Deport City Council seeking funds for three major projects

After three hours of deliberation Monday night the Deport City council found itself burdened with the task of providing the city with street repairs, fire protection and a new city hall facility.

After hearing Reeves Hayter of Hayter Engineering present specifications for the street repairs, new fire hydrants and a new city hall, Ed Moore, vice president bond consultant of Southwest Securities from Longview outlined ways to fund the \$450,000 needed for the projects.

The projects consist of street repairs on Trail Street, Fifth Street, Fourth Street, Ruth Street, Choctaw Street, Beville Street and South Jeffus Street. All streets listed in the project are either gravel or riddled with pot holes, according to the council. Also, part of the projects is the need for new fire hydrants and six inch water lines to be installed on Milton-Minter Road to serve the new addition of homes built in the past two years, and a six inch water line and fire hydrant on Clarksdale Street running toward the east city limit to provide fire protection to the homes located in that section of the city.

Yet another part of the project is to build a new city hall facility which will meet American Disabilities Act requirements.

After much discussion the council divided the \$450,000 projects into three parts and reviewed the importance of each part.

First was the issue of fire protection for the citizens of Deport. According to the council, several citizens with new and older homes located within the city limit have been warned by their insurance companies that they will not be able to keep insuring homes without adequate fire protection. Most companies require a fire hydrant to be located within 600 feet of insured homes. Also, without the required fire hydrants, the city could lose its Key Rating, which would lead to higher rates for insurance. The council unanimously agreed the fire hydrants were very important and that something must be done about the situation.

Secondly the council discussed the new city hall facility idea. According to city secretary Sharon Francis the city has been given a deadline of January, 1997 to make provisions for a city hall that meets ADA require-

ments. According to Reeves Hayter of Hayter Engineer, some of these requirements are: 36 inch doors, 36 inch hall, public restrooms meeting handicap requirements. Mayor Charles Foster stated that if the city isn't in compliance with ADA by the deadline that has been set by ADA he city could be sued.

"If we can't meet the requirements by remodeling the present city hall then we will need to build a new one" concluded the Mayor. The council agreed that a new facility might be the best solution.

Third was what is probably the most popular issue, street repairs.

Citizens have met with the council on several occasions to complain about the condition of streets. Complaints have ranged from dusty roads, to flying rocks that damage vehicles and pot holes.

The council agreed that it is very important to repair the streets and that several are in dire need of repairs.

Agreement by the council on the importance of the projects was the easy part of the discussions.

How to fund the project presented the biggest challenge. According to Ed Moore a \$450,000 bond for twenty years would cost the city in the neighborhood of \$40,000 per year.

Councilman Duane Glover reported the average value of a home in the city of Deport would run approximately \$25,000 at the present tax rate and water and sewer rates the city simply cannot afford the projects.

Duane Glover's proposal was to put on the agenda for the next month's meeting an item to raise the sewer and water rates.

After comparing sewer rates to neighboring cities, Glover discovered that Deport charges residents \$4.50 per month for sewer with a 1500 gallons a minimum.

Blossom charges \$18.50, Reno \$12.50, Detroit \$9, Talco \$4 and the city of Bogata \$8 with a 2000 gallon minimum.

Comparing water rates, Glover reported that the City of Deport charges \$9 with a minimum of 1500 gallons, Blossom charges \$13, Reno \$12.50, Detroit \$12, Talco \$10 and Bogata \$8.

According to Glover the rates charged for sewer by the city of

Deport date back to 1980, and are way too low compared to most neighboring cities.

The council agreed that by raising the sewer rate to a minimum of \$8.50 per resident the city can generate \$14,400 per year in revenues. Also by raising its water rate to a \$10 minimum the city can generate another \$3,600 per year.

Under consideration by the council is the possibility of a property tax increase from .4462 per \$100 value to .6462 per \$100 valuation to raise the rest of the funding for the projects. Based on a \$20,000 house in Deport the tax increase would raise the yearly tax rate by \$40 per year.

With the water and sewer rate increase and the tax rate increase of .20 per \$100 of valuation the city could fund the projects with bonds and meet the payments on a twenty year pay back.

Councilman Glover proposed a called election for the purpose of allowing the citizens a voice on the proposed tax rate increase.

The council agreed the only place to cut the project would be on the street repairs. The fire hydrants and the city hall facility meeting ADA requirements are needed without much of an option to do anything else, they said.

The breakdown on the three parts of the project, according to Reeves Hayter are: \$75,000 for water line and fire hydrants, \$210,000 for street repairs and \$165,000 for a city hall facility meeting ADA requirements.

In other business the council agreed to send a letter to the owners of the buildings on the north end of Main street setting a deadline for some action to be taken to improve the condition of the building. If conditions are not met the council agreed they would then pursue legal action against the property owners.

No action was taken on a street light being installed on Depot street. The bond issue for city water and wastewater systems improvements #TDHCA #714239 was discussed. The government grant will be used to replace water and sewer lines and street repairs on College Street and Depot Street.

All bills were paid and the financial report was approved.

Thefts of newspaper vending machines partly responsible for new rack price!

We've tried to avoid it way past when other papers have given up, but the time has come for us to increase newsrack prices to 50 cents instead of 25 cents. This will begin NEXT WEEK. Sadly, theft of newspaper vending machines has been a major factor in this decision.

The price has been at a quarter for twenty years, and we can no longer hold the line. In the last few months these newspapers have had two racks stolen. These racks, even though weighted with concrete and armored with heavy duty plating, seem to be a prime target for theft! One of the really frustrating things about this is that they seldom have more than a few dollars in them, since money is removed on a very regular basis. That means that the thieves get only three

or four dollars, but have stolen hundreds of dollars worth of property.

Because of this, and inflation in production costs, all newsracks will now require 50 cents.

This does make subscribing to the paper a better bargain, and we welcome subscriptions. Remember, it costs \$15 per year to subscribe to the Blossom Times, Bogata News, Deport Times, Detroit Weekly or Talco Times within Lamar, Red River and Titus Counties.

Thunder Prairie Publishing is the very last newspaper organization in this area to still require a single quarter for a paper, but the time has come we must raise our rates too.

So remember, beginning next week you will need 2 quarters to get your newspaper from one our racks.

Prairiland Board amends policy, accepts resignation

Buddy Freeman presented a report on TAAS scores.

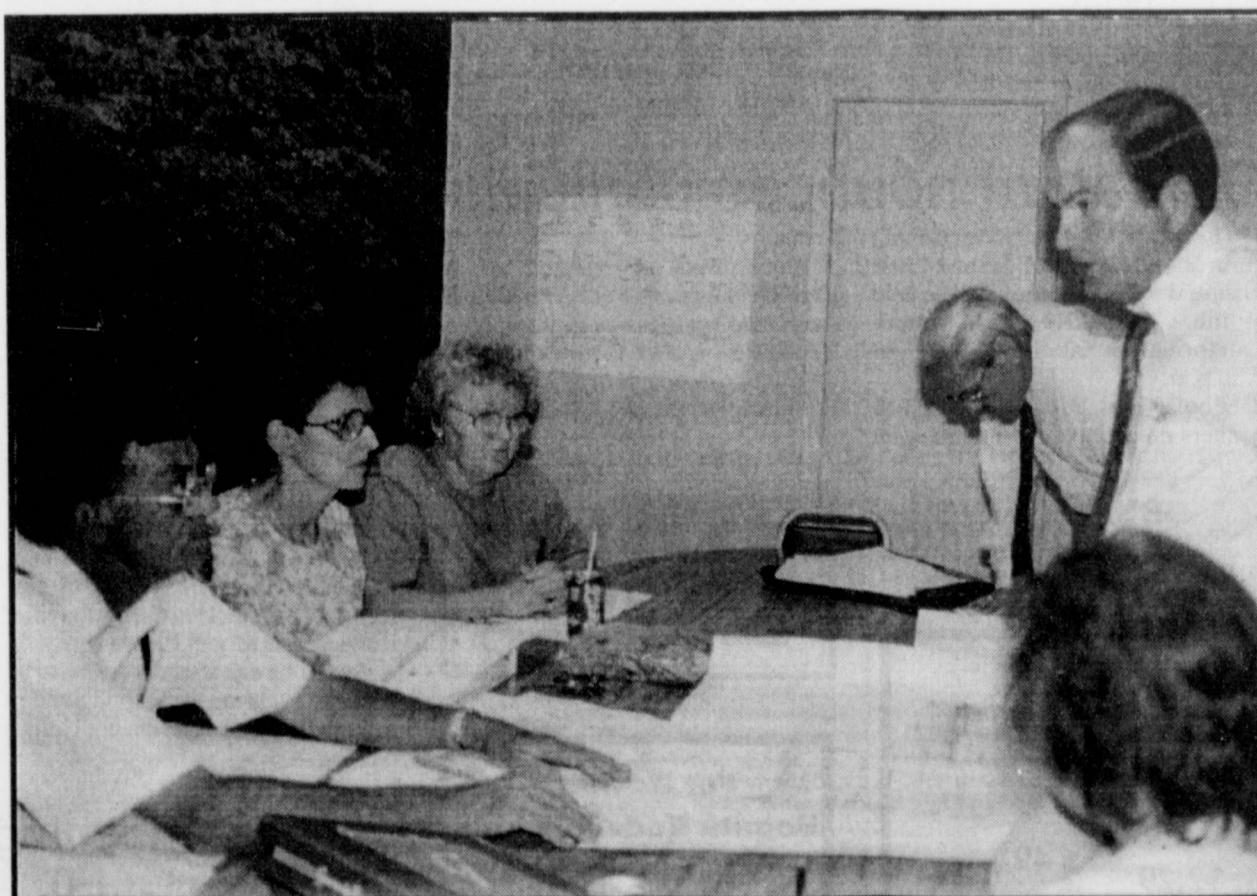
The new curriculum for Kindergarten through eighth grade, Texas School Steps was adopted.

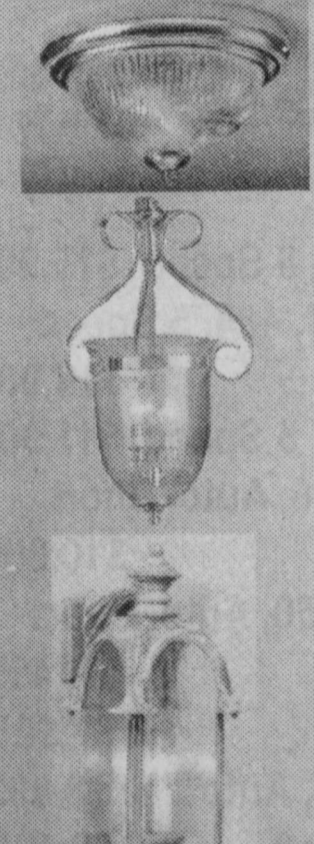

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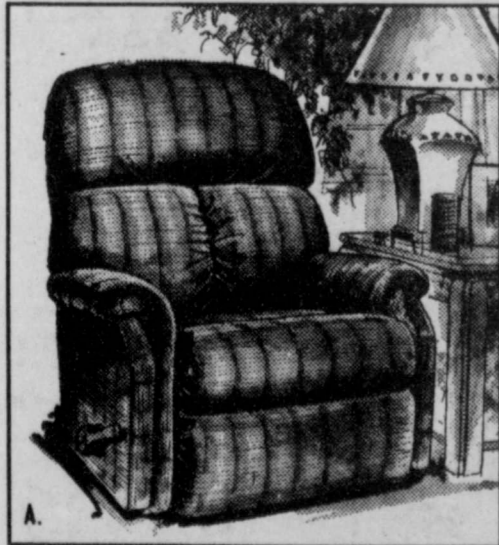
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Column Number 3,
Return to Ireland

Newgrange, Knowth, Dowth, all are names not too familiar to most people, but definitely familiar to an amateur student of ancient history...like myself.

Newgrange is a restored megalithic tomb. Built high on a beautiful hillside, in commands a view of all around. It is a passage tomb, meaning that it has a narrow "hallway" entrance from the outside into the inner chamber. The outside is an enormous mound, faced on one side with white and gray boulders, water rolled and carried by basket from the north and the south of Ireland to face the curving front. Newgrange, you see, is older than the pyramids of Egypt by 500 hundred years!

The mammoth stones are dressed to fit properly, the spirals, diamonds and patterns inscribed on hundreds of rocks throughout the tomb were done with stone...the ancients had no metals at all!

It is a fortunate thing that I have spent the last six months on a strict diet...even with all the weight loss it was a tight squeeze through the passage into the chamber, one or two large men did passable imitations of toothpaste from a tube! My slender cousin Medora took about three steps into the passage, though, said "no thank you" and left!

Within the chamber there is a wonderful example of corbelling, huge flat stones laid in circles, each circle smaller until there is a single capstone twenty feet above. The builders had a tremendous sense of things, as water channels lead moisture away, leaving the inside quite dry.

Side chambers held the cremated remains of those buried there. Virtually nothing is known about the people whose final resting place was this mysterious edifice. One thing that is known is that they had a knowledge of astronomy. Above the tomb entrance is a roof box. Once a year, between December 19 and 24th, the rising sun slowly sends it's rays down this roofbox to light the precise center of the back wall of the chamber. After 5000 years this calculation is only a few inches off, and in 10,000 years it will be exact once more!

With all lights off within the chamber the event is simulated, and is breathtaking, one can only imagine the real thing!

I left Newgrange reluctantly, to go on to Dunshaughlin, to Rosgraerin House, our destination for the night. Rosgraerin House is a beautiful, two story contemporary home, owned by Carl and Margaret Madden. Our rooms were spacious, wide moldings and a classic staircase graced the entire home, and the library was delightful. A little reading revealed that the large grounds even had a fifth

century holy well, which was once used for providing sustenance to St. Patrick's charioteer and his horses with St. Patrick ministered in the field opposite. It is locally revered.

Nearby is also the Hill of Tara, home of the ancient High Kings of Ireland.

It was while browsing through the library that I began to notice several books on witchcraft, and five or six on the ancient religion of the Druids. To be fair there were also a number of books on various Christianity so I assume these people just had a curiosity about a wide range of things. We certainly weren't going to ask them, although we did wonder!

I've always been interested in the Druids, since they were so much a part of the time period in history I'm fascinated by. I asked our host, Carl Madden, and he said that I was welcome to borrow it.

"Are you interested in the Druids, then" he queried "because if you are, you know they are meeting each night this week over by the hill of Tara, would you...." I will I never know what he might have said, for about that time my husband virtually yanked me out of the library and began a conversation with Mr. Madden about old radios!

He was convinced that the man was going to tell me how to attend a Druid ceremony, and he knew darn well my curiosity would have tempted me to go! So, I will never know what modern Druids do, which is probably for the best, as my husband tells me my curiosity will someday get the better of me.

We went to a restaurant called the County Club that night for a very pleasant meal, and visited with a young couple sitting next to us who had an adorable little red headed boy who seemed fascinated by our Texas accents.

Margaret fixed us a fabulous breakfast of homemade scones, muffins

and rolls, cheeses, sausage, eggs, just name it and there it was!

Carl asked if I enjoyed the book and I made comment that the woman was a bit "conceited and full of herself" and I hadn't read too far. He "sort of" agreed, and it was as I returning it that I saw the front was personally inscribed to the Maddens by the author. Oops. When I related this to my travelling companions they told me that I would probably bring down some ancient Druid curse! Well, so far things are okay, so maybe I didn't offend them. Readers do know I'm only joking about this, I hope!

We made the thirty minute journey to Dublin, which as big cities go isn't too big and is rather a friendly city.

But, it is a big city with the traffic and congestion that goes along with that.

We drove around through Phoenix park, which holds a premier zoo, 3000 deer, and serves as a "front yard" for many beautiful homes, including the one the Irish president, Mary Robbins, lives in. It is a well proportioned, lovely building, and she always leaves a light on to show that "all are welcome".

We browsed through dozens of shops on Grafton Street, the major shopping thoroughfare in Dublin. I looked diligently for a replacement ring for my lost dragon ring, but Celtic style rings are hard to find. Everyone I asked in the shops said to go to College House Jewelers on Nassau Street, so we did, and sure enough, I found exactly what I was looking for, a ring with the interlocking patterns and a small amethyst stone. Happily, it was well within my price range, so I left contented.

After that, we went to Aaronleigh, our B&B for the night, and thereby comes yet another tale....a story now amusing. Aaronleigh's name was by far and away the only attractive thing about it, but we shall save that little story for next week.

In the 340 acre setting, children feel free to enjoy the camp's activities. Campers also learn about exercise and nutrition and they meet other children learning to cope with diabetes.

To attend Camp Sweeney, the only requirement is that the child have diabetes. Founded in 1950 by endocrinologist Dr. J. Shirley Sweeney, the camp proves to youngsters that diabetes is manageable, and that by taking responsibility for their health, they can enjoy a full and active life.

Camp Sweeney is operated by the Southwestern Diabetic Foundation, Inc. in Gainesville.
