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

Jeff Wilcoxen wheels through life with high style and determination

Don't tell Jeff Wilcoxen that he can't do something, because in spite of his being in a wheelchair, that is all the more reason he will try.

Jeff was involved in a accident in December 27,1984 involving an accidental shooting. He was cleaning his shotgun when it apparently went off for some unknown reason and he was seriously wounded. . this did not stop him. He was in the hospital for several weeks recovering.... this did not stop him! He remains in a wheelchair with only the use of his upper body.... this does not stop him! He overcame any obstacle that came his way in order to achieve his goals. He was determined not to let a little handicap overcome his ability to function in today's society. He graduated from Prairiland High School in May of 1989 along with his other classmates.

Not wanting to be dependent on any one person, Jeff went out and found a job at the Wal-Mart store in Paris.. This is where the reason for this story comes in. Jean Mitchell who lives north of Blossom on the Walnut Ridge Road wrote into the nationally syndicated radio show of Paul Harvey's, commenting on the fine person that Jeff was and the fact that he was handicapped and worked

at the local Wal-Mart store. Since Paul Harvey mentions this store on his show and always enjoys getting letters from his listeners on unusual circumstances, Mrs. Mitchell told her husband that she intended letting Mr. Harvey know about Jeff. After several months, she decided that the letter had not gotten to the station. But several days later a friend of hers called and told her she had heard he r name and the story on the radio show and then a relative in Corpus Christi called and told her that thaey had heard it also. Since then, several people have told her about it, although she was unable to listen to it

Jean enjoyed Jeff waitherself. ing on her. She liked his attitude, his friendly personality and the fact that whatever she wanted, Jeff knew exactly where and how to get it, regardless that he was in a wheel chair, the locations was never a factor when waiting on anyone in the store. Jeff was always friendly and outgoing to the customers and always willing to help them in any way that he could. Mrs. Mitchell never failed to go into the store and not see Jeff with a smile and a hello ready for everyone. He was always busy and doing his job, never letting his handicap get in the way. According to Jeff, he stated that There was no reason to get down

because he was not as mobile as the next person." He was only looking for ways to improve his life and himself." "Feeling sorry for himself, got him nowhere.

He now lives at Gate Two in the Maxey Community outside of Paris and in 1990 on June 5 married his wife Laurie. They are comfortable in their small home and he is looking forward to each day at his new job. You see, he was always happy working at Wal-Mart, but he was always interested in law enforcement and is now employed as a dispatcher with the City of Paris. He feels that he is doing his part to help gain experience and do what he can for the good of the city of Paris and the surrounding area.

His van is equipped to where he can drive and get around like anyone else. After all, with fishing and hunting as one of his favorite hobbies, nothing was going to slow him down. In fact, being so obsessed with fishing, he keeps his lines baited and in the water at all times when he is off. There is a small lake just outside his door and it is his With the constant companion. weather so hot though, they have stopped biting as much, but he still enjoys just going out and sitting by the lake and contemplating his future, which he counts himself lucky to be a part of.

But then Kandi Wright ,who is all of nine years old, started making comments, and that was the final straw!

You see, the folks who started all this, the Dardens, have Darden-Sparks Department Store. And they got in a shipment of cute little banks. They feature tiny little scenes with animals, and when a coin is put in the bank these animals eat, or play or move in some way. There is a barnyard scene with cows and pigs and chickens, and cats in a living room that roll and play, and....there are bears. An entire miniature woodland

is filled with bears playing. And this nine year old, upon seeing the display, took down the bear bank and held it up, commenting sagely "you ought to get Nanalee one of these so she would know what bears LOOK like!".

Okay, kid, that's quite enough. Obviously she thinks we couldn't recognize what a bear looked like if we saw one, right?

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



Okra Recipes

Our featured cook this week is not a person, but a vegetable. One that is in abundance right now in this area. OKRA! We always plant too much and have okra running out our ears! It loves hot weather and is now thriving in everyone's gardens. Even planting a small row can give you enough okra to feed an army! It can grow up to 6 feet tall and bear

and bear!!!!! We fry it, freeze it, can it, chop it, dice it and everything and anything else we can think of to do with it.....oh, and give away a lot! This week's recipes inlcude an Okra Gumbo, Pickled Okra, Fried

Okra Gumbo, Okra Casserole, Okra Pilaf and Texas Okra Patties. We hope you enjoy these and we

will see you in the kitchen!

OKRA CASSEROLE 3-4 cups okra-cut up l green pepper-chopped l chopped onion 2 bacon slices-chopped l cup raw rice 2 cups tomatoes-canned or fresh l can cream of mushroom soup I can cream of celery soup I can cream of chicken soup grated cheese

Saute okra, pepper, onion and bacon until done. Add rice and water. Cover and simmer until almost done. Add tomatoes and cook until rice is done. Add soup. Pour into casserole dish and add mushrooms if desired. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees until bubbly. Can be prepared the day before OKRA PILAF

4 slices bacon I medium onion-chopped 1/2 medium green pepper-chopped 1/3 cup uncooked rice 2 cups sliced okra l can stewed tomatoes salt and pepper to taste

Fry bacon until crisp, remove from pan and set aside. Add onion and pepper to drippings. Cook over medium heat, stirring often, until tender, about five minutes. Add rice, okra and tomatoes. Cook, continuing to stir often, until liquid is absorbed and rice is tender. Stir in reserved bacon and season with salt and pepper

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
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PJC vocational nurses to graduate Aug. 14


Vassie Jean Ricks, age 51 of Detroit died Sunday, July 14 at McCuistion Medical Center, Paris.



He is survived by his wife, Ellen Gardner of Dallas.







Changes needed in alternative school system

Lamar County school administrators agree that a split-up is necessary because the 1995-96 cooperative alternative education program did not work.

According to Prairiland Superintendent Dr. L.C. Stout "the state mandate to establish alternative schools came without funding and had to be rushed in the matter of forming this program. "

Stout also says that the four hour day is too short and superintendents say the alternative school was good with discipline but not so good with technology. "The Alternative School that was located at the Police Athletic League served as a stop-gap measure" Senate Bill 1, which passed near the close of the 1995 Texas legislative session, required school to have alternative programs in place when school began in 1995. 'Transportation became a problem for the area schools, too" Stout said. Yet another crucial problem was unequal use. The original program called for each school district to contribute a proportionate share based on district enrollment. This cost was \$10 per student, which means Paris paid \$38,590, North Lamar \$28,630, Prairiland \$10,000, Chisum \$7,700 and Roxton \$2250. Yet, Paris used the largest portion of these services, sending 118 students, North Lamar 25, Prairiland six, Chisum 1 and

Roxton zero. A more cost effective system needed to be formed, it became obvious.

The State Education Code mandates alternative programs include instruction in English language arts, mathematics, science, history and self-discipline. Also, in addition to student education and behavioral needs, the law requires these programs to provide counseling services.

Current plans are for North Lamar to operate an alternative program at Texas law requires an alternative education assignment if the student engages in conduct punishable as a felony either on or off campus or commits the following on school property or while attending a school sponsored or related activity on or off school property:



the district's main campus with the participation of Prairiland, Roxton and Chisum.

Paris will probably continue to operate a program at the PAL center.

Dr. Stouts said that he considered the North Lamar site as the next best alternative until a better plan can be formulated.

The goal of the education program is to modify student behavior and continue their education.

Long planning hours have gone into formulating the program that is upcoming, and Stout emphasized cooperation of not only the five school districts but also the role law enforcement played.

Who attends alternative schools depends, in large part, on how strict school districts are with the development of discipline management plans. State law requires all district to adopt a code of conduct to fit new Texas Education Code requirements no later than Sept. 1, 1996. person or possesses or uses or is under the influence of marijuana or a controlled substance, or a dangerous drug. Slls, gives or delivers alcoholic

Slls, gives or delivers alcoholic beverage, commits a serious act or offense while under the influence of alcohol or possesses, uses or is under the influence of an alcoholic beverage

Engages in conduct that contains the elements of an offense relating to abusable glue or aerosol paint or relating to volatile chemicals.

Engages in conduct that contains the elements of the offense of public lewdness or indecent exposure

Engages in conduct that contains the elements of the offense or retaliation against any school employee

The above listed are Mandatory Placements, and schools send students to alternative schooling for offenses of the codes of conduct, which vary from school to school.

Emergency Fescue grazing is allowed

Because of continuing drought conditions and the severe shortage of forage available for livestock producers who are also faced with a depressed market, producers enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program will now be allowed to hay or graze fescue according to a grazing/haying plan prescribed by USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service un-Clinton of Johntown brought a good der the following conditions:



Producers with CRP who have been denied the opportunity to hay or graze fescue because of the restriction on use during the dormant season will be contacted and given the opportunity to request enrollment of their CRP field(s) with the Farm Service Agency.

Until now, landowners with CRP acreages planted to fescue have not been permitted to hay or graze during the time frame established by the Secretary of Agriculture for the Special 1996 Emergency Having and Grazing Authority. Having or grazing plans developed for these producers limited the use of the fescue forage from November through May. This restriction was based on solid science, technology and experience and is well documented in the NRCS Field Office Technoligical Guide.


