She enjoys trying out recipes and likes to try all varieties and types.

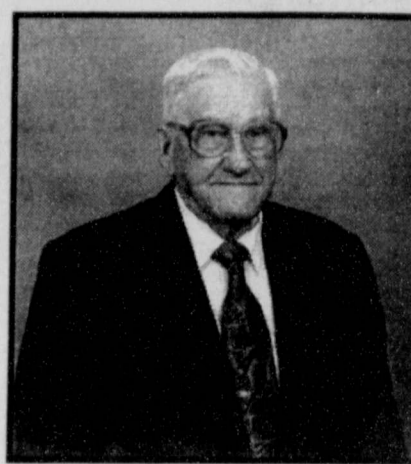

Chicken and Dumplings
Serves 8-10

1 whole chicken
1-1/2 cup carrots-sliced
6 ribs celery-chopped
1 large onion-diced
5 medium potatoes
1 large can raw bisquit dough
salt and pepper to taste

Boil chicken; bone and cut up in large chunks. Add back to stock with vegetables. Simmer until vegetables are tender; salt and pepper to taste. Bring to a rolling boil; pinch off bisquit dough (about 8 per bisquit); drop into pot and boil 5 minutes longer.

Liver and Onions
2-4 servings

1 pound beef liver
1 large onion-sliced
corn meal
bacon grease

Heat bacon grease in large cast iron skillet. Coat liver with corn meal; fry until golden brown. Add onions; cover with water and simmer on low heat for 45 minutes. Thicken gravy with corn starch.

Lasagna
4-6 servings

2 pounds ground beef
1 medium onion-chopped
5 small cans tomato sauce
1 large can mushrooms
1 colve garlic-diced
2 medium bay leaves
1 teaspoon basil
1 teaspoon oregano
1 large container cottage cheese
1 pound grated Monterey-Jack cheese
parmesan cheese
lasagna noodles

Brown beef with onions and drain. Boil noodles. In large sauce pan, add meat and next 6 ingredients. Simmer for 30-45 minutes; remove bay leaves. In 13 x 9 pan, layer noodles, meat sauce, cottage cheese, jack cheese and parmesan, ending with a layer of noodles. Top with jack and parmesan cheese. Bake at 350 degrees until cheese is golden brown.

Chicken Cordon Bleu
6 servings

6 chicken breasts
6 slices ham
6 slices sharp cheddar cheese
Italian bread crumbs
1/2 cup melted butter

Place each chicken breast between

two pieces of wax paper; pound out flat. Place slice of ham and cheese on chicken. Roll chicken around ham and cheese and secure with toothpick. Dip into melted butter and roll in bread crumbs, coating well. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-45 minutes.

Apple Pie
6-8 servings

Crust:
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
2/3 cup shortening
5-7 tablespoons water (ice cold)

Combine flour and salt; cut in shortening until pea size. Add cold water and mix well. Roll out on floured surface. Makes a double crust.
7 medium Granny Smith apples cored, peeled and cut-up
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon allspice
2/3 cup granulated sugar
1 stick butter
2 tablespoons flour

Place apples in raw pie crust. Sprinkle with spices, sugar and flour. Dot with butter and cover with second pie crust; trim and seal edges. Sprinkle top with cinnamon and sugar. Bake at 375 degrees for 55 minutes.

Pumpkin Bread
various size servings

2 cups flour
2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon allspice
1 cup packed brown sugar
1/3 cup shortening
2 eggs
2-1/2 cups fresh pumpkin -cooked
1/4 cup milk
1 cup chopped pecans

Cut up and seed pumpkin; boil until tender, let cool and peel. Mash and drain in a colander for about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Set aside. Combine all dry ingredients. In a large bowl, cream shortening and sugar; add eggs and mix well. Beat in pumpkin and milk. Gradually add dry ingredients mixing well; add pecans. Bake at 350 degrees for 50-60 minutes in loaf pans.

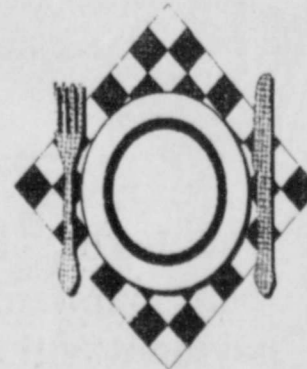
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Deport Nursing Home Locals

So by the time you check out at the register... you are wondering if their will be enough for groceries next week and then someone comes up behind you pushing two buggies and tells you how fortunate that you only have one child and announces that they have three! Thank heaven for small wonders!

Youth physical fitness declining

Chances are, when children return to school this fall, they will be among a growing population of physically unfit youths.

"Children and teenagers are increasingly obese and are not as physically active as their counterparts in previous decades," said Dr. Pat Vehrs, an adolescent health expert at Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

"National surveys show that since the 1960s but especially in the last decade, there has been an increase in the percentage of body fat and a decrease in physical activity among youth," said Vehrs, who says 21 percent of children ages 6 to 17 are obese.

Vehrs cites such probable causes as:

- * Parents who work asking their kids to stay at home until they come home. This encourages inactivity by limiting them to indoor pursuits.

- * Little or no family physical activities. Often parents are too tired when they come home to walk, shoot baskets or bike with their kids.

- * Increased popularity of "entertainment-by-computer" or television versus old fashioned playing outdoors.

- * Fear of neighborhood crime...

- * Lack of sidewalks, well lit streets, access to parks, gyms or pools in suburban areas.

- * Age requirements or rules requiring a guardian's presence at health clubs.

"It's not surprising that kids find it difficult to remain physically active," said Vehrs. "They are not getting enough encouragement from their parents and society."

Neither may they be getting much help at school, he said, where physi-

cal education courses are increasingly considered an elective.

"Even if they enroll in Physical Education (P.E.) classes are usually less than an hour. By the time they've changed clothes, gotten into the gym and taken roll, there is very little actual time left for physical activity," he said.

Vehrs states that 70 percent of high school students are physically active for less than 20 minutes during P.E.. Enrollment in P.E. declines as grade levels increase. Only 10 percent of 12th graders are enrolled in daily P.E. says Vehrs.

"This takes a toll far larger than just being in shape. Studies have shown that physical fitness can improve self-esteem, body image, academic performance and improve energy levels," said Vehrs.

Parents are key to motivating children to become physically active.

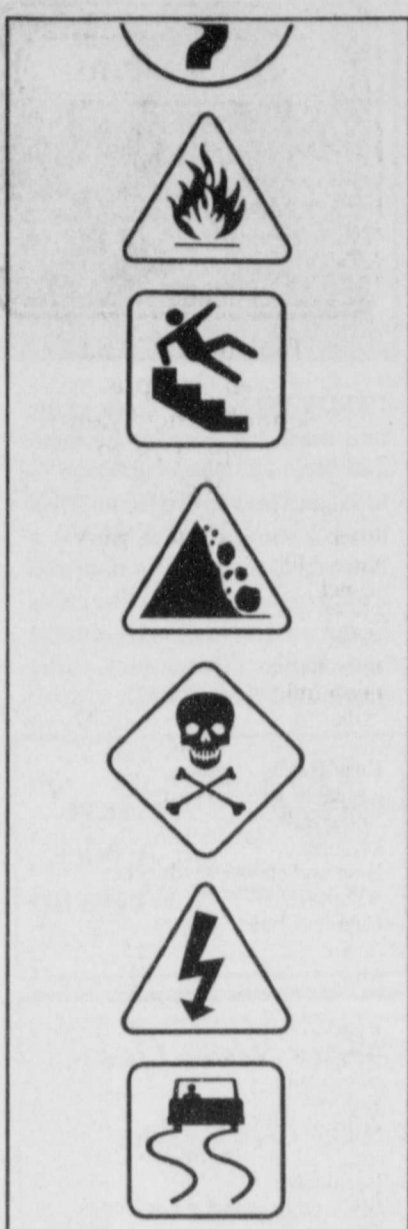
"One of the best ways to get kids to exercise is to become involved yourself," he said. "Kids love to exercise with their parents. Whether it's walking, biking, swimming, tennis or just sharing time on the treadmill - if you are enthused, they will become enthused."

Other ways to build-in physical fitness are letting your kids ride their bikes to school or walk if it is safe, encouraging them to play at recess, keeping exercise equipment in the house - not the garage, looking for church - or other agency sponsored health camps of activities, and including P.E. courses as a regular part of your child's curriculum.

"Above all, encourage them to do something they like. They will be more inclined to stick with it," said Vehrs.

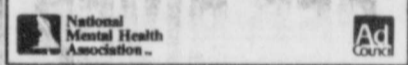

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

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Tips for parents as new school year begins

The school bells are ringing and parents, children and teachers are beginning a new year of working together to help each child reach his potential.

As the new year begins, students prepare for a new challenge. Parents' participation and involvement are essential to student achievement. Parents can support the literacy development of children in many ways.

Here are some suggestions:

Talk up school as a positive place for learning. Show children that you are interested in their achievement and their extra curricular activities.

Homework can be a positive experience if planned carefully by students and parents. Monitor your child's behavior and performance during the year. Some children will need to adjust to different learning and studying needs. First, parents and children should decide on a definite time of the day for homework. Most children should complete their homework immediately after school.

Every home with school age children should designate an area used for completion of homework. This area could be used for independent homework, writing and reading. If you have a personal computer, place it near the homework area. Encourage children to use the computers in writing reports, narratives and other types of word processing.

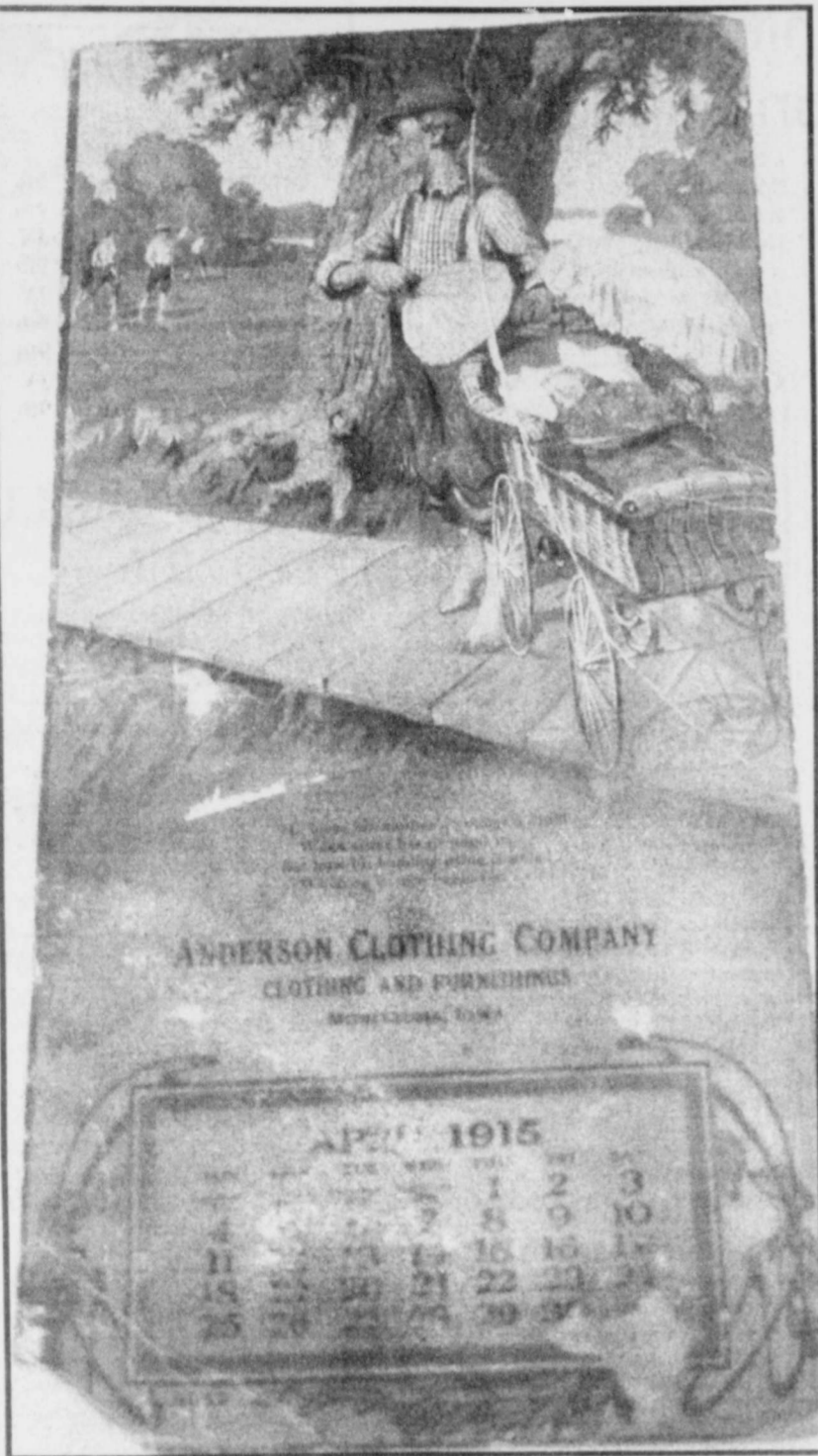
Can you remember your child's first attempt to ride a bike? Perhaps it was less than perfect. Likewise, his first project, first math test, and first report will be less than perfect.

The confidence that children gain in receiving your support and acceptance over a period of time will motivate them to strive for continued excellence. Please work to establish and maintain a risk-taking environment in your home.

Encourage your child. Take time to sit down and talk. Find at least one thing to praise: conduct, attendance, no tardies.

Show interest in what your child learned. Ask questions and let him or her tell you about it. Remember, poor grades don't reflect the value of your child as a human being or your performance as a parent.

Children usually score lower on tests when they are tense. Try to soothe your young worrier with these tips: explain that tests are just one part of school; suggest a relaxation exercise, such as tensing and relaxing tight muscles; encourage your child to study ahead of time to avoid a last minute panic.

The Detroit High School serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.50 and breakfast for \$.75. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

Elementary lunch is \$1.25 and breakfast is \$.75.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC/TANF for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income.

To get free or reduced-price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC/TANF for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC/TANF case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC/TANF case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Ed Jones, Superintendent, Rt. 1, Box 370, Detroit, TX 75436, phone 674-6131.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

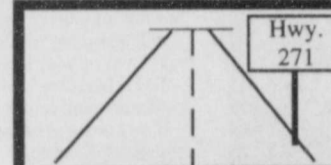
