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**Country Cooking**

What is purple, a fruit, and grows to the shape of a very large ostrich egg? Why, an eggplant of course! In East Texas, you can find eggplants in the home gardens of most folks. Wait... fruit you say! Yes, the eggplant is considered a fruit, not a vegetable. Most folks around here will disagree with me though, because eggplants are used as a vegetable when prepared around this area.

There are several varieties, but the purple is most popular in the United States, being around since the 1860's. It is low in calories and has very low levels of vitamins. They are also white, brown, yellow and striped, but these are chiefly used as ornamentals. The first eggplant was first believed to be grown in northern India and later spread to China, Europe and South America. It is now grown in many tropical lands and grows on a bush that stands from 2 to 6 feet tall. It fruit hangs from grayish-green hairy leaves and sometimes grows nearly as big as a football. It grows only in warm weather, taking up to 115-120 days to mature.

The plant belongs to the nightshade family, the scientific name is *Solanaceae*. Other nightshade family members include herbs, shrubs and tropical trees. Among

the more than 2,000 members of this family are such useful plants as potato, tomato, ground cherry, capsicum (red pepper) and the infamous eggplant. The family also includes some poisonous plants like belladonna (deadly nightshade), jimson weed (stramonium) and bittersweet (woody nightshade).

So much for our science lesson for the week. Back to the eggplant. Our family enjoys the Fried Eggplant. One time, I got really "gourmet-ish" and decided to try the Eggplant Casserole... their reaction cannot be printed, needless to say, we stay with their fried version!

I have tried freezing them, of course they are not as good as fresh, but in the middle of the winter, they still taste good. I soak them in salt-water while slicing and coat them in cornmeal, place in zip-lock bag and freeze. I have include recipes for Baked Eggplant, Eggplant Casserole, Eggplant Fritters, Oven-Fried Eggplant and just plain Fried Eggplant. We hope you enjoy the recipes and we will see you in the kitchen!

Note-The missing ingredient from the Hominy Casserole in the June 13th issue of *Enerec Phifer's Hominy Casserole* was 5 tablespoons of margarine divided.

Eggplant Recipes

**Baked Eggplant**  
1 eggplant  
1/2 cup milk  
3 slices white bread  
1 beaten egg  
1/2 cup celery-chopped  
1/2 cup bell pepper-chopped  
1/2 cup onion-chopped  
2 teaspoon butter  
salt and pepper to taste  
1/2 cup grated yellow cheese  
pimiento

Peel eggplant, slice and boil in a small amount of salted water until tender; drain. Soak bread in milk and beaten egg. Saute celery, pepper and onion in butter. Drain and add to eggplant. Mix in bread and milk mixture. Add salt, pepper, cheese and pimiento. Mix well. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. More cheese may be added on top and returned to oven to melt.

**Eggplant Casserole**  
1 whole eggplant-peeled and cooked  
1/2 cup onion-chopped  
3/4 cup toasted bread crumbs  
1/2 cup butter  
2 eggs-beaten  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon black pepper  
Combine all ingredients. Pour in casserole dish. Bake slowly for 1 hour.

**Eggplant Fritters**  
1 medium eggplant  
6 cups water  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg  
4-6 tablespoons vanilla flavoring  
2 beaten eggs  
2-1/2 cups flour

**Fried Eggplant**  
1 eggplant  
salt and pepper to taste  
cornmeal to coat

Peel eggplant and soak in salt-water mixture when slicing to avoid plant turning brown. Dredge in cornmeal, salt and pepper. Place in skillet in small amount of hot oil. Brown until crisp.

**Oven-Fried Eggplant**  
1 eggplant  
1/2 cup oil  
1/4 cup cheese-parmesan or romano  
3/4 cup seasoned bread crumbs  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
sour cream

Slice eggplant into 1/2 inch slices and then into 1-inch by 4-inch strips. Dip strips in oil and then coating mixture of cheese, bread, salt and pepper. Place strips on foil-lined cookie sheet and bake in preheated oven at 375 degrees for 20-25 minutes. They will be crisp and golden. Serve with sour cream or your favorite dip.

**Fried Eggplant**  
1 eggplant  
salt and pepper to taste  
cornmeal to coat

Peel eggplant and soak in salt-water mixture when slicing to avoid plant turning brown. Dredge in cornmeal, salt and pepper. Place in skillet in small amount of hot oil. Brown until crisp.

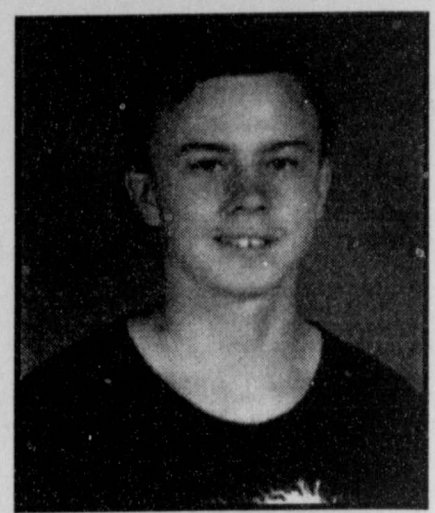
Burial followed in Madras Cemetery by Clarksville Funeral Home.

**55 goes up on more highways**

About 21,000 more miles of Texas farm-to-market roads will soon be getting a speed limit of 70 mph, but motorists should wait for the signs to change before driving faster.

The Texas Transportation Commission took action Tuesday on the final stage of a four-phase review of the state's 77,000 mile highway system.

Although the total number of farm-to-market road mileage being raised to 70 mph amounts to just over half of the state's total, the total mileage in on northeast Texas highways will be much less.

"The type of terrain we live in this area requires lower speed limits on most of our rural farm-to-market roads because of the many curves in the roads," said Carlos Ibarra, Traffic Engineer for Texas Department of Transportation in Atlanta. "Instead of putting up reduced speed signs at every curve, we justified keeping speed limits reduced to 55, 60 or 65 mph. Only about one-fifth (311 miles) of the farm-to-market roads in our district qualified for raising the speed limit to 70 mph."

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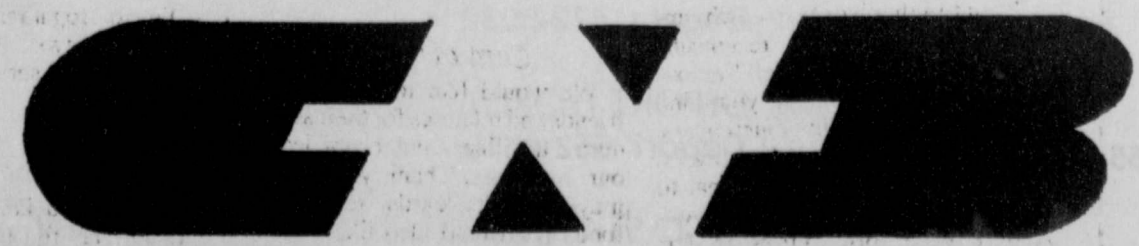

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## Ring of Kerry is quite priceless

The Ring of Kerry has so much spectacular beauty

Our last day in the Kerry region seemed to come so very soon. We loaded up into the faithful van once more for the ride around the ring of Kerry. This particular drive is world famous, and quite justly so. Mountains soar up into the heavens, valleys peek out, studded with cotton puffs of lambs and sheep, punctuated by stone walls and picture-perfect cottages. Then, turn a bend in the road and have your breath taken away by the sight of the mighty Atlantic ocean sweeping in to rocky beaches, sea birds screeching high pitched noises into the wind, white caps dying on the shore. Oh, the drive is lovely. Even though Thomas and I had seen it once before it was as new and special as if we hadn't.

We stopped for morning hot tea at a small village. We were waited on by a little old woman who could have come from any farmstead in rural territory, she would have fit in well here, with her time-worn face and friendly smile. She scurried around with our tea and scones as quickly as a mouse, and soon had us laughing at her chatter.

The views from the village bridge were gorgeous, rocky river bed with swans nesting nearby.

We oooed and ahhed our way for miles. The Skellig islands, which are the western-most point in Europe, were lonely looking. We spotted a boat load of sheep going out to one of the islands, supposedly for the summer grazing.

The roads were pleasantly narrow (for us, since we weren't driving) and we had to stop or slow for ewes and lambs crossing the road frequently.

We finally worked our way back to Killarney, coming in by the three lakes that are so beautiful. We stopped at "Ladies View" which has a path down to it. There is a lodge built down on lakeside which was built for Queen Victoria to stay in, on a visit to the area. Naturally, great care was taken to provide the most beautiful scenery for her.

Back in Killarney we killed a little time shopping and then checked into our B&B for that night. Called the Mystical Rose, it is run by a young woman with seemingly boundless energy. Her mother and dad began the business, and they are still there.

We had a long talk with the old gentleman out in his garden. For myself, it was a first to see celery growing, along with parsley, potatoes, onions, beets and much more. Amazingly, the man has 600 cabbages growing! They don't have to be harvested at a certain time. Since there is never a killing frost there, they can be picked as needed and left in the ground all winter.

The hedges on the place were filled with birds, including the tiny robin. This robin red breast is much smaller and brighter than what we call a robin here in the "states". Since the cheery little fellow doesn't exist in this country, the larger, but similarly marked thrush that does exist here was named after it's European counterpart.

We met Rocky Four a Sheltie that replaced the larger, Lassie Type collie the elderly couple had lost. Rocky was till "much of a pup" and he fell totally in love with my cousin Medora. When she tried to walk off the premises, he took hold of her pants leg and tried to pull her back, when that didn't work he simply went with her.

We ate our supper once more at a warm, friendly pub called The Laurel. Chicken in Crepes with cream sauce, for Thomas, Forest mushrooms (3 kinds) over noodles for Medora and a burger for me. Their hamburgers are very different from ours, with a crisp grilled outside and thick meat patty. This one was topped with a garlic and leek sauce.

We slept well and awoke sad...our last day in Ireland, so very soon.

It's only eighty miles from Killarney to Shannon, so we wandered slowly towards there. We stopped at what is said to be the most picturesque town in Ireland, Adare. It's easy to see why it comes by this name, as it features a street of brightly colored flower and vine-strewn

thatched cottages.

We stepped into a church there, and learned it was founded in 1230!

There was a dangling rope going up to the bell, and it took a great deal of restraint on the part of my cousin and myself not to yank on that rope! Thomas edged us further and further away from it, knowing us well enough to sense our temptation.

We went to Bunratty Castle and Folk Park in Limerick. There we climbed the steps, twisting and incredibly narrow, to the great hall. It was there, too, that we had our best laugh of the trip, Thomas, happily armed with his trusty video camera, was filming away. There was a small door into the dungeon, and a small door right next to it that led to the ladies room. My husband, looking through his camera viewfinder, strolled into the wrong one. Only when he met a woman coming away from the sinks did he come running out, face bright red. We were laughing so hard we nearly hurt ourselves, as did several other people in the room.. The thing is, he won't believe that we didn't see the tiny sign that read "Ladies" until he had already headed in. We can't convince him we didn't knowingly let him wander on in there. I ask you, readers, would WE do that? Don't answer.

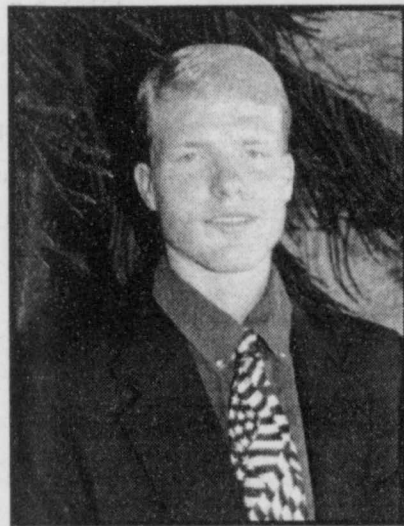
After touring the castle we walked happily about the Bunratty folk park. Here are building from the poorest, landless peasant's abode to the upper middle class. We were delighted to see a woman in period costume come to the door and throw out stale bread to the chickens, and then she invited us in to taste the fresh, hot soda bread she had just removed from the oven.

The smells of horses and pigs, chickens and ducks mingled with the delicious aroma of fresh apple tart baking, as we walked down the little street of shops, doctors office and more that gave us a clearer idea of what life was like back then.

After that we went on to Caernowen, a bog village, but that's that last "trip tale" we have to tell and you can find it next week.

## Local man takes giant leap to retirement. . .

When most people reach retirement age, they turn to nice, quiet, safe hobbies. . . like gardening, fishing, golfing, woodwork or something along that line. Well, there is a gentleman that lives out Halesboro (That is south of Deport for all of you out-of-towners!) way that has taken retirement a step farther.

His name is Connie Mack Hobbs, semi-retired teacher and navy man. He decided that since he was getting up in his years (he turns 60 in December), that he would take up skydiving! That's right, no fishing rod for him, just go jump out of a plane! You know. . . GERONIMO!!!!!! In my opinion he has to be nuts, but that is what he has wanted to do and vowed that he would before his 50th birthday.

Due to circumstances beyond his control, he didn't make it on his 50th, so decided to try before his 60th. So far he has logged 59 jumps and is shooting or jumping, as it may be, for his grade "B" license.

You ask, what makes a sane person want to do this? He says he enjoys the excitement, it keeps him alert and motivates him to stay in shape. Training is of the utmost and primary importance and a person has to be in reasonably good health (he

didn't say anything about mental). Asked how it felt to take the jump and he related that "you can't describe the excitement and feeling". Hesays he now knows now how the birds feel.

Connie Mack belongs to a private club outside of Whitewright known as "Sky Dive Dallas". They are sanctioned by the United States Parachute Association. He holds a class "A" in the UBA and they are recognized internationally. His license is authorized by the National Aeronautic Association and the Federal Aeronautique (international association).

With the 59 jumps under his belt, he hopes to go on to a class "B" and class "C" license which requires 100 jumps. This will give him more freedom and enable him to do night jumps and some "relative" work. "Relative" work is with a group such as the "Dallas Heat". He has witnessed this group doing several jumps together. A class "D" license allows jumpers to do demo jumps, more complicated night jumps and is usually issued to instructors.

Among his other adventures have been to drive and tour through Alaska, camping out the entire time. The year before that, he toured Eu-

rope with a group and enjoyed seeing Scandanavia, Denmark, Sweden and the highest point in Europe, in Norway.

He taught school in the late 60's; went in the Navy in San Diego and was commissioned as a Lieutenant. He came out of the Navy and continued his teaching career in Midland, Longview and Clarksville serving as teacher, principal and assistant principal and is currently teaching Algebra, three hours a day in Clarksville.

In his semi-retired state, he enjoys being able to have the free time to enjoy his other hobbies. He also enjoys his two sons and three grandchildren. David is married to Michelle and they live in Rowlett and have a son, Jason. Steven and Ruth live in Omaha, Nebraska with their two children, Arin and Blake. The boys don't think their father is strange; he is just Dad. The grandkids, well they think that it is "cool" that their grandfather jumps out of planes!

As this story comes to an end, look for it's sequel. I think Nanalee has almost persuaded Thomas to go along with Connie Mack in the near future. I may go too. . . just to take pictures!

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

**Texas weather grid proposed to gather lacking data**

COLLEGE STATION — Placing blame on a weather forecaster when a strong chance for rain doesn't materialize probably isn't fair in Texas. The nation's second largest state has gaping expanses where no weather stations exist to assist with predicting conditions.

But Texas A&M meteorology researchers Bruce Gammon and Dr. Ed Zipser have a \$20 million plan to put a compact weather station in every Texas county, networked to a central location and accessible in 15 minute intervals to anyone with a computer and modem.

"Everyone we talk to says it's a good idea," said Zipser, "but it's tough for anyone in the state to be brave enough to appropriate the money for it."

A Texas Mesonet, or statewide monitoring network, would connect all 254 counties with 27 wind and temperature profilers of the upper atmosphere, 84 instrumented radio towers and 800 surface stations to measure everything from rainfall to soil temperatures to air quality. Gammon and Zipser said such information impacts everyone in Texas and could save millions of dollars to industries dependent on weather conditions.

The duo are not just a couple of researchers with vivid imaginations. Oklahoma already has a Mesonet system, installed about three years ago. In all, Texas' northern neighbor has 127 sites reporting weather information for its 68,656 square miles. That compares to only 60 reporting sites for Texas' 262,015 square miles.

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

for pecans**

1995 was a fairly good year for most pecan growers in Lamar County. Most Native trees made a good crop while improved varieties produced marginal to good crops. It remains to be seen how the 1996 pecan growing year will be. Dry weather the last few months may impact this year's crop.

It is now time for growers to begin scouting trees for the pecan casebearer. Extension Service Specialists are predicting the first casebearer egg lay to be about May 25 and the first significant nut entry date to be between May 25 to May 30.

To properly time spray applications, first check for casebearer eggs on a daily basis. Eggs are usually found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of the ball in a ball-point pen. It may require a 10x magnifying glass to identify the eggs.

The eggs are white when first laid and later turn to pink prior to hatching. They usually hatch in 4 to 5 days. The tiny larvae feed for a couple of days on a bud below the nut cluster and then enter the nut, often tunneling in at the base. Silk and black frass are often visible on the outside of infested nuts.

Insecticides should be applied two to three days after the first eggs hatch to kill the larvae before they enter the nutlets. A second application may be necessary if unhatched eggs are found 7 to 10 days after the first application.

There are several insecticides labeled for casebearer control including Sevin, Dursban and Malathion.

Now is also an excellent time to apply zinc to the trees. For pecan trees it is best to apply zinc to the foliage with spray. Zinc nitrate may be applied at a rate of 2 to 4 teaspoons per gallon or 1 to 2 quarts per 100 gallons of water. Zinc Sulfate may be applied at a rate of 2 teaspoons per gallon or 2 pounds per 100 gallons of water.

These zinc materials may be mixed and sprayed with most products labeled for insect control.

Producers should consider the severity of infestation, cost of treatment, and expected return when deciding to make an application. This may be more feasible for the commercial grower than the homeowner.

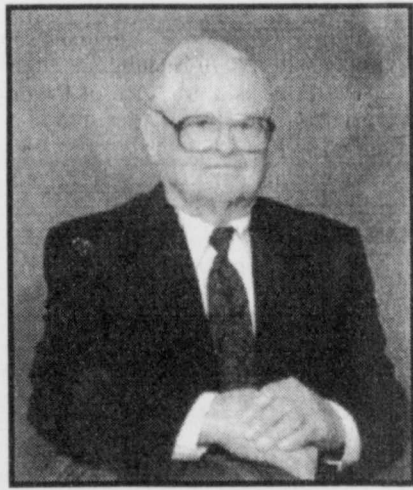

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### Portion control is answer

If you need a forklift rather than a fork to eat all the food on your plate, it is probably time to practice portion control.

The key to weight control might very well be on the plate in front of you.

"Many frustrated dieters cannot understand why they are not losing or maintaining their weight when they eat healthy foods," says Sue Thompson, a registered dietitian at The Methodist Hospital's Institute for Preventive Medicine in Houston. "They are simply eating too much of a good thing-people have forgotten that the amount of healthy food the consume counts too."

It is no wonder that our judgment about appropriate serving sizes is skewed. One only needs to look at some favorite food stops to see the problem. Consider the signs reading, "All You Can Eat Buffets" for \$3.99; 32 ounce Big Gulps and grocery stores that sell muffins resembling miniature birthday cakes.

Consumers are used to finding big food on their plates and they are the ones to blame for this increasing phenomena.

"There is the perception in America that bigger is better, and as we requested more for our money, restaurants and grocery stores met the demand," says Thompson. "However, there are some simple ways to keep our daily portions in control."

**Learn to visualize reasonable servings**

Scale down your mental images of reasonable helpings. Portions served

on airplanes are closer to what we should be eating. A single serving of meat is the size of a cassette tape or a deck of cards. An ounce of cheese or peanut butter resembles a large marble or a pair of dice. A half cup of cooked pasta, rice or mashed potatoes should be no larger than a tennis ball. French Fries, potato chips, nuts or M&M's: one small fistful is plenty.

**Bagel warning**

One large bagel is roughly 6.8 ounces and equals 5-6 bread servings. The American Dietetic Association recommends 2 ounces as the standard size of a bagel. Muffins are also exploding in size. When bakeries and grocery stores are selling 14 ounce muffins, they no longer constitute a calorie conscious choice. The American Dietetic Association recommends that the weight of a muffin should be 3-4 ounces and resemble the size of a baseball.

**Leaving Food**

Get used to leaving food on your plate. Order half orders when in restaurants, or take half home with you. Fighting the Temptation at Home. People often make portion determinations based on plate sizes. Use a smaller serving surface, such as a salad plate. Snacks prepackaged for children make perfect single servings.

"Let go of the notion that you must finish everything on your plate before leaving the table," says Thompson. "Pay attention to how much you are eating. 'Everything in moderation' truly applies to life long weight management."

### LIGHTNING MYTHS v. REALITY Facts From The American College Of Emergency Physicians

(NAPS)—The thunderstorm season runs from May to September. Lightning from these electrical storms kills between 150 and 200 people in the United States each year. The American College of Emergency Physicians wants you to be able to separate lightning myths from facts.

**The Facts**

**Myth:** Lightning always kills.  
**Fact:** "Lightning strikes are fatal less than a third of the time," says Stephen Epstein, MD, an emergency physician in Minneapolis.

**Myth:** Lightning never strikes the same place twice.

**Fact:** Lightning frequently strikes the same place repeatedly. Conditions that led to the original strike, such as the height of the building, do not change during a lightning storm. The Empire State building is struck by lightning thousands of times a year.

**Myth:** Lightning injuries are like other high-voltage injuries.

**Fact:** "Actually, lightning conveys much less electrical energy to its victims than power lines, so injuries to a lightning victim are often less severe than other types of electrical injuries," says Dr. Epstein.

**Myth:** A person who has been struck by lightning is still electrified and should not be touched.

**Fact:** People who have been struck by lightning can be safely touched. If someone has been electrocuted by power lines, don't touch them unless you're sure the lines

down on wet ground. Water conducts electricity. If possible, crouch down in a dry ditch.

• Stay away from tall or metal objects like flagpoles, fences, and trees. "If you are near these objects and feel your hair stand on end, it's a sign that lightning is about to strike; crouch down immediately," says Dr. Epstein.

• If you are indoors, stay away from electrical appliances and avoid using the telephone. These are good conductors of electricity.

• Don't watch storms from an open window or door. Also, avoid the fireplace because the chimney is a target.

"The safest place to be," says Dr. Epstein, "is in a steel-framed building or a building protected by lightning rods. It's also safe to be in an enclosed automobile."

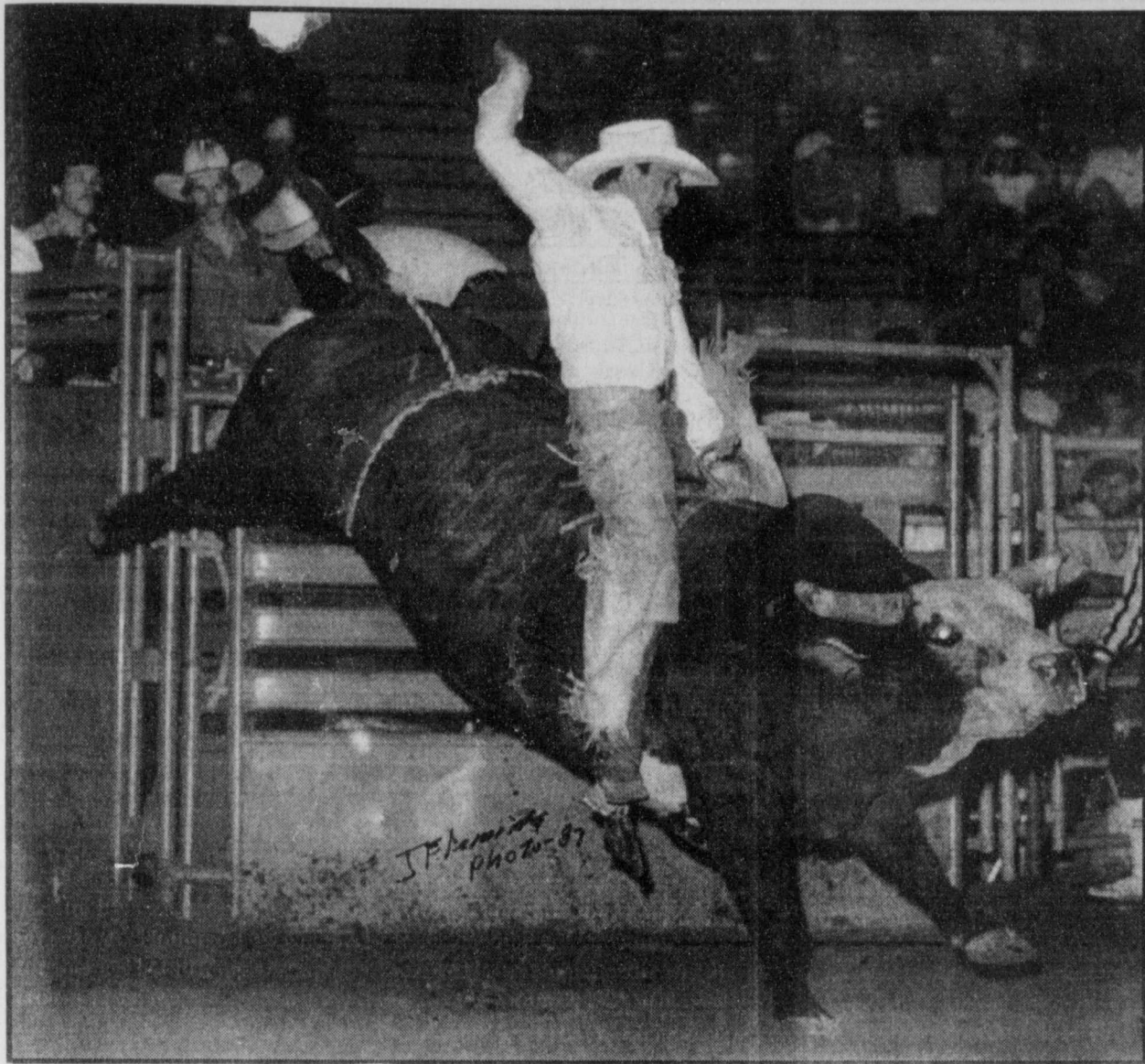

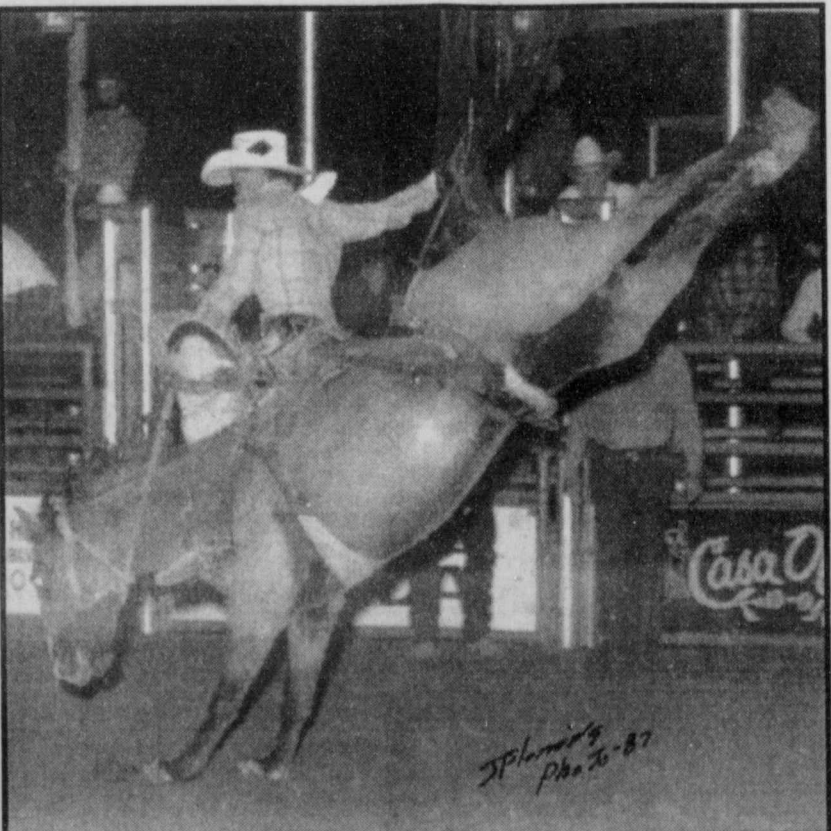

**NAFTA benefits so far said mostly psychological**

COLLEGE STATION — The impact of the North American Free Trade Agreement has thus far been more psychological than economic, says a Texas A&M University business economist.

Dr. Jared E. Hazleton says short-term results should not be expected from the new trilateral agreement between the United States, Canada and Mexico because most reductions in barriers to trade will be phased in over the next 10-15 years.

"NAFTA is good for Texas. It won't make much difference for the rest of the United States, but it's critical for Mexico," says Hazleton, who heads Texas A&M's Center for Business and Economic Analysis.

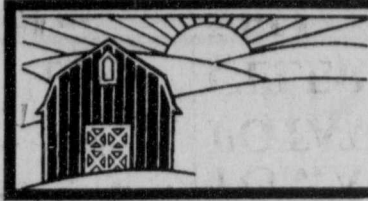
