But, there is a disturbing tendency to write this way. Young, just-out-of-journalism-school and-ready-to-save-the-world reporters tend to deal in this specialized jargon. This comes at a time when more and more people are saying they want things written in short, concise and easily understandable form.

Since confidence in television news is way, way down, why don't we all take the chance to write clearly and honestly, without pretense and without the "bull"? I have a feeling it would be like a breath of fresh air to many readers. You'll notice I didn't say it would "impact print media devotees like a zephyr of unpolluted ozone"? Get the picture? I hope some other people do, too!

## Deport Sewer testing to begin-smoke is harmless

Beginning on September 5, 1996, and through the month of September, employees from the City of Deport Water Department will be inspecting the Sanitary Sewer System of the city. An important part of their work will be the "Smoke Testing" of sewer lines to locate breaks and defects in the sewer system. The Smoke that you will see coming from vent stacks on homes or from holes in the ground is non-toxic, harmless, has no odor and creates no fire hazard.

The Smoke should not enter your home unless you have defective plumbing or dry drain traps. If you have seldom-used drains, please pour in water to fill the trap. If the harmless smoke does enter your home, please contact a member of the smoke testing crew, or call the City Hall Office at 652-3875, so that the testing can be halted. Please Note: If Smoke can enter your home, the potential also exists for the entrance of dangerous sewer gases and you should contact a Licensed Plumber to investigate this situation.

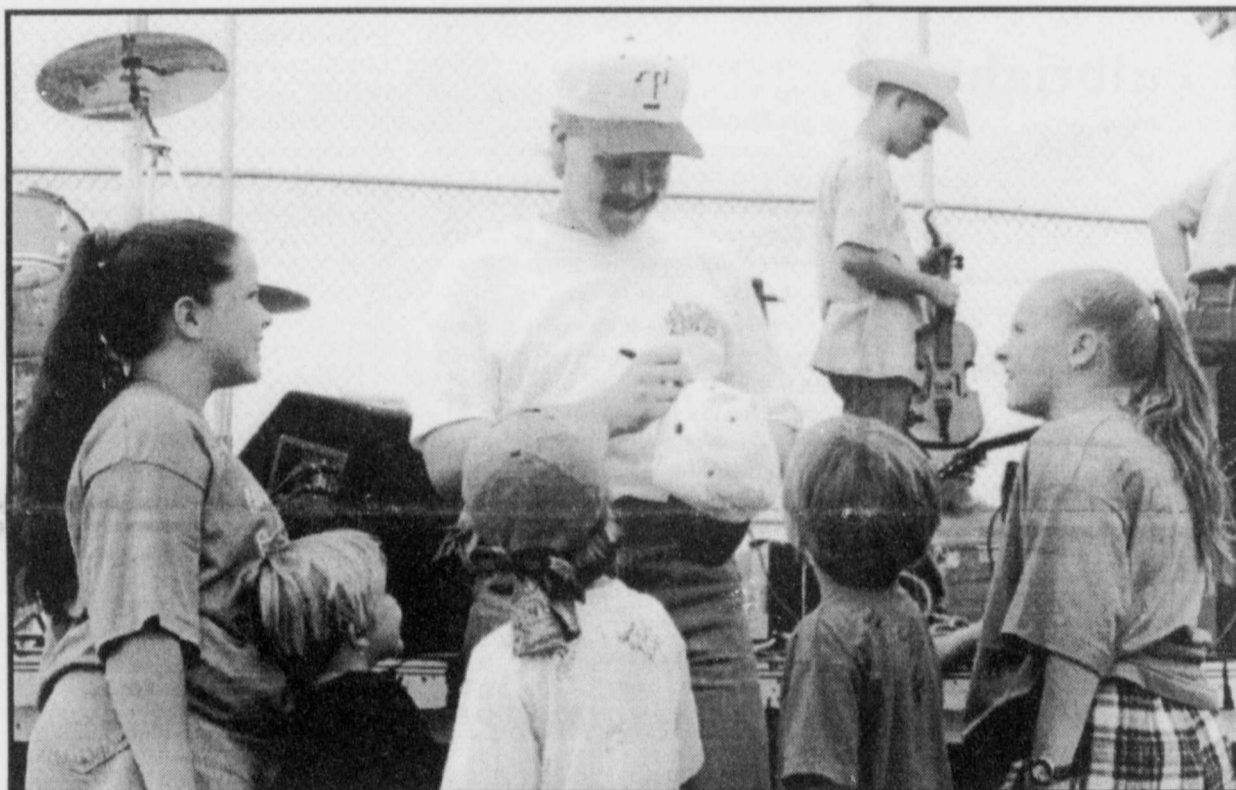
The inspection of the Sewer System will involve the opening and entering of sewer manholes that are located in the streets and in backyard easements. Please be advised that city employees may need to enter backyards to gain access to these manholes, but homeowners do not need to be at home and the workers will not need to enter your house.

Workers will photograph areas that are emitting smoke, which is indicative of defects in the sewer system; these photographs, along with other documents will be comprise the records that will be utilized if repairs are made at a later date. The information gained from this sanitary sewer system inspection will be used to improve your sewer service and the city appreciates your cooperation in this important study.

The sanitary sewer system inspection program will be conducted throughout the month of September. If you have questions or comments concerning this program, then please contact the water department at 652-3875.

**Irish Soda Bread**

4 cups sifted flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1-1/2 cup buttermilk  
2 eggs  
4 ounces margarine  
1/2 pound raisins

Mix dry ingredients; add soften butter, then raisins. Beat eggs separately and add milk. Pour over the rest of the ingredients a little at a time. Dust with flour and make into a loaf pan. Cook at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

**Banana Nut Bread**

3 cups flour  
2 cups sugar  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1 cup chopped nuts  
3 beaten eggs  
1-1/2 cup vegetable oil  
2 cups mashed bananas  
1-8 ounce can drained crushed pineapple  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine dry ingredients; stir in nuts and set aside. Combine remaining ingredients and dry mixture, stirring just until batter is moistened. Spoon batter into 2 greased and floured 9x5x3 inch loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes or until done. Cool 10 minutes before removing from pan.

**Plum Cake**

2 cups sugar  
2 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
3 eggs  
2 teaspoons red food coloring  
2 small jars baby food (Plum with Tapioca)

Mix dry ingredients together in a large bowl and all other ingredients mixing thoroughly. Bake at 350 degrees in a tube pan or 2 loaf pans.

**Glaze for Plum Cake**

1/2 teaspoon oleo  
2-1/2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 teaspoon red food coloring  
1 cup powdered sugar

Heat until sugar is dissolved and spread on warm cake.

**Mother's Caramel Drops**

3-3/4 cup granulated sugar  
1 bottle milk or 1/2 cup evaporated milk and water  
1/4 teaspoon salt/2 cup light cream  
2 tablespoons butter  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1-1/3 cups nuts

Boil 3 cups of sugar with milk and salt for 3 minutes; then add the cream. Meanwhile melt the remaining 3/4 cup sugar in a skillet until golden brown syrup. Add gradually to milk mixture while stirring. Cook at 238 degrees or until a little soft ball forms in cold water. Remove from the heat and drop in butter, but do not stir in. Let cool to 110 degrees or lukewarm. Add vanilla, then beat with electric beater until mixture loses its gloss. Stir in chopped nuts and spoon onto waxed paper. Makes 30 caramel drops.

**Sombrero Pie**

1/2 pound ground beef  
1/2 pound ground lean pork  
1 large sliced onion  
2-1/2 cups tomato juice  
1-10 ounce package frozen corn  
1-2 tablespoons chili powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper

cornmeal pastry (see below)

In a large skillet cook and stir meat and onion until meat is brown and onions are tender. Drain off fat. Stir in remaining ingredients except pastry. Heat to boiling, reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes. Heat oven to 400 degrees. Prepare pastry. Pour meat mixture into greased baking dish 11-1/2 x 7-1/2 x 1-1/2 inches. Cover with pastry; seal to edges of baking dish. Bake 30-35 minutes.

**Corneal Pastry**

1 cup Gold Medal flour  
1/4 cup corneal  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons cold water

Measure corneal, flour and salt into bowl. Cut in shortening thoroughly. Sprinkle in water, 1 tablespoon at a time, mixing until all flour is moistened. Gather into a ball; roll into rectangle, 12 x 8 inches on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Fold lengthwise in half and cut slits on folded edges.

**Krautwickel**

1 head cabbage  
1-1/2 pounds ground beef  
8-10 crackers  
1/2 cup chopped onions  
1 egg  
1/4 teaspoon caraway seeds  
salt and pepper to taste  
3 dashes tabasco sauce

Loosen 8-10 leaves from cabbage and cut one wedge of cabbage. Cook in boiling water about 5 minutes. Lift out carefully and let cool. Mix remaining ingredients; cut up wedge of cabbage and add to meat mixture. Form oblong rolls and wrap in cabbage leaves. Arrange in baking dish with folded sides down. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle a few caraway seeds on top. Add about 1/4 cup water and bake at 350 degrees about 40-45 minutes. Baste once or twice during baking. Serve with baked potatoes or potato salad.

**Poppy Seed Dressing**

2/3 cup vinegar  
1-1/2 cup sugar  
2 cups oil  
3 tablespoons poppy seed  
2 teaspoon dry mustard  
2 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoon lemon juice

Bring to a boil all ingredients, except poppy seeds. Remove from heat and add seeds. Let cool before serving. Can be served over fresh fruit.

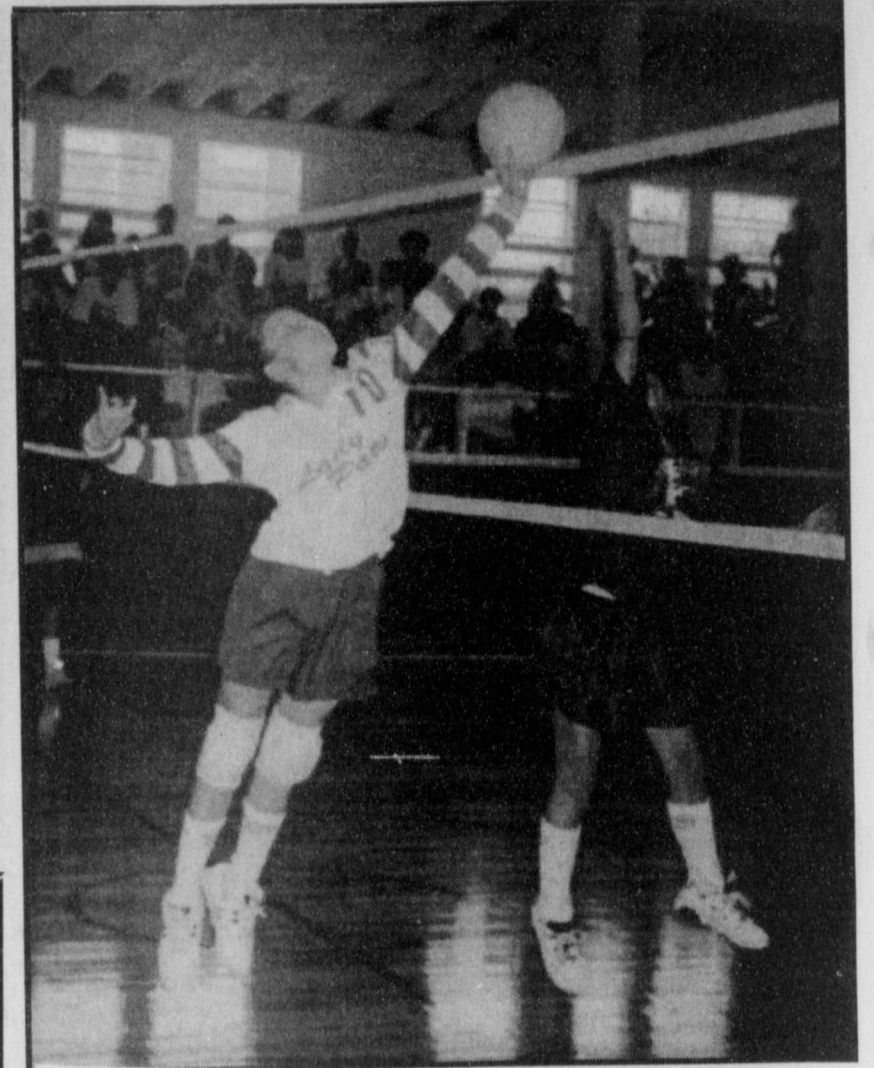
