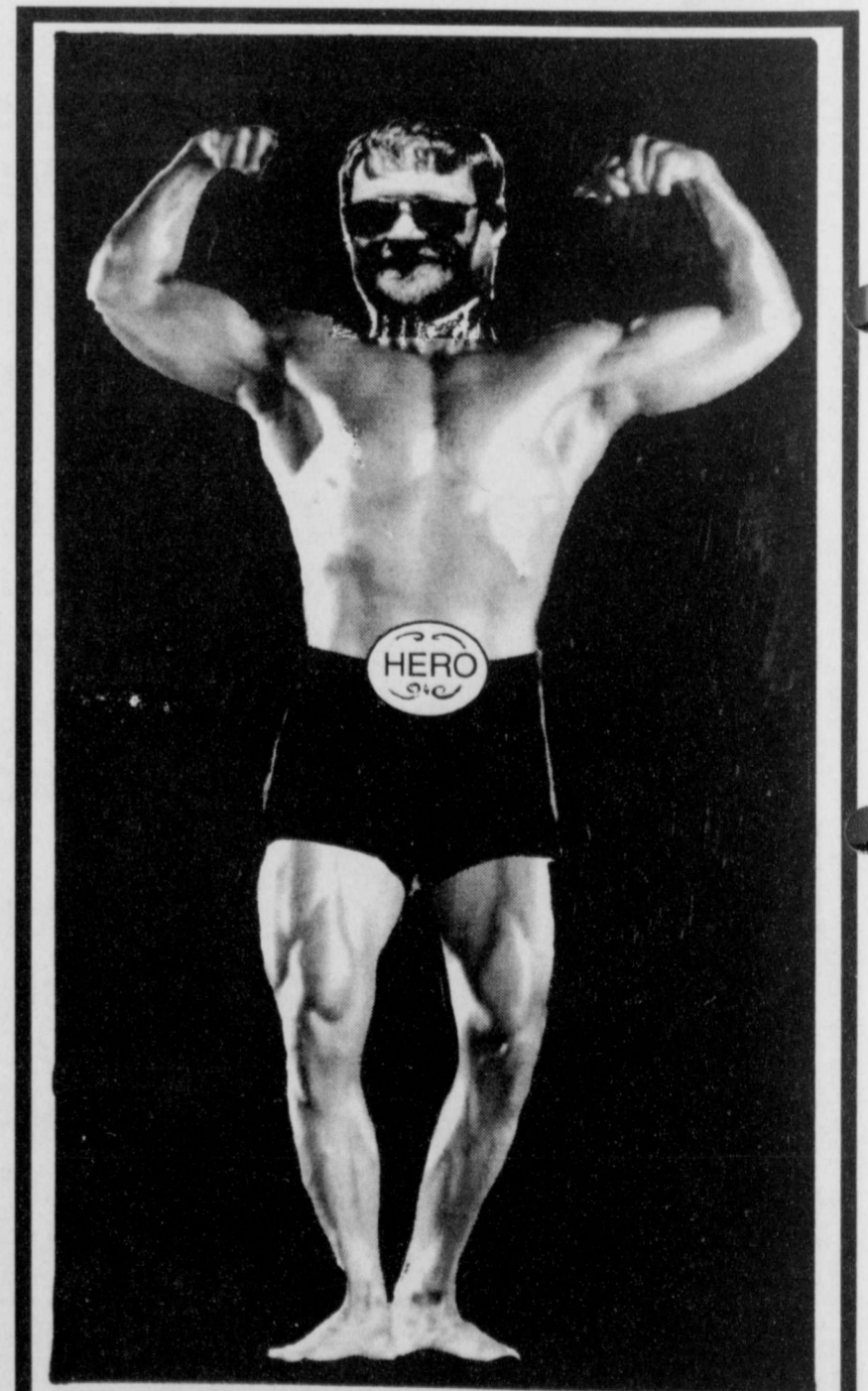
