Just what is truth? Mowing gives me lots of time to think. As I trundle along, clipping down my five acres, my mind just spins and spins and spins. And if I have a problem, it fastens on to it and just keeps chewing and worrying about it the whole time.

Friday I began fretting about a conflict that has had me very upset. And nothing I could do would get it from my mind. I couldn't understand why there had to be problems over a difference of opinions. It bothered me a lot, I just couldn't come to grips with the idea that petty differences could affect working towards a common and worthy goal.

Then, later, I was talking with a close friend and we were discussing why people are so quick to anger over a difference of opinion. After all, no two people are ever going to share the same views of things, so why fight about it? Even though I hate conflict, I was involved in one...and really didn't understand why!

But, y friend pointed out that in psychology, there is a lot about how truth or fact is perceived. The concept is called 'phenomenology'

Think about this....there just isn't one truth. Everyone perceives a truth differently. We are unable to think about something except in the context of what forms us....each of us with different genes, different upbringing and morals, different mental processes, different financial situations, current situations. Every single factor affects how we see truth.

And, of course, that carries over into everything about our lives. How we react to any given situation is going to be directly dependent on how tired or rested we are, how our mental processes work, the standards we set for ourselves and others around us, absolutely everything is going to have a bearing on our reaction!

Well, it didn't solve my problem, and none of us are capable of seeing through the eyes of someone else...but it did make me more aware of why conflicts and differences, arguments and challenges arise!

I have to work on this concept a little bit. I have to try and remember and analyze why someone may react as they do...and most of all I have to analyze what things have made ME react in the manner that I did. I'm not immune to the pressures and stresses of life, and that means my reactions may be different on one day than they would be on another

It won't fix a thing...but it challenges me to use my mind in a new way instead of just continuing to worry and gnaw on a problem uselessly. And I hope that is progress.

A day in the Dales makes a great day

slowly head down to London.

My cousin Medora got up early and went for a walk in the Yorkshire Dales outside of Haworth. She met a pair of elderly sheep herders who chatted with her in their deep Yorkshire accents, and pointed the way to a beautiful walk.

In the meantime Thomas and I had been poking around the quaint town.

We met for breakfast and laughed

This featured the full British Breakfast of sausage, bacon, eggs, grilled tomato and mushrooms, toast, butter and jelly but also had fried bread, fried potatoes and an extra fried egg! We passed on that one, but then went to the Bronte parsonage museum and the church where the Bronte sister's father was pastor. It was easy to see how the characters and fells described in the book "Jane Eyre" came to be, for although the day was sunny, under the trees it was still damp and chill and almost gloomy. One could imagine the wind sweeping across the hills in bleak despair!

After visiting with several merchants and our host at the White Lion Inn we went out to find Phil applying the "Don't mess with Texas" bumper sticker to his van! Do you know how funny it was with Phil wearing a Tour De Paris tee shirt we had given him, with the Eiffel tower and a cowboy hat! I suspect his is the only van in Britain with a bumper sticker against

litter in Texas.

The day before we had inquired how far out of the way it was to go to Thirsk, the town that was the setting for the Herriott books. Phil had said it was quite a way out of the way, and Thomas had wistfully said to forget it then.

But, Phil had mapped out the route and said we would go. Those who have read the series of books will know that the author wrote as James Herriott and the town he was located in was called Darrowby. His real name was Wite, and the town is Thrisk. We had a lovely drive through the dales spotting more bright pheasant, gasping at vista after vista. We began to descend from there and came into Thirsk was larger than I envisioned it in the books, quite a busy and thriving town with a cobbled square and pretty clock.

We went down a street to the surgery, with it's bright red door. It is currently in use by veterinarians, but a project is in the works to convert it to a visitor's center and memorial to the beloved "James Heriott" whose books have been enjoyed round the world.

Thomas slipped around back to discover to his delight that the old garage, shed and yard is still just as it was in the books!

We bought a framed print of the street and it's red door, then headed onto the boring motorway for the rest of our journey to London. It was not something we were ready to do, because it meant that our trip was drawing to a close. All too soon it was going to be time to go home, and we

really weren't ready!

The motorway was very busy, with traffic heavy and a light rain falling. Phil made driving look easy, but it is bound to have been difficult, especially with the three chatterboxes he had to put up with asking questions all the time.

One thing we learned is that there is a rich person's hobby in Britain. Where as here in the states a vanity license plate doesn't cost much, they aren't specifically manufactured for people there, and when one occurs it is snapped up and can cost thousands of pounds. As an example, a Rolls Royce passed us with a license plate that had initials on it. This would have cost about 30,000 pounds! Talk about having lots of money!

It was fascinating to see trucks and vehicles from France, Poland, Germany and Spain driving by. To us these countries are all so far away, it's always an adjustment to think of them as only a few hours' drive.

We stayed at a motorway motel, a Travelodge. We discovered that motels are a lot more expensive there than they are here in the states. It was clean and fairly comfortable, however, and that was all that really mattered. We ate the first "fast food" we had eaten in a week, and discovered it wasn't any better for not having eaten any for a while. I was beginning to crave a good dose of Tex-Mex food, since British food isn't very


