Council of Professors of Educational Administration which will meet August 11-16 in Vail, Colorado, where Davis will speak.

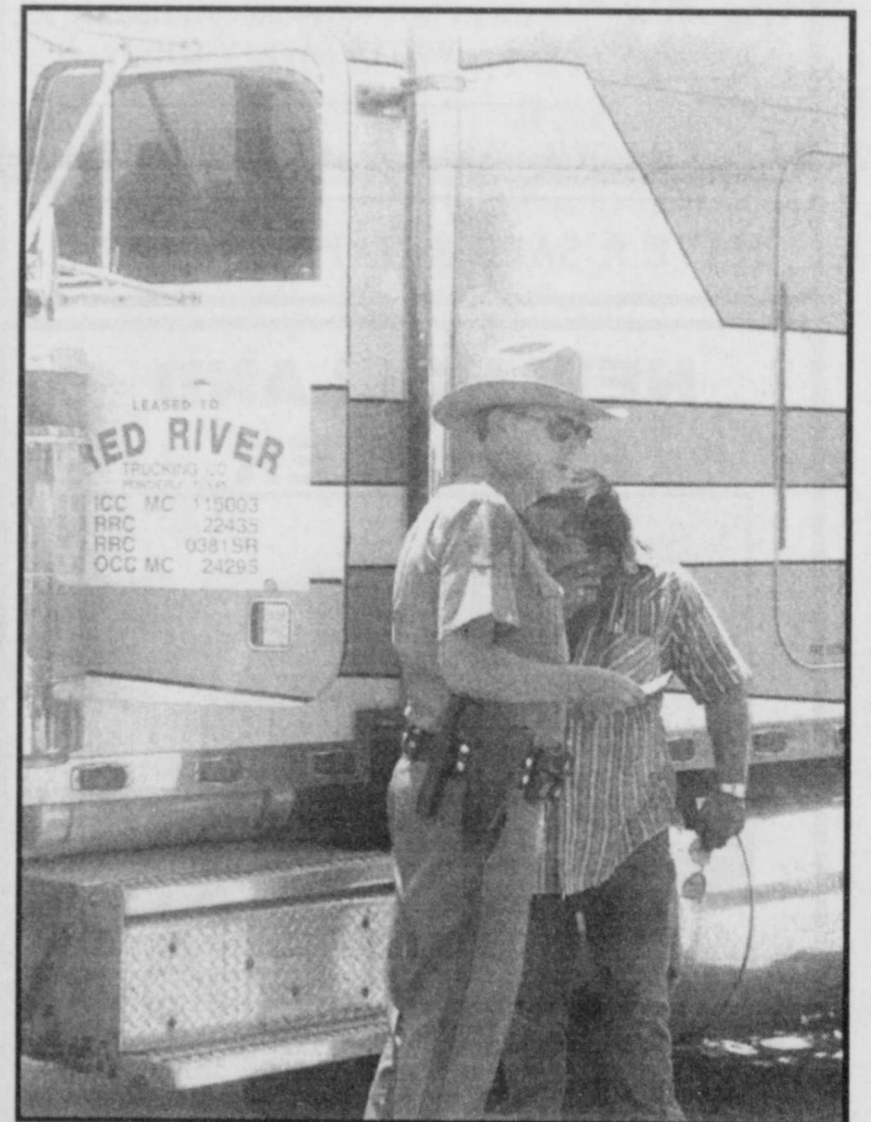

Davis is the son of Sonny and Juanita Davis of Deport.



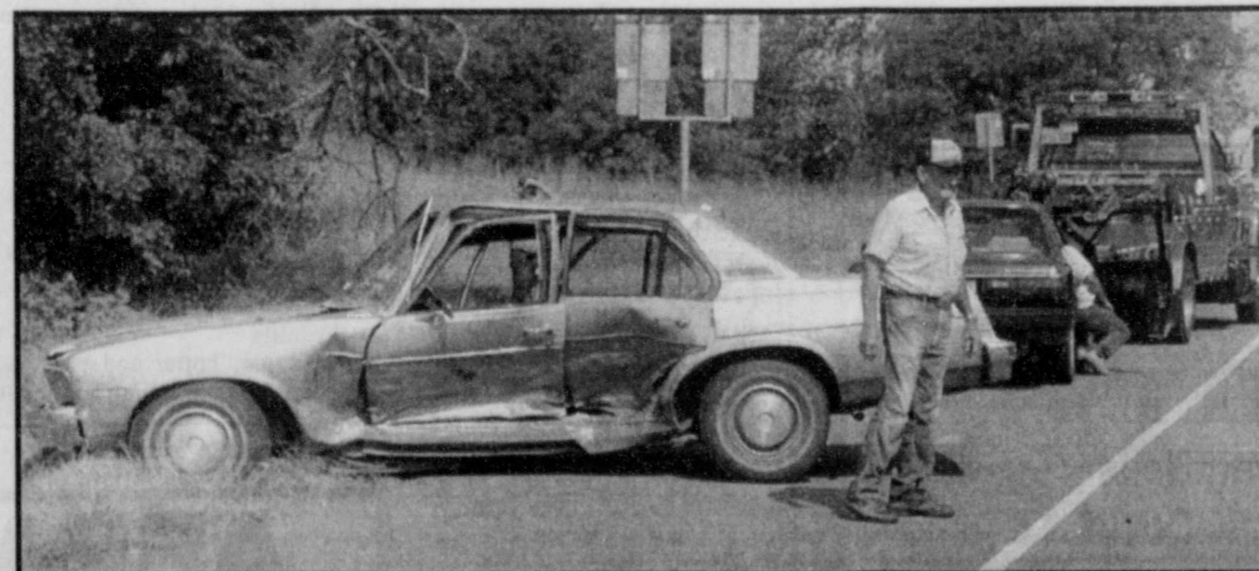

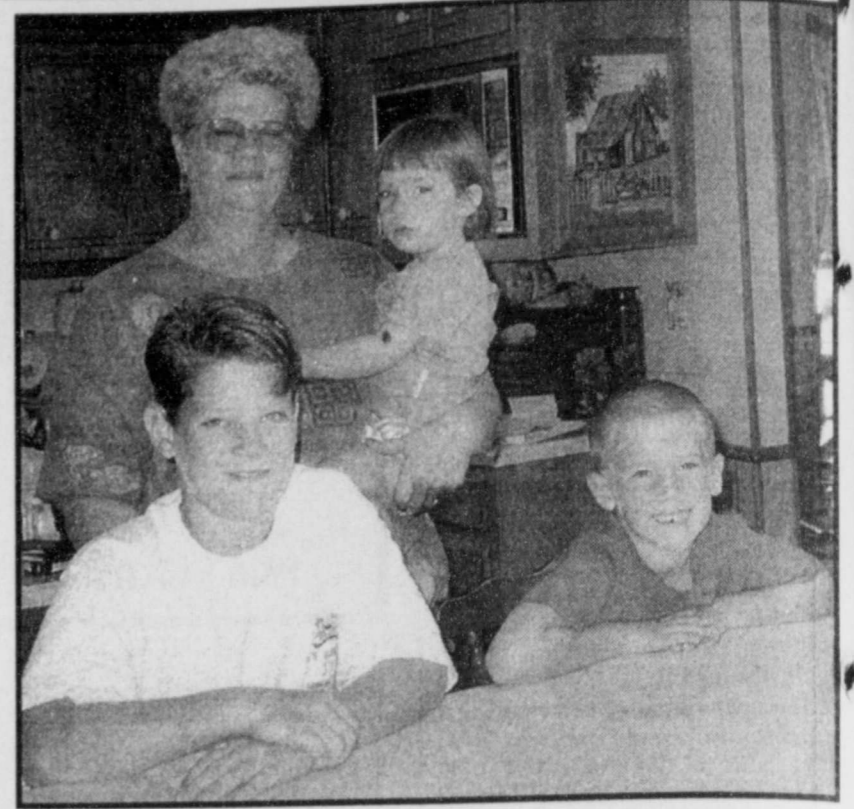

IMMUNIZE YOUR LITTLE TEXAN BY TWO
SHOTS ACROSS TEXAS SHOTLINE

Q. What is the recommended schedule for childhood immunizations?

A. The schedule recommended by the Texas Department of Health is as follows (physicians' recommendations may vary slightly):
AT BIRTH: Hepatitis B
2 MONTHS: Hepatitis B, DTP (diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis or whooping cough), Polio and Hib (*Haemophilus influenzae* type b)
4 MONTHS: DTP, Polio and Hib
6 MONTHS: Hepatitis B, DTP, Polio and Hib
12-15 MONTHS: DTP, Hib, Varicella (chicken-pox) and MMR (measles, mumps, rubella)
4-6 YEARS: DTP, Polio and MMR
EVERY TEN YEARS: Td (tetanus and diphtheria)

Picante Sauce

- 5 Qts. tomatoes, peeled & chopped
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 Garlic pod, chopped
- 3/4 sugar
- 1 cup vinegar
- salt to taste
- 1 hot pepper
- 2 sweet banana peppers

Ben's Snack

- Mix all together and simmer for about one hour. Put in jars and seal.
- 1 lb ground meat
- Cook meat in skillet with onion and favorite seasoning. Drain real good. Add mayonnaise and mustard to taste. This is good on bread while hot. Try it you'll like it

Caramel Popcorn

- 4 Qts popped corn put in shpan
- Mix and bring to rolling boil until it forms a soft ball in water
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white syrup
- 1 stick oleo

Remove from heat, add 1 tsp. vanilla and 1 tsp. baking soda, stir until foamy. Pour over popcorn and stir, bake for 1 hr. at 250 degrees in oven stirring every 15 minutes, popcorn is delicious.

Josh and Blake's No Bake Cookies

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup butter
- 3 cups instant oatmeal
- 3/4 cup peanut butter
- 4 Tbsp cocoa
- 1 tsp vanilla
- Mix sugar, butter and milk in saucepan. Bring to rolling boil for 1

minute. Remove from heat and add peanut butter, cocoa, oatmeal and vanilla. Mix ingredients well. Using a teaspoon, drop small amounts onto waxed paper. Let cookies cool until firm. My grandkids love these cookies.

Strawberry Dessert

- 1 ((10 ounce) pkg strawberries
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1 pkg. strawberry jello (dry)
- 1 large can evaporated milk
- vanilla wafers

Thaw strawberries, then add sugar, eggs and jello. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Let cool completely. Add milk, which has been chilled and beaten until stiff. Fold into cooled strawberry mixture. Layer, using vanilla wafers. Chill. Looks pretty in crystal glass bowl. Makes a large amount.

Corn bread Salad

- 1 pan baked corn bread
- 3 boiled eggs
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 5 slices fried bacon, drained
- 1 small tomato
- 1 small can green peas
- 1 small can whole kernel corn
- 1/2 small bell pepper
- salt and pepper
- 1/4 tsp garlic
- 1/4 tsp poppy seed
- 1/2 cup pecans, chopped
- Mayonnaise and buttermilk dressing to taste.

Crumble corn bread and bacon. Add all other ingredients. Add enough dressing to moisten mixture. Mix well and refrigerate. Add green onions and red pimentos for color. Nuts are optional.

Parents may be unaware children are suffering from chronic diarrhea

Many parents may not realize their children are suffering from chronic "non-specific" diarrhea. A child suffering from this type of diarrhea will have loose stools for a long period of time, but otherwise is perfectly healthy," said Dr. Carlos Lifschitz at the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "It usually strikes children at age 1 year and can sometimes last until age 3." Chronic "non-specific" diarrhea is defined as any increase in the number of bowel movements per day and increase in the water of the stool lasting more than 15 days. It's "non-specific" because it has no particular cause. Children need plenty to drink during these hot, summer months, but

excessive amounts of water or fruit can contribute to chronic "non-specific" diarrhea.

"Many times parents will give more liquids to a child suffering with this type of diarrhea to prevent dehydration," said Lifschitz, an associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine. "More fluids equals more liquid stools, and you create a vicious cycle."

However, parasites can also cause diarrhea and children may need to be tested. The best way to stop chronic "non-specific" diarrhea is to decrease the amount of fluids.

"It usually takes two or three days to determine if the fluids are contributing to the diarrhea," Lifschitz said. "Some popular fruit juices contain combinations for sugars which make them less absorbable. The less absorbable a sugar is the more water will be attracted to the gut, leading to diarrhea."

Lifschitz says parents may have to deal with cranky children when they take away their favorite drinks, but it will be worth it in the long run.



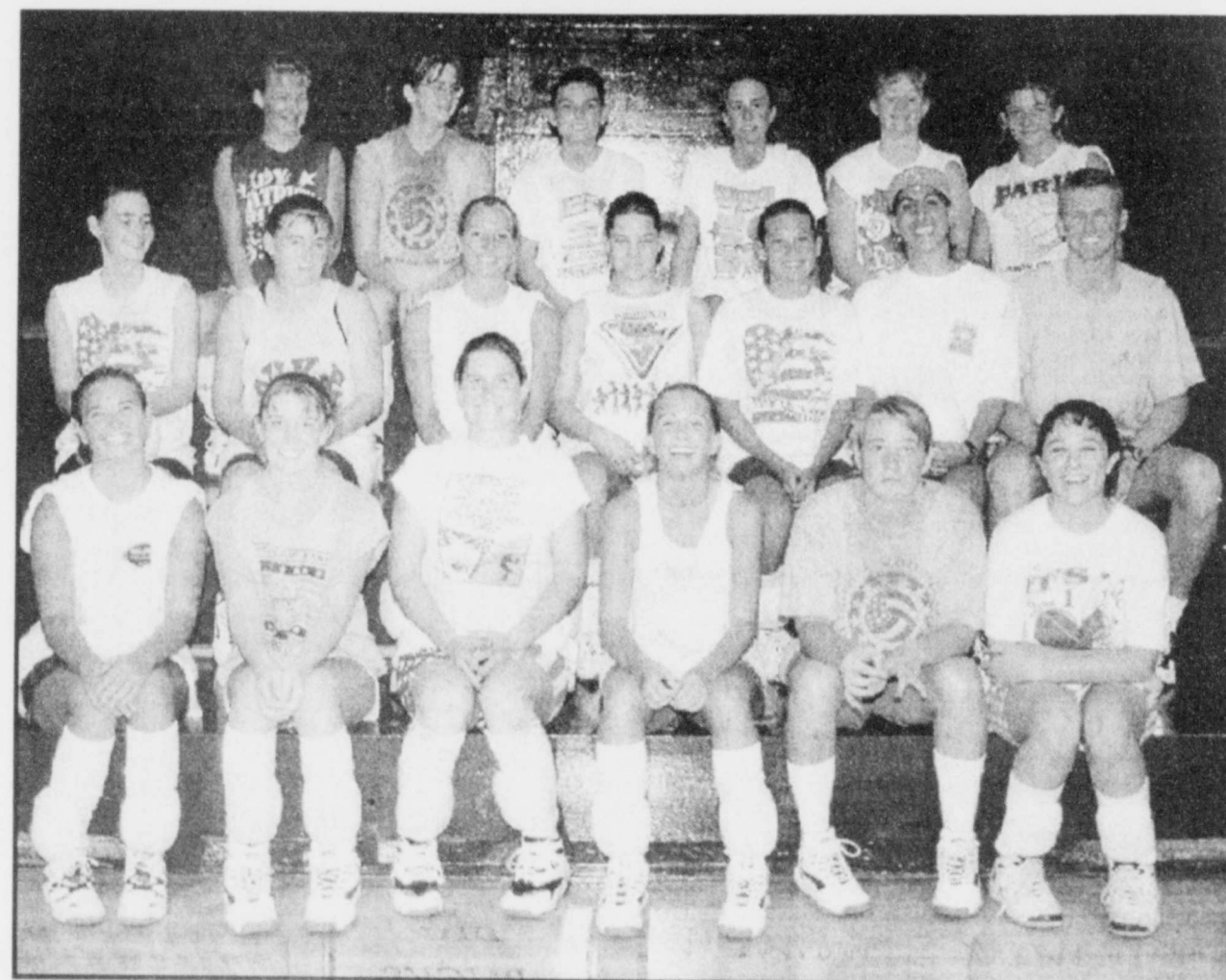

Rabies is confirmed in the area

Hopkins County has reported eight confirmed cases of rabies in tested skunks during the past two months. One dog exhibiting signs of rabies infection was shot after eating a rabid skunk; the dog was not tested.
 Mt. Pleasant had a confirmed rabies in a bat on July 16 within the City Limits. The cat playing with the rabbit bat was also destroyed. Another case of rabies was confirmed in Titus County in a skunk.
 In Mt. Vernon, a cat showing symptoms of rabies was put to sleep.
 Pet owners are strongly urged to

vaccinate their dogs and cats against rabies. Vaccinations must be given yearly. The State of Texas currently has a fine of up to \$2,000 for not having a current vaccination for all dogs and cats over three months of age.
 If you see a skunk or bat out in the daylight that appears to be ill, please contact your local Animal Control Officer. If you kill a suspected rabid animal it must be refrigerated, not frozen, immediately to be tested. In Mt. Vernon, contact Animal Control Officer, Bill Bennett at 537-7186.

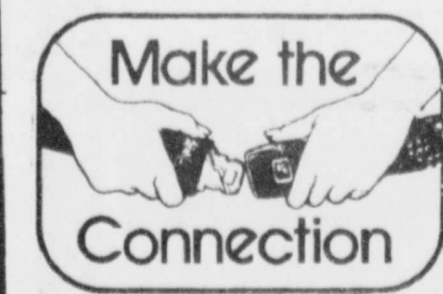
