the lift. $I$ announced that when it the lift. I announced that when it
didnt crank he would get someone to help him pull it until
cranked. I drank a nice sofidrink under the office air con-
ditioning while he and another man dragged that blasted truck all
over the mill yard until it finally over the mill yard until it finally
fired up! He didn't. however, argue with me anymore.
When I firststarted in the news-
paper business I dealt with prejupaper business I dealt with preju-
dice and rejection because women were not usually found at crime
scenes, fires, deaths and sports events. My theory was "Do the
job well and don't back down and they'll come around". Mostof them did.
Over the years I have main-
tained that there are very few lained that here are very few
places a woman doesn't belong, but that they have to do the job as
well as a man with no snecial well as a man with no special
concessions, It doesn't count if you don't do it on an equal basis! Women have made great strides in being able to choose what ca-
reer they wanted instead of what was "appropriate"

## It's up to consumers to protect themselves from unwanted phone services

Remember when you didn't even really need to check your phone bill to see if it was correct? Well, those times are gone with the intense competition within the telemarketing business of today's high-tech world. use. Please read the following and perhaps it will help you avoid what I went through.
Recently I had a charge for "Voice Mail Services" appear on one of our phones for the newspaper. The services. The service had nothing to do with the phone company my service is with. I called the toll free
ser number on my bill and learned that a teenager who occasionally answers the phone for her mother had spoken with the telemarketing company. She was asked "do you understand how this card works" and
she said yes. That was all it took for voice mail charges of about $\$ 20$ per month to show up on our bill...at location. the was hilly l , location without the capability to use voice mail! And, Mearned that anyone can sign you up for these
services whether you want them or not! After doing so you can cancel them, but it is very difficult to get those charges removed and many people just go ahead and pay them instead of going through the major efforts to recover their money.
t has been a big hassle to get the service cancelled and the charges removed, and it has taken many letter to the Public Utility Company, the phone company, the people selling the service, etc. to accomplish this.
pon speaking with other people 1 have discovered a number of others have gone through the same thing. Idiscovered that sometimes people thought the were agreeing to a free psychic reading instead of signing
 gainst this kind of thing, as well as long distance phone companies constantly coming up with new (and iften devious) ways to get you to changeyour long distance services. equently agree to a 30 day free trial without realizing that if THEY don't call and cancel the service after 30 days it automatically continues and you will be billed for the services. are often being worse than rude!
3. Check your telephone bill carefully. Always look at every page. The charges for all kinds of service assisting me with removing charges. record of everything you do and are told and on what date.
