Incumbent Ronald Roddy will not seek another term as a board member on the Prairiland School Board. In his place running for a place on the board are three area residents of Blossom. They are Lowell Gillie, Micheal Sessums and LeNita Unruh.

Lowell Gillie was born and raised in this area and graduated from Prairiland High School in 1978. He resides in Sylvan and is married to Melissa, a school teacher. They have a 14 month-old daughter, Bailey. He is a member of the Blossom Prairie Kiwanis Club, Blossom Masonic Lodge and Texas Scottish Rite's Hos-

Mr. Gillie feels that he could be an asset to the board by not having a child in the school system. He stated that the older he gets, the more he tends to disagree with people that think you have to have a child in the system. He feels that he could be more unbiased in making decisions that effect the students and taxpay-

Mr. Gillie states that his first concern is the quality of education that the students are receiving and feels that more concentration should be placed on academics. 



Peanut Butter Bar By Carla Farmer

1 cup sugar

4 tsp. salt 1/2 cup egg substitute or 2 eggs 10-11 Cups flour (All purpose) Mix undissolved yeast and sugar

with about 1/3 of the flour in large mixing bowl. Heat water, milk, wesson oil and salt until warm (about 120 degrees) Add liquids to dry ingredients.

Beat for 2 minutes at medium sped of electric mixer, scraping bowl occasionally. Add enough flour to make a thick batter, add eggs or egg substitute.

Beat on high speed for 2 minutes scraping bowl occasionally. Stir in additional flour.

Let stand 10 minutes, knead on floured surface until smooth or elastic. Place in greased bowl, turning once to grease surface and cover. Store in refrigerator. Shape rolls about 2 hours before serving. Let rise until double in bulk. Bake in hot oven 350 degrees about 15 minutes. Punch down unused dough and return to refrigerator. Makes 4-6 dozen rolls.

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





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


