I regret not managing to control my temper better, and I regret some pretty harsh words I may have said over the years.

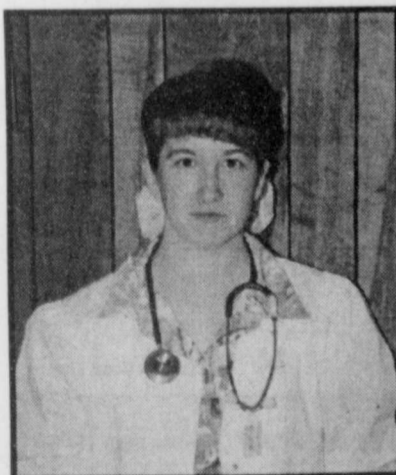
I regret that I have occasionally failed a friend through insensitivity, or hurt someone for the same reason.

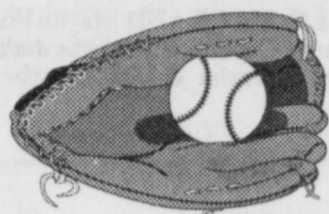

Thirteen year old studies in Europe

Can you imagine getting up at 6 a.m. to study in the summer? Summertime is usually time for vacation, relaxation or even a summer job, but most kids don't think about school or history or learning during those months. Thirteen year old Matt Morton of Deport is one of the teenagers that did, though.

This past summer Matt was one of forty area teens who took part in a European Interlude, the first phase of a Cultural Heritage Alliance Program. Matt spent 17 days abroad and toured several countries, including England, France, Germany, Austria, Italy and Monaco.

"I was the youngest on the tour, but I thought that was good because I got to see a lot of things that I'll be studying in school," Matt says.

The whirlwind trip began with the eight hour plane ride to London and included several bus trips, ferry boat rides, tunnels and "the tube". London, Matt says, "was cool, because it's such a big place. Everywhere you look there are flowers and landscapes, just like the movies". While waiting to view the inspection of the guard and the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace, the group spotted the arrival of Princess Anne.

"We were all taking pictures and videos of her. She had on this huge hat and gloves and the whole crowd was cheering. Our guide said that was a pretty unusual sight to get to see royalty".

Some of the different foods Matt will tell about after his return include tuna and corn combo pizza at a Domino's Pizza in London, along with a Royale with cheese at a McDonalds.

"The pizza was gross, but it was the number one best seller there" he will say in amazement!

Fond memories keep Matt flashing back to Italy. "The pasta was excellent and the portions were generous. After the small amounts of food in France, I was glad to get to Italy". Other dining experiences included flan, creme brulee, and rose ice cream.

"We visited a famous ice cream shop in Rome where the European movie stars go and the ice cream tasted and smelled like roses" a fascinated thirteen year says.

Matt also reports that seeing the Eiffel Tower in Paris was a treat and he never thought of it as being so big.

He and his mom went all the way to the top where Matt had his picture taken with Miss Spain (she was also on a tour).

When asked about his favorite country Matt had positive comments about each one.

"I really liked the German people and their food was best. They liked Americans and really got a kick out of us Texans, but my favorite place overall was Italy."

Three days in Rome allowed Matt to view such sights as the church of St. Peter in Chains, Trevi fountains,

the tomb of the unknown soldier, the Roman forum, the pantheon and the colosseum.

Sunflower fields and grape orchards covered the countryside as the tour group passed through the Tuscany Valley where famous Italian wines and cheeses are made.

"The land and hills were manicured like garden" Matt said "and all different kinds of animals graze in the pastures together". About halfway through the trip in Italy is where the group began seeing castles and fortresses. The young teen said there were so many that the tour guide, who was Italian and spoke six other languages, could not name them all".

"All that stuff has been there forever, I mean, the Romans were a great civilization. They had aqueducts for running water before modern times. It was all pretty amazing".

Michaelangelos David, the leaning tower of Pisa, the Italian Alps, Arc d'Triomphe, Olympic Village in Insbrook, Palace of Versailles, Notre Dame, Motzarts birthplace and the Mediterranean were all memorable for the thirteen year old. He says something special happened each day of the tour.

"The last day before our trip home was a free day, so my mom and I parasailed over the Mediterranean. After 16 days of history, we decided to make the last one historic too!"

Chop broccoli, grapes and onions; fry bacon crisp and crumble. Add sunflower seeds and toss. Pour dressing over broccoli mixture. Toss well.

8 slices bacon
1/4 cup sliced green onions
1/4 cup green pepper cut into thin strips
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
3 cups cold cooked rice
2 tablespoons soy sauce
1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 beaten eggs

In 10-inch skillet over medium heat, fry bacon until crisp. Remove to paper towels to drain; crumble and set aside. Spoon off all but 2 tablespoons drippings. In bacon drippings, cook onions, green pepper and parsley until tender-

crisp. Stir in rice, soy and pepper. Heat through. Make a well in center of rice mixture. Pour beaten eggs into mixture and as eggs begin to set, stir lightly with fork so uncoked eggs flow to bottom. Cook until set, but still moist. Gently stir to mix all ingredients in skillet. Stir in reserved bacon.

1/2 cup flour
1 cup meal
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoon baking powder
2 tablespoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon garlic
1 egg
1 onion-chopped fine

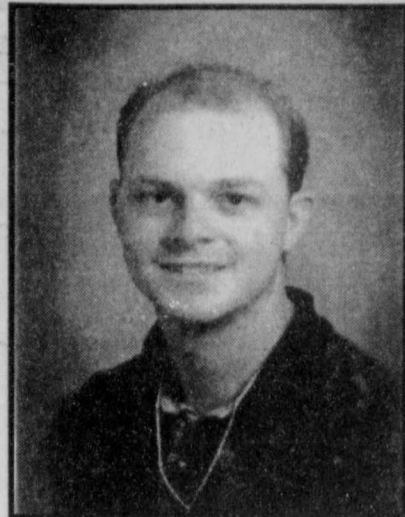

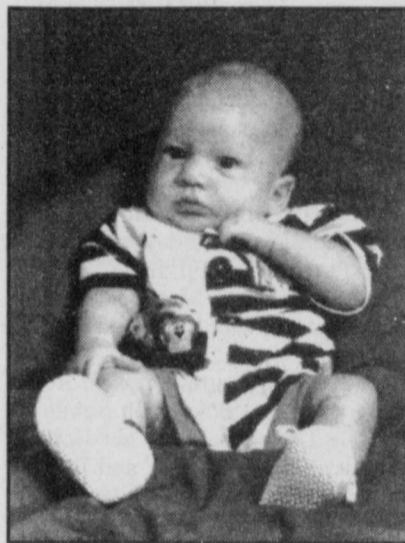


Brandon Oats

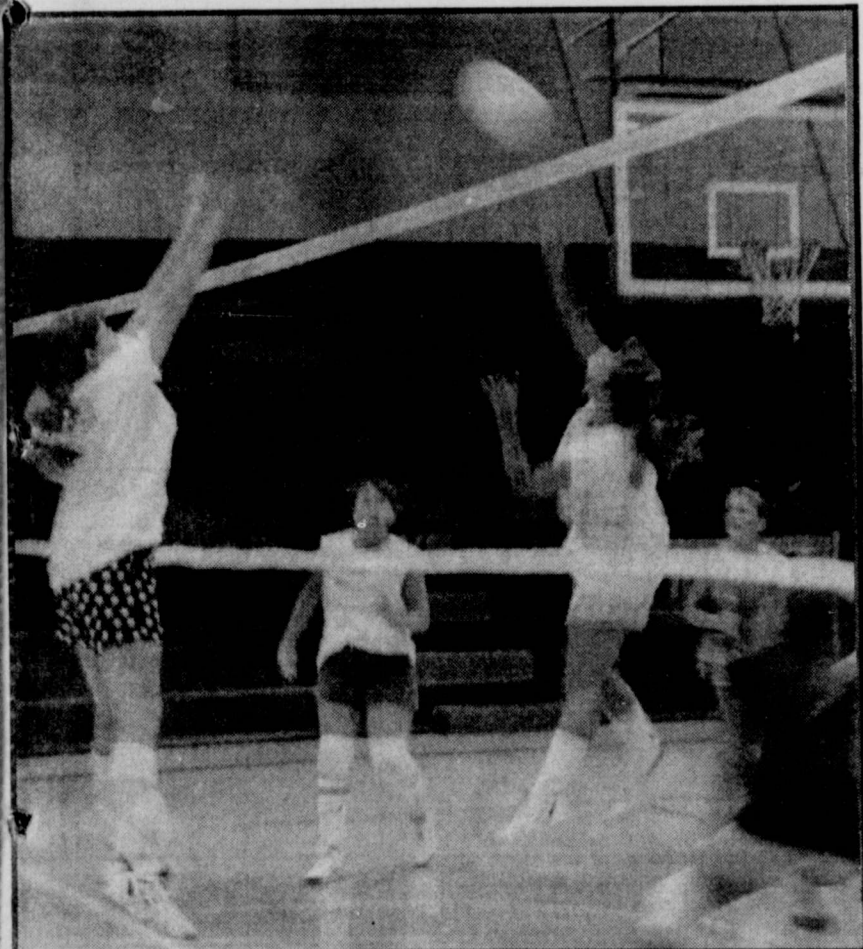

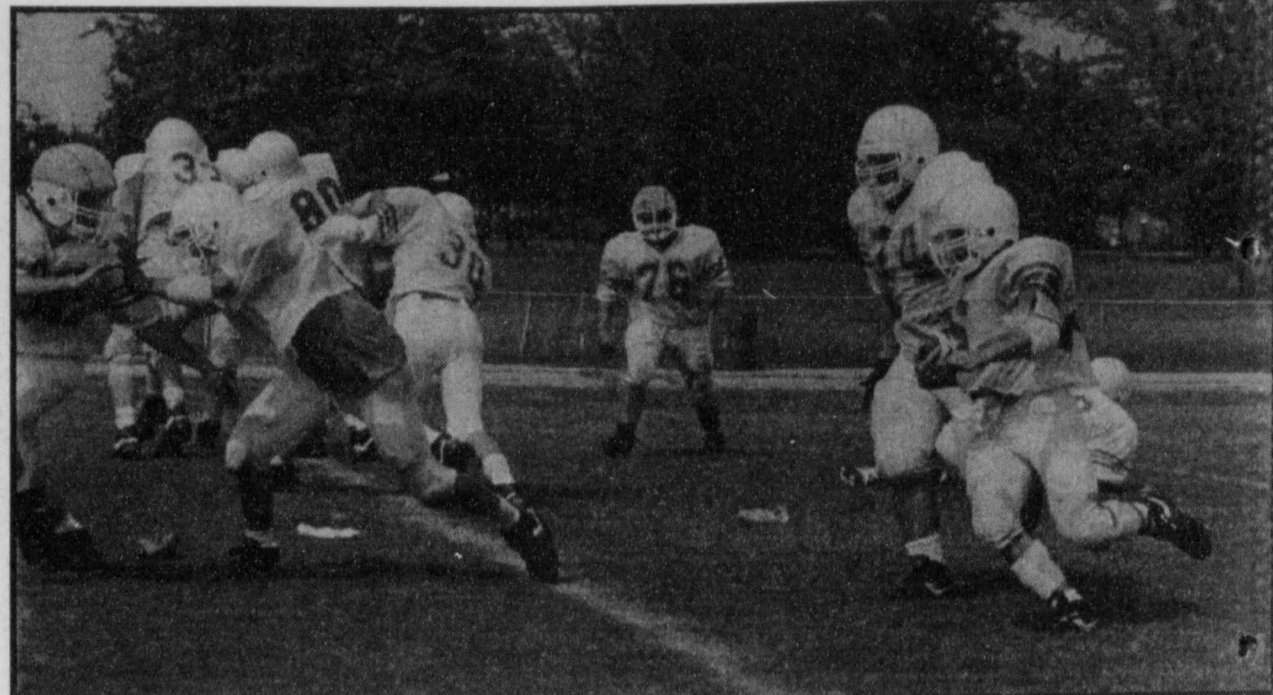
