





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Free or reduced/price meals available at Prairiland

The Prairiland I.S.D. school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 40¢. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your child, your child can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your child can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To get free or reduced-price meals for your child, you must complete an application and return it to the school. Applications cannot be approved that are not complete.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal "use" income and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are appplying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that you child should

get free or reduced-price meals. You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also

ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Buddy Freeman, Rt. 1, Box 200, Pattonville, TX 75468, (903)652-6476.

If your child gets free or reducedprice meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your child gets meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

School officials use the information on the application to decide if your child should get free or reducedprice meals. Free and reduced-prize eligibility information may be subject to release to other federal, state and local education, health or other means-tested programs. Some programs already identified are the National Assessment of Educational Progress and officials collecting data for Title I allocation and evaluation

You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, liek a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your child, you may then complete an application.

Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, DC 20250.

Now, however, you can call the same number from side-by-side pay phones and pay significantly different rates.

After the break-up of AT&T; many new phone companies entered the market. The majority are good, reputable companies, offering needed services for reasonable prices. But some use questionable marketing practices to install

high-priced pay phones in restaurants, convenience stores, hospitals and other sites.

This is how it works. \$\$\$ Pay Phones — a fictitious company offers to install its pay phones in a hospital, convenience store, or other location. \$\$\$ Pay Phones gives the institution or owner a bonus for every phone installed, and a percentage of the "take." Someone has to make up the difference, and that someone is you, the caller. When you enter your calling card number, you might be charged a very high rate and not know it until the phone bill ar-



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
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
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
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
