I cannot count the times that we have gone to the Great Smoky Mountains of Tennessee. We have traveled there in early spring, late spring, early fall and late fall. The only bears we ever saw were made from ceramic, plastic, or fake fur and were equipped with price tags in the

Seventeen year Jackie Carder drowned Tuesday around noon in a private pond at Rosalie.

According to reports from Deputy Larry Spangler it seems that Carder was attempting to swim across the pool and didn't make it. Carder was swimming with a companion who after being transported there by amwas unable to locate Carder in the water and went for help.

Bogata Volunteer Fire Department responded along with Red River County Law Enforcement officials and Game Warden and Texas Highway Patrol Trooper

Lewis. The drowning has been ruled accidental

Carder is son of David and Glenda Carder of Bogata.Funeral arrangements were pending at press time.

Another seventeen year old, Billy Smith, of Rosalie, died from a gunshot wound late Tuesday afternoon. Smith was pronounced dead at East Texas Medical Center in Clarksville bulance.

According to Red River County Sheriff Bob Edrington, Smith was visiting relatives at their home near Fulbright on FM 410.

Edrington said that the matter is under investigation pending autopsy Carder was pronounced dead on results. No further details were available at press time.





Our featured Cook of the Week this week is Blossom resident Irene Bryant. I was looking for someone that knew something about blueberries and remembered Irene's story of several years ago when she and the late Carol Pilip went blueberry picking and came home not only with a load of blueberries but also a load of chiggers. Irene had never been introduced to chiggers before and decided right away, that chiggers needed to be left in the woods!

Irene is a RN Case Manager with Magnolia Home Health out of Paris. She enjoys flower gardening and plants, reading, sewing, crafts and traveling. She and her daughter Marleena have returned from a recent trip to Washington state where they visited Irene's mother, Margaret Akehurst.

Marleena is a 21 year old senior student at East Texas State University in Commerce. Irene has been a Girl Scout Board member for several years and is chairman of the Finance Committee. She also belongs to the Bereaved Parent Support Group and serves as Program chairperson and is actively involved on the Board of the American Cancer Society. They have lived in Blossom since 1981 and Irene was born and raised in and around Vancouver Washington.

Blueberries freeze best is unwashed until ready to use and will

keep about 12 months. Irene washes her first two times and then lays them

out to air dry, then puts them in freezer bags to freeze. They keep up to two weeks in the refrigerator. They contain vitamin A and C, calcium, phosphorus and potassium and have only 84 calories per cup.

If a recipe calls for a can of blueberries, you can make your own by using 2-1/2 cups berries, I tablespoon corn starch, 1-1/2 teaspoon lemon juice, 1/8 cup water and cook until' thickened and clear. Cool before using as a substitute.

Some of her recipes comes from a handout from the Storey Orchards at Avery and others she had collected and improvised to her own liking. They include her very favorite recipe, the Blueberry Delight. She says that when she takes it anywhere, she always comes back with a clean dish. Everyone really enjoys it. Her second favorite is the recipe for Marie's Blueberry Muffins. It calls for cream cheese and a yellow cake mix. She leaves some of the cream cheese lumpy to get the added flavor. There is also a recipe for Blueberry Cream Cheese Pie, Blueberry Ice Cream, Blueberry Yum-Yum and Blueberry Sour Cream Pancakes.

We hope you enjoy these blueberry recipes and we will see you in the kitchen!

A strange B&B puts us ahead of schedule

Column Number 4, We finally had a bad B&B!

After a day in Dublin what would any tourist want? A good hot shower, a hot cup of tea and a bit of a rest before dinner.

What did we actually get? Well, it wasn't so good, but it is worth a lot of laughs now!

We were scheduled to spend two nights at Aaronleigh B&B, Ballsbridge Court, Dublin. We spent only one, and here is why.

Our typically efficient guide, Robert, had called ahead, located the place and told our hostess we would arrive about 4:30 p.m. We drove up, unloaded our bags and rang the bell, only to discover no one at home.

Well, we sat on the sidewalk waiting, and after a bit here came a young couple in a car. They breezed past us with no real apology for being late, and we entered our "house of horrors"! Now folks, we live with three dogs and five cats. I've happily eaten my lunch sitting in the corral, but I didn't touch the food in this place!

The first thing that was noticeable was the hair all over everything, from the dog. The second was the laundry all over the couch. Upstairs in our rooms we were greeted by bare light bulbs, tea making equipment that was absolutely filthy, spotted, dirty looking sheets and showers that we really weren't going to put foot into until we sterilized them! After our clean, neat B&Bs that we were used to it was quite a shock! We sat around and laughed and laughed, more out of desperation than anything else. We decided quite quickly we had no intention in spending more than one night there.

We went to a bistro for our evening meal, and down the street to a pub afterwards to talk to Robert about changing arrangements. He was horrified at our descriptions of conditions there, and we decided to mosey down the road towards Kinsale instead of wasting more time in Dublin. When we returned to our "home" for the night we were met by a man at the door who said "Sorry, electricities off". Well, Medora ran back to the an to tell Robert not to leave just yet. I really got the giggles, "What else could happen" I thought.

Thomas, being a more sensible sort, hung around to learn that the electricity was to be back on soon, as they were hanging new light fixtures. We decided we would go ahead and tough it out, instead of trying to find accommodations at such a late hour, and went upstairs. Medora came from her room and visited with us for a while, and then we all went to bed.

As if by signal the family's children began to scream, fight and yell! They made enough noise to wake the dead, and certainly enough to keep us from sleep. The mother said once "Hush, you know you have to be quiet when we have guests".

The screeched replay was "Well I hate it when we have guests, just go tell them they aren't welcome". Thanks, kid, but we had already figured that out!

About midnight the little monsters hushed we slept and next morning we gulped down tea and dry toast...having glimpsed the condition the kitchen was in we weren't about to eat a full breakfast! Medora took a walk through the neighborhood down to the shore, and then, we fled, having had our one bad experience for the trip.

The day made up for it, though, as we drove down to Kilkenny, where we went through the design center, which is world famous, saw the castle and then headed on to Kinsale. Just outside of town we went through the ruins of Ft. Charles, used by the English to guard the harbor from 1770-1780 and currently under restoration.

Kinsale is a picturesque fishing village, with expensive yachts anchored in the harbor and shops of all kinds meandering up and down the hills of the town.

We wandered around, looking at hand made candies, grocery shops, fantastic seafood shops and more. We bought nothing, since things tended to be a bit expensive.

Two miles outside of town we found Carrigeen and our pleasant hostess, Mary Cummins. This beautiful place was located up above the Bandon river, and had a view that was breathtaking. Medora got the best room there, with a view from her window, a small sitting area and a big bath. Still, we couldn't complain.

My weary knees moaned to me of hot baths, so I listened to them while Thomas and Medora strolled back down the road to some mussel farming we saw on our way out.

There they found racks fastened in the river bed, and wire mesh sacks full of mussels on top of the racks. They were so fascinated that they realized with a start that the tide was rushing in on them quickly and they had to hurry up to get out!

When we drove back by later for dinner we discovered the mussels invisible under the water. We tried them several times on the trip and although they are a rather strange bright orange color they are delicious steamed with fresh garlic.

Kinsale is considered the gourmet capital of Ireland, so we donned our best duds to go out and eat at a place called Man Friday. This place featured hand made pottery, a fabulous view, perfect service and what has to be the very best meal I've ever eaten.

Crab claws, oysters, Dover sole, mussels and scallops were set off by homemade rolls, the ubiquitous potatoes and more. I normally can't abide oyster on the half shell, but these were so mild and sweet that they were delicious. Indeed, we agreed with the gourmet reputation Kinsale has, but of course we made up for no purchases in the shops that afternoon...it went to the meal.

Could it really be Thursday already! Next morning it was, and it didn't seem possible. It was only a # short distance to Killarney, and we were soon there, and met our guide's cousin, Michael, who is one of several people who operate jaunting carts out to Muckross House. The house sits amid hundreds of acres of national park. The sidecar we took was pulled by an Irish draft horse, and the trip took about thirty minutes through beautiful woods, past lakes and then out into the open for the first view of magnificent Muckross. The structure has 365 windows, one for each day, and 52 chimneys, one for 9 each week. It is furnished with inlaid furniture handcrafted by Killarney artisans, silver, crystal and lovely paintings. That afternoon we had our notorious fishing expedition, which was featured in my column recently.



Low fat diet protects from skin cancer

Now, there is one more way to on the diet. protect yourself from skin cancer - a low fat diet.

Research at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston revealed that patients on a diet of 20 percent fat had fewer precancerous growths and non melanoma skin cancers

After two years, patients on the low fat diet had an average of three precancerous growths while the normal diet patients averaged 10," said Dr. John Wolf, chairman of dermatology at Baylor.

Wolf and other Baylor dermatologists studied 100 people over a two year period. Half of the group ate a normal diet of about 38 percent fat and other half went on a very lean diet of 20 percent fat. The caloric intake for each group was similar.

"The participants had already had one to three non melanoma skin cancers, so we were looking at a group with a history of skin cancer, " Wolf said

The study showed that the number of non melanoma skin cancers decreased the longer the patients were

There was some impact during the first eight months of the study, but the greatest impact was in the last eight months." Wolf said. "There were no significant changes in the normal diet group.

Avoiding excessive sun exposure is still the best way to prevent the initial damage that causes skin cancer, Wolf says. He recommends using sunscreens daily, avoiding direct exposure from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and wearing protective clothing.

However, Wolf also suggests a

low fat diet for his patients with skin cancer. The diet works at the progression phase of skin cancer helping to block it after the initial damage has occurred.

"I recommend a 20 percent fat diet, but 25 to 30 percent fat would be better than no dietary change," he said.

Wolf notes that there is evidence that a low fat diet may be beneficial in reducing the risk for colon, prostate and breast cancer and proof that it influences cardiovascular health.

In Pursuit Of Happiness







to feed livestock in the continuing drought could find help as near as the closest road.


The Texas Department of Transportation is making some of its right of way available for ranchers for mowing and baling of roadside grasses. Under authority granted by the Texas Legislature in 1977, TxDOT can allow ranchers to mow and bale vegetation along the department's 77,000 miles of highway. Written permission from the local

Lamar County ranchers struggling TxDOT office is required before any mowing and baling can take place. Owners of property adjacent to the right of way have the right of first refusal before others are allowed to mow or bale. The district engineer has the authority to deny any request.

> Persons granted permission to mow or bale must not receive compensation for performance of these operations, but may use or dispose of the hay or other materials produced. Mowing and baling will be limited to appropriate rural roadways.


