If they hit the water head first they should make a nice dive. They sound like they belly flop, as loud a plop and as many ripples

as they stir up. I don't see a reason to enter the water feet first at all, but I can't prove they don't!

So, if any of you out there share my sense of curiosity, my sense of quest and need to know how a frog hits the water, just give me a call. I know it isn't important, but I'd really like to know!

She attended Paris Junior College and graduated from East Texas State University in 1971 with a bachelor's degree in English and in 1975 with a master's degree.



Needed improvements in state school funding formulas that would be beneficial to districts that have limited wealth were discussed and explained. The share-the-wealth system was explained as the only option for the

The system requires about 95 super wealthy districts to share some tax dollars with the other 900-plus school districts. I can remember lots of good times at the Topping home. It was always the same. Everybody was welcome and everybody belonged to them. I guess they helped raise at least two or


three or more classmates of each their four daughters.

I had no excuse, and as April had to be at the park at 4:30 in the morning, I figured since I had to get up, dress and drive her to the school to catch a shuttle to the park, I would just join her. I also wanted to make sure April would be treated humanely and I was feeling generous and good about helping out the schools.

See, the deal is that the three high school is Rockdale County would get 10% of the proceeds from the parking lot if they provided the volunteers and they had been having trouble getting people to work since most people work anyway and the ones who don't work may not have children in sports or band. I figured though, How hard can it be to show people where to park?? You see, I have a small mind and it thinks very small. I come from a small town, a small school and have a small family.

I just don't think big, big, BIG! Well, armed with the backpack, my most comfortable tennis shoes, regulation beige shorts a big T-shirt with EVENT PARKING written on the back, snacks, water, squeezebreeze water an, sunscreen, chapstick, money, extra socks, a straw hat fancied up with my Olympic pins, poncho, Kleenex, sunglasses, fanny pack and only 3 hours and 55 minutes of sleep April and I were on our way to the park. We felt like we were on an

adventure. We were carried to our respective parking lots on golf carts and it was very chilly. We were briefed on procedure. I was assigned to the handicapped lot and April to the upper handicapped lot. I could see April in the darkness and we flash SOS back and forth. I was feeling pretty cool in my hat, bright orange net vest, new shirt and my very cool vector flashlight. For the first hour we mostly stood around and played with the flashlights and tried to stay warm. The backpack started to get mighty heavy so I dumped it in the dirt along the fence. The sun was rising and I could see the parking field didn't have

a blade of grass nor a tree, it looked like a dirt desert. I still felt excited, like something important was going to transpire. I'm also figuring I'm pretty luck to be here in handicapped parking--how many people could be handicapped compared to the ones who weren't. I felt I would spend the day taking 30 minute breaks, eating, drinking Gatorade and waving to people who drove by. It would be fun, and we would see horses and there would be people from foreign countries and we could show them Southern hospitality

Why, we might even see movie stars! The cars started to trickle in, then to line up, then to gridlock and back up into Conyers, then to the other side of Conyers. The officials came and took away my flashlight and gave me an orange flag, then they stripped me of my orange vest and flag and told me I could be cashier now and someone under 18 could direct parking. I donned 2 Ace hardware aprons, was given a huge roll of tickets and green parking stickers and \$150 to make change. I had to take \$10 from everyone in a car, \$20 form RVs and \$30 from bigger buses and autohomes. OK, I still though it couldn't be hard. The math as easy, I had to tell them the price, make change quickly and give them tickets, the parking sticker and tell them to put on their rear-view mirror and had about 3 seconds to do so.

I had to wave 2 cars past me to the next cashiers, there were people who had their money out the window trying to give it to me all at once, and I was trying to keep from getting run over by the cars on my backside (including a huge RV with large, dangerous mirrors) and the cars kept trying to run over my toes. I had to keep screaming "blue" for handicapped parking "Red lot" for the VIPs who didn't have to pay, the ACOG officials who didn't pay, answer everyone's questions about when things started, how they broke their foot yesterday so could they park in the handicapped parking, how to get to an auto repair shop, if there was shopping in the park, where could they turn around and did they really have to pay, was there a discount for compact cars, if they could ride a horse, which was the quickest way to this or that, sorry, but they had nothing but a \$100 bill, where was the shuttle, could they ride the bus to downtown Atlanta from here? and more! One person took the ticket away from me and drove away without paying and the boss screamed at me. I finally said I was just a volunteer and didn't do this for a living and not to get snippy with me! Soon I was grabbing money from their hands, slapping the parking ticket in their palm and yelling "rear view mirror, please". I exhausted my right arm waving them through. Three vans tried to run over me because they were from a foreign country, didn't speak English and had no intention of paying anything. I figured I'm only a volunteer and I didn't intend to throw myself in front of the vehicle for \$10.

One guy ignored me and drove right by. April said a lady asked her which was the quickest way to the exit. April said just to follow the exit signs and the woman told her not to be a smartass. The boss kept popping his orange flag to speed people up, but the line of cars stretched for miles. The highway system was in a gridlock. There were around 10,000 cars and my aprons quickly filled with money. Every half hour we went into the mobile home where a guard emptied our pockets. I took in \$4000 myself and there were 13 of us working. We had no breaks except a porto-let and water break. At noon someone came around with flattened biscuits and bags of potato chip crushed into cereal and partially rotten fruit. The biscuits were actually BBQ sand-

Did I mention the heat? It was only 85 but the sun seemed to burn a hole in the top of my head and the humidity made us sweat. I had little sweat blisters on my back and my feet after 12 hours without sitting were terrible. The T-shirts wee new and good quality and thick and that made them hot. Everyone had put on lots of sunblock which made us giant dirt magnets. There was no way to ward off thirst and the cars just kept coming even after the vents were over! At 1 the horse park events were

over and I kind of had a plan to leave due to the exhaustion I felt, but I couldn't find April and couldn't leave her there alone. They proceeded to assign me to the orange parking lot where I directed traffic until 4. Hundreds of cars, all trying to crash into each other knew not which way to go. The lot had to place to sit except in the dirt, and I had to wait until someone provided water and make a port-o-let when the traffic died down. I spent 3 hours there in complete discomfort and loneliness, because I was the only one there. Others wee supposed to come, but ended up at other lots. At 3:30 p.m. I decided to quit. I personally had had enough. After all, I had been in the sun for nearly 11 hours and I wasn't getting a penny for it and if they wanted the darn shirt back, so be it! What could they do, fire me? Ha!!! I grabbed a ride with the closest golf cart driver and headed for the rendezvous tent and turned in my sticky, sweaty orange vest and sat down and dared anyone to say a word. was exhausted, hot, tired, made, hungry, thirsty tired and mad. I felt abused, I knew why they couldn't get volunteers, if they did, they worked them to death! I looked around and everyone else looked the same way. The poor kids were sunburned dirty and just pitiful. April looked awful was still remarkably cheerful. She slept for 19 hours, breaking her alltime record of 16 hours when she returned from swim camp. She said "I wouldn't have missed the experience but I won't be back". I agreed. I asked her seriously the next day if wanted to go to the horse park for some of the events and she said "Absolutely not, Mom" I always said she
