



We must bid Ireland goodby After touring the folk park at Bunratty Castle we had some time left, that afternoon, with very little to do in Shannon.

Robert suggested we might like Caernowen, a recreated bog village, and he was quite right.

Not nearly as famous as the complex at Bunratty, it lies down a winding country lane.

There is a castle there, too, but it lacks the sophistication of the one at Bunratty.

Back in ancient times, villagers would sink logs and old canoes, in the water until they had created an artificial island. They would haul soil in (by basket) and keep packing it down until their island was complete.

It was enclosed in a wattle fence of saplings woven like a giant basket, and over the bridge was built a watchtower. This meant that the village could be safe from attack by rival tribes or wild animals, or marauding Vikings.

There is a lovely nature trail, and we saw a small herd of wild deer flee across our paths, vanishing in the dappled sunlight of the trees.

A portal tomb is also located on the premises. This is where they would enterr the bones of the dead after carrion eaters had picked the skeleton clean. It consists of three large stones capped by an even larger stone, creating a three sided shelter.

Something of great interest to me was the ingenious method they used for cooking. They had no metal, no pottery at that stage in history. There-

fore, they dug a rectangular pit, lined with logs near a spring. Water seeped in, as clear and clean as could be imagined. They would heat rocks and put them into the water until it was boiling, then lower food in leather bags for cooking.

Nearby, there was another pit, larger, that was believed to have been used for bathing.

Inside a huge glass building is a replica of the same leather-sided boat that St. Brinden the Navigator used.

A sturdy pen contained wild boars, perfectly camouflaged against the boulders, snoozing away.

Examples of pollarding were to be found in the woods. This was a special trimming of elder trees, so that they would produce the wattles needed for construction. The process takes about seven years, so they were a patient people!

After checking into our last bed and breakfast we cleaned up and went back out towards Bunratty to Durty Nellie's Pub. This is world famous, and said to be the oldest pub in Ireland, having been founded in 1620.

The food was excellent and we ate until repletion, knowing that our days of fantastic breads and delicious potatoes

As darkness slowly descended on the Irish coast, we stopped for one final visit to a pub that advertised itself as the "Last Pub On The Road to America', and listened to a very happy group of Irish football fans singing happily after a major victory.

Then, we went on back to our B&B for a good nights sleep before our 9:30 flight.

It was something of a shock the next morning to arise to find our hosts still sound asleep. The dining room was set for breakfast, juice and milk on the table, but no other food. 

So, we'll close it out as one of the very best trips we've ever had, and cherish our memories.





# Transportation Commission approves FM speed limits

While some motorists are whizzing through the state courtesy of higher speed limits on some Texas roadways, that hasn't been the case if they have traveled on the state's 40,000 plus miles of farm-to-market roads. And with last week's action by the Texas Transportation Commission, that won't change, either for most of those roadways in Lamar County. In its monthly meeting, the Commission approved speed limits lower than the state maximum of 70 mph on about half of the state's FM system.

According to officials with the Paris District of the Texas Department of Transportation, most of the county's FM roadways will remain 55 mph, but some could see even lower limits.

In Lamar County, portions of FM 38, 79, 137, 196, 197, 906, 1497, 1503, 1509 and 2352 will be posted lower than 55 mph. Sections of FM 195 will be posted higher at 60 mph.

Statewide, speed limits on more than 21,000 FM miles will be the

automatic state maximum of 70 mph. About 8,900 FM miles will be 60 or 65 mph, while another 10,000 FM miles will be 55 mph or lower.

In other words, about three-fourths of the FM system will have speed limits previously mandated by federal regulations.

With the Commission action, TxDOT has completed the fourth and final stage of work to determine appropriate speed limits on 77,000 miles of roadway on the state system as a result of the repeal on the national maximum speed limit last December. With the federal decision to lift the mandate, Texas reverted to a 1960's law by the Texas Legislature that set the maximum speed limits in the state at 79 mph during the day, and 65 mph at night. The law requires that state roadways outside city limits be set at the state maximum unless traffic and engineering studies show a need for a lower speed limit. The state system includes interstate, U.S. highways and farm-to-market roads.

In 1974, the federal government tied federal transportation funding to a national maximum speed limit of 55 mph. The 1963 Texas speed limit law stayed on the books but was superseded by the federal requirements. In 1987, the national maximum speed limit was raised to 65 mph on rural portions of interstate highways. When the national maximum speed limit was repealed Dec. 8,1995, the Texas speed limit law went back into effect, setting the maximum daylight speed limit at 70 mph outside cities unless traffic and engineering studies justified a lower limit. TxDOT began work on the traffic and engineering studies several months before the national speed limit was lifted. The review was conducted with the existing TxDOT workforce. Since the statewide speed limit study began late last summer, TxDOT has spent more than 46 million in labor and materials to conduct the studies and install speed limit signs.
