J. A. COUCH, SR. PASSES TO BEYOND

Death Occurred Sunday Morning,
With Interment Monday
Afternoon

J. A. Couch, Sr., died in this city Sunday morning, at the age of 83 years. Mr. Couch had been in feeble health for some time, and the end was not altogether unexpected. While Mr. Couch has not lived in Haskell for a great while, yet he had been a resident of this section for the past ten years, recently removing here from Munday.

The funeral service was held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, at the First Baptist Church, Rev. Wm. Groom being in charge of the service. Interment occurred in Willow Cemetery immediately thereafter.

John Archibald Couch, Sr., was

born in Bedford County, Tennessee, April 4, 1832. In 1870 he removed to Texas, first settling in Hill County. In 1876 he moved from Hill to Coleman County and for ten years past had been a resident of this section.

Beef Cattle Prices Advancing

Washington, D. C. Dec. 9 —Based on a recent report issued by the Bureau of Crop Estimates, the average price of beef cattle per 100 pounds in Texas is \$5.60, while during the corresponding period in 1914, it was estimated at \$5.50 per hundred pounds.

Although the report does not show the increase of this year's price to be very high over that of 1914, it is thought the bulletin will be optimisticly received by Texas cattlemen.

Several Thousand Turkeys Are Sold

The Turkey Growers Association of Haskell County held an interesting meeting in this city last Saturday. At that time it was decided by members of the organization to pool their turkeys and sell in lump. A deal was made whereby M. A. Clifton handled the fowls. On Wednesday something over 4,000 birds were brought in and sold. Mr. Clifton, we understand, shipped 3,000 turkeys to the Overstreet Produce Company, of Wichita Falls.

In addition to the three thousand shipped, a thousand, maybe more, of the birds were sold to independent buyers, some local and some out of town. Wednesday was a busy day around Mr. Clifton's feed store and lot, where the turkeys were weighed and many unloaded. Several hundred were kept in his lots Wednesday night.

MRS. F. L. PEAVY IS FATALLY SHOT

Small Boy is Alleged to Have Fired
Shots That Resulted in
Lady's Death

The most deplorable tragedy in the history of Haskell, perhaps, occurred last Monday afternoon, when the life of Mrs. F. L. Peavy was snuffed out by gunshot wounds. There were no eye-witnesses to the tragedy, other than the boy who is said to have fired the shots. However, before death occurred, Mrs. Peavy made a statement in which she described the manner in which she received the fatal wounds. A neighbor boy was taken into custody following the shooting of the lady. The lad who is alleged to have fired upon

Mrs. Peavy is only thirteen or fourteen years of age, and so far as ascertainable had no motive for the crime with which he is charged.

A particularly pathetic incident of the sad affair is that the deceased lady is deaf and dumb. Notwithstanding this affliction, however, Mrs. Peavy was at all times in a pleasant state of mind, and enjoyed a wide circle of friends. The husband, F. L. Peavy, is a local carpenter. At the time of the shooting Mr. Peavy was engaged in some work at the Haskell Oil Mill.

Mrs. Nola Peavy was born Sept. 17, 1875. Prior to her marriage she was Miss Nola Norman. Besides her husband and one son, she is survived by her mother and several brothers and sisters.

The funeral service was at the Methodist Church Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, interment taking place in Willow Cemetery immediately thereafter.

Much comment these days as to W. J. B. failing to accompany the peace party to Europe, he preferring, rather, to meet the delegation later at The Hague. Being a peace advocate and taking chances of being a piece of a peace advocate, are to his mind, perhaps, entirely different matters.

One paper timely remarks that while Ford has his Oscar II, that Texas had her Oscar first. Hank playing second fiddle to Texas, eh?

Headline: "Men Armed With Shot Guns Patrol Dallas Streets to Stop Crime." Which gives us more cause to be thankful that we live in peaceful, healthful West Texas, rather than the M. of T.

According to Wednesday's news dispatches, the main point in President Wilson's annual message was the need for better military preparedness. Wonder how it will set with the Grape Juice exponent?

Talking about a money crop How about Haskell's annual turkey crop? On Wednesday of this week Haskell County farmers received in the neighborhood of ten thousand dollars for the fowls marketed that one day alone.

There are many land deals being made these days. But bear in mind all the land is not being purchased by outside capital; witness that eighteen thousand dollar cash deal last week, wherein a resident of Haskell was the purchaser.

A visit around the stores these days is convincing argument of the very near approach of Christmas. And from a standpoint of prosperity, this will doubtless be the greatest Christmas in the history of Haskell.

Notwithstanding the almost incessant rains throughout Monday, there was a monster crowd in town. Kind of a double attraction, as it were: District Court in session and First Monday. Good trading at local stores was also on the program of the day.

Haskell resident guards Turkey! However, it was not a case of guarding against advances of the allies in the Dardanelles; only a case of guarding a few hundred fowls from possible invasion of night prowlers, said turkeys being kept in a local lot over night Wednesday, awaiting shipment.

TWO CROPS AND PRICES

J. A. Taylor of Memphis is the president of the National Ginners' Association. His report issued on Dec. 1 indicated 11,017,000 bales without linters. He says the bales are about 5 per cent lighter than last year, making the crop about 10,910,000 bales of last year's weights. Oil mills report the linters will be about 698,000 bales, compared with 832,000 last year, the bales averaging 34 per cent less than last year, or equal to 651,000 of last year's weights.

Texas ginned to Dec. 1, 2,783,000 bales exclusive of linters. It should be remembered that linters have been in great demand by manufacturers of high explosives. Early in October The Record predicted a 3,000,000-bale crop for Texas and came within 100,000 bales of the total crop without counting the linter product.

There is a short cotton crop. Those who held their cotton realized handsome profits. The crop of 1914 sold for an average of less than 8 cents to the producer. Should it average 19 cents to the producer this year it will mean \$10 to the bale, or a little matter of \$120,000,000 to the farmers of the South.

In 1914 the speculators and spinners said that the production was 2,000,000 bales in excess of the world's demand. In 1915 the crop is 5,000,000 less than in 1914. Then why shouldn't the manufacturers of the world pay a fancy price for the raw material?—Fort Worth Record.

Two Haskell families have been irretrievably saddened as a result of Monday's tragedy. While it is a dark hour of grief for the family of the deceased lady, likewise are the hearts of the parents of the boy who is said to have fired the fatal shots, downcast and saddened. To both these good families our heartfelt sympathy is extended.

If our news columns are slack, blame it on the grand jury. It is the custom of this scribe to ask all friends, and others, whom he meets on the streets, what they know. For two weeks past now, maybe more, the invariable answer has been: "Don't know nothin'—grand jury is in session."

Some mighty good road work has taken place over the county since the inauguration of the Haskell County Chain Gang. This was an advanced step of progress by the Commissioners' Court, from which they have been recipients of many compliments.

All editors should boost for that Newspaper Week, to be holden at the University of Texas, under auspices of the School of Journalism of that institution. While the date remains to be set, it is probable "Newspaper Week" will be either in February or March. Notices have been sent out to "sound" the brethren of the press as to their views of the most suitable time for the occasion. We hope to be there, whenever it may be.

BUFORD YEAGER IS ADJUDGED DELINQUENT

Youth Alleged to Have Shot Mrs. Peavy, Goes to Gatesville Training School.

The case of Buford Yeager, charged with being a delinquent and who is alleged to have fired the shots that resulted in the death of Mrs. F. L. Peavy last Monday afternoon, went to trial before District Judge Thomas, sitting as Special Juvenile Judge, Thursday morning. The county judge is designated as Juvenile Judge, but in this instance Judge Smith disqualified by reason of relationship to Mrs. Peavy.

A number of witnesses were placed on the stand in regard to the case, the lad himself being placed on the stand. When questioned by the court the boy admitted that he fired the shots. The law provides that for crimes or misdemeanors committed by youths under the age of 17 years that their cases must be tried in Juvenile Court, and a State institution is maintained at Gatesville for the confinement of offenders coming under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Courts.

In the case of Buford Yeager, the charge of delinquency was sustained and he is to serve an indeterminate sentence in the State Juvenile Training School at Gatesville. The youth in this case, it is said will be 15 years of age in January next. Therefore, he will be confined most likely for a little over six years, or until he reaches his majority.

Many pathetic scenes occurred in the court room during the trial of the boy. At the time when relative and friends of the deceased lady were testifying there were few dry eyes in the court room. Especially was this so when the son and husband of Mrs. Peavy took the stand.

In commenting upon the case following the testimony of the various witnesses, Judge Thomas characterized it as one of the most horrible tragedies in which he has ever been called upon to sit as judge. He stated that any reason for such a terrible occurrence was entirely beyond his comprehension.

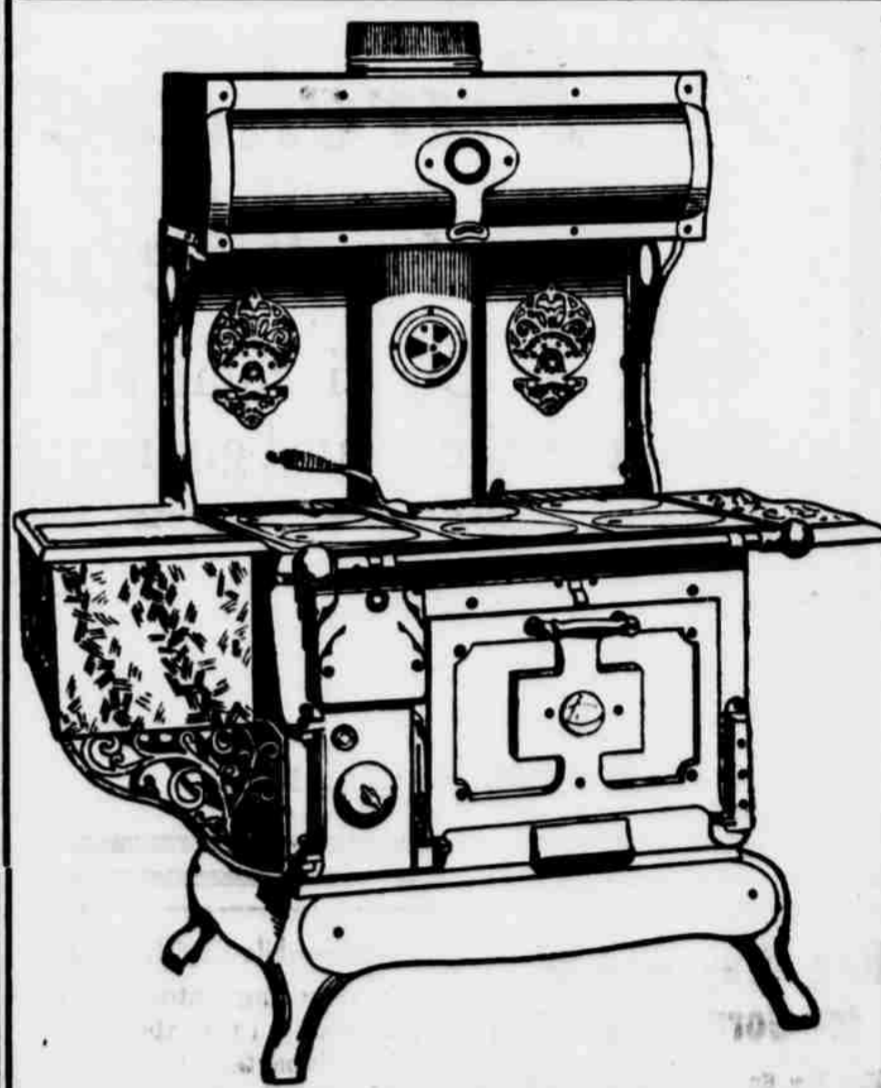

Texas Tomatoes Worth \$1.70 Bushel

Washington, D. C. Dec. 9—Thirty cents per bushel is the increase in price made on tomatoes in Texas this year as compared with the 1914 estimate, according to the Bureau of Crop Estimates.

The 1915 price per bushel for Texas tomatoes is given at \$1.70 and during the same time last year they were shown at \$1.40 per bushel.

There are only three states which have shown a larger gain this year in price per bushel than is shown in Texas.

The report shows the average price of tomatoes for 1915 in the United States at 67.9 per cent per bushel.
