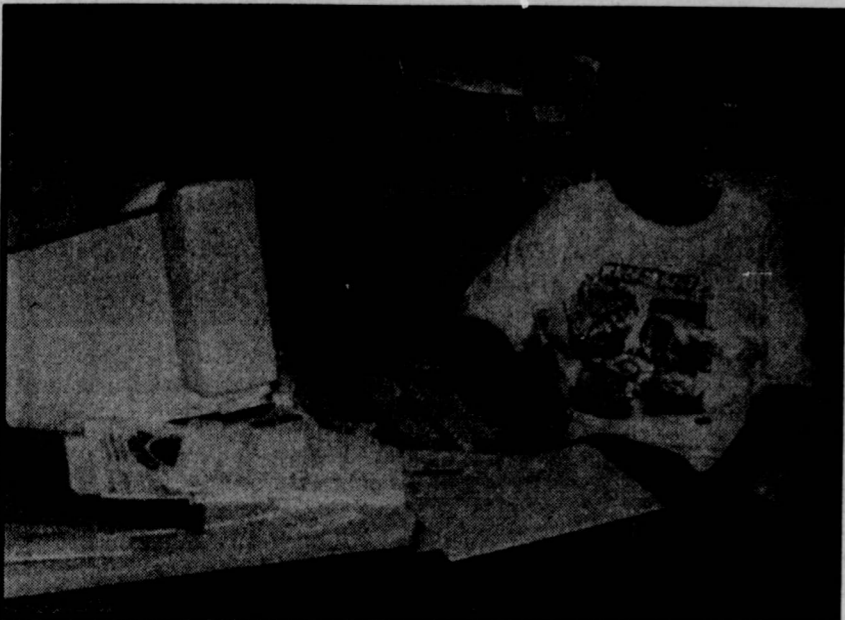

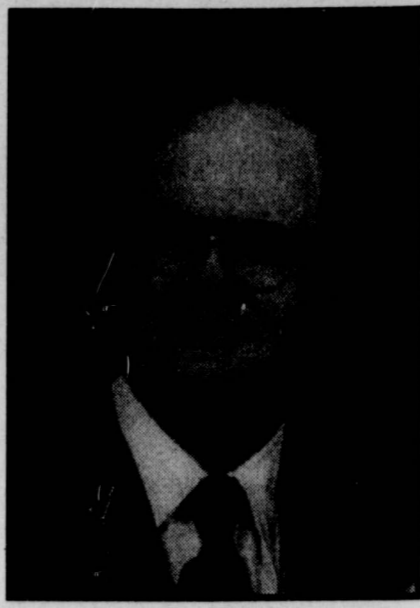

Chocolate Pie 1-1/2 cups sugar 2 heaping tablespoons flour 2-1/2 heaping tablespoons cocoa 3 egg yolks-slightly beaten 2 cups milk 1 teaspoon vanilla Mix sugar, flour and cocoa. Stir in yolks and milk. Cook over medium heat until thick. Add vanilla. Beat egg whites with 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar until peaks form. Add 2 tablespoon sugar and 2-3 drops vanilla to whites. Pour chocolate mixture into baked 9-inch pie shell. Brown to your preference in 350 degree oven.	One-Crust Raisin Pie 2/3 cup sugar 1 cup raisins 1/2 cup water pinch salt 3 tablespoon cornstarch 2 eggs-separated 1/2 cup cream 1-9 inch pie crust-baked Put 2/3 cup sugar, raisins and water on stove to boil. Mix cream, salt, cornstarch and egg yolks together and add to boiling mixture. Cook until thick. Pour into pie crust, add meringue and bake until brown. or top with whipped topping.
Coconut Cream Pie 3/4 cup sugar 2 tablespoon flour 3 egg yolks-slightly beaten 2 cups milk 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup coconut Mix sugar and flour. Add yolks and milk. Cook over medium heat until thick. Add vanilla and coconut. Beat egg whites with 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar until peaks form. Add 2 tablespoons sugar and 2-3 drops vanilla to whites. Pour cream mixture into baked 9-inch pie shell. Sprinkle coconut over whites and brown to your preference in 350 degree oven.	Sweet Potato Pie 2 cups cooked-mashed sweet potatoes 1/2 cup butter 2 egg yolks 1 cup packed brown sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon ginger 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 cup milk 2 egg whites 1/4 cup sugar Mix first 9 ingredients. Beat egg whites until foamy; add 1/4 cup sugar and beat until stiff. Fold into above mixture and pour into shell. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Then reduce to 350 degrees and bake for 30 more minutes.

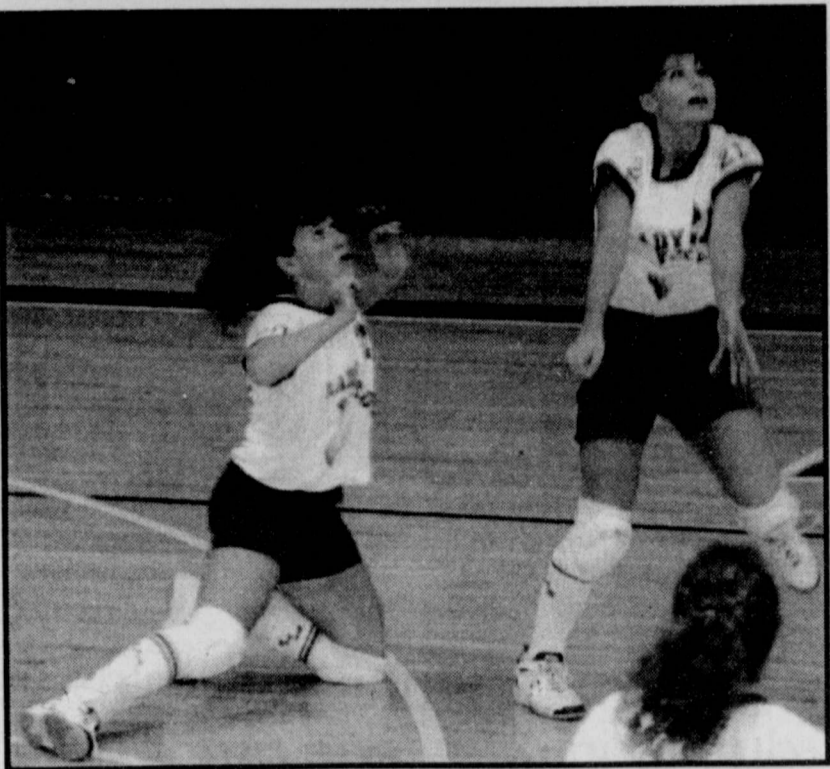

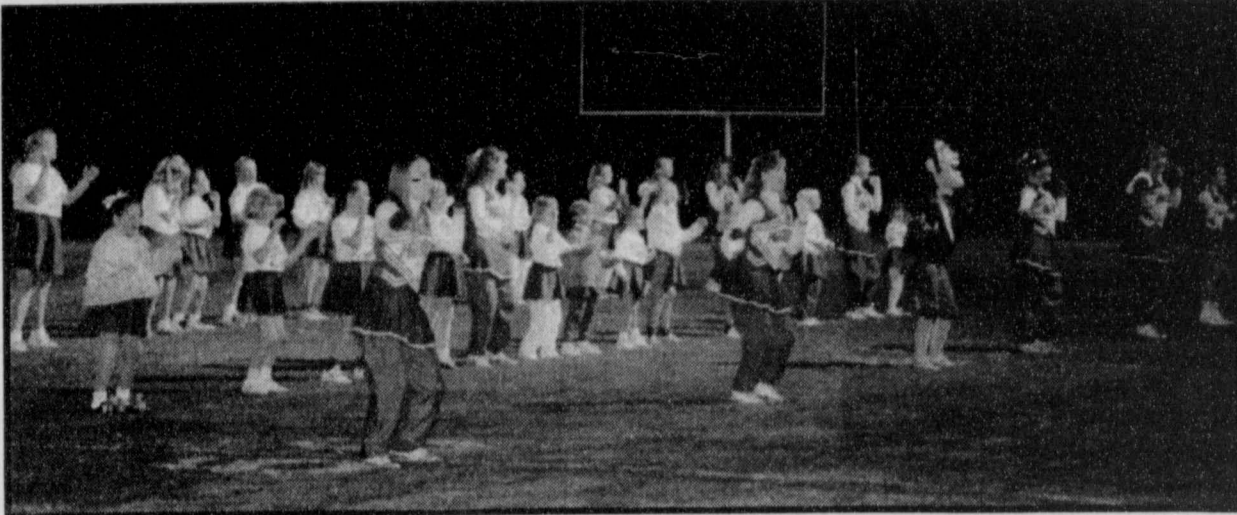

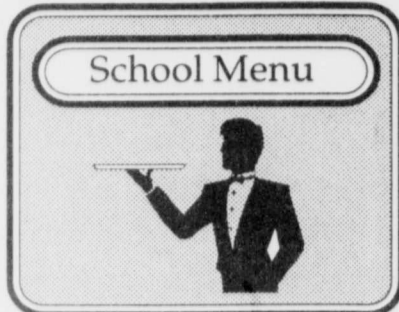

One of the goals of the society is a field trip to various locations especially the cemetery north of Clarksville maintained by the society.

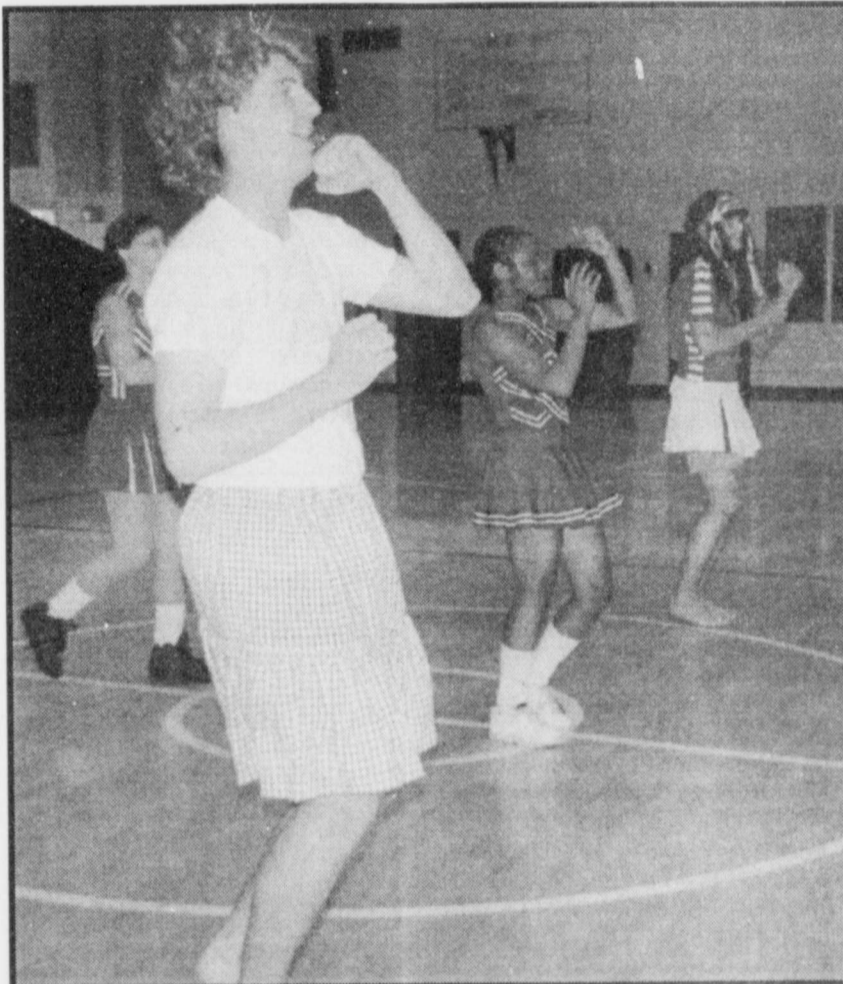
Of special interest to the public is the discussion of a weekly column in area newspapers on family research. This would be a question and answer column with questions sent in by individuals.

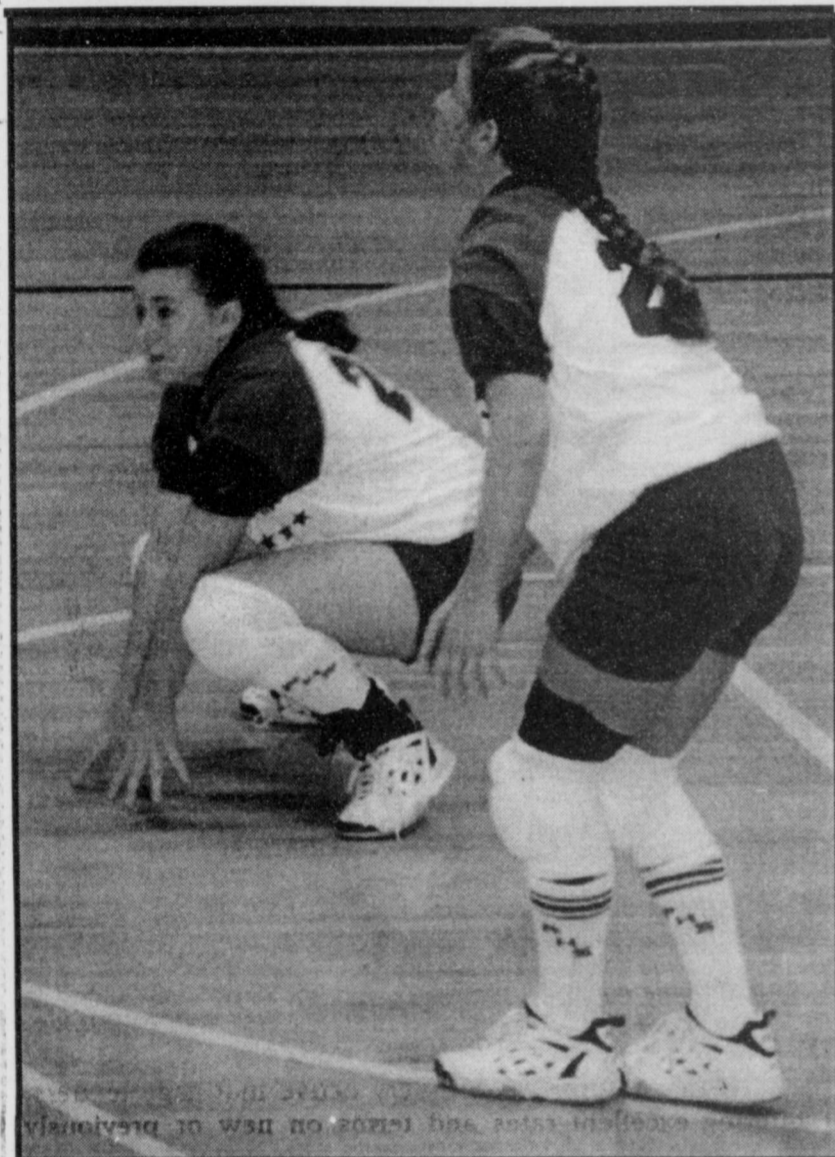

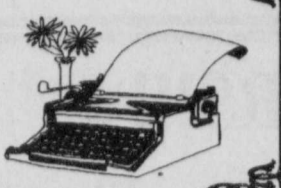

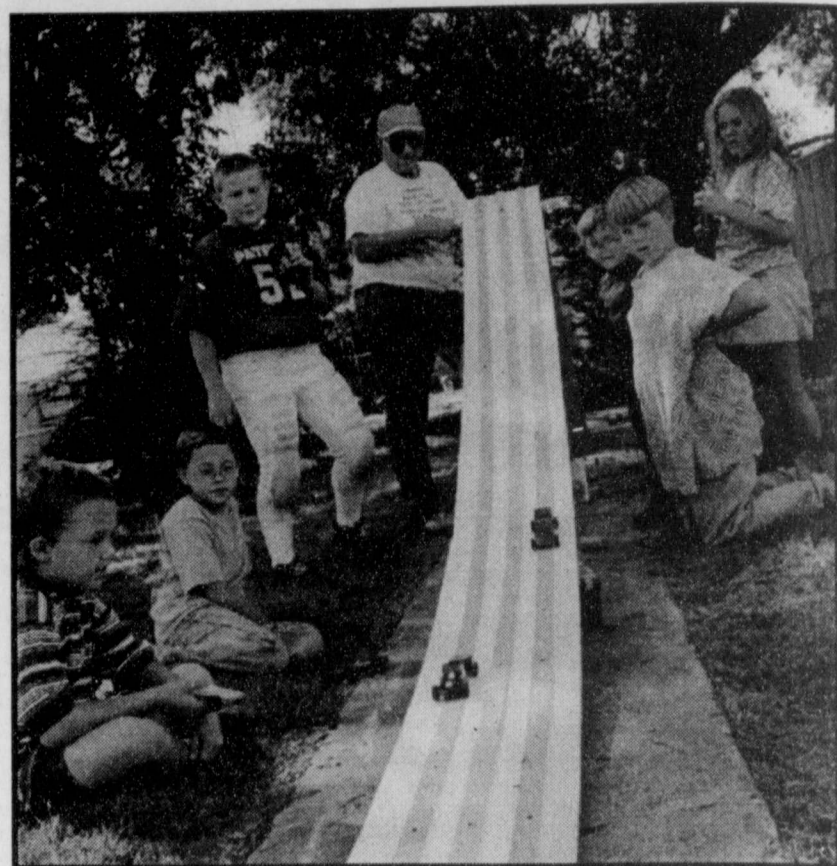

From The Pastor's Heart

And Let There Be Love
A Poem by David P. O'Neill called "What Do You Say to a Child When You Meet a Flower?" is the basis of my discussion. O'Neill begins with this advice to parents:

Parents, enjoy your children, be in joy with them, look into their eyes, be with them.

It is amazing what you see when you "look into" a child's eyes. Magical, mystical, always believing, purity and unconditional loves are only a few of the wonders found in a child's eyes. The joy of childhood can never be lost, if a person will merely enjoy children.

Parents that do not take the time to enjoy their children can not fully appreciate them. I do not mean merely "loving" your child, everyone loves their children (although with the sharp rise of child abuse I wonder about that), I mean to like them for who they are. Psalm 127:3 says, "Children are a gift from the Lord; they are a real blessing".

Have you ever considered how lucky we are to have children in our home? Our town? Our church? If you feel that children are truly a "gift" from God, take the third stanza of O'Neill's poem to heart.

Don't be afraid of loving them too much, of making mistakes with them, of being wrong, of apologizing.

Are you afraid of loving a child too much? Doesn't sound right, does it? How can you love a child too much? Some say that if you do, you will spoil the child. Okay, if spoiling the child is all to be worried about, go ahead. That is a character flaw that is easier to correct compared to a child that has turned "bad" because of low self-esteem and lack of love.

Personally, I do not think there are "bad" children, only discouraged children. There are "bad" things that children do but that does not define them as bad. This is the same attitude God has toward us as sinners, don't you see. God does not like the sin in our lives, but God loves us, the sinners. God wages war against sin, but not against us. God has only love for us, even in God's discipline we find love.

Love is discipline? How can this be? First we must identify that there is a tremendous difference between the love of discipline and the love of punishment. When the Bible speaks of discipline it is speaking of something different from what we identify as discipline. We punish our children and call it discipline. God does not. I know this confusing to you to understand but that is only because you have been trained that discipline means punishment.

The word "discipline" can in no proper form be translated into the word "punishment". The word comes from the root "disciple" that means student. A student does what? Learn from a teacher. So what do we teach our children when we punish them? We teach them not how to do better, but how to avoid being punished.

I could not teach you to play a piano by hitting you across the knuckles every time you hit a wrong key. So what does God mean by the command to discipline our children? That is what I hope to discuss next week. To be more responsive now, however, let me answer this way: God is the center of love. In everything God does for and to us is based on that love. Can we not do the same for children? The last stanza of the poem concludes:

Then your children Will love you And you will love them And love covers up our faults. I leave you with this question: Can your love cover the faults of your children?
