Only a 60 day window to sign up for farm program for the next seven years!

Glickman has warned that agriculturalists need to remember to sign up for the farm program between May 20 and July 12. This is a narrow window of only sixty days to sign up to receive ag transition payments during the next seven years.

Glickman said it will be especially important for producers who jump in and out of farm programs not to miss the spring sign-up period. Not signing up will effectively lock farmers out of the farm program though 2002!

Glickman says that "farmers don't give up a lot by signing up in the program, and if they don't sign-up, they'll be out of the program with no exceptions, except for CRP contracts".

In an address to the International Bankers Association of America Spring Leadership Meeting, Glickman told more than 220 community bankers at the conference that more than \$8 billion in government payments will flow to farmers by early next year. He noted that rural

Secretary of Agriculture, Dan banks will need to help small and moderate-size farms to be "exceedingly prudent" in managing and investing the new farm bill's frontloaded payments. The Secretary said he expects significantly greater price volatility to inevitably occur as producers respond to market signals and change crop plantings. He noted that this will pose a greater risk-management challenge for smaller and less capitalized producers and their lend-

> The Secretary outlined the payment schedule as making 50 percent of the 1996 transition payment within 30 days after a producer's contract is approved. If producers sign up by May 20, they should expect to receive a 50 percent payment by mid-June. The remainder of the 1996 transition payment will be made by Sept. 30 and producers will be eligible to receive 50 percent of the 1997 transition payment by either Dec. 15 or Jan. 15, depending on their tax-planning needs.

Class ring returned to owner after 45 years

Joplin recently, with a very interesting tale to relate.

Back in 1950 William Henry Johnson graduated from Deport High School. About a month after getting his high school class ring, he lost it. His dad accused him of giving it to some girl, but William Henry knew he had truly lost it.

His parents were killed in an automobile accident after that, and my parents, Charley and Ella Joplin, bought the house the Johnsons had lived in.

A number of years later, my Dad found the ring in his garden. There is no telling how many times he ploughed over it. After he found it, he showed the ring to me. It still looked new, and I saw the initials WHJ inside and knew who it be-

longed to. I asked around and tried my best to locate William Henry, but he had moved away and I had no success. I finally gave up and my Dad gave the ring to my brother, Billy Joplin, who had it sized to fit his little finger. Billy wore the ring for many years.

Larry McGill is a friend of mine. and we talk often on the telephone. Recently, while talking to him, he mentioned that he had talked to William Henry Johnson. I told Larry the story about the ring and

We received a letter from Wes that I thought my brother still had it. I asked him to call William Henry and tell him. A few minutes later I received a call back from the longmissing (to me at least) William Henry Johnson! He was very excited about the possibility of getting his ring back. I called my brother and he said he thought he still had the ring. He did not wear it anymore and he thought it was in a drawer with lots of other items. It took him several weeks to find time to sort through all the items, but he located the ring after several calls from me.

> My brother works in Dallas. He found the ring and brought it by to me. I called William and told him that I had his ring and we made arrangements to meet. As I told him over the phone, the ring did not look the same as when he lost it since it had been worn and sized, but he didn't care what it looked like, he was just excited to get it back after 45 years.

> I felt excited about returning the ring to William as he was in getting it back because I know how much it meant to him. I graduated from Deport High in 1958, and I still have my own class ring. I never wear it, but I take it out every now and then to look at it and it brings back good memories.

I enjoy mine with a little salt on them to bring out the sweetness. A lot of folks enjoy them with sugar, dipped in chocolate, baked in a pie or cake or strawberry preserves, and the list just goes on and on.

One of nature's truest fruits. They are at their peak around mid-May and are grown in abundance around this area. Along with being used in a variety of recipes, they are easily frozen and will keep for a long period of time this way.



Dead men don't always wear good suits

The year was 1955. Ann and I had heard of the state of Wyoming for some time, but we had never lived in or visited this western area. Our company gave us a new Ford station wagon and Ann had given us a new baby girl just 5 weeks before we left for Big Piney, Wyoming.

I was to help on a gas compressor construction operation. This natural gas was found and dug and capped in the 30s and was waiting for us to put it in pipelines and send it to Salt Lake City and other large cities for use. Thus the reason for arriving in Big Piney, Wyoming in October of 1955. You get a lot of togetherness on a 5 day cross country trip, especially with a 2 year old and a 5 week old, but all went well and Denise gained weight

Big Piney was a path for pioneers going to Oregon or further north in Wyoming and Yellowstone area. Piney, as it is called by natives, is on the Green River which is full of Green brown, cutthroat, native and rainbow trout. Piney is known as the "Icebox of the Nation." with regular winter temperatures down in the - 30 degree -42 degree F, and always -20 degrees F. The tow years we were there it didn't freeze for 36 days in 1955 and 41 days in 1956 All of this plus an elevation of 6,800 feet. It's fine for a young man who enjoys hunting and fishing, but not so well with a wife and 2 young girls and a coal cook stove.

When we arrived we had a house already rented. A 1 bedroom log cabin across from the High School. The log cabin used to be a cattle winter station until the Millers moved it to town. Town-yes 146 people lived in Piney before the Texas and Oklahoma delegation moved in . We nearly moved out before we moved in. We voted Piney Democratic for

the first time in its existence. The locals lost face with the big boys in Casper. Remember-the whole state only had about 800,000 people.

The log cabin was comfortable. A large living room with an oil stove fed by a 55 gallon drum outside. Dining table at one end with 4 small fluorescent light bulbs overhead. By the way, our electricity came from 2 portable generators in a 40 'covered trailer on the edge of town. Bedroom was large, one double bed, Kristy's

single bed and the baby bed all together. Kitchen was large, big storage cabinets. I mean a sack of flour and a sack of sugar wouldn't fill the pull outs. A big black talking cookstove. We used coal to fire the stove and circulate the water for hot water in the bathroom. No fire in the stove, no hot water. Bath was nice old time 4 legged tub, wash basin and commode and the talking stove discussing events with the hot water heater in the bathroom.

Piney is cattle country. The large local ranches like the Millers ran 8000 head, and the Judd family around 6000 head. Piney's closest neighbor town is Daniel "Home of the Rendezvous" and Pinedale, the town farthest from a railroad in the U.S. Both a little larger than Piney but everyone went to Jackson Hole about a 2 hour drive north of Piney to have a few days off. At this time Jackson Hole had I hotel, right downtown by the door of deer antlers. To tell you how update Jackson Hole was then, there was 1 ski lift and Iskabibble was entertaining at the 1 hotel Iskabibble used to play trumpet with

An old timer once told me Big Piney sorta leans off the north and a mite to the west of Wyoming. Now your know.

Piney had a 7 man football team.

They played their last game the last week we arrived. I noticed about an 18" dirt curb around the entire field. After the last game a water line was put in the field, filled to the top of the levee and the next day the kids had a skating rink for the next 8 months.

Back at this time California people had not found Piney for hunting as they now have. There were mule deer, antelope, moose, etc. All that your heart could hold. Hunting and fishing were excellent, but's that's a whole

Speaking of story, I'd better get to the story but you need to know the surroundings before you can appreciate the story. Helen and Frank Tanner owned the local mercantile store and Tanner was also the undertaker. With a population of 146 people you can see why an undertaker needs a second job. The Tanners were real pioneer stock and loved their Wyoming living. Helen was sweet, but Tanner could be a bit mischievous, to

Well, one day Tanner called the deputy in Piney and said he needed the deputy, Red Wilkerson (Also the town freight man) to go with him up in the Green River range of mountains to check on a family death. Now, this family consisted of 1 bearded old man, his quiet wife and two sons. Tanner had heard one of the sons had died and it was Tanner's job to see that the boy was buried immediately or be embalmed. This was about mid November and snow was already getting deep in the mountains and the rabbits were changing colors. Those big old jack rabbits or snow shoes as they call them are funny looking with some white and some brown. They change colors to solid white in the winter to brown in the short summer.

The two, Tanner and Red set out early one morning since the pioneer family lived way up in the mountains. I only saw the old man one time in 2 years when he came down for groceries. The rest of the time he and the boys were trapping and selling hides. They had their pickup and horse trailer with horses They drove for miles up in the mountains until the snow got too deep to continue by pickup. Out came the horses and Tanner and Red rode for another long time to the cabin. Sure enough, in the back of the cabin lay the younger son dead. Been dead for 5 days, but it seems Maw wouldn't let Paw and the other brother bury him. He had on a long gown and his boots.

Tanner explained he had to take the boy back with him and embalm his and return him for burial. State law. Tanner and Red tied the boy across Tanner's horse, since Tanner was about 50 pounds lighter then Red and down they went to the pickup and town just as dark set in. It was really starting to get cold about this time. I remember seeing 2 small rabbits pushing a large horseshoe rabbit trying to get him started.

Tanner completed the boy and he and Red took the boy back home with instructions to bury this boy in 3 days. As in most states if the family couldn't afford a suit, tie and shirt the state will. The young man looked nice in the new suit and old boots that Tanner had put back on him. Maw agreed to bury the boy within the prescribed time and off the mountains came Tanner and Red.

I asked an old timer what they did in Piney during the summer and he told me,"Last year it came on August 2, and we went on a picnic. The

colors are beautiful in the fall. Ann, the girls and I went to Salt Lake City in October of 1956 and everything was so pretty in colors, without thinking I took about a half a dozen pictures in black and white. Now that's pretty. One of the families in Piney had to send their father to a nursing home in Kenner, Wyoming. We visited him one day and this is about as close as I can remember what he told me,"They treats me fine, but they just don't understand that you can't separate a cowpoke, young or old from his boots and saddle without making him feel kinda lonesome like and scairt".

Tanner got Red one more time to go with him to see that the boy was buried. Red objected but Tanner insisted. He didn't trust maw. So they loaded up and away they went to the cabin in the mountains. It took a very long time because the snow was deep. Sure enough there lay the younger brother in his pine box casket in the back of the cabin. Tanner says we are burying the boy right now,. Well, the old man and the son had already dug the hole. They just couldn't get the body past Maw. Maw says in one hour. So in one hour everything was ready, Maw and Paw came out dressed as good as they could and Tanner and Red carried the casket. Marching behind everyone was the other brother in a new suit, shirt and tie. Tanner

VFW members attend loyality day festivities





In their book, Happiness Is A Choice, Minirth and Meir list five five stages of grief: 1) Denial; 2) Anger turned outward; 3) Anger turned inward; 4) Genuine grief; 5) Resolution. Other researchers have defined the grief process in a similar fashion. How one allows himself or herself to go through the process is often the determining factor as to his or her depression or happiness following the loss.

The thesis of the book is that a person can choose to be happy. If we choose to be happy, then we can overcome grief due to loss of various kinds. If one's concept of life and values is based upon Biblical principles, then choosing to be happy becomes easier and can eliminate a lot of additional hurt and frustration.

Jesus offeredhelp to people who are hurting. If one will come to Jesus on His terms, then that person can learn from Jesus what life is all about and how to deal with it. Jesus said, "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of (from) me: for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light" (Matthew 11:28-30).
