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





Fondant

2 cups granulated sugar -1/2 cups boiling water /8 teaspoon cream of tartar or 2 tablepoons light corn syrup

Butter sides of 1-1/2 quart saucepan. I it combine sugar, water and cream o tartar or corn syrup. Stir over medium heat til sugar dissolves and mixture boils Cook without stirring to soft-bal stage(238 degrees). Immediately pour onto platter. Do not scrape pan. Cool til fondant feels only slightly warm to touch about 30 minutes; do not move. Using

spatula or wooden spoon, scrape fondant from edge of platter toward center, then work till creamy and stiff. Knead till smooth and free from lumps. Wrap; place in covered container to ripen 24

To tint and flavor fondant: for vanilla fondant, knead in I tablespoon soft butter and I teaspoon vanilla. For pink peppermint fondant, knead in 10 drops of peppermint extract and 4 drops red food coloring. Shape and decorate.

Marzipan

Prepare 1 recipe Fondant to ripen 24 hours. Next day, warm fondant over hot water and work to smooth cream(about 2 minutes), adding a few drops of water is needed. Work in one 8-ounce can() cup) almond paste till smooth. Place in bowl, cover with damp cloth and let ripen several hours. Divide into parts; coloe with red, yellow or green food coloring and shape fruits. Dry fruits overnight on their sides on waxed paper. Next day, add blushes or sugar coating.

Leaves-Tint green and form tiny leaves and berry "hulls"

Pears-Tint yellow. Mold pear shape. using 2 teaspoons each. Add cloves for blossom ends and press on leaves. Next day, pat or brush on a pink blush, using red food coloring mixed with water.

Peaches-Tint orange. Mold balls using 1-1/2 teaspoon each. Flatten on both ends. Crease one side with knife. Add cloves at one end, leaves at another. Next day, add pink blush, using food

Apples-Tint green or red. Mold balls using 1-1/2 teaspoons each. Add cloves at one end, leaves at another. Next day add blush using red food coloring.

Bananas-Tint yellow. Mold bananas using 2 teaspoons each. Next day, tint ends green and streak with cocoa dissolved in equal amounts of water.

Strawberries-Tint red. Roll into balls using I teaspoon each. Spape point at one end and flatten the other. Add hull. Let dry overnight. Brush with cornsyrup and roll in red sugar. Dry thouroughly

National mammography debate not a Texas controversy

In January, national headlines reported a controversy over the effectiveness of mammography screenings for women in their 40s. The scientific debate may be scholarly and interesting among epidemiologists, clinicians, and federal bureaucrats. In the real world, however, women are dying because of breast cancer that went too long undetected. More lives are being put in danger due to women's indecision and fear about this most basic and necessary

early detection tool. The debate is at the national level. Here in Texas, however, there is no controversy. The Texas Cancer Council continues to recommend mammograms every two years for women in their 40s, a recommendation we believe helps save the lives o of Texas women. This is the recommendation of the American Cancer Society, which has been supported by numerous other medical and health organizations, including the American Medical Association, the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology and the American College of Radiology.

Radiology.

Texas physicians also are united in their support of mammography for women in their 40s. A 1996 survey of Texas physicians found that 75 percent of the respondents recommend mammography every one to two years for women in their 40s, and 8 percent recommend it annually. This survey was conducted by Baylor College of Medicine for the Physician Oncology Education Program of the Texas Medical Association and the Texas Cancer Council.

The national debate centers on the findings of a consensus panel of the National Institutes of Health. The

panel had a large body of evidence to consider in a short time span, and concluded that "The panel also raised questions about the possible risks of mammography. The panel's conclusions drew heated criticism. Many cancer specialists and health organizations believe the panel failed to consider adequately new data emerging from various international studies that demonstrate the effectiveness of mammography for women ages 40-49.


The national debate has left Texas women confused about this very important and personal health issue. All Texas women between the ages of 40-49 should not let the academic debate sway them from getting mammograms. Mammograms can detect breast abnormalities that might be cancer before symptoms occur. Early diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer greatly increases a woman's chances of survival. With 2,500 Texas women dying each year from breast cancer, we must do everything possible to seek early detection for ourselves, our mothers, sisters and friends.

The Texas Cancer Council encourages all women in their 40s to talk with their health care provider about the personal benefits they will receive from mammography. For more information, contact your local chapter American Cancer Society
