Storms cause damage throughout area

Heavy rain, hail, high winds and a tornado all came packaged in a huge storm front that swept through the area Friday night.

Storm spotters were put in place all across Lamar County as word of the big cloud was received.

Pattonville received damage to roofs and barns as golf ball size hail pounded the area. The hail was still golf ball size just north of Deport, but was marble sized in Deport. South of Deport it was minimal, fortunately for the cotton farmers in that area.

One tornado was confirmed in the cloud. It was spotted by Danny and Callie Gaddy at their home on 196 North of Pattonville. They suffered brick damage and broken windows, and the roof also lifted up so that the interior of the house received damage. The twister was seen by the Barrentine family between Pattonville and Deport as it came so close to the family's mobile home that it tore the roof off. They were fortunate, they reported, to have the last few rooms still under a roof, so that their family photos and personal belongings were safe. Trees were ripped up, and a large hay barn heavily damaged as the storm sucked the posts out of the ground when it ripped the roof off.

Hail continued to mete out severe damage to many roofs, broke windows and even beat the bark from trees. High winds also did damage even when there was no tornado.

In Deport two meteorologists from the University of Oklahoma were on hand taking videos and photos of the cloud as the greenish mass moved in. They reported that "there is definitely a tornado in the cloud, embedded in heavy rain". It apparently did not touch down in the Deport area, although the sirens were set of to make sure people sought shelter.

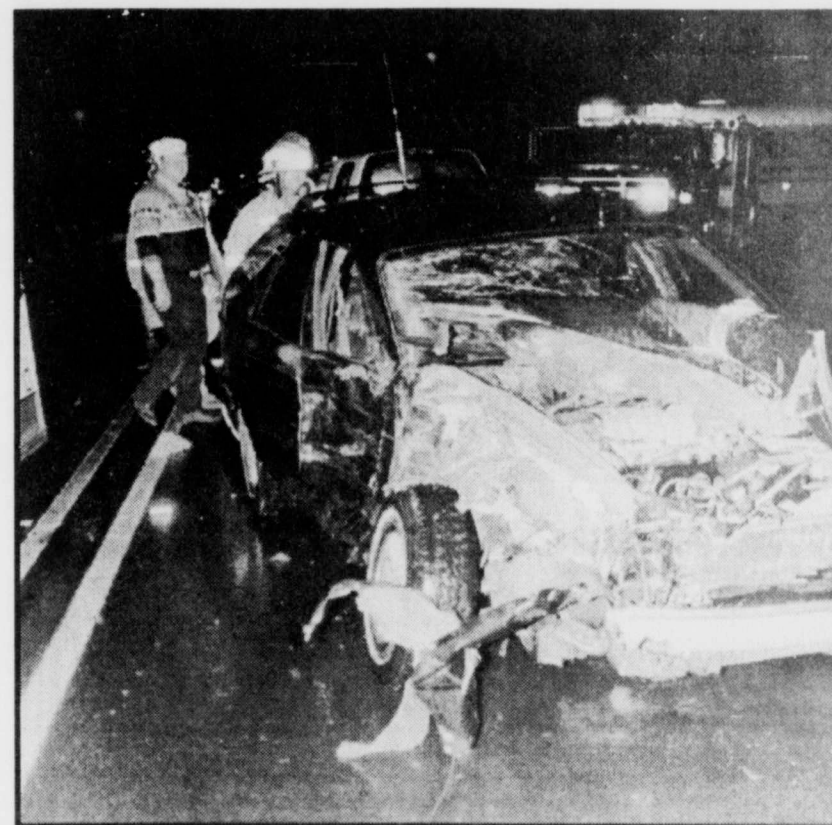
The cloud moved on into Red River County, with the tornado still formed but doing very little damage. High winds and heavy rains caused flooding, damage to trees and signs before the storm moved on eastward, diminishing slowly.

On Tuesday morning, September 24th, at about 3:00 a.m. another cloud slammed into the area, with an incredible display of lightning and more rain. The Barrentine family, who had felt fortunate that their personal belongings had mostly survived Friday night's twister, had more deluged as winds tore some of the tarps.

The first storm deposited an approximate 3 1/2 inches of rain while the second one added over 2 more inches, leaving the soil saturated.

Area farmers hoping to harvest their cotton crops are concerned with the rains, as are those trying to make a last hay cutting.

The forecast for the rest of the week calls for "more of the same", but most people are hoping for less wind, less rain and certainly no more tornados or hail!

Country Cooking

As the cooler weather sets in, most folks will be heating up the ovens and doing some type of baking. Also, as the holidays approach, now is a good time to start thinking about doing some bake-ahead baking and storing it in the freezer.

Most all pies and cakes freeze well and can be kept for several weeks in advance. Freezing is also great when unexpected company drops in and you can take something from the freezer and thaw.

We are featuring pies, cakes and cookies that can be frozen and thawed out in a short time. The

Monster Cookies can be baked ahead of time or frozen, ready to bake as well as the Oatmeal Peanut Snap Cookies. The Lemon Pound Cake is wonderful and so is the Pecan Cake and either will freeze well. The Frozen Fruit Pies can be used with a variety of fruit and freezes individually for fried pies and the Little Pecan Pies may not last long enough to be frozen!

Also, do you have a cook to recommend and does anyone have a Key Lime Pie recipe? Thanks and we will see you in the kitchen?!

September 26, 1996

Monster Cookies
1 cup packed brown sugar
3/4 cup butter-flavored Crisco
1/4 cup water
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 cups uncooked oats
1 cup flour
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup M & M's
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Heat oven to 350 degrees. In large mixing bowl combine sugar, shortening, water, egg and vanilla. Beat at medium speed of electric mixer until well blended. Add oats, flour, salt and baking soda. Beat at low speed until soft dough forms. Stir in candy and nuts. Drop by large spoonful 4 inches apart onto greased cookie sheet. Flatten with back of wooden spoon. Bake for 18-20 minutes or until golden brown.

Oatmeal Peanut Snap
1 cup granulated sugar
1 cup packed brown sugar
3/4 cup butter-flavored Crisco
2 eggs
2-1/4 cup flour
2 cups crisp oatmeal flakes with raisins
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup chopped salted peanuts

In large mixing bowl, combine sugars and butter. Beat at medium speed of electric mixer until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition. Add flour, oatmeal flakes, baking powder and baking soda. Beat at low speed until soft dough forms. Stir in peanuts. Cover with plastic wrap and chill if baking. Bake at 375 degrees after shaping into 1 inch balls.

Lemon Pound Cake
2-1/2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
2-1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 cup milk
1 cup butter-flavored Crisco
2-1/2 teaspoons lemon flavoring.

Mix all ingredients well and the secret of this cake is beating for 15 minutes for the extra fluffiness. Bake at 325 for 1 hours.

Pecan Cake
2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup butter-flavored Crisco
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup sour cream
1 cup chopped pecans
powdered sugar

Sift together dry ingredients. Cream butter until fluffy. Gradually beat in sugar. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in vanilla. In thirds, blend in flour mixture and sour cream, mixing just until smooth. Fold in pecans. Turn batter into greased and floured 9-inch tube pan. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for 1 hour. Before serving, sprinkle lightly with powdered sugar.

Frozen Fruit Pies
5 cups flour
1-1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon baking powder
1 cup butter-flavored Crisco
1 large can evaporated milk
2 slightly beaten eggs

Mix all dry ingredients, then cut in shortening with pastry blender. Add milk and eggs; mix well. Roll part of dough in circle or oblong about 1/8 inch thick. Cut in circles, with saucer for size. Put about 1/4 cup filling (any type of fruit) on 1/2 circle. Brush edges with wet pastry brush, fold over filling and seal with fork. Place pies on cookie sheet and freeze. After frozen, place in individual plastic bags for storage to be taken out as needed.

Little Pecan Pies
Pastry:
1-3 ounce package cream cheese
1 stick margarine
1 cup flour

Cut cream cheese and margarine into flour with pastry blender. Refrigerate 2 hours; then make into 24 balls. Press into mini-muffin tins and make a hole in center, forming tiny crust for pie. Fill crusts with filling.

Pecan Filling:
3/4 cup brown sugar
1 tablespoon butter
2 tablespoons Karo syrup
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 beaten egg
1 cup finely chopped pecans

In a saucepan, heat sugar, butter and syrup until butter is soft. Let cool and add vanilla, egg and pecans. Fill pastry shells. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

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

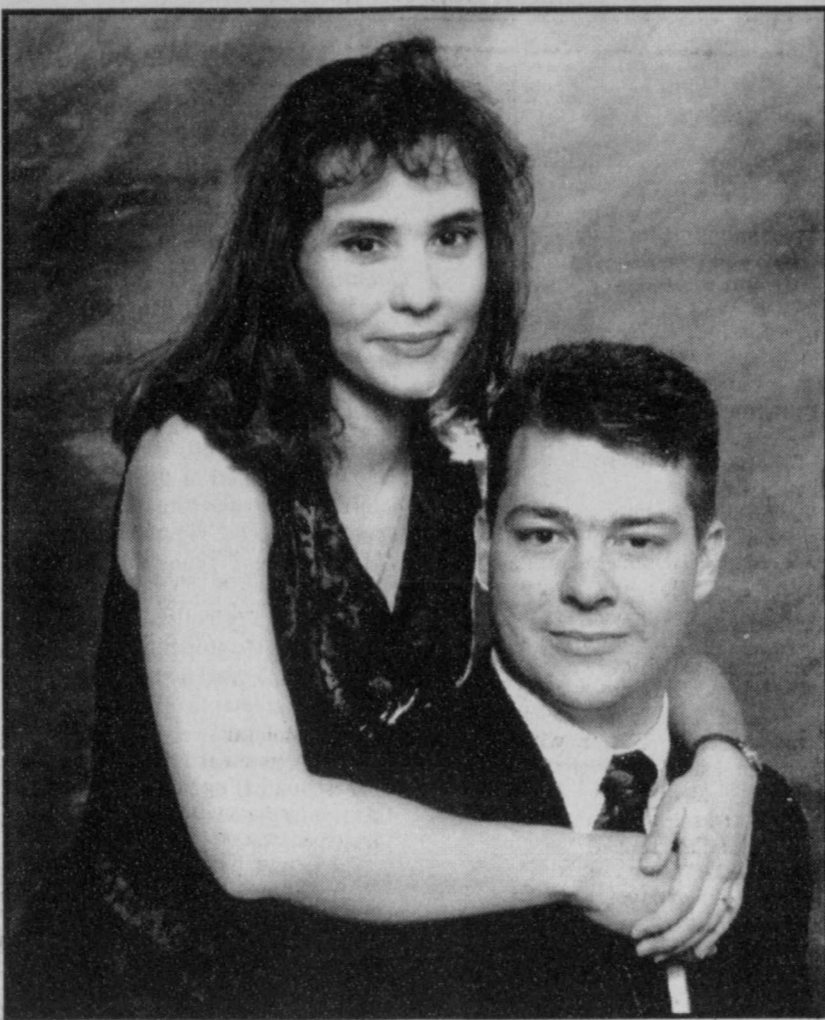
Attending the bride as matron of honor was Laurinda Stogsdill. Darrell Simpson, father of the groom, was best man.

They were also able to score one in the second with Ryan Gordon rounding the bases.

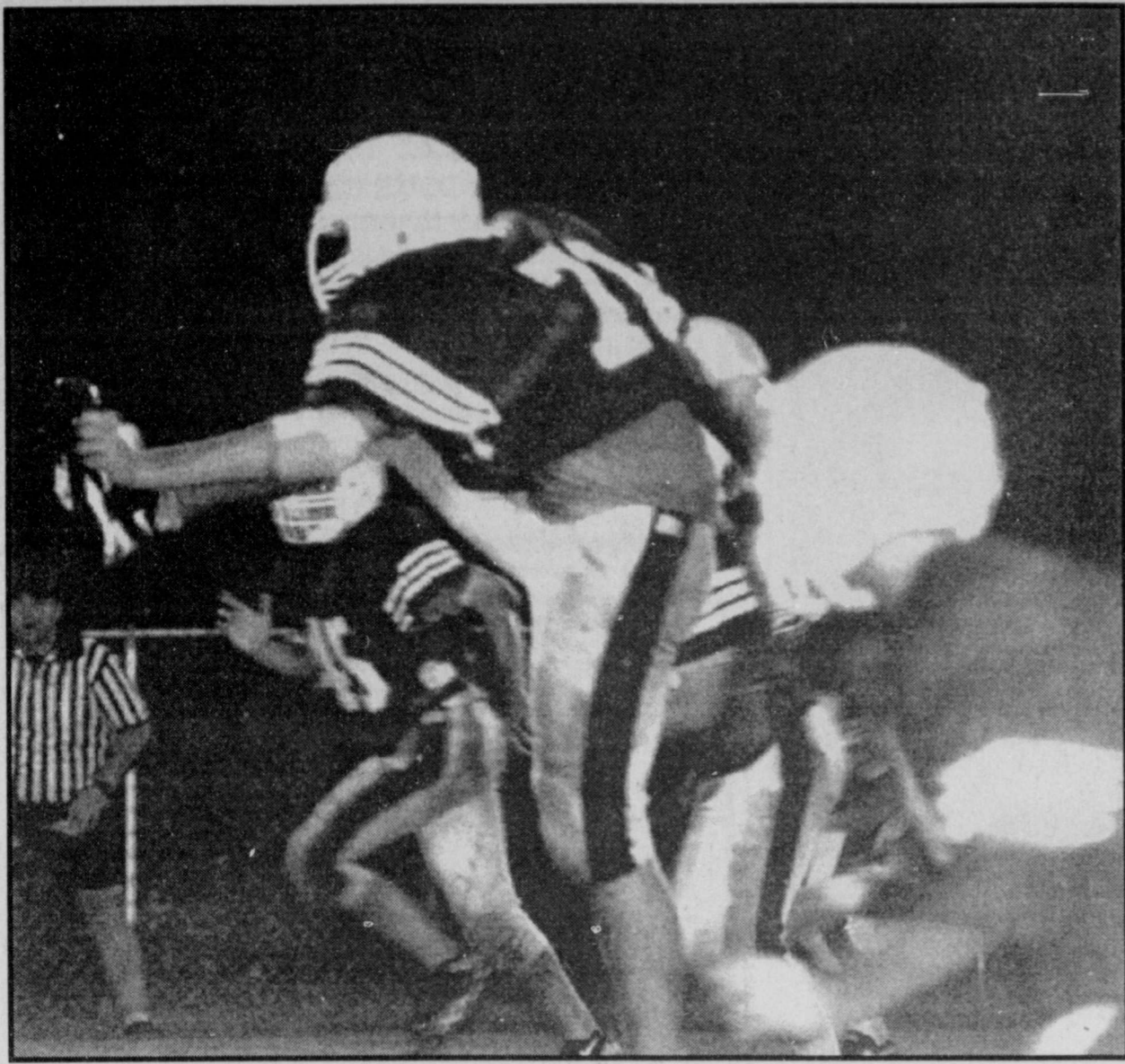
The Texans were able to score in the third inning making the score 4-5.

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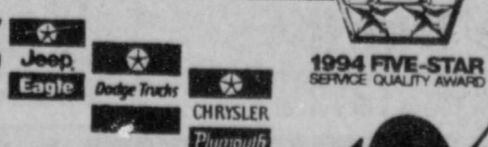

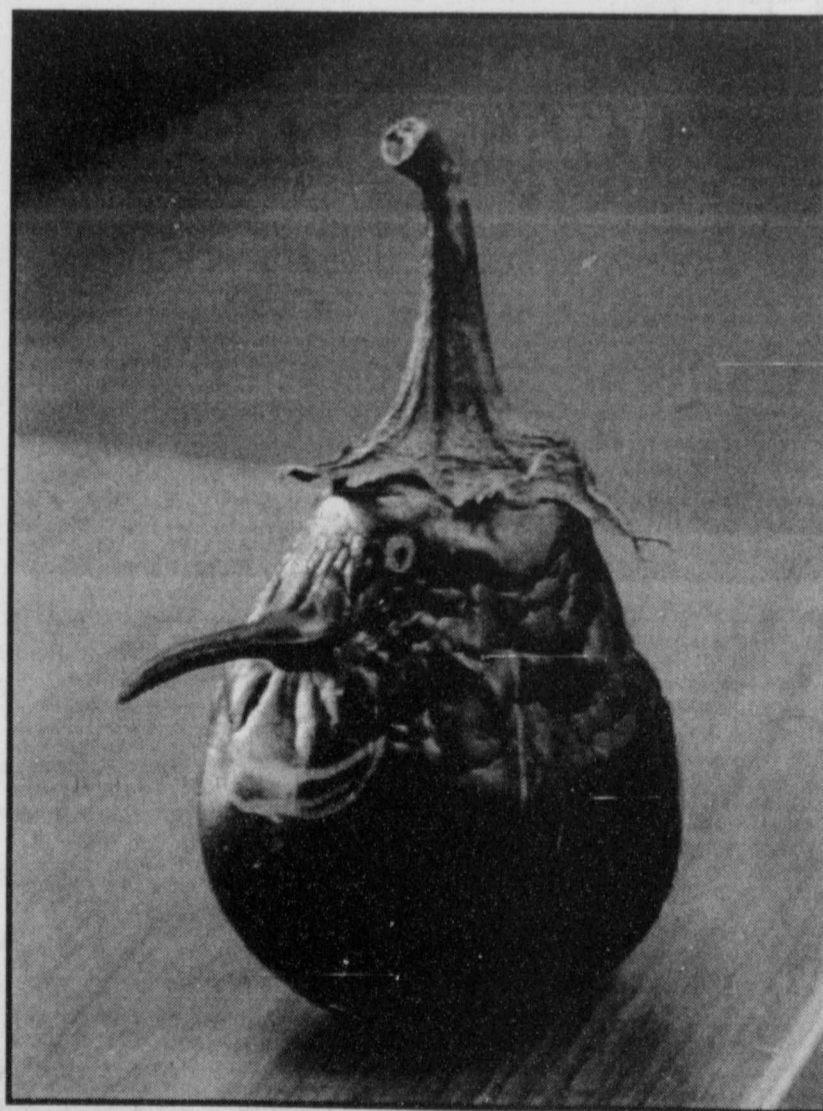

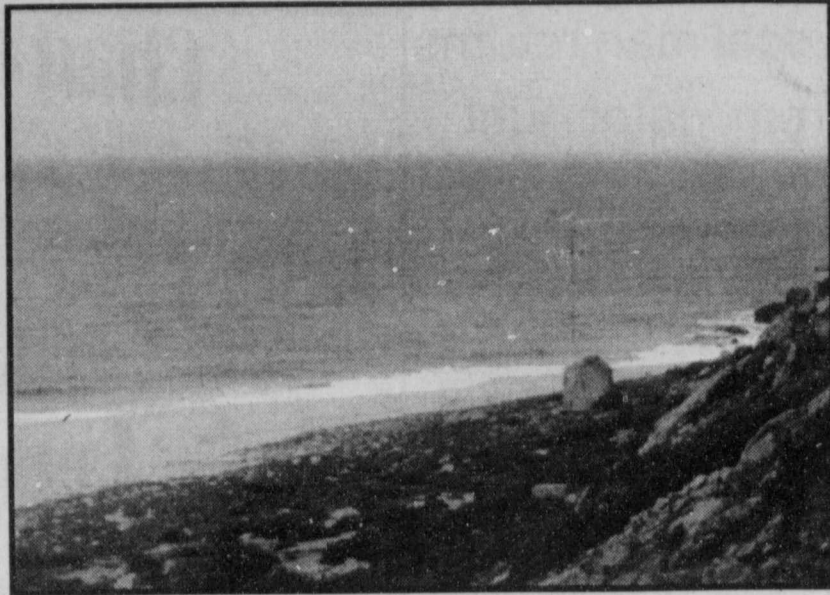

No fish, but quite a hurricane! Travelers get quite a vacation experience at Cabo San Lucas

When Marilyn Glover and Ruth Skaggs decided to go to Cabo San Lucas for some deep sea fishing they never thought that they would end up in the middle of a hurricane.

They flew down to Cabo San Jose and took the 50 kilometer drive to Cabo San Lucas on September 11, a Tuesday.

Their fishing trip was scheduled for that Thursday.

Without realizing how fortunate they were, they stayed at the oldest resort there, a family owned hotel called the Finnerstera. The resort sits on the top of a ridge that runs into the ocean. Twenty-five years ago when the resort was built there was no electricity or water, and they installed their own supplies.

They also were a little disappointed to discover that their room overlooked the marina side instead of the Pacific side, but didn't complain.

Tuesday they shopped around the city, generally admiring the tall palms, white buildings and luxury hotels.

The only news stations on television that were English speaking were from the east coast, and they were absorbed with hurricane Hortense.

By Wednesday, however, they knew that Fausto was headed right for them. They spent the day watching in fascination as the employees of the resort, long familiar with hurricane preparation, worked through the day.

They put masking tape across all the glass, removed everything from the pool area, stacked all loose items such as outdoor furniture in and underground area and stretched heavy rope along all the balconies.

Palm trees were lashed together, and even the chandeliers up under the

covered patio areas were roped against the ceiling beams.

That night the sliding door onto the balcony of the room snapped and popped as the wind steadily rose.

"The winds were predicted for about 130, but they tell us they only reached 105" Marilyn Glover says, "let me tell you, that's plenty ferocious".

Thursday morning, as the once calm, turquoise blue ocean turned to huge rolling breakers, and winds screamed, bending palm trees nearly double, everyone at the hotel were told to stay in their rooms and hotel staff would try to bring them a box lunch.

Sure enough, about an hour later they received a ham sandwich, soft drink and apple.

Later Marilyn decided to go check out the restaurant. When she rounded the corner onto the Pacific side of the hotel the wind whipped her glasses away and she had to grab the ropes with both hands. "It was incredible. I didn't realize just how sheltered we had been!" she says. She struggled up and discovered that there was seven inches of water in the restaurant, and the employees in the kitchen were trying to keep on making box lunches standing in water.

On her slow trip back to the hotel room, she met workers with brooms, mops and buckets, but didn't think much about it.

That night the storm abated, and it was the next day that Ruth and Marilyn discovered that the brooms and mops were for. On the Pacific side water had flooded, run down the walls and shot through sealed windows and doors of all the rooms. One young couple had their window blown

out, and ended up having to stuff the mattress into the window and use sheets and blankets to absorb water. They told Ruth they retreated into the bathroom to the tub. "We knew we were in trouble when our luggage started floating around" they said. Phone and tv service was out, but they still had electricity and water.

The next day was clear, and Marilyn and Ruth went into town to discover broken windows, trees blown over, and sand so deep in the streets that vehicles were bogging down. They found out then that there was no water or electricity anywhere except at their resort, because it was using its generator and water supply!

Obviously during all this, no fishing was possible. On Sunday they did go out, discovering that the ocean was black with silt from the storm and huge breakers were still rolling. When the boat was caught sideways to a swell and heeled over so sharply that they could touch the water they decided it was time to go in.

"We weren't going to catch anything in that muddy water anyway" Marilyn sighed.

The road to the airport was washed out, and rocks had to be piled into the gaps in the hard surfaced road before anyone could leave.

When they flew out it was uneventful. People from all over were waiting to get a room at their resort because there was still no water and electricity had only just been reestablished.

It's obvious Marilyn is regretful of all the deep sea fishing she missed.

"Well, I've always wanted to see a hurricane come in" Marilyn says, "But I sure could have seen one cheaper than the way we did!"

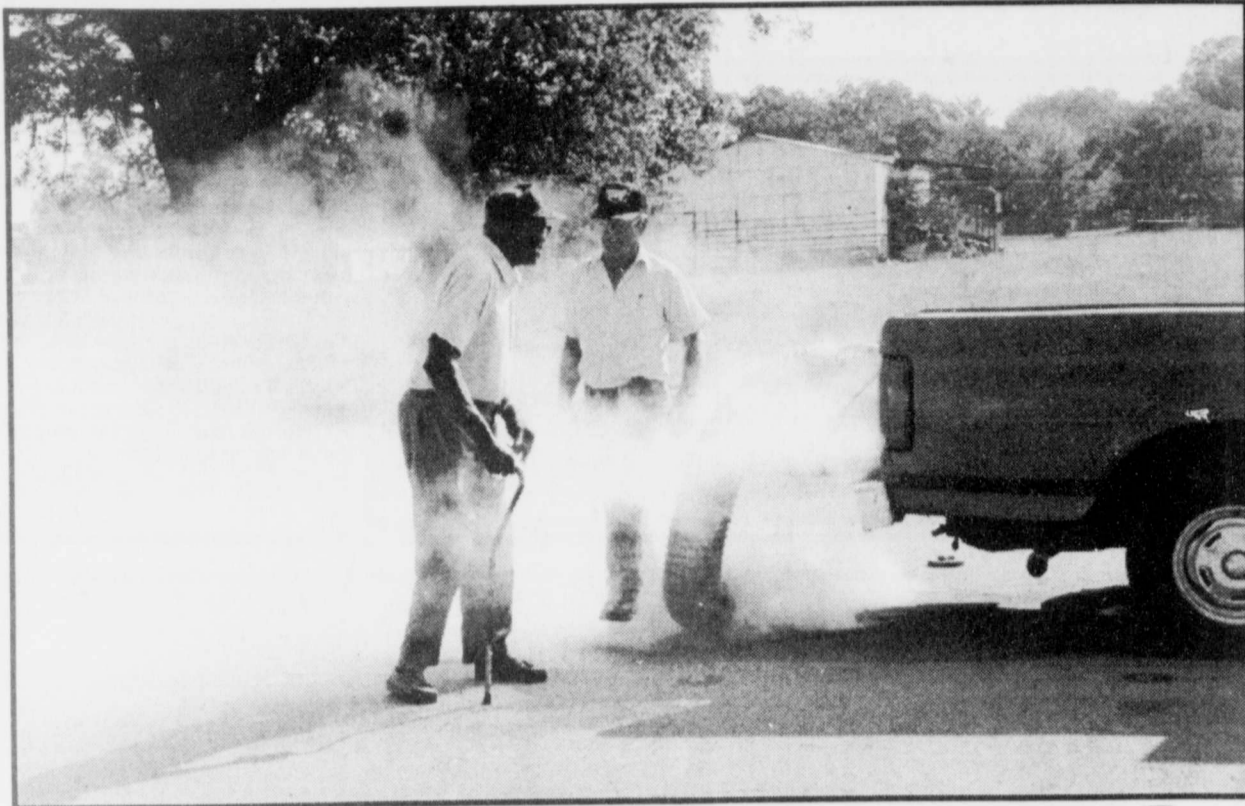
