Youth physical fitness declining

to school this fall, they will be among a growing population of physically

unfit youths. "Children and teenagers are increasingly obese and are not as physically active as their counterparts in previous decades," said Dr. Pat Vehrs, an adolescent health expert at Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

National surveys show that since the 1960s but especially in the last decade, there has been an increase in the percentage of body fat and a decrease in physical activity among youth," said Vehrs, who says 21 percent of children ages 6 to 17 are

Vehrs cites such probable causes

* Parents who work asking their kids to stay at home until they come home. This encourages inactivity by limiting them to indoor pursuits.

Little or no family physical activities. Often parents are too tired when they come home to walk, shoot baskets or bike with their kids

* Increased popularity of "entertainment-by-computer" or television versus old fashioned playing out-

* Fear of neighborhood crime... *Lack of sidewalks, well lit streets, access to parks, gyms or pools in

suburban areas, * Age requirements or rules requiring a guardian's presence at health

clubs. "It's not surprising that kids find it difficult to remain physically active," said Vehrs. "They are not getting enough encouragement from their

parents and society." Neither may they be getting much help at school, he said, where physi-

Chances are, when children return cal education courses are increasingly considered an elective.

Even if they enroll in Physical Education (P.E.) classes are usually less than an hour. By the time they've changed clothes, gotten into the gym and taken roll, there is very little actual time left for physical activity,"

Vehrs states that 70 percent of high school students are physically active for less than 20 minutes during P.E.. Enrollment in P.E. declines as grade levels increase. Only 10 percent of 12th graders are enrolled in daily P.E. says Vehrs.

"This takes a toll far larger than just being in shape. Studies have shown that physical fitness can improve self-esteem, body image, academic performance and improve energy levels," said Vehrs.


Parents are key to motivating children to become physically active.

One of the best ways to get kids to exercise is to become involved yourself," he said." Kids love to exercise with their parents. Whether it's walking biking swimming tennior just sharing time on the treadmill -- if you are enthused, they will become enthused.

Other ways to build-in physical fitness are letting your kids ride their bikes to school or walk if it is safe, encouraging them to play at recess, keeping exercise equipment in the house - - not the garage, looking for church - or other agency sponsored health camps of activities, and including P.E. courses as a regular part

of your child's curriculum. 'Above all, encourage them to do something they like. They will be more inclined to stick with it," said

Tips for parents as new school year begins

The school bells are ringing and parents, children and teachers are beginning a new year of working together to help each child reach his potential.

As the new year begins, students prepare for a new challenge. Parents' participation and involvement are essential to student achievement. Parents can support the literacy development of children in many ways.

Here are some suggestions: Talk up school as a positive place for learning. Show children that you are interested in their achievement and their extra curricular activities.

Homework can be a positive experience if planned carefully by students and parents. Monitor your child's behavior and performance during the year. Some children will need to adjust to different learning and studying needs. First, parents and children should decide on a definite time of the day for homework. Most children should complete their homework immediately after school.

Every home with school age children should designate an area used for completion of homework. This area could be used for independent homework, writing and reading. If you have a personal computer, place it near the homework area. Encourage children to use the computers in writing reports, narratives and other types of word processing.

Can you remember your child's first attempt to ride a bike? Perhaps it was less than perfect. Likewise, his first project, first math test, and first report will be less than perfect.

The confidence that children gain in receiving your support and acceptance over a period of time will motivate them to strive for continued excellence. Please work to establish and maintain a risk-taking environment in your home.

Encourage your child. Take time to sit down an dtalk. Find at least one thing to praise: conduct, attendance, no tardies.

Show interest in what your child learned. Ask questions and let him or her tell you about it. Remember, poor grades don't reflect the value of your child as a human being or your performance as a parent.

Children usually score lower on tests when they are tense. Try to soothe your young worrier with these tips: explain that tests are just one part of school; suggest a relaxation exercise, such as tensing and relaxing tight muscles; encourage your child to study ahead of time to avoid a last minute panic.
