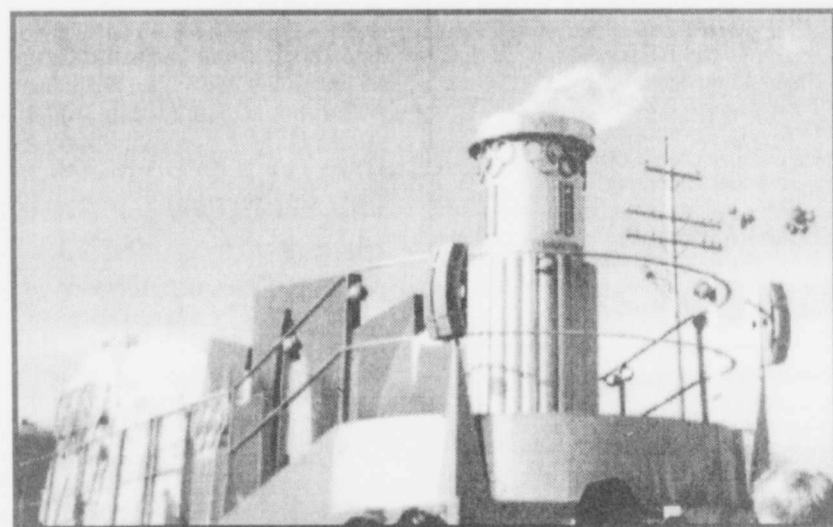
In other business they accepted the Wonder Bread bid for bread supply at the cafeterias. Oak Farms was accepted as the milk supplier.

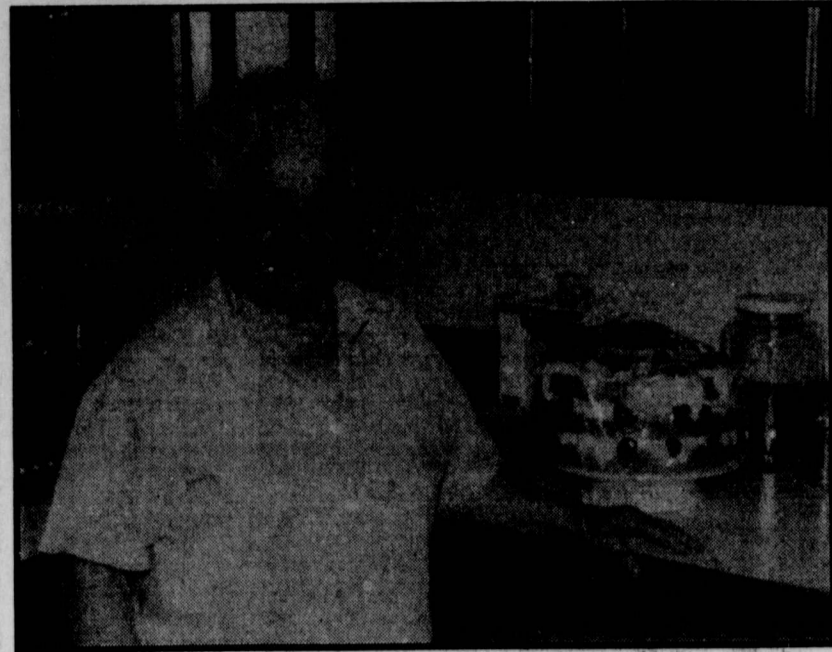

**Kosher Dill Pickles**  
20-25 dill sized cucumbers  
1/8 teaspoon powdered alum  
1 clove garlic  
2 head of dill or 2 teaspoon dill seed  
1/2 teaspoon pickling spices  
1 hot red pepper  
1 quart vinegar  
1 cup salt  
3 quarts water  
grape leaves

Wash cucumbers and let stand in cold water over night. Pack in sterilized jars. To each quart add alum, garlic dill, pickling spices and red pepper. Combine vinegar, salt and water to boiling; fill jars. Place grape leaf in each jar and seal. Makes 6-8 quarts, depending on size of cucumbers.

**Pickled Beets**  
Wash beets and cover with boiling water and cook until tender. Remove skins and slice beets. For pickling syrup:  
2 cups vinegar (or 1-1/2 cup vinegar and 1/2 cup water)  
2 cups sugar  
Heat to boiling. Pack beets in glass jars to 1/2 inch of top. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt to pints and 1 teaspoon to quarts. Pour syrup over beets and seal.

**Fried Green Tomatoes**  
1 egg-slightly beaten  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup cornmeal  
1/4 cup all purpose flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
3 medium sized tomatoes-sliced  
vegetable oil

Combine egg and milk. Stir together cornmeal, flour, salt and pepper. Dip

tomato slices in egg mixture and dredge in cornmeal mixture. Fry tomato slices in hot oil until golden brown, turning once. Drain on paper towel and serve hot. Yield 4-6 servings.

**Zucchini Bread**  
1 cup oil  
2 cups sugar  
3 eggs  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 cups zucchini (peeled and grated)  
3 teaspoons vanilla  
3 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 cup chopped nuts  
coconut and raisins (optional)

Mix sugar, oil and eggs until well beaten. Sift flour, soda, salt, cinnamon together. Mix in squash, vanilla, nuts and coconut and raisins, mixing well. Use a wire hand beater to mix this. Spray with no-stick cooking spray. 5 small aluminum loaf pans and fill to half. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes to an hour or until toothpick comes out clean when inserted.

1 pound lean hamburger  
1 can jalapeno Ranch Style beans  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1/2 package tortilla chips-crushed  
grated cheese-optional

Fry meat and add beans and soup. Heat well. Remove from heat and stir in crushed chips. Cover with cheese and bake in 350 degree oven until cheese is melted.

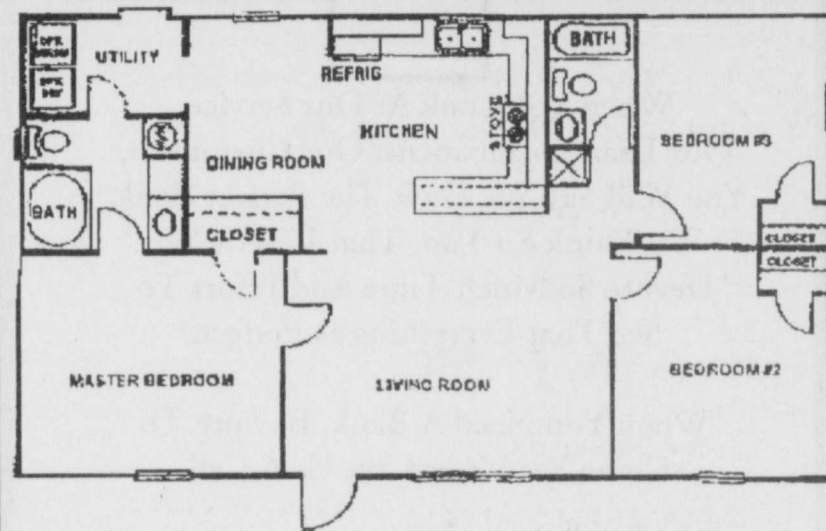

## Free or reduced-price meals available at Prairiland

The Prairiland I.S.D. school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 40¢. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your child, your child can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your child can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To get free or reduced-price meals for your child, you must complete an application and return it to the school. Applications cannot be approved that are not complete.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your child should get free or reduced-price meals.

You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also

ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Buddy Freeman, Rt. 1, Box 200, Pattonville, TX 75468, (903)652-6476.

If your child gets free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your child gets meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

School officials use the information on the application to decide if your child should get free or reduced-price meals. Free and reduced-price eligibility information may be subject to release to other federal, state and local education, health or other means-tested programs. Some programs already identified are the National Assessment of Educational Progress and officials collecting data for Title I allocation and evaluation purposes.

You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your child, you may then complete an application.

Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, DC 20250.

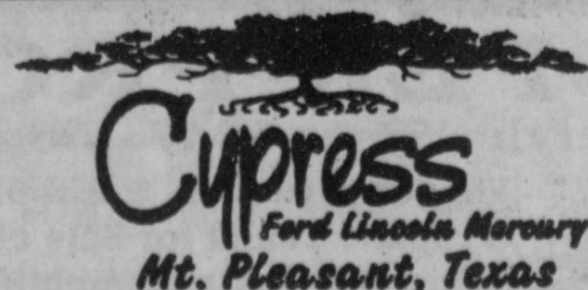

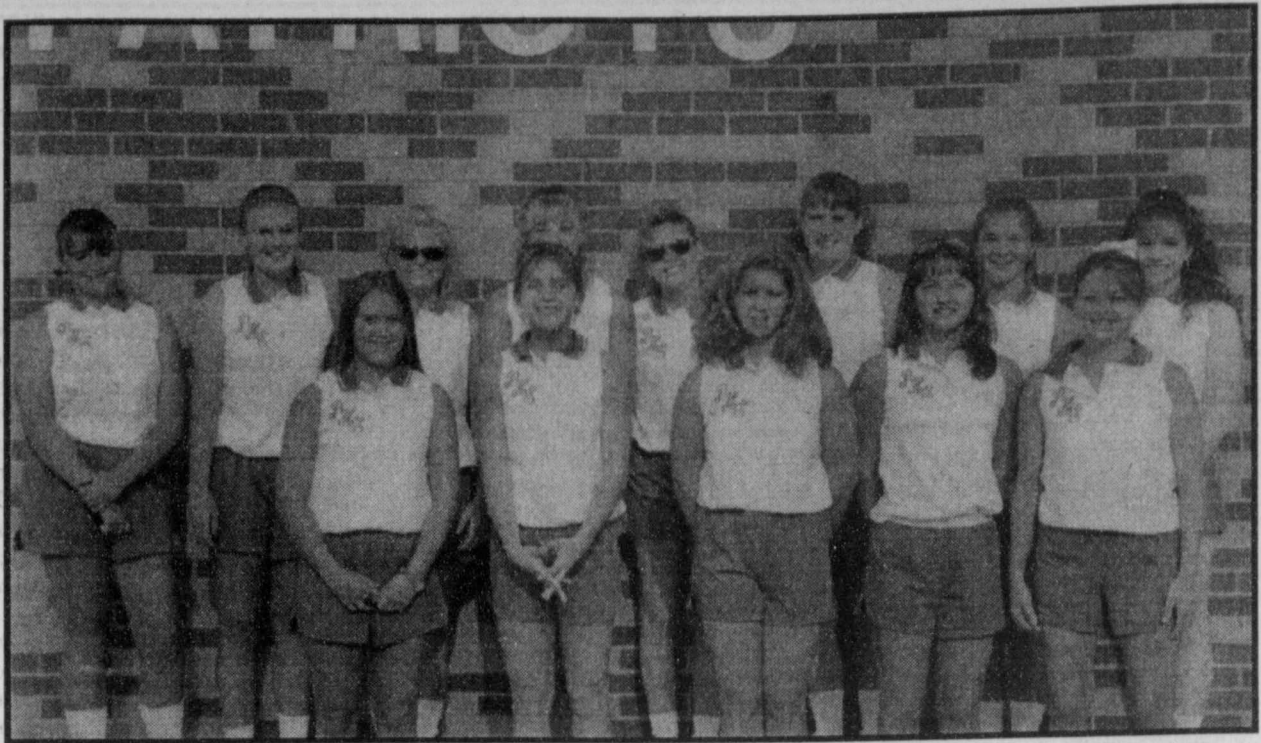

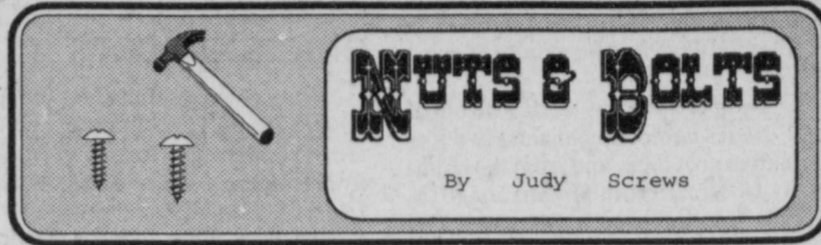

I have noticed myself making many concessions to my age in the last few years, so moving to the front of the church will be just another adjustment to cause my older body to be able to keep up with the things my mind still wants to do. These things my mind wants to do are not luxuries. They are just basic things we all take for granted such as hearing, seeing, waking in the morning, going places, etc. Until just a few years ago I only had to wear my glasses to take my driver's license exam every few years or work crossword puzzles. Now I need glasses to cook (can't read labels on food containers), watch Television, sew, iron and drive, just to name a few of the many things I now require glasses to do. One of my favorite things to do in the past was to lie in the bed and watch television. I don't wear glasses in bed very well. They either smush one way or the other when I turn over, and they are so cumbersome, so I sit in a chair to watch television. I could probably solve the problem by wearing contacts, but I would have to keep up

How can you protect yourself from excessive phone bills? By following some of the guidelines we at the Office of the Attorney General have put together. This column outlines how a part of the phone industry works today — and how you can spot a potentially expensive call.

**It's your nickel**

It used to be that Ma Bell owned all the phones and took care of everything. The company's pricing practices were reasonably consistent — similar calls from any pay phone in the country cost about the same amount. Now, however, you can call the same number from side-by-side pay phones and pay significantly different rates.

After the break-up of AT&T, many new phone companies entered the market. The majority are good, reputable companies, offering needed services for reasonable prices. But some use questionable marketing practices to install

high-priced pay phones in restaurants, convenience stores, hospitals and other sites.

This is how it works. \$\$\$ Pay Phones — a fictitious company — offers to install its pay phones in a hospital, convenience store, or other location. \$\$\$ Pay Phones gives the institution or owner a bonus for every phone installed, and a percentage of the "take." Someone has to make up the difference, and that someone is you, the caller. When you enter your calling card number, you might be charged a very high rate and not know it until the phone bill arrives.
