Students will be involved in activities to promote and publicize the activities and the value of their experiences through the agricultural education program to their communities.


National FFA Week is conducted each year during the week of George Washington's birthday to recognize his leadership and commitment to American agriculture.

Burning Is Banned In Lamar County

and tinder-dry grass, outdoor burning in Lamar County has been temporarily banned.

Lamar County Judge Chuck Superville signed a seven-day ban on all outdoor fires Friday, February 16.

This action was taken during an emergency meeting with representatives of the county's volunteer fire departments Friday afternoon.

Volunteer firefighters have continuously fighting grass fires all over the county. Windy conditions have also been a factor in the huge grass fires becoming all too common.

Eighteen of the 19 representatives with the volunteer fire departments signed a letter asking the county judge to issue a temporary ban on outdoor burning in an effort to curb the number of fires.

According to Judge Superville the law only allows the county judge to issue a seven-day ban. If it is to be extended, based on weather condi-

Due to the unusually dry weather tions, the commissioners court will have to meet in a special session to approve another ban which could be 30 or 60 days in length.

Many people don't realize how quickly an open fire, a burning barrel or a cigarette or any small spark can ignite grass after the months of dry, arid weather.

In the event of a fire in the county, Superville said the appropriate volunteer fire department should respond to the scene, extinguish the fire and a peace officer will investigate the fire. The responsible party will receive a warning. If a second fire is found to be started by the same person, the

individual may be prosecuted. The ban gives volunteer fire departments the authority to go onto private property and put out a fire, whether it has started an out of control fire or not.

All citizens are called upon to exercise extreme care and refrain from burning anything outside.







The legislation allowed the PUC to set rules for communities with less than 10,000 telephone lines, and outside of metropolitan areas, to expand local calling areas where there is a community of interest, such as county government, churches, a school district, hospitals an doctors. The service is called expanded local calling

The law, passed in 1993, allows the additional costs and investment, as well as lost long-distance revenues

associated with ELC, to be recovered by assessing customers in the requesting community a monthly charge of no more than \$3.50 for each residential line and \$7 for each business line. Revision of the law in 1995 limited the number of distant calling areas that can be added to the local calling area for the \$3.50 and \$7 minimum charges to five. Additional calling areas over the five limit will include an additional \$1.50 a month for both residential and business lines for each additional calling area.

When approved by the PUC, cusomers in areas with ELC service who are not paying the maximum \$3.50 residential or \$7 business rate will see charges for ELC increased to the maximum. Customers not paying an ELC charge will receive a \$1.06 monthly surcharge per line.

DEPENDENTS NEED SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS

My first child was born a few months ago. Should I obtain a social security number for him now?

A Since you must include the social security number of each individual born before November 1, 1995, whom you claim as a dependent on your return, it would be a good idea to apply for a social security number right away. In fact, because of IRS rules, if you want to file your return electronically, all persons listed on your return will need a valid social security number regardless of their age.

Call your Social Security office and request a copy of Form SS-5 for any child who needs a social security number. The completed application should be filed as soon as possible to avoid the expected last minute rush.



Genetic defect responsible for disease

A genetic defect responsible for a common form of heart muscle disease has been discovered on chromosome 1, say heart specialists at Baylor College of Medicine and the Methodist Hospital in Houston.

Familial dilated cardiomyopathy (FDCM) runs in families and usually leads to heart failure. The ventricles enlarge, resulting in loss of pumping strength.

The scientists detected the chromosomal defect after analyzing the genetic make up of 46 living members spanning four generations of an afflicted family living in California and Utah. Eighteen cases of FDCM, eight of them fatal, have occurred in

"We have achieved the first major step -- isolating the gene," said co investigator, Dr. Robert Roberts, a professor of medicine and cell biology and chief of the cardiology section at The DeBakey Heart Center of Baylor and Methodist. "Now, we want to identify what is responsible for the defect. No gene defect has ever been identified for this disease.'

While several genes are suspect on chromosome 1 and the culprit has not been pinpointed, the research team say their findings pave the way to screening to look for genetic markers on and around the chromosome among family members with the dis-

Campaign signs, highway right of way don't mix

The recent filing date for candidates for statewide public office brought the start of the campaign season. To avoid a deluge of illegally placed campaign signs, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is reminding candidates of the laws on signs along highways.

Under Texas law, it is a class C misdemeanor to place any sign on highway right of way without a license and permit. The fine for violating this law can be as much as \$500 per sign.

It is also illegal to place a sign, even off of state right of way, along most major highways in the state without a license and permit. Violation of this class B misdemeanor is punishable by a fine of as much as

\$1000 per sign. Within city limits. the placement of signs along roadways may also be regulated by local ordinances so candidates are encouraged to check with local municipalities for election sign laws.

"These laws are designed to keep roadsides clean and uncluttered so that official traffic control signs are clearly visible for the safety of the traveling public," said Keith Hollje, right of way agent for the Paris District of TxDOT.

TxDOT is mailing information about the placement of illegal signs to statewide candidates. Local candidates may also obtain this information by writing to Mr. Hollje at the department's Paris District office at 1365 North Main, Paris, Texas 75460.

Low fat foods do not guarantee safety from cholesterol

If you think you're safe from high cholesterol because you eat low fat foods, think again.

For years physicians have emphasized diet to patients who want to lower their blood cholesterol levels.

Recent studies have shown that a low fat diet and drug therapy can reduce heart attack risk in people with heart disease.

The key is keeping your cholesterol level in check.

Many heart surgery patients never have their cholesterol checked. At least 50 percent of the people who take a cholesterol lowering drug stop taking it after six months -- a habit that can be fatal.

Some people can reduce or go off medication and follow a low fat diet

and exercise plan. For others, taking medication to control cholesterol is a lifetime commitment. However, taking drugs to thwart high cholesterol is not a license to eat high fat foods.

A bad diet can undo the effects of medication.

Heart disease is the number one cause of death and disability in the United States. Nearly half a million Americans die of heart attacks each

In most cases, too much low density lipoprotein (LDL) in the blood is to blame. LDL is the ""Bad" choles-

terol that clogs arteries and blocks blood flow to the heart, resulting in a heart attack or stroke. Cholesterol acts differently in dif-

ferent people. People most at risk include men, people with high blood pressure and diabetes, and people who smoke and are overweight.

People often point at a relative and say, "They are bacon and eggs and lived to be 90, why can't I?" It doesn't mean you can do it too. Adopt good health habits early on to ensure a healthy and productive life.



CHANGE IN MARITAL STATUS

I got married in November. What will my filing status be on my 1995 tax return? Will I be considered married because I was married at the end of the year or will I be considered single because I was single for the majority of the year?

You'll be considered a married taxpayer for 1995. Your marital status for tax purposes is determined as of the final day of the tax year, meaning you'll need to choose between filing a joint return or filing separate returns.

It will be best to compute your tax both ways for comparison, and then select the filing status that results in the lower combined tax liability. You and your spouse should each review your Forms W-4 filed with your employers to adjust your tax withholding to reflect your new situation.

New Ground In The Bottom

Dad only went to the sixth grade in school, but the older I got I knew Dad had a lot of what he called "horse sense." Dad was a simple man who lived in a simple world. My dad wore overalls and a jumper

almost all his life and wore overalls without the jumper, until he died. Dad was a sharecropper for many years and money was something he never had much of. I think if dad had made a million dollars in one year, his life still would not have changed that much. Dad may have had a newer tractor or pickup but I think that's about all. Many times I heard him wish for the good old days. I could never understand why. I think Dad always wanted to go back to the 20's and 30's when a man's word was as good as gold. Where Dad could see hard work and satisfied people, I saw only toil that most men today could not survive. Dad helped clear Sulphur Bottom for 50 cents a day. A day's work began at daylight and ended at dark. He told me that he wore coal oil soaked rags aroung his legs to keep chiggers off his body and many times his shoes were red as blood, with millions of chiggers. Dad told me one time he was down to his last dollar and he had worked two long days for it. Christmas was near and we did not have enough food for winter. All crops failed because the levee around Sulphur Bottom had broken and flooded all the farm land. He said he was on his way to town to try to borrow some money and he ran into some friends who were shooting dice. He prayed a silent prayer and when he had finished the game, he had \$31.00, a lot of money in those days. He went on to town and bought 100 pounds of pinto beans, 100 pounds of sugar, 25 pounds of corn meal and 20 pounds of coffee, a case of Rex jelly and had enough money left for Christmas. That was the first time I had ever heard of my dad "gambling" as he called it. However as I see it, my dad "gambled" every year on the banks of the big muddy a place called Sulphur Bottom.

and malice.

I can never remember when we did not have large quantities of pinto beans, flour, meal, lard, pork and potatoes. Dad always raised chickens for eggs and meat and a cow for milk. This may sound like a terrible diet today, but it carried my dad and his dad to their late 80 's. I wonder, was it really that bad. The house we lived in for many years was an old box house, made from 1X12 green lumber. After the lumber shrunk, between each plank 1/2" to 3/4 " of pure daylight could be seen from the insiide. Some cracks were patched with 1X 4 and some were not. I cannot ever remember seeing a sharecropper working on a house he did not

There are many stories to tell. my dad never, and I mean never, let us go hungry. Each year my dad raised six hogs, killed, cured or made sausage from all the meat, rendered all fat into lard and made soap from what was left. I always loved "hog killing season" as my dad called it and

every few years and he washed all the engine parts in gasoline. Because there was so much oil and grease in the old gas, my dad used it to start fires, (a big mistake). This time the old gas had sat in storage for many months. I put wood around an old cast iron wash pot. I had sen my mother boil clothes in it to get the sweat of toil completely out. I started the fire, but dad was always in a hurry. He went to the storage building and got the 5 gal. can of old gas. The gas had settled and separated. He turned the gas up and started pouring it on the fire. It blazed up instantly and dad pulled back the can sucking flame into it. The can exploded and I could not see my dad for the flame He screamed, "Son, help me". It was the first time in my life that dad had to have my help and I did not know what to do. My dad went a few steps to a chicken watering trough. As he started to move, I saw a large heavy throw rug hanging on the clothes line a few steps away. I raced for the rug as my dad knelt down and started flipping water onto his body. In a flash, I was there with the rug around his feet and legs and I choked the fire out. I do not understand how I did it to this day. I helped my dad remove his old cowboy boots and poured at least a pint or more of gas from each boot. I helped him remove his brand new overalls. As I saw his legs appear, I knew my dad was badly burned. He told me there was a bottle over the door of his bedroom and I must get it quickly. I returned and dad took off the cap, turned up the pint bottle and drank every drop at one time. It was the first time in my life that I had ever seen my dad drink whiskey. Dad said that he was OK and would not go to the doctor, but I knew he must. I called Bo Bryson crying for help. Roads were muddy, but I could depend on Bo. He loved my father too. In minutes I heard Bo coming down the road. He arrived and looked at dad. He looked straight in to my dad's eyes and said, with authority, "Uncle Homer, you are going to the doctor." Dad could not change his mind and in seconds Bo was loading dad into his car. I thank God for Bo Bryson to this day. I had saved my dad's life that day. But we rarely talked about it. Many years later as he looked at his terrible scarred legs, he said, "Son, if you had not put out that fire, I was ready to run for the pool of water, and I knew, I could never made it without burning up. I thank God and you for being there that day." Dad had a hard time giving compliments and I accepted this one with a lump in my throat and tear in each eye, as I remembered that frightful day. There were many things I wanted to remember about my dad, today, but the grief is too much, so I must quit. (To be continued)







New Ground In The Bottom

I walk a short distance and now I stand at the foot of my grandmother and grandfather Scoggins graves, which I have done many times before. I see myself as a young child, running as fast as I can away from the old box house that was almost always too hot or too cold. I run on toward mama's house that was the same. I loved to watch mama sit in a straightback, cane bottom chair. Taking her braided hair from her head, I marveled as she unbraided her long hair, almost to the floor when she stood up, and pulled it into her lap, where she combed and brushed it

I remembered when she died, I told my dad, crying, I did not want to go to the funeral. He hugged me with tears in his eyes. It was the first time I had seen my dad cry, and the first time I can remember him hugging me. He said, "Son, you don't have to go if you don't want to. We can't help mama anymore now." I did not go, however, now I wish I had. Dad and I visited her grave almost every week for many months as his grief remained strong. Several years later dad and I were working on her grave, to remove every sprig of grass that came up every time it rained. I looked at my dad and tears were running down his cheeks. I looked down quickly so he would not see my tears too. We completed the task, loaded thetools in the old pickup truck and drove several miles before either of us exchanged words. I now look north, a hundred yards or more, toward where my great-grandfather was laid to rest many years before my birth. I wondered if his life had been any different than my father or his father. I wish I could talk to him. I wish that I could ask questions of a man who must have had a hard time starting a new life in a land called Texas, a man I regret I never got to

Scoggins a name that originated 400A.D. descended originally form the Boernicians. The ancient race from the north were a mixture of Scottish Pecks and Anglos. Last year as I had several times before, I visited Europe. In the border country between Scotland and

England, I wondered how my ancestors had lived in this beautiful countryside of rolling hills. An old Scotsman told me in a language I could hardly understand "Son" he said "Sheep were more important than people in the 16th and 17th centuries. The bloody English kings banished your ancestors to the colonies.' From this area of the motherland came the Armstrongs, Grahams, Scots, Kerrs, Bells, Nixons, Dicksons, Rutherfords and most names ending in "son". In 1246 A.D., six chiefs from the Scottish side of the border and six chiefs from the English side met at Carlisle and produced a set of laws for the border territories. These were unlike any laws in Scotland or England. For example, it was a great offense to refuse to help a neighbor recover his wife, sheep, cattle or horses. Refusal could get you hanged instantly without a trial. I think my dad could have fit into these clans, just as his ancestors had. I hope God in his infinite wisdom will cut out 50 acres of good bottomland in heaven, give four good mules to my dad and say "Homer, you can share crop this land for me if you want to.

Although I think more like my mother there are streaks of Scoggins in me. There is only one way to do a job. It's my way, bear with me a few years so my dad can work for a landlord he has loved the last 57 years. I am sure he will, with God's help, build a golf course on the hill next to that fifty acre strip of bottomland. Dad can drive his mules up under the big tree between the bottomland and the golf course. I'll drive the golf cart over and mom will join us with a big box lunch as she used to do when I was very young. We can talk about the good days, not about the good old days, as we have many times before, where the weather never gets too old or too hot, the ground never gets too wet or too dry, where man or beast never gets tired, working the new


ground in the bottom, of a new land. This tribute is from a son that loves his father very, very much. Harley Scoggins
